A motion was made by Ms. Smith and seconded by Mr. Smith to approve the minutes of the special Board meeting of August 26, 2010, and the minutes of the regular Board meeting of September 7, 2010, as presented. The motion carried unanimously.

Delegations, Petitions, and Communications SCCCD police officer Nick Hernandez presented the initial contract proposal to Randy Rowe, on behalf of the union.

Campus Reports

Dr. Kershaw reported on the following topics from the North Centers. Copies of the report were provided for the Board and interested attendees.

- New Educator's Welcome Reception took place on September 21, 2010. It was sponsored by the Madera Chamber of Commerce.
- Madera County Office of Education Academic Decathlon continues this year, with the theme/ subject, "The Great Depression". The essay portion will be held at the Madera Center on January 28, 2011, and concludes on February 5, 2011, with the Super Quiz.
- Dr. Kershaw acknowledged Superintendent Sally Frazier, who will be retiring this December. He thanked her for her dedication to the educational systems of Madera County and her tremendous support of the Madera Center. Dr. Kershaw also welcomed superintendent Dr. Cici Messetti as the newly appointed Superintendent of the Madera County Office of Education.
- The Madera Center College Advantage program continues despite the budget issues. It is in its ninth year. There are 52 high school seniors participating in this program.
- Due to the increasing number of veterans attending the Madera Center, the campus will host a pre-registration workshop for veterans on October 14, 2010.
- A reception honoring scholarship donors and the recipients of those scholarships will be held on October 21, 2010, at the Madera Center. This will be the first time for this event.
- Trunk 'n Treat will be held at the Oakhurst Center in conjunction with the Oakhurst Chamber of Commerce on October 31, 2010, at 6:00 pm.

Dr. Azari reported on the following topics from Fresno City College. Copies of the report were provided for the Board and interested attendees.

- FCC received a Title V grant totaling over 3 million dollars for five years. The grant allows the college to upgrade the technology infrastructure and provide support services designed to increase the transfer rate of students.
- FCC received a \$600,000 grant from HUD Hispanic Serving Institution Assisting Communities (HSIAC) program. The grant allows students in the construction program to renovate vacant homes in the Lowell – Jefferson area. The City of Fresno will sell the homes to low income families.
- The annual scholarship banquet was held September 17th

- FCC is hosting its first Majors Fair on Wednesday, October 13th.
- Speakers Forum began this month with a live broadcast of the Alan Autry show in the Free Speech area.

Dr. Hioco reported on the following topics from Reedley College. Copies of the report were provided for the Board and interested attendees.

- Dr. Hioco recognized Anna Martinez, Nancy Frampton, Natasha Maryanow, Bill Turini, and David Borofka who have been selected to participate in a variety of events because of their professional expertise.
- Accreditation continues to be at the top of Reedley College's priority list, with special activities occurring on Student Learning Outcomes, the Classified Campus Wide Integrated Planning Assembly, town hall meetings, and the publication of the monthly Accreditation newsletter.
- A few of the activities occurring on campus include: the participation of Reedley College in the Reedley Fiesta Parade on October 9, 2010; the Child Development Program is hosting a California Preschool Instructional Network (CPIN) on October 16, 2010; Reedley College is hosting the final of three Expository Reading and Writing Course workshops for teachers on September 21, 2010; and Reedley College recently hosted Smart Money workshops for students and the community on September 22 and 27, 2010.

Dr. Blue thanked community members, colleagues, faculty, staff and Dr. Terry Kershaw for the reception held earlier in the afternoon. Dr. Blue recognized the commitment of the community to the Madera Center campus, programs and students. Dr. Blue values the partnership to ensure the District continues to provide high quality educational programs and services to the community.

Dr. Blue reported the following:

<u>Governor's Debate</u> – Dr. Blue attended the Governor's debate between Meg Whitman and Jerry Brown this past Saturday at Fresno State. The debate, hosted by Univision, was an opportunity to hear the candidates' positions on the state of California's economy and key issues related to higher education. Unfortunately, only one of the candidates addressed community colleges directly. Dr. Blue stated it is apparent extensive education about the work of community colleges is needed with regards to Ms. Whitman. Community colleges have certainly

benefited from the current governor's experience with Santa Monica City College; and Mr. Brown's experience as a former community college trustee has given him some insight as well. It is still unclear how community colleges will fare in the future, as there doesn't seem to be any immediate solutions to California's economic crisis.

