Presidents' Reports	 Mr. Cantu reported on topics of interest from Fresno City College. Copies of the report were provided for the Board and interested attendees, and contained the following highlights: Fire Academy Class 38 held their graduation certificate ceremony in the OAB auditorium on December 13, with 17 fire cadets graduating. The keynote speaker was retired engineer Gary Baxter from the City of Clovis. This year's opening of school meeting was held in the OAB auditorium on January 3. At the meeting, faculty and staff received updates on campus safety and security from Daniel Cervantes, interim chief of the SCCCD Police Department, and updates on the budget and accreditation. Chancellor Blue also

presented information regarding district goals that included safety and security, Society for University and College Planning (SCUP) training, districtwide technology, and the next strategic conversation.

 Lori Natal, Puente coordinator/counselor has been selected through a very competitive process to participate in the 2013 HOPE Leadership Institute. This institute (HLI) is the first and only statewide leadership institute specifically designed for professional Latinas in California.

Mr. White reported on topics of interest from Reedley College and the Oakhurst and Madera centers. Copies of the report were provided for the Board and interested attendees, and contained the following highlights:

- Reedley College has been ranked #2 in California for campus safety by the website StateUniversity.com for 2012. This is one position higher than the college's ranking from 2011. This is StateUniversity.com's second annual list of safest colleges and universities in the U.S.
- Five Reedley College students received their American FFA degrees at the National FFA Convention in October. The students are Julia Alvarez, Shana Layne, Victor Evans, Juan Rodriguez, and Justin Abatti. Michael Valencia received the national proficiency award for specialty animal production with his apiary (bee) project.
- Reedley College officially welcomed back faculty and staff from all locations on January 3 during its annual Opening Day Conference. The event's keynote speaker was Dr. Darrick Smith, the center director for LearningWorks, an educational policy organization focusing on improving student success rates in higher education.

Ms. Ikeda reported on topics of interest from the Willow International Community College Center (WICCC). Copies of the report were provided for the Board and interested attendees, and contained the following highlights:

 The Clovis Chamber of Commerce is taking signups for the 14th year of Leadership Clovis. The program is an instructional and hands-on leadership learning experience that includes networking, field observation, and community involvement, and requires a two year commitment. During the first year, which is instruction-led learning, WICCC will be utilized. The class is led by the facilitator and various guest speakers from business, government, and the community. A number of our faculty and

Presidents' Reports (continued)	 administrators have attended and completed the Leadership Clovis program. The annual Holiday Festival was held the evening of December 13 at the WICCC. The choir's concert featured a variety of musical selections performed by the WICCC choir under the direction of Dan Bishop. Students are being welcomed to the new semester by staff and Associated Student Government (ASG) members at welcome booths/help stations the first week. Students will be given directions to classes, information on purchasing parking permits, as well as answers to general questions.
Chancellor's Report	 Dr. Blue reported the following: State Center Community College District will host a SCUP (Society of College and University Planning) planning institute January 30 to February 1 at District Office North. The SCUP institute is an internationally recognized program that leads to certification in integrated planning and issues related to accountability and accreditation. It is a very prestigious program and is rarely offered on-site. SCCCD has reserved 35 slots for internal participants selected from campuses and sites throughout the district. Five slots are being offered to external participants as a way to generate revenue and offset costs. This is a tremendous opportunity for professional development in the area of planning and assessment. As a result of a visit from the Counselors of Real Estate (CRE) last fall, they have agreed to accept SCCCD as one of its projects, and will be sending a team to do a thorough evaluation and provide recommendations for the Board's consideration. CRE is an independent consortium of real estate professionals that help institutions create plans to maximize revenue resources for existing properties and facilities. They will be assisting the district in creating an asset management plan. More details about CRE's visit will be available soon. With dwindling revenues from the state, the district must explore alternative revenue resources and, therefore, this is an excellent opportunity for the district. Award-winning composer, philanthropist and New York Times best-selling author Peter Buffett will share his music and insights into the lessons learned while growing up as the son of millionaire investor Warren Buffett, at FCC's Old Administration

Building on February 2. All proceeds will benefit scholarship and arts education programs at State Center Community College

