Chancellor's Report

Dr. Crow reported the following:

- Mr. Michael Quinn was introduced and welcomed by Dr. Crow. Mr. Quinn is serving as the Interim Vice Chancellor of Educational Services and Planning, appointed for the period of January 2 through June 30, 2007, until the new Vice Chancellor for Workforce Development and Educational Services is hired.
- Regarding the Old Administration Building capital campaign, the internal campaign has passed the half million dollar mark. The external campaign for the Old Administration Building will begin March 21, 2007. The District and SCCC Foundation are pleased to announce that Dr. Peter Mehas, former Fresno County Superintendent of Schools, and Mr. Don Larson, retired Fresno City College faculty member, have agreed to serve as co-chairs for the external campaign.
- The results of the Noel-Levitz recruitment and retention audit have been received. The next step will be to pull together a districtwide enrollment committee to review the recommendations and to develop a districtwide strategic enrollment and retention plan. The results of the audit were similar to the findings from the Workforce Development

Summit, all of which point to the development of new programs to reach new markets and exploration of alternative delivery systems. It is the intent to be just as aggressive with the enrollment efforts as with the vocational training and education agendas.

In his response, Mr. Brinkley stated that the engineers and architects are asked to look at the greenest type of product they can provide us. In regard to life cycle costs, Mr. Brinkley said the State Chancellor's Office life cycle recommendations are followed and priced out.

Mr. Patterson asked about the dollar amount from the Bookstore Enterprise Fund.

A motion was made by Mr. Smith and seconded by Mr. Forhan to award Bid #0607-10 in the amount of \$715,058.00 to Mark Wilson Construction, Inc., the lowest responsible bidder for the Gymnasium HVAC at Reedley College, and authorize the Chancellor or Vice Chancellor, Finance and Administration, to sign an agreement on behalf of the District. The motion carried unanimously.

- Over 130 students attended the New Student Welcome last week. This week during Welcome Week, the College Activities team will continue to aid students.
- The Spring Volunteer Faire is January 17 with over 30 agencies on campus to recruit student volunteers. Mentioned were Big Brothers, Big Sisters, The Sanctuary and Habitat for Humanity.
- Club Rush is scheduled for January 24 with over 30 clubs that cater to the diverse interests of the student body.
- The ASG is planning the Annual Faculty and Staff Appreciation Banquet to be held some time during the semester. During this event they will be recognizing faculty and staff for their exceptional work with students.

Mr. Edward Rea, Reedley College Student Trustee, reported the following:

- The Associated Student Body has voted to become a member of the American Student Government Association.
- The ASB class is proving to be an excellent class with over 25 members.
- Sujo John, a survivor of 9/11, will be the guest speaker on January 11.
- ASB will be celebrating African American History Month and will include events such as Soul Food Sampling, Stomping Dance Demo, visit to the African American Museum, and a poetry contest.
- Mr. Rea commended the District for the advertisement currently playing on the radio telling listeners that "community college is the way to go."

• The women's and men's basketball teams have started conference play. The third ranked women's team is looking to repeat as conference champions.

Ms. Smith reported that she attended the memorial services for Ms. Evelyn Fiorani, retired Fresno City College production department supervisor. She said that the District was well represented in paying our respects to Evelyn. Her dedication to Fresno City College has definitely been remarkable.

Ms. Smith also reported that her daughter is now taking classes at Fresno City College.

Ms. Barreras asked the Board for volunteers to serve on two consultant interview panels as follows:

1) Interview panel for consultant services to establish an internal revenue code-compliant irrevocable trust (GASB 43/45).

Mr. Smith said that he thought that the Board had talked about it but had not made up their minds about whether we were going to establish an irrevocable trust for purposes of the deferred retirements benefits.

Mr. Brinkley said that a final decision was not made and that the Board would still be able to make the decision. He continued that there are at least three or four different packages on how these trusts look. This would allow us to interview and find one that would be the best fit. The Board would receive a report and could decide if they wish to establish that type of trust. Ms. Barreras volunteered to serve. Interviews are expected to occur in mid-February.

2) Interview panel for consultant services for establishing an Owner-Controlled Insurance Program in which the District might participate for the OAB construction project. Ms. Smith volunteered. Interviews are expected to occur in mid-February.

Enclosed is the December 31, 2006, Quarterly Financial Status Report (CCFS-311Q) for the District General Fund, as required for California community college districts (ECS 84043). In accordance with State instructions, a copy of the report is forwarded electronically to the State Chancellor's Office.

The quarterly financial report reflects projected revenues and expenditures in line with the annual budget, as amended for additional grants, programs, etc. Actual revenues and expenditures are consistent with expectations at mid-year, allowing for the fact that most of the revenue from property taxes and certain federal monies, i.e., VTEA, is not received until later in the fiscal year.