Irvine Foundation Panel – The Irvine Foundation Board will be in Fresno in October for their board meeting. On October 6, 2010, Dr. Blue will be joining Fresno State President, John Welty, Superintendent Michael Hanson and Dr. Catherine Flores from the Sunnyside High School Doctor's Academy on a panel to discuss education issues in the central valley, at Sunnyside High School. The purpose of the presentation is to provide members of the James Irvine Foundation the opportunity to hear from local educational leaders in order to develop a clearer understanding of some of the unique challenges facing the region. This is a wonderful opportunity to share with them some of the serious challenges students face on a daily basis, and to look to the Irvine Foundation to help fund some of the student success initiatives in the central valley.

<u>CVHEC Degree Completion Summit</u>- State Center Community College District will participate in a Degree Completion Summit on October 17 through October 19th. The Summit, hosted by the Central Valley Higher Education Consortium, will tackle such issues as transfer articulation, student support services, and equity issues in the CCs, CSUs and UCs. Senator Alex Padilla and Assembly Member Paul Fong will be on hand to discuss their recent historic transfer legislation –SB 1440 (Padilla) and AB 2302 (Fong). The consortium consists of college and university chancellors and presidents who lead institutions across ten counties in Central California. The summit will include participants from a broad range of related interests including faculty and educational policy leaders.

<u>Heritage Dinner</u> – On Wednesday, November 3rd, the Foundation will host the 2010 Heritage Society Legacy Makers dinner to recognize those donors that have contributed \$100,000 or more. This year the Foundation will be honoring ADCO Manufacturing, Fresno Hispanic Scholarship Fund, Serpa Packaging Solutions, Sun-Maid Growers of California, and the Fresno Bee. North Centers Faculty Association Report Joseph Libby, President of the North Centers Faculty Association, presented the following information:

- Accreditation All full-time and some part-time faculty from the Madera Center and the Willow International Center are working together with Reedley to prepare the self study documents for Reedley College. At the same time, the faculty of the Willow-International Center are preparing Willow's self study Candidacy report for initial accreditation.
- Student Learning Outcomes –Another major focus for the faculty is the assessment of Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs). The assessment of SLOs is fundamental to the culture of improvement at Reedley College and the North Centers. Over the last few years the Reedley and North Centers faculty have worked together within their disciplines to prepare and implement assessment programs. These assessments, which generally operate over two semesters, generate data which the faculty in their departments utilize as a basis to develop and implement improvement strategies for the classroom. Many departments are currently in the second cycle of their assessment programs, while a few are in their third cycle. This semester the North Centers and Reedley faculty have expanded these assessments to include program level and general education level outcomes. The development and implementation of these assessment programs is a collaborative effort by all Reedley and North Centers faculty.
- Madera Fair Faculty from the Madera Center participated in last month's Madera Fair, staffing an information booth. The annual participation in this event reflects the ongoing commitment to reach out to the residents of Madera County.

Ernie Garcia, Fresno City College Classified Senate President presented the following information:

- Classified Senate hosted two mini training sessions on September 28, 2010 on Datatel query building. The sessions were well attended
- At the September 15, 2010, meeting the Senate approved a travel and conference request for Shanna Ahrens to attend an internal auditors conference. Also approved was a revision to the Strategic Plan goals and objectives.
- Planning continues for Staff Development Day on November 11, 2010. The theme this year is "One

The Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC) has policies and procedures that include an expectation of the Board's involvement in the process. The governing board reviews, approves and certifies that there was broad institutional involvement in its development. To meet this expectation, this self study progress update explains where the District currently stands in preparation for the Fall 2011 Accreditation visit. The first reading of the report will occur in May 2011.

FCC Vice President of Instruction Tony Cantu RC Vice President of Instruction Dr. Marilyn Behringer, and NC Vice President of Instruction Deborah Ikeda, presented information on four Accreditation Standards required by the ACCJC.