Academic Senate Report	 Mary Ann Valentino, Fresno City College Academic Senate President, reported the following: She attended the Fall Plenary in Irvine on November 8-10. FCC Academic Senate approved AR 4250 (Probation). The senate selected Laurel Doud as their Hayward Award nominee. The senate reviewed and made recommended changes to the FCC mission statement, as request by the Strategic Planning Committee. The senate continues to discuss and make recommendations regarding the district integrated planning manual draft.
Classified Senate Report	 Juan Tirado, Reedley College Classified Senate President, reported the following: The RC Classified Senate approved several operating agreements in October, including the budget committee, distance education, staff development, and student success. The senate hosted a Halloween office decoration contest and fundraiser for scholarships. During the November senate meeting, Stephanie Curry provided an update on the budget and Eileen Apperson-Williams presented the Program Review Cycle 3 Handbook. In December, the senate adopted two families for Christmas. Gifts, food and a tree were delivered to the families in Madera and Reedley. The senate is currently developing a classified staff handbook and reviewing the college mission and goals. Mr. Tirado recently appointed as the RC Latino Faculty and Staff Association president. The association has drafted their activities for the spring semester.
Fresno Area Express Update	Mr. Brian Speece introduced Ken Hamm from the City of Fresno, and Angie Rios from the Rios Company. Mr. Hamm presented information on the upcoming bus rapid transit service project. This project will reduce the amount of time busses dwell at stops or the stations, and busses will be appointed with amenities not included on regular busses. A stop at Fresno City College is included in the first phase of this project. Ms. Smith asked if the is project complies with clean air initiatives. Mr. Hamm stated the project does comply with the initiatives and will be looking at all-electric applications for

Fresno Area Express Update (continued)	the future. Ms. Smith asked about the schedule for the bus service. Mr. Patterson would like to see Willow International included in the loop. Mr. Hamm said this plan is flexible and can accommodate several routes, including Willow International. Mr. Nishinaka asked if the cost of ridership will change with this service. Mr. Hamm stated there will not be a change in the cost. Mr. Payne asked if there will be opportunities for increased ridership in southwest Fresno. Mr. Hamm stated Fresno City Council considered several routes for the initial phase of the service and chose the Kings Canyon/Blackstone corridor.
Board Strategic Conversation Update	Dr. George Railey provided an update for the upcoming second annual strategic conversation. He reviewed the timeline, the planning and the participants for the event. Dr. Railey discussed the process and expected outcomes from the strategic conversation. Mr. Payne requested the committee be mindful of a "universal thought process" when selecting students. Students who are on academic probation and represent ethnic diversity should be considered when making the selection. Mr. Nishinaka asked that students who have extended day schedules also be considered. Dr. Jothany Blackwood stated she would be available to meet with board members if they are interested in actively participating in a in the strategic conversation planning. President Barreras asked interested board members to submit their names by the end of the week.
Federal and State Financial Aid Update	Kira Tippins from Fresno City College, Chris Cortez from Reedley College, and Candace Cannon from the Willow International Community College Center reviewed the recent and upcoming changes for both federal and state financial aid. Ms. Barreras asked if there is an outreach program for students affected by AB540. Ms. Tippins said the district reaches out to those students through the Cash for College Workshops as well as partnerships with Fresno Unified and through the campus Latino faculty and staff associations. Ms. Smith stated she is concerned about students that come to secondary institutions unprepared. The district needs to partner with K-12 to assist in helping student prepare to college.
Safety and Security Update	Mr. Brian Speece presented information on the district's safety and security plan. He reviewed the emergency notification systems including "First to Know", phone systems, and interior and exterior speakers. Mr. Speece reviewed the emergency procedures pamphlet and provided copies to the Board. Mr. Speece presented

Safety and Security Update (continued)	information on future considerations for improvements for security at the child development centers and other campus locations. This topic will be discussed in greater detail at the board retreat.

Background:

On December 11, 2012, the Personnel Commission approved a reorganization and staffing plan that included creating a new classification of human resources specialist. The director of classified personnel studied the duties being performed by staff members and reviewed other agencies' staffing plans and determined the duties being performed would be more properly classified as a human resources specialist. According to Education Code section 88009, the Board of Trustees shall fix and prescribe the duties to be performed by all persons in the classified service. Following the Board of Trustees' approval of these duties, the district will meet and negotiate a salary placement with CSEA as required by the California Government Code section 3543.2.

Examples of Duties:

Performs difficult and complex duties in accordance with general directions and requires lead responsibilities:

- Research and prepare recruitment materials such as job announcements and advertisements.
- Assist in determining the time line for recruitment, establish monthly calendar for written and oral testing, and post recruitments accordingly.
- Use automated applicant tracking/Human Resources Information Systems software to create job postings, screen applications, and other related work in recruitment cycle.
- Conduct and monitor the examination process to include administering knowledge, skills, and oral board testing.
- Compose test questions for oral and/or technical panels and instruct panel members on proper application of Equal Employment Opportunity guidelines.
- Secure subject-matter experts to assist in the examination process.
- Develop interview forms and other examination materials, reflecting required skills, knowledge, and abilities necessary for successful job performance.