The District is projecting total FTES of 26,084 which is approximately 1% less than the amount funded by the State Chancellor's Office last year. The District is also evaluating 9-week, 4-week and summer programs in an effort to increase enrollment.

Background:

The City of Reedley has been in the process of developing a trail adjacent to the railroad tracks in Reedley which would run westerly along the rails to the river. The College and District staffs have been meeting with City representatives to determine the feasibility of the trail between the railroad tracks and the College. The City currently owns a 30-foot right-of-way between the rails and the College several hundred feet back from the river where the City plans to terminate the path with a gazebo structure. The City is missing right-of-way from Manning Avenue to this 30-foot piece of right-of-way. The City has requested the District to consider dedicating a 20-foot right-of-way from Manning to the City's right-of-way. The advantages to the District from a pure development component are:

- Removal of the oleander bushes along the south side of the campus;
- Installation of a bike/walk trail along the south side of the campus from Manning Avenue to the river, which will include such amenities and services as:
 - o installation of new landscaping with irrigation system;
 - o trail and landscaping maintained by the City;
 - o installation of lighting along the trail;
 - o development of a cross-walk with in-pavement lighting system across Manning Avenue;
 - o steel guard posts at entrance to inhibit vehicle traffic;
 - o functional and decorative fencing to separate the trail from the campus.

This project, as designed, is a \$661,000 investment by the City for this portion of the trail. It will enhance the southern side of the campus. The proposed right-of-way dedication is 20 feet wide for a distance of 1,030 feet, or slightly less than 0.5 acre. This is a positive investment into the

community of Reedley, as well as a tremendous enhancement to the south side of Reedley College. (A drawing of the proposed trail is attached to the enclosed Resolution as Exhibit "B".)

Campus Perspective of Project:

There are numerous benefits to Reedley College in the completion of the City of Reedley's Rails to Trails project. The trail is planned to parallel the railroad tracks on the south side of the campus. This area of the campus poses problems for the College because it is aesthetically unappealing and difficult to secure because of the landscaping bordering it and the fact that there is no lighting. The proposed trail would mitigate these issues and provide additional benefits to the College as follows:

- Improved Security The project will include removal of the oleanders and other landscaping that make it difficult, if not impossible, to have good visibility of the area. The project will also include lighting along the trail which is greatly needed. These items are a significant improvement in our ability to properly secure this area of the campus.
- Public Access The project will allow controlled access to the trail both by the public
 and by College personnel and students. It is good to have people from our communities
 on the campus, and the trail will provide a way for people to see our campus, enjoy the
 amenities we offer, and have a safe route to enjoy the Kings River. The trail will make
 the baseball facility more easily accessible.
- Aesthetics The area identified for the extension of the trail is in need of redesign and new landscaping. The railroad tracks and the non-campus buildings bordering this side of the campus are not aesthetically pleasing, and the completion of the trail, as proposed by the City of Reedley, will greatly improve this area of the campus. The design of the trail, the landscaping, the block/wrought iron fencing, and the Kings River overlook structure will provide significant improvement that is greatly needed in this area of the campus.
- The City of Reedley will provide all maintenance and upkeep of the trail, the fencing, the lighting, and the landscaping.

This project is a win-win project for both Reedley College and the City of Reedley.

State statutes require the District to take action at two separate Board meetings. The first action, which the Board is being asked to take at this meeting, is to adopt a Resolution of Intention to Dedicate Right-of-Way. The Resolution provides public notice that the District will be considering the dedication of a right-of-way to the City of Reedley on March 6, 2007, and that public comment will be solicited prior to the Board considering and taking action on the dedication. The second action occurs on March 6, 2007, when the Board holds a public hearing

regarding the dedication and considers adopting a Resolution Authorizing Dedication of Easement. Enclosed is Resolution No. 2007-5 stating the District's intention to dedicate a right-of-way to the City of Reedley. This Resolution requires a roll call vote and approval of at least two-thirds majority.

AGREEMENT FOR THE DEDICATION OF RIGHT-OF-WAY

State Center Community College District, hereby known as Grantor, owner of Assessor's Parcel Nos. 368-360-03 and 363-100-59, currently Reedley College, located at 995 North Reed Avenue in the City of Reedley, does hereby grant to the City of Reedley (Grantee) by the execution of this Agreement an ingress and egress easement across the south 40 feet of said parcel for the purpose of installing, in general, a new storm drain line and filtration system, and the next phase of the Reedley Parkway to include bike trail, lighting, fencing, river overlook gazebo, landscaping and irrigation.

Grantor further agrees to convey by Grant Deed the south 20 feet of Assessor's Parcel No. 368-360-03 as right-of-way to the Grantee as further described in Exhibit "A" and as shown in Exhibit "B". Grantor acknowledges and agrees that said right-of-way is hereby conveyed by the Grantor to the Grantee at no cost to the Grantee for the benefit of the Reedley Parkway, Reedley College, and the community at large.

