Chancellor's Report

Dr. Crow reported the following:

Strategic Planning Charrette – On October 29, nearly 200 business, education and community leaders met at Fresno City College to participate in a districtwide strategic planning charrette. The purpose of the charrette was to solicit feedback and input for the SCCCD strategic plan. Participants were given a draft copy of the plan ahead of time and were asked to bring their comments, questions and concerns to the charrette. The response was overwhelming. There was a lot of energy and excitement in the room, and as a result of the charrette, there were some very helpful suggestions for revisions throughout the plan. This is exactly the kind of input and "buy-in" we had hoped for in order to produce a final document that is dynamic and, more importantly, "doable." The next step in the process is to review the input received and present a draft of the plan to the Board at their December 11, 2007, meeting.

Dr. Crow thanked Trustees Ron Feaver, Phil Forhan, Dorothy Smith and Les Thonesen for participating in the charrette. He extended his appreciation to Dr. Cynthia Azari, Dr. Teresa Patterson and their staff for planning and orchestrating the event. He also thanked the faculty and staff who served as facilitators and recorders.

Old Administration Building Kick-off – November 7, 2007, will mark another significant rite of passage in the campaign to restore the Old Administration Building at Fresno City College. The gathering to celebrate the construction kick-off is scheduled for 11 a.m. at the OAB south entrance. Community members will also join SCCCD in celebrating this long-awaited moment.

Chancellor's Report (continued)

Dr. Crow said that SCCCD Board members have demonstrated their support for the OAB through words and actions by supporting the Measure E bond in 2002, which provided the catalyst for the "Legacy Renewed" capital campaign. The Board also voted to direct \$5 million from unexpended Measure E dollars towards the OAB project. In addition, each Board member made a personal contribution towards the project. The celebration is the next step in seeing the OAB project to fruition by marking the first day of construction.

Gary Soto Award – Noted author and poet, Gary Soto, will be honored November 16, 2007, at the annual convention of the Community College League of California. Gary, a Fresno native and former student at Fresno City College, will receive the prestigious California Community College Distinguished Alumni Award. Gary's work as an author and poet has earned him numerous awards and accolades. Gary has been a major supporter of Fresno City College and the Old Administration Building project, and community colleges in general. He has generously shared his time, talent and treasure to help advance our mission.

Campus Reports

Dr. Doffoney reported on the following topics from Fresno City College. Copies of the report were provided.

- A special Veterans' Day ceremony on November 9 will pay tribute to all veterans who served in the Navy, particularly submariners. The annual Citizens Soldier Award will be presented to business instructor Jim Makofske.
- Native American Heritage Month will be commemorated with a procession on November 1, along with the Pow Wow Dancers, food booths, films, speakers, and a panel discussion. A scholarship fundraiser dinner on November 8 will feature acclaimed poet, activist, actor, and national recording artist John Trudell. Trudell will also be a speaker on November 9.
- Geology instructor Brandy Anglen will discuss her dissertation research on ice-covered lakes in Antarctica at the November 16 cross-campus colloquium.
- Donations for the annual Holiday Baskets for needy students are now being accepted. The goal is to distribute 350 baskets.

Dr. Hioco reported on the following topics from Reedley College. Copies of the report were provided for the Board.

- Animal Science Instructor David Lopes was honored by the Big Fresno Fair with a service recognition award.
- Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE) is coordinating "A Night with Elvis" scholarship fundraising dinner on Saturday November 17 at the Reedley Opera House.

- The Reedley College annual holiday dinner is December 13.

- The Madera Community College Center hosted its first business conference with workshops for students, faculty, and community business and workforce partners. Dr. Victoria Halsey, Vice President of Applied Learning with Ken Blanchard Companies, was a presenter.
- The annual High School Counselors' conference was held at the Clovis Center on November 5. Ninety counselors from throughout the State Center service area participated.
- November Transfer Center activities at the North Centers include student field trips to UC Santa Cruz and UCLA, CSU online application workshops, a UC application workshop, and visits from UC Merced, CSU Fresno, and Fresno Pacific representatives.