- Monitor and track recruitment expenditures.
- Work with district hiring managers to select and place employees in temporary/provisional assignments.
- Contact candidates selected for temporary/provisional employment; schedule and conduct orientation, explain hiring process and pre-employment requirements.
- Establish start dates with hiring supervisors and track temporary/provisional employees.
- Follow up on pre-employment requirements.
- Review and prepare employee status change notices or personnel action forms.
- Create and maintain employee files.
- Provide information to supervisors and employees regarding compliance with merit system rules, state and federal laws.
- Interpret and explain district rules, regulations, and policies.
- Attend a variety of meetings, workshops, and conferences related to assigned activities.
- Prepare commission agenda items and conduct background research for related reports.
- Research and prepare materials and/or reports for Personnel Commission meetings such as salary surveys, annual reports, and presentations.
- Assist in the coordination of disciplinary hearings.
- Enter and retrieve data from software applications such as word processing, spreadsheets, database, calendaring and email.
- Assist in the development and maintenance of internal operating guidelines.
- May perform other related duties as needed.

Background:

Due to an increase in the cost of operations (primarily utilities, expiring warranties and increased maintenance), it is necessary to raise the Reedley College residence hall rate for the 2013-14 academic year by three percent. The current rental rate is \$3,182 per year (\$1,591 per semester) plus a non-refundable contract fee of \$140.

It is proposed that the 2013-14 residence hall rental rate be established at \$3,278 per year (\$1,639 per semester), with an additional \$10 increase of the non-refundable contract fee (to \$150), which is collected from residence hall tenants and is used for activities and programs. The proposed contract fee increase will allow for additional activities for students to be funded.

A mandatory meal plan is included as part of the residence hall contract. Due to increased costs (primarily food costs, healthy menu choices, and utilities), it is necessary to raise the meal plan rate by \$50. This proposed increase for 2013-14 would raise the current plan of \$1,500 per year (\$750 per semester) to \$1,600 per year (\$800 per semester) with an optional augmented meal plan rate increase from \$2,300 per year (\$1,150 per semester) to \$2,400 per year (\$1,200 per semester). This meal plan can be used by residents in the college cafeteria, Monday through Friday.

Fiscal Impact:

Increased revenues for the fiscal year 2013-14 of \$11,520 for residence hall rate, \$1,200 for contract fee, and \$12,000 for meal plan rate are anticipated.

Background:

Community college districts must annually establish the nonresident tuition rate for the ensuing year in February of each fiscal year. Effective with the 2010-11 fiscal year, a nonresident student, for tuition purposes, was defined as any student who has not established residency in California, including both out-of-state and international students.

The district has established the nonresident tuition rate based on the 12 comparable states' average tuition option, as authorized under Education Code 76140(e). Additionally, state law permits a community college district to charge nonresident students an additional fee not greater than the respective district's capital outlay expenditures for the prior year reduced to a per unit rate . The established non-resident tuition rate schedules for the fiscal years 2003-04 to 2012-13 are listed below.

Background:

Education code section 76355 provides the governing board of the community college districts the option of increasing student health fees by the same percentage as the increase in the implicit price deflator index for the state and local government purchase of goods and services. The established fees assist districts in offsetting the cost of providing health care services for their students. Therefore, it is appropriate to apply the calculated fee increase to minimize the encroachment of the student health program upon other general fund activities. The district was notified in 2011 and 2012 that the student health fee could be increased for each year by one dollar (\$1); the district took no action to increase the student health fee during either year.

The education code authorized a health fee increase of \$2; (\$1 for 2011 and \$1 for 2012). The increase in fee results in a semester increase from \$17 to \$19 and a summer increase from \$14 to \$16 for most colleges and centers in the district. Since the Oakhurst and Career & Technology Centers have not provided a full complement of health services to students, the district has chosen to charge a reduced fee for these centers; it is recommended the new fee increase from \$9 to \$11 per session. The proposed increase will provide funding for psychological services to be offered at all campus locations and assist with addressing the need for additional revenue to cover the increased cost of existing health services.

Recommendation:

It is recommended the Board of Trustees authorize a \$2 increase to student health fees, effective the fall semester of 2013, resulting in the following rates: \$19 per semester and \$16 for summer session for district colleges and centers; with the exception of the Oakhurst and Career Technology centers at the rate of \$11 per semester.

Background:

In July 2012 the Board awarded the installation of an intrusion detection and access control system for the Old Administration Building (OAB) project. This award, made against RFP #1112-08, was to pilot a new intrusion and access control system, which if successful, would become the standard system for installations throughout the district. Specifications for the three competing vendors responding to this RFP required that any new installation must integrate with our existing technology while offering new control panels and software with enhanced reporting at a reduced cost. Sebastian Corporation, a local firm, was awarded this project utilizing Interlogix/Verex security panels as part of the new intrusion and access control installation.

