Approval of Minutes

The minutes of the special meeting of September 30, 2009, and regular Board meeting of October 6, 2009, were presented for approval. A motion was made by Ms. Smith and seconded by Mr. Thonesen to approve the minutes of the special meeting of September 30, 2009, and regular Board meeting of October 6, 2009, as presented. The motion carried unanimously.

Delegations, Petitions, and Communications

Mr. Venancio Gaona, Chair, El Concilio de Fresno introduced Tomas Villarreal, Lawyer; and Mr. Eddie Varela, Member of Board of El Concilio de Fresno. He thanked the Board for the time to present this concern and request. He provided the Board of Trustees with his letter addressed to the SCCCD Board President, William J. Smith, dated November 2, 2009; and a letter from Robert Rubin, Legal Director with Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights. Mr. Gaona addressed the Board with the contents of his letter stating that it is "our contention that the SCCCD is not in compliance with the California Voting Rights Act of 2001," and further stating, "The District has continued to have elections 'at large' since the passage of the law." He said, "There has not been any acknowledgement by the District to the community that it serves, especially to the Chicano-Latino community, that any plans have been initiated to comply soon with the law." The El Concilio de Fresno, Inc. is requesting that

SCCCD initiate and support an immediate conversion from an atlarge method of election to a district-based election system to commence November 2010. He also requested that El Concilio de Fresno, Inc. be advised and informed of any proceedings and/or committees, etc. formed to study the matter. Mr. Gaona added that they have also contacted MALDEF (Mexican-American Legal Education Defense Foundation).

Mr. Smith thanked Mr. Gaona and said that the Board appreciates Mr. Gaona addressing them on this issue. They are in the midst of working on this issue, but as this matter is not on the agenda, the Board is not able to respond at this time.

Chancellor's Report

Dr. Crow reported the following:

Foundation Update – On Friday, October 23, the SCCC Foundation hosted a reception for Mrs. Rinko Yoshioka, a 1968 Fresno City College nursing graduate who gifted a \$100,000 endowment for nursing scholarships. Trustee Pat Patterson represented the Board at the reception. Rinko and her late husband Minoru were in the Japanese internment camps. They have worked diligently to establish funds that would allow them to leave a legacy with agencies they were close to. Rinko will be honored at the Heritage Society Dinner on November 5 where she, along with seven others, will be presented the Legacy Maker Award. Also, for the first time, the Foundation will also be presenting the Pillar Society Award that will acknowledge donors who have contributed over \$500,000.

Web Design Award – We are pleased to announce that the newly designed SCCCD website is in the running for a national Paragon award. As you will recall, the district was awarded two Gold Paragon awards last year. One for the radio enrollment campaign and one for the Welcome Brochure. The Paragon Award is sponsored by the National Council for Marketing and Public Relations. NCMPR is an affiliate council of the American Association of Community Colleges. The winners will be announced during their annual meeting in the spring.

- Revisions are being made to the board policies and administrative regulations to reflect changes in Title V.
- Operating agreements have been approved for basic skills committee, program review committee, and business education committee.
- The Department Chair Council met. This council gives the department chairs on campus an opportunity to discuss common issues and concerns.
- Ms. DeKruif attended the Area A meeting via teleconference and will be attending the plenary session in Ontario.
- Faculty are involved in nominating "100 Stars for 100 Years," for the Centennial recognition ceremony.

Classified Senate Report

Melanie Highfill, RC Classified Senate President, reported the following:

- The Reedley College Classified Flex Day is November 11. The event, titled "Who Are We? Investigating Our Mind Set," is held in the RC cafeteria, 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.
- Classified Senate has completed making assignments to college committees.
- Classified Senate has reviewed and approved the new assessment reporting forms for Program Review and the RC Participatory Governance Handbook.
- Classified staff are being recruited for the Accreditation Self-

- Classified staff are being encouraged to comment on the Educational Master Plan.
- Classified Senate is planning their holiday community project.
- Leadership Class IX graduation is December 4 at Fresno City Hall. The keynote speaker is Cynthia Sterling. The Board of Trustees will be receiving invitations to the graduation.

Entrepreneurship Presentation

Dr. Crow introduced the presentation and presenters. He noted that this has been an area of interest for the Board for quite a while. When funding became available for entrepreneurship, SCCCD was very fortunate to have had two outstanding faculty members in place who already had some relationships with the Lyle's Center for Innovation at Fresno State and also some funding through the Coleman Foundation. Dr. Marianne Dunklin, FCC, and Eric Nasalroad, RC, have in a few short years expanded the entrepreneurship program.