Academic Senate Report

Mr. Rick Santos, Fresno City College Academic Senate President, reported the following:

- The Academic Senate discussed the FCC mission, vision and core values statements and is looking forward to having them implemented.
- Fresno City College Academic Senate and the Reedley College Academic Senate are jointly working on a resolution for starting the use of an FW grade.
- Another resolution being worked on is recommending that all instructors submit all their end of the grading period paperwork online.
- Bill Turini, Rick Santos and two members from the executive board went to the statewide plenary last week. Two resolutions that were approved are 1) the agents for change (examining role of student learning outcomes and assessment coordinators in California Community Colleges), and 2) an articulation transfer resolution asking the senates to begin discussions at the local level about the potential of expanding current enrollment for secondary students.

Community College Leadership Academic Seminar Series (CCLASS)

Randy Rowe, Associate Vice Chancellor of Human Resources, presented a report on the Community College Leadership Academic Seminar Series (CCLASS), a professional development program in partnership with the CSU Central Valley Educational Leadership Institute. CCLASS is a two-year academic leadership program designed for aspiring academic leaders throughout SCCCD. It is a comprehensive cohort program that focuses on the demands, multiple roles, and critical nature of academic leadership in community colleges. First year class topics include leadership traits and vision, coaching, personnel/legal issues, client/education/business relationships, and learning community/team building. Year two provides participants an opportunity to put into practice the leadership knowledge and skills presented in the first year of the program. Topics include case studies, shadowing experiences, conflict resolution training, historical mapping of SCCCD, and a leadership film study. Cohort I will hold their final class on November 13, 2007, and Cohort III has just begun their classes. The average class size is 24 members.

Reports of Board Members A motion was made by Mr. Smith and seconded by Mr. Thonesen that the Board of Trustees authorize the District to enter into an agreement with Alliance of Schools for Cooperative Insurance Programs (ASCIP) to provide insurance for the Fresno City College Old Administration Building (OAB) project under the Owner Controlled Insurance Program at the following levels:

- a) workers' compensation insurance for the contractors at the statutory level (full coverage);
- b) employer's liability insurance at \$26 million
- c) general liability at \$29 million; and

Meets on the third or fourth Tuesday of each month at Barthuli & Associates in Fresno. (Current representative is Trustee Forhan.)

Director, Valley Insurance Program JPA

Background:

The North Centers are in need of a full-time police officer. The student population of Willow International, Clovis, and Madera Centers exceeds 6,700 students. Currently, calls for police service during daytime hours are handled by an officer from the Fresno City College campus. The driving time to these campuses is at a minimum of 25 minutes. The presence of a full-time officer will allow the department to have a proactive presence at the North Centers. This position will be funded from the 2007-08 General Fund budget.

Police Officer Examples of Duties:

Duties include investigating criminal activity, apprehending law violators, controlling dangerous and violent persons, operating emergency vehicles within legal guidelines, conducting plant security inspections, assisting staff and public with directions, unlocking or jumpstarting vehicles, and investigating non-criminal incidents. Police officers may be required to perform other duties such as field training officer, firearms and tactical weapons instructor, first aid and CPR training, background investigations, and other related duties as assigned.

Background:

The Willow International Center is in need of two new positions: a full-time Lead Custodian and a full-time Groundskeeper I. These positions are needed based on the completion of the 80,000 square-foot academic building and new central plant, the 11,000 square-foot child development center and the 5,000 square-foot food service and bookstore facility, as well as 30 acres of landscaped area, a child development play yard, 12 acres of parking lots and roadways, 60 acres of undeveloped land, and 1.5 miles of street right-of-ways. These positions will be funded from the 2007-08 General Fund budget.

Lead Custodian Example of Duties:

Duties include leading, training and monitoring employees in the performance of custodial duties including emptying trash containers, cleaning chalkboards, arranging furniture, dusting, cleaning, disinfecting and restocking restrooms, sweeping and mopping floors, vacuuming carpet, washing windows, stripping and waxing floors. Performs other related duties as needed.