Based upon the success of the initial award of RFP #1112-08, administration is recommending Sebastian Corporation proceed with additional intrusion and access control upgrades. This new district standard has been evaluated thoroughly and judged superior to existing intrusion detections systems throughout the district. Pricing for these four installations at the Fresno City College business education and health science buildings, Madera Center and Willow International AC1 building is in keeping with the previously awarded specifications and costs, and includes new control panels, keypads and interface modules, labor, and installation. Existing motion detectors and door contacts will continue to be utilized to help contain costs. Funding for these installations is part of the previously approved Capital Projects Fund and Measure E Local Bond Measure Fund (district support).

Background:

In December 2012, the district released Request for Proposal No. 12-13-02, Executive Search Services, for the selection of a service provider to assist the district in identifying and selecting candidates for the positions of president of Reedley College and associate vice chancellor of human resources. The purpose of this solicitation was to retain a firm with extensive educational contacts and recent relevant experience to provide executive search services under a fee-based agreement to expedite the executive search process. Proposers were encouraged to identify areas of potential cost savings for work to be performed, including any financial advantage gained for assisting in both searches simultaneously.

The district received six proposals in response to this solicitation. These proposals were evaluated on the basis of the thoroughness of the firm's submission, relevant experience in California community college executive searches, evaluations and recommendations of clients, conformity with the requirements of the RFP, capacity to complete the project within defined parameters, and the level, background and experience of individuals to be assigned to perform the services. From the initial six proposals, four consultant firms participated in an interview process with a selection committee. This committee included a trustee representative, vice chancellor of educational services and institutional effectiveness, president of Willow International Community College Center, vice presidents of administrative services from both Fresno City College and Reedley College, and the director of purchasing. The executive search firms interviewed included the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT), Community College Search Services, The ELS Group, and Professional Personnel Leasing (PPL). At the conclusion of the interview process, a final recommendation was forwarded to the chancellor.

After thorough consideration, the district administration is recommending ACCT, led by Dr. Pamila Fisher, to provide consultant services to assist in the search process for both the president of Reedley College and associate vice chancellor of human resources. Dr. Fisher has successfully

completed 24 searches, including the latest Fresno City College presidential search. She recently served as interim chancellor of City College of San Francisco in 2012. Dr. Fisher and ACCT have an extensive knowledge of the district, the California community college system, and an active nationwide community college network. They have an impressive track record of success, diversity, and a commitment to working with all types of colleges. ACCT has the administrative capability to facilitate both searches simultaneously and will perform the searches at an extremely competitive cost.

Fiscal Impact:

Funding for the executive search process will be paid by the 2012-13 general fund. The estimated overall fee to facilitate the searches for president of Reedley College and associate vice chancellor of human resources is \$35,000.00.

Recommendation:

It is recommended the Board of Trustees authorize entering into an agreement with the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT) for executive search services for the president of Reedley College and the associate vice chancellor of human resources, and authorize the chancellor or vice chancellor of finance and administration to sign an agreement on behalf of the district.

Attached is the December 31, 2012, Quarterly Financial Status Report (CCFS-311Q) for the district general fund, as required for California community college districts (ECS 84043). In accordance with state instructions, a copy of the report was forwarded electronically to the State Chancellor's Office.

Projections for the revenue, expenditures, and other sources/uses are based on the adopted final budget and amended for additional funding or programs as they are received. Actual revenues and expenditures through the quarter ending December 31, 2012, when compared to the current budget, are 45.4% and 48.1%, respectively.

Projected FTES for 2012-13 at the first period reporting is 25,986, which is approximately 2.0% above anticipated funded FTES cap.

Background:

As a result of Dr. Timothy Woods being appointed as Vice President of Instruction, Fresno City College, the district conducted an in-house recruitment for the position of interim Dean of Instruction for the Business Division at Fresno City College. The search advisory committee was composed of five faculty members, four administrators, and one classified employee. A total of three people applied for the position of interim dean of instruction. Three applicants were interviewed by the committee and two applicants were forwarded to the chancellor for interview.

It is recommended that Dr. Rick Santos be appointed interim Dean of Instruction, Fresno City College. Dr. Santos has been an English/Reading instructor at Fresno City College for the past 18 years. During those 18 years, Dr. Santos served as an Interim Vice President of Instruction, Reedley College for six months. He served a six-month assignment as Instructor on Special Assignment, Reedley College. During his tenure he also served as department chair as well as academic senate president. Dr. Santos began his career as an English Instructor in Japan. Dr. Santos received his B.A. and M.A. in Linguistics – English as a Second Language and his Ed.D. in Educational Leadership from California State University, Fresno.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees appoint Dr. Rick Santos as the Interim Dean of Instruction, for the Business Division at Fresno City College with placement on the Management Salary Schedule at Range 62 step 8 (\$132,064/annually), effective February 6, 2013.