Dr. Marianne Dunklin and Mr. Eric Nasalroad titled their presentation "Building a Community College Entrepreneurial Pathway, Linking High School, Two-Year and Four-Year College Campuses." They discussed the successful outcomes and futures for the students through this program. Successful outcomes include articulation of Introduction to Entrepreneurship (BA 52) with Fresno State, vibrant CEO clubs, excellent student GPAs and student retention, high school outreach through VE Trade Fair (RC) and NFTE schools (FCC), RC student business fair, FCC Extreme Entrepreneurship tour, FCC Entrepreneur Unplugged, positive media coverage, student business startups, student on-campus businesses, students in Lyle's Center Hatchery, NACCE and USASBE presentations, SB70 and Lyles Center grant for CEO conference, CEO conference moderators and speakers. Exciting projects for the future are entrepreneurship textbook, entrepreneurship centers (WIA grant), entrepreneurship certificates, national model, and continued funding from WIA (Partnership for the San Joaquin Valley) and the Coleman Foundation through the Lyles Center. The Center for International Trade Development was mentioned as having a significant impact on the success of the entrepreneurship program. There is national and international interest in their program, so they are putting a textbook together. Entrepreneurship centers are being planned and will provide students resources to grow their businesses and give back to the community.

Veterans Services Presentation Michael White, RC Vice President of Student Services and Chris Cortes, RC Director of Financial Aid, discussed the mission of the Veterans Support Team at Reedley College, described changes in the GI Bill benefits that went into effect in August 2009, and described how RC Student Services have coordinated efforts in order to meet the needs of veterans. Some of the services mentioned were the veterans orientation, the Veterans Club, Veterans Day activities, and access to resources at the college, as well as the state and nation. Online classes are also available on a semester-to-semester basis for active military stationed out of the area, or overseas. Fernando Gonzalez, a U.S. Marine veteran who leads the Reedley College Veterans Club, gave his perspective as a student and of the support the club provides.

Dr. Chris Villa, FCC Vice President of Student Services, and Mary Alfieris, FCC Student Personnel Services Assistant, described Fresno City College specialized services and benefits for veterans. The FCC Veterans Office certified over \$4 million of G.I. benefits to their veteran population in 2009. In Fall 2009 the college has 445 veterans enrolled. Provided were national statistics concerning veteran students returning from war zones, followed by projected services for California veterans through partnerships built upon the Troops to College educational partnership. Students who were on hand for the presentation were Katie Contreras, Sanit Ros, and Miguel Saldaña.

I. Executive Summary


Introduction

This is the Compliance Review of the County of Fresno Treasurer's Investment Pool Portfolio for the period ended September 30, 2009, pursuant to California Government Code 53646. The report has two primary objectives: (1) to provide information regarding portfolio holdings as to compliance with California Government Code Sections 53601 and 53635, as well as the County Treasurer's Statement of Investment Policy, and (2) to detail portfolio characteristics of the portfolio's investment holdings.

Quarterly Overview of Markets

U.S. Treasury rates decreased across the maturity spectrum during the most recent quarter. Since the December 16, 2008 meeting, the Federal Reserve has maintained a target range for the Federal Funds rate of 0.00% to 0.25%. The Federal Reserve announced plans to continue asset purchases and a commitment to keep interest rates low for a considerable time. These steps were taken to help improve conditions in private credit markets and to subdue a rise in long-term Treasury rates. The U.S. budget deficit hit a record \$1.4 trillion in the fiscal year that ended on September 30th leading to a 17.6% increase in total public debt outstanding to a staggering \$11.9 trillion.

As indicated on the previous page, during the third quarter of 2009, yields decreased across the maturity spectrum. The yield on 1-year Treasury Bonds decreased 16 basis points to 0.40%, while the yield on 30-year Treasury Bonds decreased 29 basis points to 4.03%. The spread between the 1-year Treasury and the 30-year Treasury ended the quarter at 363 basis points, narrowing from 376 basis points at the end of last quarter. During the quarter, yields on 90-day Certificates of Deposits decreased 15 basis points, while 180-day maturity yields decreased 33 basis points. The 30-day Commercial Paper decreased 6 basis points from last quarter.



Portfolio Position

The County of Fresno Investment Policy (revised August 2009) Section 11.0 recommends a portfolio of securities with a weighted average maturity not to exceed 550 days. Keeping the portfolio within this maturity range minimizes its exposure to potential interest rate shifts that can occur in the mid-maturity sectors of the yield curve. As of 9/30/09, the portfolio maintained a weighted maturity of 689 days and was oriented towards high quality, with approximately 85% of the portfolio's assets invested in virtually risk-free instruments.

Compliance with California Government Codes 53601 & 53635:

The Investment Portfolio is compliant with the California Government Codes 53601 and 53635.