Groundskeeper I Example of Duties:

Duties include mowing lawns, trimming shrubbery, pruning trees, general cleanup on campus, raking and weeding flowerbeds, applying pesticides and fertilizer, repairing and maintaining irrigation systems, assisting in the preparation of sports turf, planting of new shrubs, trees or plants, maintenance of the campus grounds, participating in seminars, workshops or other training opportunities. Performs other related duties as needed.

Recommendation:

- 1. Business Administration 55, Introduction to Logistics, 3 units, 3 lecture hours, pass/no pass option. Basic Skills Advisories: Eligibility for English 125, 126, and Math 101.

 This course is an exploration of contemporary logistics and supply chain management from a managerial perspective. The fundamentals of modern logistics are covered. (VOC) (Common with FCC's Business Administration 55)
- 2. Business Administration 59, Applications in Logistics Management, 3 units, 3 lecture hours pass/no pass option. Subject Advisories: Information Systems 15. Basic Skills Advisories: Eligibility for English 125, 126, and Mathematics 101.

 Focus is on logistics management business applications. Emphasis on Famous software. (VOC) (Unique)
- 3. English 15F, Creative Writing: Screenwriting, 3 units, 3 lecture hours, pass/no pass option, (repeats=1). Subject Prerequisites: English 1A. Fulfills RC General Education Area C-Humanities.

 This is a workshop course intended for students who have begun to write for the screen which includes appropriate reading, viewing, and analyses. (Unique)
- 4. Film 2B, History of Cinema: 1960 to present, 3 units, 3 lecture hours, grading scale only. Subject Advisories: Completion of Film 1 with a "C" or better Basic Skills Advisories: Eligibility for English 125 or 126. Fulfills RC General Education Area C-Humanities.

 This course is a survey of significant films and advances in the reception, influence and creation of cinema from 1960 to the present. Instruction will include the international reach and commercial success of the film industry, the hegemony of Western film, the maintenance and the re-tooling of Hollywood as a labor force from the Classical period to the present. Also, this course charts the filmic conventions and advancements of narrative and documentary film, and how film is used as a political argument or as indoctrination. Analyses will include varying film criticisms from feminist to Marxist to reception theory, among others. (Common with FCC's Film 2B)
- 5. Film 5, Digital Filmmaking, 3 units, 3 lecture hours, grading scale only, (repeats=3). Subject Advisories: Film 1. Basic Skills Advisories: Eligibility for English 125 or 126.

 Participation in this course serves as an introduction to digital filmmaking from both assigned topics and original scripts, including techniques for shooting, light set up, sound capture and dubbing and editing of short films. Emphasis is on the application of personal creative expression with guidance from a script of fictional work, and inspiration from professional and well-regarded examples. (Common with FCC's FILM 5)
- 6. Human Services 19V, Work Experience (Cooperative), Occupational, 1-4 units, grading scale only, 3 repeats. Subject Prerequisites: Human Services 20. Subject Corequisites: Human Services 24. Fall and Spring Semesters: Must be enrolled in a minimum of 7 units, including work experience. Summer Session: Must be enrolled in at least one other course.

 Supervised employment directly related to the student's major and/or career goals in the field of Human Services. Success on the job, including interpersonal, problem solving, and communication skills; office dynamics and adapting to change. Group interaction. Collaborative learning activities specific to human services. Learning objectives established specific to human services. Finger printing may be required upon some field placements. (VOC)(Unique)

- 7. Human Services 20, Introduction to Social Welfare, 3 units, 3 lecture hours, grading scale only. Basic Skills Advisories: Eligibility for English 125 and 126.

 Social, economic, political, historical and philosophical components in the development of social welfare and social work in western society. (VOC)(Common with FCC's Human Services 20)
- 8. Human Services 24, Fundamentals of Interviewing and Counseling, 3 units, 3 lecture hours, grading scale only. Basic Skills Advisories: Eligibility for English 125 and 126.