Mr. Cantu, Dr. Behringer and Ms. Ikeda provided updates on the accreditation progress of Fresno City College and Reedley College, as well as an update on Willow International's progress towards candidacy.

Mr. Patterson announced that the exhibit for Consent Agenda Item 10-30HR Academic Personnel Recommendations has been amended and copies are provided. Before proceeding with the consideration of the Consent Agenda, President Patterson recognized Ms. Barreras for a procedural matter. Ms. Barreras requested Consent Agenda Items 2 and 3 (10-31HR and 10-32HR) be removed from the Consent Agenda and considered separately.

Mr. Patterson acknowledged Ms. Barreras' request and stated that Consent Agenda Items 2 and 3 would be considered separately. Mr. Patterson asked for a motion to approve the Consent Agenda as amended, excluding Items 2 and 3.

It was moved by Mr. Smith and seconded by Ms. Barreras that the Board of Trustees approve Consent Agenda Items 10-30HR, as amended, and 10-33HR and 10-100G through 10-108G, as presented. The motion carried unanimously.

Ms. Barreras stated that since she has recently completed a temporary internship with CSEA, the exclusive bargaining representative for the classified employees of the District, she must recuse herself from consideration of these matters as they may involve CSEA's representation of classified employees. She also noted that later on the agenda there are closed session items for conference with the labor negotiator regarding the District's ongoing labor negotiations with CSEA and the faculty bargaining unit. She recuses herself from the portion of closed session Item B concerning the CSEA contract and from the salary and medical benefits provisions of the faculty contract, and will not participate in those deliberations. She does this to comply with the requirements of the Political Reform Act and to prevent the appearance of conflict, on the advice of the District's counsel.

2010-11 District Budget Cash Flow Analysis [10-58] No Action

Consideration to Approve Loan from Retiree Benefits Fund to General Fund for Temporary Cash Flow Needs [10-59] <u>Action</u> Doug Brinkley presented an analysis of the 2010-11 Final District Budget, which estimates the State appropriation for State Center Community College District to be \$110.4 million or 66% of the District's operating budget.

The District is recommending a loan to the General Fund from the Retiree Benefit Fund of \$4,600,000 leaving approximately \$100,000 in that fund, and further to repay the loan when State apportionment is received.

Due to the lack of the 2010-11 State Budget, the District relied primarily on General Fund reserves to meet its cash flow needs. Based upon the cash flow analysis the District will have insufficient funds available in the General Fund to address its operational needs through November 15, 2010.

Mr. Smith asked if there are any other alternatives.

Ms. Barreras stated she is concerned about District's obligation to the retirees.

Ms. Smith asked what safeguards the District has to protect the funds.

Mr. Caglia asked what the payment terms are for the District's creditors.

Mr. Thonesen asked if the District is continuing to budget the \$2.8 million for the Retiree Benefit fund. Mr. Brinkley responded not at this time. Mr. Thonesen stated that he agrees with Ms. Barreras and is concerned about the obligation to the retirees.

Mr. Brinkley stated that, by law, the money that is borrowed must be paid back.

Mr. Caglia stated that if the budget passes there should not be a need to borrow the funds. Mr. Brinkley confirmed Mr. Caglia's statement.

A motion was made by Mr. Thonesen and seconded by Ms. Smith that the Board of Trustees authorize a loan of \$4,600,000 from the Retiree Benefits Fund to the General Fund for the purpose of meeting temporary cash flow needs. Once the 2010-11 State Budget is approved and sufficient funds have been received by the District, the District will repay the loan from the Retiree Benefits Fund.

Background:

As the result of a reclassification study, the Personnel Commission reclassified the position of Curriculum Assistant to a new classification specification of Curriculum Analyst. According to Education Code section 88009 the Board of Trustees shall fix and prescribe the duties to be performed by all persons in the classified service. Following the Board of Trustees' approval of these duties, the Director of Classified Personnel in accordance with Education Code section 88095 will recommend minimum qualifications along with the knowledge and abilities required for this position to the Personnel Commission for their approval. The District will then meet and negotiate a salary placement with CSEA as required by the California Government Code section 3543.2.