Compliance with Treasury Investment Pool Statement of Investment Policy:

The Statement of Investment Policy is more stringent than the California Government Code. As of 9/30/09, the Treasurer's Investment Pool portfolio complied with its Statement of Investment Policy.

Please refer to the next section of the report for a more detailed evaluation of the portfolio in relation to the California Government Code and the Treasurer's Investment Pool Statement of Investment Policy.

Portfolio Characteristics

The Treasury Pool's portfolio characteristics are indicative of a plan exhibiting a high degree of quality with short-term maturities.

- As of 9/30/09, the portfolio had a market value of \$2.0 billion with an average dollarweighted quality of "AAA."
- Approximately 85% of the portfolio's assets are invested in securities with virtually no credit risk (i.e. U.S. Treasury, U.S. Agencies, Government-backed Corporates, and Cash).
- The dollar weighted average life of the pool is 689 days.
- 9.6% of the portfolio at cost matures within 30 days, 11.9% matures within 90 days, and 14.8% within 180 days.

Based on its relative high quality and near-term liquidity, and assuming no significant changes to pool funding policies, the Treasury Investment Pool is well positioned to meet its expenditure requirements over the next six months.




Portfolio Breakdown by Investment Type (valued at cost)





Bank may also utilize pricing valuations obtained from brokers and dealers of securities, fund accounting providers, and other securities industry sources as directed by Client and/or its investment advisors or other authorized person (collectively Authorized Person). Client understands that certain pricing information with respect to complex financial instruments including, without limitation, derivatives, may be based on calculated amounts rather than actual market transactions and may not reflect actual market values, and that the variance between such calculated amounts and actual market values may or may not be material. Where vendors used by Bank do not provide information for particular securities or other property, Client and/or other Authorized Person may direct the Bank regarding the fair market value of, or provide other information with respect to, such securities or other property. If Client or other Authorized Person does not provide such information, Bank may use the cost or nominal value for such securities or property, solely for administrative convenience. GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Average Maturity - The weighted average time to principal repayment. Useful as an approximation of a single maturity where the mean or average maturity is used to describe the life of the instrument.

Bankers Acceptance - Money market instrument created from transactions involving foreign trade. In its simplest form, a bankers acceptance is a check, drawn on bank by an importer or exporter of goods.

Basis Point - 1/100th of 1%.

Certificate of Deposit - A short term money market instrument representing a receipt from a bank for a deposit at a specified rate of interest for a specified period of time.

Coupon Rate - The annual interest paid of a fixed-income instrument.

Commercial Paper - Money Market instrument representing a short-term promissory note of a large corporation at a specified rate of return for a specified period of time.

Current Yield - A bond's coupon expressed as a percentage of the bond's market price.

Discount Rate - The interest rate used to translate a future value into a present value.

Duration - Often times referred to as Macaulay's duration is a fixed income measure of price sensitivity to changes in yields. It is calculated by taking a weighted average of the time periods to receipt of the present value of the cash flows from a fixed income instrument.

Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation - Also known as "FHLMC" and Freddie Mac. FHLMC is a Private Corporation authorized by Congress, which sells notes, participation certificates and other mortgage obligations backed by mortgage pools.

Federal National Mortgage Association - Also known as "FNMA" and Fannie Mae. A private corporation which buys and sells residential mortgages insured by FHA or guaranteed by VA. FNMA also issues notes, participation certificates and other mortgage obligations backed by mortgage pools.

Government National Mortgage Corporation - Also known as "GNMA" and Ginnie Mae. A wholly-owned U.S. government corporation. GNMA issues and guarantees mortgage-backed securities which are backed by the full faith and credit of the United States Government.

Repurchase Agreement - Short term collateralized loan at a specified rate for a specified period, used by large investors as an alternative for cash investments.

Yield to Maturity - The internal rate of return of a standard bond held to maturity.

Background:

Title V of the California Code of Regulations allows districts to charge instructional materials fees for materials which are of continuing value to the students outside of the classroom setting, including, but not limited to, textbooks, tools, equipment, clothing, and those materials which are necessary for a student's vocational training and employment.

Many of the non-credit courses and various credit courses provide programs that are appropriate for assessment of an instructional materials fee. These programs include such items as woodworking projects, flower arranging, ceramics projects, and welding projects. Because these materials are of continuing value to the students and in most cases are retained by the students, it is appropriate to charge a materials fee. It should be noted that the fee cannot exceed the actual cost of the materials provided and cannot be a prerequisite to taking the available class. In order to provide courses of this nature, the District must rely upon the students paying the expenses for the value of the personal items. Materials Fee Schedules are currently in place for Fresno City College and Reedley College. Reedley College has requested changes in fees for courses detailed in the exhibit. Fresno City College has determined there is no need to increase its fees at this time. It is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt changes to the Materials Fee Schedule for the 2010-11 school year as requested. All other fees will remain unchanged at each of the colleges.