 An introduction to principles and theories of interviewing and counseling for professionals going into the field of Counseling, Psychology and Social Work. This course focuses on specific micro and macro skills within a human service setting. Analysis of the dynamics between counselor and clients will be examined. The Code of Ethics and principle of the human service profession will be addressed.

 (VOC) (Common with FCC's Human Services 24)
- 9. Human Services 30, Group and Community Social Services, 3 units, 3 lecture hours, grading scale only. Subject Corequisites: Human Services 20. Basic Skills Advisories: Eligibility for English 125 and 126. Methods of social work intervention with individual, group, and community; problem analysis and available services. (VOC)(Common with FCC's Human Services 30)
- 10. Office Technology 16, Preparing for a Job Interview, 1 unit, short-term course 18 lecture hours, pass/no pass option. Basic Skills Advisories: Eligibility for English 125 and 126.

 This course is designed to prepare the Office Technology student to conduct an effective job search within the office assistant, administrative assistant or medical office assistant career path. A variety of topics will be covered including personal skill evaluations; where and how to look for office jobs; writing a cover letter and resume, highlighting and implementing their office technology skills; correctly completing an office job application; interview attire; body language and personal mannerisms; management of cell phones and answering machines; the intent of general interview questions as well as questions specific to office technology; and follow-up calls and letters. (VOC) (Unique)
- 11. Office Technology 17, Job Retention and Responsibilities, 1 unit, short-term course 18 lecture hours, pass/no pass option. Basic Skills Advisories: Eligibility for English 125 and 126.

 This course will cover a variety of topics related to succeeding at work as an office assistant, an administrative assistant, a secretary, and/or a medical administrative assistant. Topics will include job orientation, business office employer expectations, customer service, dealing with difficult coworkers in the office, goal setting and career planning, mentoring, continuing education, and business ethics. Students will also be asked to examine their personal lives to determine and correct any potential issues that may hinder their ability to maintain their jobs in an office. (VOC) (Unique)

I. Executive Summary


Introduction

This is the Compliance Review of the County of Fresno's Treasurer's Investment Pool Portfolio for the period ended September 30, 2007, pursuant to California Government Code 53646. The report has two primary objectives: (1) to provide information regarding portfolio holdings as to compliance with California Government Code Sections 53601 and 53635, as well as the County Treasurer's Statement of Investment Policy and (2) to detail portfolio characteristics of the portfolio's investment holdings.

Quarterly Overview of Markets

During the quarter, the U.S. Treasury curve grew more precipitous as yields decreased across the entire maturity spectrum. At the September 2007 meetings, the Federal Reserve decided to lower its target for the federal funds rate 50 basis points to 4.75%. The Federal Reserve noted that while growth was moderate during the first half of the year, the tightening of credit conditions has the potential to intensify the housing correction and to restrain economic growth more generally. The lowering of the federal funds rate is intended to help forestall some of the adverse effects on the broader economy that might otherwise arise from the disruptions in financial markets and to promote moderate growth over time.

As indicated on the previous page, during the third quarter of 2007, yields decreased across the entire maturity spectrum. The yield on 1-year Treasury Bonds decreased 86 basis points to 4.05%, while the yield on 30-year Treasury Bonds decreased 29 basis points to 4.83%. The spread between the 1-year Treasury and the 30-year Treasury ended the quarter at 78 basis points, widening from 21 basis points at the end of last quarter. During the quarter, yields on 90-day Certificates of Deposits decreased 11 basis points, and 180-day maturity yields also decreased 23 basis points. The 30-day Commercial Paper decreased 51 basis points from last quarter.

Portfolio Position

The portfolio maintained a weighted maturity of less than 21 months. The County of Fresno Investment Policy (revised December 2006) Section 11.0 recommends a portfolio of securities with a weighted average maturity not to exceed 550 days. Keeping the portfolio within this maturity range minimized its exposure to potential interest rate shifts that can occur in the midmaturity sectors of the yield curve. The portfolio was oriented towards high quality, with 77.4% of the portfolio's assets invested in risk-free instruments.

Compliance with California Government Codes 53601 & 53635:

The Investment Portfolio is compliant with the California Government Codes 53601 and 53635.

