Approval of Minutes

The minutes of the Board meeting of December 6, 2005, were presented for approval. A motion was made by Ms. Barreras and seconded by Mr. Smith to approve the minutes of the December 6, 2005, meeting as presented. The motion carried unanimously.

Ms. Smith commented that the minutes should state specifically which Board member has asked for a report, study or information and not to merely say, "the Board...." Mr. Thonesen said that it would be taken under advisement.

Delegations, Petitions, and Communications

There were no delegations, petitions, and communications.

Chancellor's Report

Dr. Crow reported that although the details of the Governor's budget are just now being released, some expected highlights provided by the Community College League of California on January 9, 2006, include:

- 5.18% COLA
- 3% for growth
- \$130 million for credit equalization which would bring approximately \$4.5 million for State Center
- \$30 million for Tech Prep expansion
- Increase in Proposition 98 split from 10.45% to 10.79%
- Enrollment fees stay at \$26
- Supports SB 361 by Senator Jack Scott to change the current community college funding model to one recommended by the system.

Chancellor's Report (continued)

The Governor is also proposing a state general obligation bond for the November ballot with \$491 million for community colleges.

Dr. Crow noted that he will be participating in the Madera Visioning Project on Saturday, January 14. Approximately 65 community leaders have been invited to discuss and develop action plans related to growth and development, the economy and infrastructure, culture and community, and health and safety issues that affect Madera County. The Madera Center will benefit tremendously from this coordinated, aggressive effort to improve the quality of life in Madera County

Campus Reports

Dr. Doffoney reported the following from Fresno City College:

- Spring Orientation for faculty and staff on January 5, was highlighted by the presence of Dr. Carol Tomlinson-Keasey, UC Merced Chancellor, who gave an update on the university.
- English Instructor Lee Herrick has been nominated to be a member of PEN, a human rights and international literary organization.
- Fresno City College Instructor Chuck Erven's original play, *Canyon Suite*, is a national finalist for the David Mark Cohen Award for Playwriting. The play is one of only fifteen plays being considered for the award and will be showcased at the 2006 Region VIII American College Theatre Festival at Southern Utah University in February.

Dr. Kershaw reported the following from the North Centers:

- The Art Open House took place December 8 at the Madera Center.
- The LVN Pinning Ceremony was held on December 16.
- An orientation was held January 4, 2006 for the Madera Center College Advantage Program (MCCAP).
- North Centers faculty and staff received a "State of the Centers" overview on January 5, along with sessions on on-line education, disaster preparedness plan, and an inservice for the faculty hiring screening committee.
- An evening orientation was held for new adjunct faculty.
- January 6 workshops at Reedley College, Fresno City College, and the Clovis Center ranged from program review to updates on technology; DSP&S and financial aid services; and sabbatical leave and travel abroad experiences.
- The SCCC Foundation received a donation for the Madera Center in the amount of \$100,000 from Jill and Steve Cholewa, owners of S & J Lumber in Madera.

• Karen Hammer, North Centers Spanish Instructor, was selected to participate in the CCID Summer 2006 Professional Development Program, "The Emerging Community Colleges in Argentina," from July 2-16, 2006.

Academic Senate Report

Ms. Paula Demanett, President of the Fresno City College Academic Senate, reported the following:

• Mr. Lee Herrick, Fresno City College instructor, has been selected as the Academic Senate's nominee for the Hayward Award. Ms. Demanett noted Mr. Herrick's accomplishments as an instructor, club advisor, writer and poet, as well as the awards/prizes he has received. Mr. Herrick was present to acknowledge his nomination and expressed his appreciation.

Classified Senate Report

Ms. Linda Nies, Reedley College Classified Senate President, reported the following:

- The January 26 technology training session topic is Windows File Management.
- The 2006 Classified Professionals Mega Conference is set for April 11 at Pardini's. The title of the conference is "Unmask Your Potential," and the theme is "Mardi Gras." The keynote speaker is Steve Cleveland, Head Basketball Coach at Fresno State University. There will be sessions on developing potential, leadership philosophies, and professional growth opportunities within the District.
- A brown bag lunch is scheduled for February 18 at Reedley College on Outlook pointers and e-mail etiquette.
- Reedley College and North Centers Classified Senate will be selling See's Valentine candy to raise funds for scholarships.