Background:

Members of the Board of Trustees are currently elected in "from-trustee area" elections, i.e., elections in which "each governing board member [is] elected by the registered voters of the entire school district . . . , but reside[s] in the trustee area which he or she represents." Ed. Code § 5030(c). Over the past few years, however, there has been a trend across California community college and K-12 districts and other elected governmental bodies to move to "bytrustee area" electoral systems, i.e., elections in which "one or more members residing in each trustee area [is] elected by the registered voters of that particular trustee area." Ed. Code § 5030(b).

Moving to a "by-trustee area" electoral system offers some important benefits to the District. The change would eliminate the costs associated with running for election district-wide, allowing candidates and incumbents to campaign within their trustee areas. Moreover, the District's present "from-trustee area" electoral system is subject to challenge under the California Voting Rights Act of 2001. "By-trustee area" electoral systems, on the other hand, are not vulnerable to challenge under the CVRA.

California Education Code sections 5019(a) & (c)(1) and 5030 authorize the Fresno County Committee on School District Organization, upon application of a school district's governing board, to change the method of election in a school district under its jurisdiction.

Recommendation:

The Administration recommends that the Board adopt the attached Resolution 2009-20 requesting the County Committee to change the District's electoral system to a "by-trustee area" system, and instructing the Chancellor to take all necessary steps to effect the change.

WHEREAS, members of the Board of Trustees of the State Center Community College District ("SCCCD" or "District") are currently elected in "from-trustee area" elections, *i.e.*, elections in which "each governing board member [is] elected by the registered voters of the entire school district . . . , but reside[s] in the trustee area which he or she represents[,]" Cal. Educ. Code § 5030(c); and

WHEREAS, from-trustee electoral systems such as the District's are subject to challenge under the California Voting Rights Act of 2001, codified at sections 14025–14032 of the California Elections Code ("CVRA"); and

WHEREAS, by-trustee area electoral systems, *i.e.*, elections in which "one or more members residing in each trustee area [is] elected by the registered voters of that particular trustee area[,]" Cal. Educ. Code § 5030(b), are not vulnerable to challenge under the CVRA; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees believes that "by-trustee area" elections will lower barriers to run for seats on the SCCCD Board by eliminating the costs associated with running for election district-wide;

WHEREAS, it is the considered view of the Board of Trustees of the District that the public interest would be better served by election of its governing board members in "by-trustee area" elections; and

WHEREAS, California Education Code §§ 5019(a) & (c)(1) and 5030 authorize the Fresno County Committee on School District Organization ("County Committee" or "FCCSDO"), upon application of a school district's governing board, to change the method of election in a school district under its jurisdiction;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE STATE CENTER COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. By this resolution, and pursuant to Education Code §§ 5019(a), (c)(1) & 5030, the Board of Trustees applies to the Fresno County Committee on School District Organization to have the County Committee adopt a change in the method of electing members of the SCCCD's Board from "from-trustee area" elections, Cal. Educ. Code § 5030(c), to "by-trustee area" elections, Cal. Educ. Code § 5030(b), and to hold a public hearing thereon.

SECTION 2. By this resolution the Board hereby instructs the Chancellor to prepare a sample trustee area plan for the Board to consider for recommendation to the County Committee.

Background:

The District must comply with certain Education Code requirements in the process of implementing by-trustee area elections. These include the requirement that the change to a by-trustee area electoral system must be put to a vote by the voters of the District (Ed. Code §§ 5019 and 5020) and the requirement that any rearrangement of existing trustee area boundaries must be completed no later than 120 days prior to the next election at which the new boundaries will be used (Ed. Code § 5019(d)).

Education Code section 33050 *et seq.*, however, allows the District to request the State Board of Education to waive these requirements. To be able to use the new by-trustee area process to elect governing board members in 2010, it would be necessary for the District to obtain a waiver of the election process of Education Code §§ 5019 and 5020, and the 120-day deadline of Education Code § 5019(d), from the State Board of Education. This waiver provision of the Education Code requires that the District hold a public hearing prior to requesting a waiver from the State Board of Education.

Recommendation:

The Administration recommends that the Board establish January 12, 2010, the date of the Board's next regularly-scheduled meeting, as the public hearing to solicit public input and testimony on whether to apply to the State Board of Education for a waiver of the election process of Education Code §§ 5019 and 5020, and the 120-day deadline of Education Code § 5019(d).

It is recommended that Board of Trustees approve the appointment of Donald Lopez to serve as Interim Associate Vice Chancellor Workforce Development & Educational Services at a monthly salary of \$11,318.67 (Range 66, Step 5) effective January 4, 2010.