The Grantee does hereby agree to the following conditions and/or understandings:

- a. Prior to the issuing of the Notice to Contractors for the construction of the Parkway, SCCCD and the City of Reedley will review and mutually agree upon the Parkway plans.
- b. The cost of the Parkway construction along with the cost of repairing or restoring any and all damage to College property (irrigation systems, lawn, etc.) will be the sole responsibility of and paid for by the Grantee.

- c. Maintenance of the Parkway will be furnished and paid for by the Grantee for the life of the Parkway. This shall include but not be limited to graffiti removal, trash removal and cleanup, and year-round maintenance of the landscaping and irrigation systems.
- d. To provide access points to the Parkway from inside Reedley College as predetermined and specified by SCCCD prior to the issuance of the final construction plans.
- e. To pay for any and all legal expenses incurred by SCCCD in regards to this Agreement and the transfer of said real property.

Background:

At the November Board meeting the District was asked to research 1) human rights issues regarding Coca-Cola as presented by students and staff, 2) actions of other agencies regarding purchasing policies related to human rights issues, and 3) pros/cons for single vendor agreements vs. multiple vendors being on campus.

Over the past several months the District staff has done additional investigation via the internet and has found only the two referenced cases in Columbia and India. The search also included websites which were exclusively or predominantly in Spanish as well as English. There were a number of internet commentaries and publications by several non-governmental agencies related to these two alleged situations. In both cases there does not seem to be any outstanding court or legal issues facing Coca-Cola or the affiliate franchises. The Coca-Cola producers in Columbia and India are both affiliated to Coca-Cola through a franchise arrangement and are not owned by Coca-Cola. It appears the accusations are from individuals or groups not associated with governmental agencies.

Research into organizations sponsored or affiliated with the United Nations (UN) indicates that the UN in 2000 launched a UN Global Compact. The Compact brings businesses together with UN agencies, labor, civil society and governments to advance universal principles in the areas of human rights, labor standards, the environment and anti-corruption. The United Nations claims this to be the world's largest voluntary corporate citizenship initiative with 2,900 participants and stakeholders from 90 countries. Coca-Cola is a member of this Compact, which has principles similar to those stated in other similar organizations, such as Amnesty International.

The District also requested from other community colleges, local agencies and school districts any type of policy in regard to purchasing products from companies where human rights violations are alleged. None of the agencies or organizations stated that such policies have been developed or implemented.

The revenue from the vending contracts has gone towards a number of activities for the campuses, which include, but are not limited to, guest speakers, Associated Student Government-sponsored activities, student and staff recognition events, student and staff awards, various pieces of equipment on campuses, campus celebrations, scholarships, and participation in community events. It has been staff's experience that an exclusive vendor agreement provides more revenue than a multiple vendor agreement.

In recent communications the District has learned that the Fresno City College Academic Senate has shown an interest in discussing this issue. Fresno City College students addressed the Board at the November Board meeting. It would be appropriate for the Board to solicit further information from the interested parties. The administration will ask the Board for direction on beverage contracts following the discussion from the public.

Background:

The Governor's 2007-08 Proposed State Budget provides for a cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) of 4.04% and a 2% increase in FTES growth systemwide. In addition, the proposal includes statutory COLA and growth of 4.04% and 2%, respectively, for each of the following: Basic Skills, Extended Opportunity Programs and Services (EOPS), Disabled Students Programs and Services (DSPS), and Matriculation. The Governor continues to support Matriculation by redirecting \$33.1 million of surplus Basic Skills over-cap incentive funding to Matriculation and support services for community college students with \$19.1 million of the funds specifically targeted for additional counsel and tutoring services for at-risk students.

The 2006-07 Budget had significant equalization funds and fully funded the new community college funding model under SB 361, including a reduction in student fees from \$26 per unit to \$20 per unit effective January 2007. The student fees are proposed to remain at the current \$20-per-unit level for 2007-08.

It is important to recognize that the Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) determined in November 2006 that the State faces annual operating shortfalls averaging slightly under \$5 billion over the next three years. The LAO states that, if the Governor's budget proposals were fully adopted and all of the assumed savings were fully realized, the projected operating shortfall would reduce by roughly one-half over this same three-year period. The LAO further states, "While any budget is subject to risks and uncertainties, we believe that the number and magnitude of these risks is unusually high in the current plan." Hence, the District is encouraged by the Governor's 2007-08 Budget Proposal and will continue to monitor the progress of the Legislature during the State budgeting process.

The District will rely primarily upon this budget proposal as the basis for the development of the 2007-08 Tentative Budget, which is to be adopted on June 5, 2007, rather than the May Revise as in previous years. Any major differences between the January Proposed Budget and the May Revise Proposed Budget will be noted for the Board prior to its taking action to adopt the Tentative Budget.