Commission on Athletics Championship Festival Dr. Ned Doffoney stated that Fresno is the host for the inaugural 2005-2006 COA Athletics Championship Festival and gave a brief overview. He introduced Ms. Susan Yates who is the Fresno City College Athletic Director. Dr. Doffoney gave Ms. Yates recognition for her involvement in developing the core of the idea and also for chairing the site selection committee.

Ms. Yates thanked the Board for the opportunity to give an update on the Community College Athletic State Championships. She stated that an idea arose in 2003 to have a festival format for the state championships similar to the Division II model which bundles state championships into one location. She was the chair of the site selection committee. Ultimately, the city of Fresno was awarded the bid to host the first COA Fall Sports Festival (a three-year commitment).

Commission on Athletics Championship Festival (continued)

The festival started November 14, 2005, with women's golf and will conclude with the basketball state championships in March 2006 at Selland Arena. The Board was provided with copies of the Participant Handbook and a summary page of key facts and figures. The summary showed that 1538 students and 420 coaches will participate in the events of the festival.

A strong component of the festival is community outreach, and each sport organization and sport affiliate group is required to do something for the youth in the community such as free sports clinics. The athletic trainers provided a job shadowing activity. The boys and girls clubs will be participating in a free basketball clinic this March. Student-athletes were treated to banquets and other social events. Also, the COA employed several student-athletes to help with running the activities. Student-athletes Jaimie-Rose Walberg, Kaira Kachadurian and Alyssa Porter were present to give testimonials about their rewarding experiences in participating in the community outreach component and in meeting other championship teams.

Consideration to Accept 2004-05 Audit Report [06-01] Action Mr. Doug Brinkley introduced Mr. Ray Cowles, with Vavrinek, Trine, Day & Co., LLP. Mr. Cowles reviewed the 2004-05 Audit Report and handed out copies of the Executive Summary to the Board.

Mr. Forhan questioned unfunded liabilities and the reserve for retiree healthcare, asking where this was addressed in the report.

Mr. Brinkley said an actuarial study will be presented at the Board retreat. The requirements go into effect July 1, 2007, for the 2007-08 fiscal year. He further stated that on January 20 the State Chancellor's Office is holding the first meeting to discuss the guidelines. The California Community College League and the California School Boards Association are finalizing the development of an irrevocable trust to comply with GASB 43/45. Keenan has developed a trust to address GASB 43/45. There are advantages and disadvantages to an irrevocable trust, which will be discussed at the Board Retreat in March.

Mr. Thonesen said he was pleased that on the last four pages of the Audit Report, there were no reportable findings or recommendations listed.

A motion was made by Mr. Patterson and seconded by Mr. Feaver to accept the 2004-05 Audit Report as submitted by the firm Vavrinek, Trine, Day & Co., LLP. The motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Forhan moved and Mr. Feaver seconded the motion to adopt Resolution No. 06-02 providing workers' compensation coverage for District volunteers. The motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Patterson asked about the cost to the District.

Mr. Brinkley responded that the District has been providing the coverage through the JPA where it has been the practice to consider volunteers as employees and entitled to workers' compensation benefits. All workers' compensation is based on the salaries of the District. Adoption of the resolution by the Board ensures proper coverage for the District's volunteers.

Background:

With the recent vacancy of the warehouse position, a close review was conducted to assess bookstore industry standards and requirements. The District bookstores require the new position to be created to assist in functions to support campus bookstore receiving, inventory controls and accuracy in the bookstore system software programs.

Examples of Duties:

Electronically verify receipt of all merchandise and input invoices for bookstores and store pending inventory rotation, stocking and returns. Electronically maintain and log all merchandise in database. Evaluate condition of received product. Photograph condition of damaged freight and file claims with carriers for lost and damaged merchandise. Check in all merchandise on bookstore purchase order, noting discrepancies between order and received goods. Generate bar codes to ensure correct pricing. Maintain accuracy of universal price code/stock keeping unit cross reference items. Use bookstore computer system for various data entry processes and retrieval of information for reports. Certify accuracy of information in system. Price, store, and ship merchandise to colleges and centers. Prepare and ship transfer of merchandise to colleges or centers. Assist with coordination and supervision of stocking and placement of merchandise in warehouse. Maintain supplies required for shipping and receiving functions. Assist with book buyback procedures. Assist with inventory flow. Process all book and merchandise returns in accordance with established bookstore and vendor policies and procedures. Pack items, prepare freight bills and ship items to appropriate vendor or publisher location. Coordinate the return of overstock and defective merchandise. Prepare bills of lading. Complete special inventories. Assist with perpetual and annual inventories. Prepare and ship all e-commerce-generated sales. Ensure safety compliance and health standards are maintained in the receiving department. Maintain and operate shipping and receiving equipment and perform light Bookstore maintenance. Schedule, train and supervise hourly employees in the Bookstore's shipping and receiving area. Complete and accomplish all other duties as assigned.

According to AR 4210.2 and Education Code section 88009, the Board of Trustees shall fix and prescribe the duties to be performed by all persons in the classified service. Background:

During the last legislative session Assemblyman Laird introduced AB 982 to the State Legislature. The bill was passed by the Legislature, signed by the Governor and entered into statute with an effective date of January 1, 2006. This legislation removed from statute the health fee waiver for low-income students, including students who demonstrate financial need. AB 982's stated intention is to ensure that all college students continue to have access to health care services. The current health fees are \$14 at Fresno City College and Reedley College for the fall/spring semesters and \$11 for summer sessions with \$6 being collected at each of the Centers for the three time periods.

The Board requested additional information in regard to the removal of the fee waiver. In the enclosed exhibit, additional information is detailed regarding: the services provided; duplicated headcount of the students previously receiving the health fee waiver based upon fiscal year 2004-05; summary of input from the student leadership at the Colleges and Centers; survey of 13 other college districts; and a revenue and expenditure analysis based upon the 2004-05 fiscal year, including expansion of the program to include services at the North Centers.

A committee made up of College, Center and District management staffs, representing Financial Aid, Student Services, Business Services, Health Services and Admissions and Records, met to discuss the new legislation and implementation. The committee continues to recommend that the District begin collecting the fee. The recommendation has been modified to an effective start date of fall session 2006 for all students enrolled in fall session classes. Staff's review of the revenue records for 2004-05 shows \$323,000 was generated from health fee payments during that fiscal year. Based upon this recommendation, it is estimated the District would have generated an estimated \$953,000 during the same period of time had the fee waiver not existed. With the addition of health services at the North Centers, it is appropriate the fee for the Madera and Clovis Centers be increased to \$14 per semester and \$11 per summer session with the other Centers in the District remaining at \$6 per session.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees authorize the District, in accordance with AB 982, which removes the health fee waiver for low-income students effective January 1, 2006, to collect health fees from all students who are enrolled in classes, beginning with fall semester 2006, as follows:

- a) Fresno City College, Reedley College, the Madera Center and Clovis Center \$14 per semester and \$11 for summer sessions; and
- b) all other Centers in the District \$6 for all sessions.

CONSIDERATION TO APPROVE HEALTH FEE Exhibit #1

Services to Students

Health Services performs many functions for the Colleges and Centers. It strives to: remove barriers for students as they seek out health services both on the campuses and in the community; increase the educational successes of students by providing assistance, guidance and referrals; increase students' understanding of self care; provide assistance with minor health issues and referral to community health services; and respond to medical emergencies on campus. This is accomplished through both medical and psychological services being made available at each of the campuses. The students at Fresno City College and Reedley College have access to the following health services. These services are also available to students attending the North Centers to the degree they are able to access Reedley College.

Health Services

- Assist with Blue Cross accident insurance claims (coverage is provided for every student by the District)
- · Provide confidential health assessments and counseling
- Provide screening tests, such as blood pressure, blood sugar, vision, and hearing tests
- Administer emergency first aid and determine if further medical referral is needed
- Monitor and assist students in making decisions related to chronic health conditions, such as cystic fibrosis, diabetes, cerebral palsy, etc.
- Provide case management and report communicable diseases (TB, Chickenpox, Scabies, Strep Throat, Flu, etc.) to reduce spread of the disease to other students
- Provide communicable disease testing and immunizations to students to meet instructional prerequisites (estimated at \$40 for a TB test at a doctor's office and \$10 at a health department)
- Distribute information and provide counseling regarding alcohol and other drugs, as well as other health concerns
- Participate as a member of the Substance Abuse Education and Prevention Committee
- Provide health promotion and education to individuals, groups and classrooms
- Make referrals to health providers in the community
- Assist the athletic department with physicals and meet with injured athletes regarding follow-up care issues

- Provide crisis response support to students
- Create, purchase and distribute health education materials at a variety of activities throughout the year

Psychological Services

- Provide six to ten individual, brief therapy sessions for each student as requested
- Provide crisis intervention
- Provide group therapy sessions as requested
- Administer psychological testing (i.e. ADD, ADHD, Learning Disabilities, etc.)
- Make referrals to providers of mental health care when continued care is needed
- Provide lectures on stress, depression, behavior change, smoking cessation, substance abuse, etc.
- Provide screening and referral for alcohol and other drug abuse counseling for individuals and groups
- Perform annual screenings for eating disorders, anxiety, depression, and alcohol abuse
- Provide consultation to instructors regarding classroom management and individual student learning disabilities

Student Leadership Input

The Colleges and Centers have been meeting with their respective student leadership groups to determine the student body's interest in levying student health fees to all students on the campus. Following are summaries of the student leadership interests related to the levying of health fees.

Fresno City College:

The FCC Student Government met with Health Services faculty members Linda Albright and Jennifer Brennan on Monday, January 23, 2006, to discuss the implications of implementing a total health fee payment system for all students. After hearing, questioning and understanding the value of health and psychological services provided to students, the FCC Student Government agreed to support the implementation of the proposed fee.

North Centers:

The Reedley College Nurse, Associate Dean of Students and the North Centers ASB Advisor met with 12 Associated Student Body and Club officers on January 20 to discuss the new health fees for the Madera and Clovis Centers and the proposal to have BOG-eligible students pay the health fee beginning Fall 2006. Pat Jackson, RC Nurse, gave the students an overview of the need for a full-time Nurse for the Clovis and Madera Centers,

as well as the benefits obtained if all students pay the proposed health fees. The officers were very positive towards the new Nurse position and supported the full-fee payment by all students. They are writing a letter of support to the RC and FCC Board of Trustees student representatives this week with a copy to Dr. Kershaw.

Reedley College:

Dean of Students Ruben Fernandez and Nurse Pat Jackson met with students at two meetings held on January 10 (ASB) and January 23, 2007 (Deans Student Advisory Council [DSAC]). Both meetings were well attended with the majority of the meeting time dedicated to the pending changes in the health fee charges. Information about health services was provided and students' questions were addressed at both meetings. LaShanda Mack, Student Trustee, was in attendance at both meetings. After much discussion to clarify the issues, the consensus of both student groups was to support the charging of the health fee to all students, including those who were previously exempt.

As you can see, the student leadership on the campuses is supportive of the removal of the fee waiver.

Of the thirteen Districts listed four districts do not have Health Centers. Six districts have approved implementation of the fee for either spring session 2006 or fall semester 2006 with most opting for the fall semester. Three districts are yet to take action on the fee waiver change with two districts recommending the fee.

Fiscal Analysis Using Fiscal Year 2004-05 Data

The current health fees are \$14 at Fresno City College and Reedley College for the fall/spring semesters and \$11 for summer sessions with \$6 being collected at each of the Centers for the three time periods. The Board requested additional information regarding the collection of health fees in the District. The following information has been developed using 2004-05 data. The 2004-05 fiscal year was chosen because it is the most recent, fully completed fiscal year.

Students who complete a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and have at least \$1 of unmet need qualify for a BOG C.

The estimated total of health fee revenue which would have been collected had all students paid the fee in 2004-05 would have been \$953,000. This would have meant an increase of \$630,000 in fee revenue for health services in lieu of the \$323,000 collected from the existing fee program. The \$323,000 represents a reduced collection in health fees in 2004-05 as a result of a \$5 fee established for the Centers (CTC, Oakhurst, Clovis and Madera) rather than the \$13 charged at the Colleges. Discussed below are the addition of nursing services at the Clovis and Madera Centers for the 2006-07 school year and the levying of the full fee to students in those Centers.