Examples of Duties:

Performs a variety of duties related to the curriculum development process, curriculum database systems and MIS reporting including but not limited to:

- providing on-going technical assistance and training to Administrative Aides, Division Deans, and other staff regarding section entering, schedule development, and catalog production;
- providing technical support and training to: the Curriculum Committee regarding curriculum procedures, regulations, and past practice;
- providing technical support and training to the academic and classified personnel regarding the preparation of curriculum documents;
- providing technical support and training to the division staff on new and existing system techniques pertaining to section entering, division enrollment, faculty load, budget, and related areas;
- acting as curriculum liaison between the college and the State Chancellor's Office;
- serving as the college Curricunet system administrator;

- analyzing information and evaluating results to solve problems and recommend solutions;
- coordinating the production of the college catalog and class schedule which includes auditing and verifying the work of Administrative Aides and other staff related to schedule input, proofreading scheduling catalog, maintaining a master catalog of Curriculum Committee actions, and ensuring the printing and distribution of the catalog;
- coordinating the review of course outlines by initiating an annual study, notifying instructional departments of needed review, and tracking the process;
- troubleshooting and resolving issues relating to scheduling, faculty loads, data entry, computer database errors, and state reporting;
- developing procedures, forms, and other written materials to facilitate compliance with state requirements related to curriculum and MIS reporting;
- Organizing, scheduling and preparing materials for meetings;

The VIP Board selected the Alliance of Schools for Cooperative Programs (ASCIP) pool representing K-12 and community college districts throughout the state to serve as the administrator, provide support services and insurance coverage for property/liability and workers' compensation through its pool. As part of the transition of VIP to ASCIP it is necessary for the Board of Trustees to take certain actions to maintain compliance with state laws and regulations. The resolution before you is to the State of California, Department of Industrial Relations, Self Insurance Plans, and applies for a "Certificate of Consent to Self Insure" the District's workers' compensation liability program. The District currently holds a similar certificate to self insure through VIP. The State will place the VIP certificate on an inactive status since the ASCIP pool will be providing the first dollar coverage for workers' compensation liabilities rather than VIP.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt Resolution No. 2010-22 authorizing application to the Director of Industrial Relations, State of California, for a Certificate of Consent to Self Insure workers' compensation liabilities on behalf of the State Center Community College District and to execute any and all documents required for such application.

Background:

Enclosed is the September 30, 2010, Quarterly Financial Status Report (CCFS-311Q) for the District General Fund as required for California community college districts (ECS 84043). In accordance with State instructions, a copy of the report is forwarded electronically to the State Chancellor's Office.

Since this is the first quarterly report for the 2010-11 fiscal year, few changes have occurred since the budget adoption. Additional revenue and expenditure adjustments will occur as the year progresses. Projections of revenue, expenditures, etc., are based on the adopted budget and amended for additional grants, new programs, etc. The revenues and expenditures, when compared to the budget, are 4.9% and 22.9% respectively. Revenue collections are down due to the late passage of the 2010-11 State budget. Had the budget been passed timely, the District would have received approximately \$22.9 million in State apportionment funds for the quarter ended September 30, 2010.

Projected FTES for 2010-11 is 30,968, which is approximately 2% less than 2009-10.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees accept the Quarterly Financial Status Report (CCFS-311Q) as presented.

The 2010-11 State Budget was passed and signed approximately 100 days late. According to the State Chancellor's Office, state leaders used a combination of cuts, rosy assumptions, borrowing and temporary revenues to bridge an estimated \$19.3b budget gap. While on the surface, the 2010-11 State Budget appears to provide the community colleges with a somewhat Improved budget, compared to 2009-10, districts should employ cauton in their local budget planning. The adopted budget presents a number of risks to the colleges that should be taken into account: possible mid-year cuts; additional \$129m in funding deferrals; and unreasonable local property tax estimates.

SCCCD has weathered the late passage of the State Budget, but the District's Administration is more concerned about the prolonged revenue stagnation in the next four years (previously estimated to be only three years). In an effort to mitigate some of these uncertainties, staff has developed a multi-year budgeting model and is updated as the District's economic conditions change.