Compliance with Treasury Investment Pool Statement of Investment Policy:

The Statement of Investment Policy is more stringent than the California Government Code. As of 9/30/07, the Treasurer's Investment Pool portfolio complied with its Statement of Investment Policy.

Please refer to the next section of the report for a more detailed evaluation of the portfolio in relationship to the California Government Code and the Treasurer's Investment Pool Statement of Investment Policy.

Portfolio Characteristics

The Treasury Pool's portfolio characteristics are indicative of a plan exhibiting a high degree of quality with short-term maturities.

- As of 9/30/07, the portfolio had a market value of \$2.1 billion with an average dollarweighted quality of "AAA."
- Approximately 77.4% of the portfolio's assets are invested in securities with virtually no credit risk (i.e., U.S. Agencies and cash).
- The dollar weighted average life of the pool is 616 days.
- 17.1% of the portfolio at cost matures within 30 days, 21.5% matures within 90 days, and 29.3% within 180 days (see Appendix for further details).

Based on its relative high quality and near-term liquidity, and assuming no significant changes to pool funding policies, the Treasury Investment Pool is well positioned to meet its expenditure requirements over the next six months.






Portfolio Breakdown by Investment Type (valued at cost)

To determine T-Fund's net asset value per share, the daily valuation of portfolio securities is performed in accordance with BIMC's matrix pricing policy.

BIMC uses a matrix pricing methodology that is based on pricing tiers called matrix codes, and time cells that extend out the yield curve.

The matrix codes represent how a security trades relative to other securities of the same type. Security prices (yields) represent the bid side of the market and are indicative of where Blackrock would expect to be able to sell that security.

Prices of repurchase agreements come from Bloomberg. BlackRock also checks the data against Broker/Dealers who are major participants in specific money market areas. IDC provides prices for Treasury bills, notes, and bonds.

Portfolio valuations are performed daily. Portfolio managers who are members of the matrix pricing team check data for accuracy. This data feeds the fund accounting system that determines the fund's net asset value per share. The variance to a \$1.00/share is noted and reported to the portfolio manager daily.

Depending on market conditions, the number of matrix codes and the spread between tiers may change. BlackRock reviews these factors periodically and change them as conditions warrant.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Average Maturity - The weighted average time to principal repayment. Useful as an approximation of a single maturity where the mean or average maturity is used to describe the life of the instrument.

Bankers Acceptance - Money market instrument created from transactions involving foreign trade. In its simplest form, a bankers acceptance is a check, drawn on bank by an importer or exporter of goods.

Basis Point - 1/100th of 1%.

Certificate of Deposit - A short term money market instrument representing a receipt from a bank for a deposit at a specified rate of interest for a specified period of time.

Coupon Rate - The annual interest paid of a fixed-income instrument.

Commercial Paper - Money Market instrument representing a short-term promissory note of a large corporation at a specified rate of return for a specified period of time.

Current Yield - A bond's coupon expressed as a percentage of the bond's market price.

Discount Rate - The interest rate used to translate a future value into a present value.

Duration - Often times referred to as Macaulay's duration is a fixed income measure of price sensitivity to changes in yields. It is calculated by taking a weighted average of the time periods to receipt of the present value of the cash flows from a fixed income instrument.

Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation - Also known as "FHLMC" and Freddie Mac. FHLMC is a Private Corporation authorized by Congress, which sells notes, participation certificates and other mortgage obligations backed by mortgage pools.

Federal National Mortgage Association - Also known as "FNMA" and Fannie Mae. A private corporation which buys and sells residential mortgages insured by FHA or guaranteed by VA. FNMA also issues notes, participation certificates and other mortgage obligations backed by mortgage pools.

Government National Mortgage Corporation - Also known as "GNMA" and Ginnie Mae. A wholly-owned U.S. government corporation. GNMA issues and guarantees mortgage-backed securities which are backed by the full faith and credit of the United States Government.

Repurchase Agreement - Short term collateralized loan at a specified rate for a specified period, used by large investors as an alternative for cash investments.