In 2004-05 the actual cost to operate Health Services at Fresno City College and Reedley College was \$744,000. This means the program encroached upon the General Fund a total of \$421,000 for the fiscal year. The District is proposing to add Health Services at the North Centers in 2006-07. The North Centers are planning to employ one Nurse and two permanent/part-time clerical staff along with the necessary materials to provide services similar to the two Colleges in the District. The budget to provide the staff is estimated at \$143,000, with supplies, equipment and other related expenses for the two locations increasing the budget to \$180,000. With this increased cost the Health Services operating budget would be approximately equal to the revenues generated from the fees.

It is important to remember that the District has been able to submit a claim for reimbursement to the State for the fees that were previously waived by statute; hence, the District was able to claim the lost revenue from the BOG fee waiver. The reimbursement was submitted to the State based upon the District's actual cost to provide the service with the understanding the District was to collect health fees from the student population not specifically waived in statute. Although these funds have been slow in coming, the District believes the reimbursements will ultimately be received. Should the Board choose not to levy the fee, as authorized by statute, it is unlikely the State Controller's Office will approve reimbursement of a mandate under any circumstance and will cite the fact that the District made the choice not to charge such a fee.

If the fee is not instituted, the District will lose more than \$1,000,000 in revenue based upon the increased cost and growth in the student population. This is a significant revenue source which needs to be kept in place to maintain services, as stated in AB 982, and/or to expand services, as in the case of the North Centers. The need to maintain this critical service and funding source is even further compounded with the need to plan for the funding of the retiree health benefits, meet the expectations of the collective bargaining units in both salary and benefits, meet the full-time faculty growth obligation, support the successful opening and expansion of the North Centers into the Willow/International Campus, and develop future access opportunities for students within the District.

Conclusion

A committee made up of College, Center and District management staffs, representing Financial Aid, Student Services, Business Services, Health Services and Admissions and Records, met to discuss the new legislation and implementation. The committee, after reviewing the fiscal data and the information presented in this report, continues to believe the change in the fee waiver should both be supported and implemented to ensure continued services at the Colleges and expanded services for the North Centers. Although levying fees is not popular in these fiscal times, considering the direct benefit this fee provides to students and the critical need for these service by many students, the cost of less than \$3 per month is affordable and an important service to provide.

Background:

Enclosed is the December 31, 2005, Quarterly Financial Status Report (CCFS-311Q) for the District General Fund, as required for California community college districts (ECS 84043). In accordance with State instructions, a copy of the report is forwarded electronically to the State Chancellor's Office.

The quarterly financial report reflects projected revenues and expenditures in line with the annual budget, as amended for additional grants, programs, etc. Actual revenues and expenditures are consistent with expectations at mid-year, allowing for the fact that most of the revenue from property taxes and certain federal monies, i.e., VTEA, is not received until later in the fiscal year.

The District is projecting total FTES of 26,606 which is approximately 1.5% more than the amount funded by the State Chancellor's Office last year.

Background:

The Governor's 2006-07 Proposed Budget provides for a cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) of 5.18% and a 3% increase in FTES growth systemwide. In addition, the proposal includes statutory COLA and growth of 5.18% and 1.74%, respectively, for each of the following: Basic Skills, Extended Opportunity Programs (EOPS), Disabled Students Programs and Services (DSPS) and Matriculation. The 2006-07 Proposed Budget includes funding from the previous Partnership for Excellence (PFE) 2004-05 "set-aside" and the 2005-06 equalization funding as part of the base allocations to districts.

In the Proposed Budget the student fees remain at the current \$26 level. It also contains \$130 million for equalization, which will bring the total funding for equalization to \$240 million over a three-year period of time. The budget also increases from \$20 million to \$50 million funding for Career Technical Education. The State's contribution to the State Teachers Retirement System (STRS) is budgeted in the State Budget, unlike last year when the Governor proposed transferring that contribution from the State to the K-14 Districts without offsetting funding.

This Proposed Budget is a favorable budget for the Community College System and takes major strides in equalizing funding among the colleges and districts in the System. It is important to recognize that the Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) has determined the Proposed Budget is approximately \$7 billion more in expenditures than revenue.

Of further note, the Governor is supportive of placing a statewide bond measure for educational facilities on the November ballot and has indicated support for the System's proposed legislation to modify, simplify and improve the fund allocation model.