Yield to Maturity - The internal rate of return of a standard bond held to maturity.

Background:

It is necessary that the residence hall rental rate at Reedley College be established early in order that the information may be included in the college publications so that incoming students for 2008-09 can be properly informed. Because of an increase in the cost of operations, it is appropriate to raise the fees for the 2008-09 academic year. The current rental rate is \$2,480 (\$1,240 per semester), plus a nonrefundable contract fee of \$135. It is proposed that the 2008-09 residence hall rental rate be established at \$2,620 (\$1,310 per semester), plus a nonrefundable contract fee of \$140.

Background:

Title V of the California Code of Regulations allows districts to charge instructional materials fees for materials which are of continuing value to the students outside of the classroom setting, including, but not limited to, textbooks, tools, equipment, clothing, and those materials which are necessary for a student's vocational training and employment.

Many of the non-credit courses and various credit courses provide programs that are appropriate for assessment of an instructional materials fee. These programs include such items as woodworking projects, flower arranging, ceramics projects, and welding projects. Because these materials are of continuing value to the students and in most cases are retained by the students, it is appropriate to charge a materials fee. It should be noted that the fee cannot exceed the actual cost of the materials provided and cannot be a prerequisite to taking the available class. In order to provide courses of this nature, the District must rely upon the students paying the expenses for the value of the personal items; therefore, it is necessary for the Board of Trustees to adopt an instructional materials fee schedule for assessment of the appropriate fee.

Background:

The Board of Directors of the Valley Insurance Program Joint Powers Agency is made up of two appointees from each member district. - Assessment Methods than an institution employs to gather evidence and evaluate quality. (Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges, 2002)
- Charrette (shär-reť) is from the French noun meaning cart. Used in architecture, it refers to an intensive critique and planning session. In the 19th century at the École des Beaux-Arts in Paris, student architects collected their project materials for final jurying by the faculty, seated themselves on a charrette and were pulled by other would-be architects to their examination. Along the way, in a kind of intensive planning process, the group would join their talents and background to critique and redesign the preliminary architectural plan or solution, despite the short time available. Thus, the charrette process came to be an assembly of professional architects and students who would jointly analyze a major design problem, develop a number of solutions to the problem, critique these, and select the best. The charrette brought a number of architectural talents, interests, biases, and resources to bear at one time on an important problem.
- Strategic Planning A disciplined effort to produce fundamental decisions and actions
 that shape and guide what an organization (or other entity) is, what it does, and why it
 does it. At its best, strategic planning requires broad scale information gathering, an
 exploration of alternatives, and an emphasis on the future implications of present
 decisions. It can facilitate communication and participation, accommodate divergent
 interests and values, and foster orderly decision making and successful implementation.

They help an organization measure its progress towards achieving goals. Key performance indicators rely on consistent and accurate data. (Reh, F. John. "Glossary of Business Management Terms")

Effective teaching strategies, influenced by the educational philosophy of the teacher, are determined by the students' knowledge, experiences and environment. "This complex combination of skills and abilities is integrated in the professional teaching standards that also include essential knowledge, dispositions, and commitments that allow educators to practice at a high level." Background:

Bid #0708-15 is for the labor and materials necessary to construct a concrete block wall and other related improvements for a new trash compactor to be located west of the cafeteria at the Fresno City College campus. Approved plans for the construction of the Old Administration Building (OAB) central plant made it necessary to move the existing trash compactor and greenwaste container to the interior of the campus. These project plans also require that a new compactor for foodservice be located behind the cafeteria adjacent to the loading dock. The work of this project will prepare the site for this new trash compactor and, as noted in the Final Environmental Impact Report, provides for construction of a 10-foot-high by 32-foot-long solid block wall along the north side of the compactor for acoustic and visual screening purposes. Also included in this project are foundation and concrete improvements, the extension of the existing loading dock, and related paving and utility work in support of the new trash compactor.

Funding for this project will be provided by Measure E General Obligation Bond Funds. Bids were received from four (4) contractors as follows:
