Chancellor's Report

Dr. Crow reported the following:

**Business and International Education Grant**

The District was recently notified that we received a grant of approximately \$150,000 from the Business and Industry grant program of the United States Department of Education. The Business and International Education Grant will be used for faculty development in international business.

**Capital Campaign for the OAB**

College and District personnel have been busy this week reviewing

the newly-created fund-raising and marketing plan for the Old Administration Building. The campaign consultants have been meeting with groups and individuals to outline all facets of the capital campaign. We are all looking forward to the official kickoff of this new venture for Fresno City College and the District.

**Accreditation Update - Reedley College/North Centers**

Recommendation 1: Student Learning Outcomes

- Counselors from throughout the district attended a special workshop to develop districtwide student learning outcomes on April 27.

Recommendations 2 & 6: Strategic Planning

- Reedley College and the North Centers faculty, staff, and administration met jointly to identify support teams from Reedley College and the North Centers, and to complete training in strategic planning framework.

Recommendation 3: Dialogue

- Planning sessions are open to all faculty, staff, and administrators.
- Updates are presented at augmented president's cabinet, academic senate, facilities, and other college committee meetings.

Recommendation 4: Program Review

- Reports completed for Cycle 2 of the program review are aviation mechanics, automotive, agriculture business, mechanized agriculture, environmental horticulture, natural resources, plant science, manufacturing, DSPS, EOPS, and dental assisting.

Recommendation 5: Library and Learning Resources

- The North Centers' library advisory committee has developed recommendations that address the hiring of a full-time librarian.
- An orientation to the library services will be given to faculty at the Fall 2006 duty day training session.

**Accreditation Update - Fresno City College**

Recommendation 1: Participatory Governance

- An *ad hoc* committee of the constituent groups has been formed to review different governance models and to make a recommendation to the president in the fall.

Recommendation 2: Program Review

- Ongoing with final drafts of program review reports being reviewed.

Recommendation 3: Planning

- The Strategic Planning Council has been meeting weekly for the last four weeks. At the April 26, 2006, meeting, the areas of focus for the planning process were identified.

The draft key performance indicators (KPI's), goals and objectives were also identified. Rough drafts of the planning and communication flow chart, operating agreement, definition of terms and action planning process are being reviewed by campus constituent groups. A BlackBoard site on strategic planning is up and running for all campus constituents to review documents and participate in discussions.

- 3.2 Distance Education Plan - A Distance Learning campus committee has been formed and will hold its first meeting on Monday.
- 3.3 Human Resources - Human Resources are currently being addressed in the goals, objectives, and KPIs draft of the strategic planning process.
- 3.4 Technology Plan - Campus Technology Committee has met to establish principles of the technology plan and to review technology plans from other California community colleges. A BlackBoard site was established to facilitate discussion.

Recommendation 4: Library Holdings

- New collection policy has been developed to address the deficiencies.

Recommendation 5: College-Wide Strategic Planning

- The Strategic Planning Council is mindful of the District's Strategic Plan as the College's goals, objectives and KPI's are developed.

**Employee Recognition**

Dr. Crow extended an invitation and strongly encouraged everyone's attendance at the commencement ceremonies on May 19. He said that the campuses are busy preparing for commencement, which is the most enriching and rewarding experience of the year. The ceremonies are a testimony to the will and determination of our students--many of whom achieve their goals despite enormous challenges and obstacles.

Ms. Zyanya Bajareno presented a narrated slide show of the end-of-the-year report for Fresno City College Associate Student Government activities including community services, cultural events, club events, and participation in college activities. ASG officers were introduced.

Special Presentation,  
Steve and Jill Cholewa

Dr. Crow introduced Steve and Jill Cholewa, owners of S & J Lumber in Madera, and expressed his gratitude on behalf of SCCC for their contributions to the Madera Center, noting their involvement on advisory committees and as scholarship donors. Dr. Joan Edwards, Director of the SCCC Foundation recognized the Cholewas as a unique couple who have been contributors of their time, energy, and resources for fundraisers, as well as hosting events for potential donors. Dr. Terry Kershaw, Vice Chancellor of the North Centers, said that Steve and Jill Cholewa are two champions for the Madera Center who want to do what benefits students. Their two contributions of \$100,000 each over the last two years have essentially started the physical education and athletics programs at the Madera Center. The funds have been used to develop softball and athletic fields, and to make renovations to allow for an exercise/dance studio and a fitness center. Students can now take their required physical education classes at the Madera Center.

Update of Tutorial  
Program, Fresno City  
College

Dr. John Spolsdoff, Director of the Fresno City College Student Success and Honors Program, and Ray Sanchez, Tutorial Coordinator, presented an overview of the mission and services of the Student Success and Tutorial Center. A slide presentation included hours of operation and usage, data on students served, pictures of the facilities, and new endeavors to improve retention such as the math extended learning center and online tutoring.

The Board members engaged in a discussion with Dr. Spolsdoff and Mr. Sanchez. Ms. Barreras asked how students are made aware of the services and how students are directed to tutorial services. Mr. Forhan commended the program for addressing student retention and asked about progression rates. Ms. Smith said that she is impressed with the program. She emphasized the importance of the intervention efforts of counselors and staff, and asked how students are selected as tutors. Mr. Smith concurred with the fine work the center is doing and asked about the students that are resistant to asking for help (often the most needy), how those students are encouraged to come to the center, and how courses and tutorial services are selected. Mr. Thonesen closed the discussion by noting the creativity of this program and others in the District that assist students.

Mr. Brinkley introduced Architect Fred Sweeney with Phillips, Metsch, Sweeney, Moore Architects, who has been working with the District on the Southeast site planning over the last year.

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Background:

Administrative Secretary I Position:

The District Foundation office is gearing up for the capital campaign program for the Old Administration Building. The Administrative Assistant in the Foundation Office will be temporarily reassigned to the Fresno City College campus to assist in the capital campaign program. The Administration is requesting a limited term Administrative Secretary I position to work in the Foundation Office during the time that the Administrative Assistant is reassigned to Fresno City College effective June 12, 2006, through December 12, 2006.

Example of Duties:

Performs a wide variety of secretarial work, including typing, proofreading, filing, checking, drafting correspondence, and recording information from rough drafts, notes, or general instructions. Files materials, prepares mailings, and duplicates materials. Tracks budget expenditures. Operates a variety of office machines including copiers, calculator, switchboard, folding machines, etc. Answers telephone and serves as office receptionist. Schedules and cancels appointments. Assigns and reviews the work of other employees and students assigned to the department. May perform other related duties as needed.

College Center Assistants

Fresno City College is going to be involved in a capital campaign for the Old Administration Building. To assist in the internal portion of the capital campaign, administration is requesting

approval for two limited term College Center Assistants effective June 12, 2006, through December 12, 2006.

Examples of Duties:

Performs a wide variety of work, including working with faculty, staff and students to develop a comprehensive college center program, which integrates the curricular and co-curricular programs; maintains a calendar and schedule of events for the College Center; implements an effective program of films, speakers, field trips, workshops and seminars, art exhibits and student/staff performances; serves as trainer and advisor to campus student organizations; implements an effective intramural program for students; supervises the student activities in the College Center; assists with promotion of College Center activities; assists with monitoring budget, processing artist's contracts and contacting vendors. May perform other related duties, as needed.

Registration Assistants

It is necessary to relocate the Admissions & Records WebRoom due to construction at the Fresno City College Student Services building. This will potentially create an inconvenience for staff and students in that they will have to go back-and-forth from student service areas to the relocated WebRoom on the west lawn. In order to minimize the inconvenience to students and faculty, Admissions & Records will give them the option to request services on paper in the Admissions & Records main office. This will create a significant workload increase on the current staff. Administration is requesting two limited term Registration Assistant positions in Admissions & Records effective June 7, 2006, through August 15, 2006.

Accomplishes simple assistance with student registration functions. Provides routine basic registration information and assistance to students. May answer telephones, reply to basic registration inquiries, and take messages. Operates a copy machine, distributes office mail, time-stamps documents, and files/retrieves registration information. May operate data entry terminals and computers to enter registration information.

Computer subjects include terminology, storage devices, word processing, and computer based training applications. (*unique*)
2. **Aeronautics 2 Aviation Maintenance Technology 17.5 units, 15 lecture hours, 15 lab hours, graded only. (VOC)**  
**Basic Skills Advisories: Eligibility for ENGL 125, ENGL 126, and MATH 101.**  
Skills and knowledge appropriate to FAA Regulation Part 147 to include: Cabin Atmosphere Control Systems, Hydraulic and Pneumatic Power Systems, Aircraft Fuel Systems, Fuel Metering Systems, Engine Fuel Systems, Aircraft Landing Gear Systems, Position and Warning Systems, Ice and Rain Control Systems, Fire Protection Systems, Engine Fire Protection Systems, Assembly and Rigging, Engine Instrument Systems. (*unique*)
3. **Aeronautics 3 Aviation Maintenance Technology 17.5 units, 15 lecture hours, 15 lab hours, graded only. (VOC)**  
**Subject Prerequisites: AERO 1 and AERO 2.**  
Skills and knowledge appropriate to FAA Regulation Part 147 to include: Reciprocating Engines, Turbine Engines, Engine Inspection, Lubrication Systems, Ignition and Starting Systems, Induction Systems, Engine Cooling Systems, Engine Exhaust and Reverser Systems, Propellers, Auxiliary Power Units. (*unique*)
4. **Aeronautics 4 Aviation Maintenance Technology 17.5 units, 15 lecture hours, 15 lab hours, graded only. (VOC)**  
**Subject Prerequisites: AERO 1 and AERO 2.**  
Skills and knowledge appropriate to FAA Regulation Part 147 to include: Sheetmetal and Non-metallic Structures, Airframe Inspection, Communication and Navigation Systems, Aircraft Electrical Systems, Aircraft Instrument Systems, Engine Electrical Systems. (*unique*)
5. **Engineering 10 Introduction to Engineering 2 units, 2 lecture hours, credit/no credit option.**  
**Basic Skills Advisories: Eligibility for ENGL 125, ENGL 126, and MATH 101.**  
This course is an introduction to the engineering profession for students interested in a career in engineering or technology. Topics include opportunities in engineering, education plans, internships, the design process, analytical problem solving techniques, project management, and professional ethics. Hands-on projects are used extensively in the course. (*common*)
6. **Physical Education 8 Martial Arts/Self Defense 1 unit, 2 lab hours, credit/no credit option, 3 repeats.**  
**Basic Skills Advisories: Eligibility for ENGL 125 and ENGL 126.**  
This course helps individuals develop the confidence and the skill necessary to defend oneself against deliberate, aggressive assault. It incorporates the mental and physical skills of basic self defense. (*common*)

Emphasis on oral communication and listening comprehension with some skill development in reading and writing. Practical vocabulary for everyday usage and application of basic grammatical structures stressed. Topics include daily life situations at home and in the French world. (*unique*)
9. **Speech 8 Group Communication 3 units, 3 lecture hours, credit/no credit option.**  
**Subject Advisory: Eligibility for ENGL 1A.**  
An introduction to group communication as a vehicle for solving problems, reaching decisions and making recommendations on policy. Students will study and practice the theories, behaviors and processes of group communication. (*common*)

This course is designed for students with severe disabilities and/or learning disabilities. This course emphasizes developing skills in the areas of career assessment, career awareness, career exploration, and career development. The course is designed to prepare students for employment. *(common)*
- 2. Developmental Services 251 Workability Preparation and Job Placement 3 units, 2 lecture hours, 3 lab hours, credit/no credit only, 3 repeats.**  
This course is designed for students with severe disabilities and/or learning disabilities. The course will emphasize work preparation, job placement, and compensatory skills in preparation for work. Disability issues related to employment will be covered. Students will complete an employment portfolio, gain interviewing skills, and become familiar with the Americans with Disabilities Act and disability related issues in the hiring process. *(common)*
- 3. Developmental Services 252 Workability Strategies and Job Maintenance 2 units, 2 lecture hours, credit/no credit only, 3 repeats.**  
This course is designed for students with disabilities. The course will give students compensatory skills and strategies in the workplace related to personal disabilities, work ethics, and socialization. Disability issues related to accommodations on the job will be addressed. The course will assist students with strategies and techniques to obtain and keep employment. *(common)*
- 4. Developmental Services 255 Workability Experience 1-4 units, student credit requires 60-240 hours volunteer employment or 75-300 hours paid employment, credit/no credit only, 3 repeats.**  
**Subject Prerequisites: Must be a California State Department of Rehabilitation (DOR) consumer.**  
This course is specifically designed for students with severe disabilities and/or learning disabilities. The course emphasizes developing skills through work experience in the areas of time management, following directions and instructions, appropriate work behaviors, and selecting and planning vocational choices. *(common)*
- 5. English 262B Reading Improvement Strategies 2 units, 3 lecture hours, 2 lab hours, credit/no credit only, 1 repeat.**  
**Subject Advisories ENGL 260 or ENGL 260B or placement by college assessment process.**  
The second nine week segment of ENGL 262. A variety of group and individual skill development activities in literal and interpretive comprehension skills to foster independent reading proficiency. Preparation for English 126. Recommended to be taken concurrently with English 252 or English 125. *(unique)*
- 6. Mathematics 260B Arithmetic Review: Fractions 1 unit, short-term course 18 lecture hours, credit/no credit only, 1 repeat.**  
Review of arithmetic involving computing with fractions. Students can not take this class concurrently with MATH 260. *(common)*
- 7. Mathematics 277E Elementary Statistics Discussion Group 1 unit, 1 lecture hour, credit/no credit only.**  
**Subject Corequisite: MATH 11.**  
This course is intended to provide group-based assistance for students who are currently enrolled in MATH 11 (Elementary Statistics). *(unique)*

Adult, child, and infant CPR, rescue breathing, choking rescue, and first aid skills including treatment of burns, fractures, sprains, seizures, bleeding control, sudden illness, injuries, poisoning, heat and cold emergencies.  
*Certificates upon successful completion: Adult, Child and Infant CPR (valid for 1 year) Community First Aid & Safety (valid for 3 years). (unique)*
- 11. Physics 277 Physics Problems Discussion and Exercise 1 unit, 1 lecture hour, credit/no credit only, 1 repeat.**  
**Subject Corequisites: PHYS 2A or PHYS 2B or PHYS 4A or PHYS 4B or PHYS 4C or PHYS 10.**  
The intent of this course is to assist students with help in physics problem solving strategies. The emphasis will be on how to read the problem correctly, apply the principles of physics and the mathematical techniques learned in lecture to solve problems presented on homework and exams. *(unique)*

## I. Executive Summary

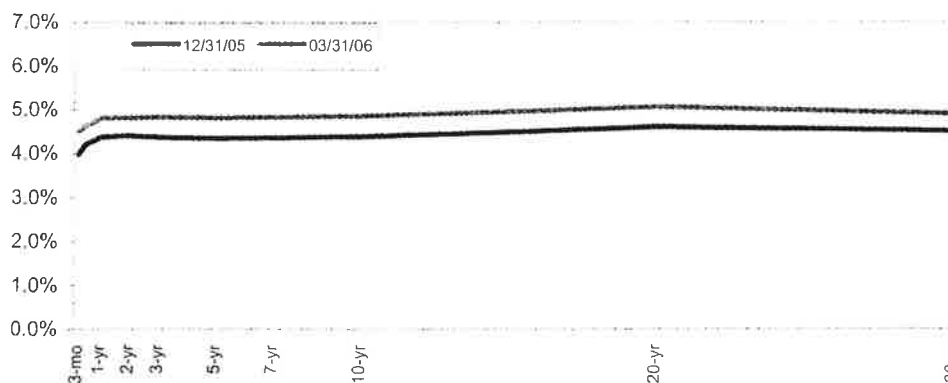
### Introduction

This is the Compliance Review of the County of Fresno's Treasurer's Investment Pool Portfolio for the period ended March 31, 2006, pursuant to California Government Code 53646. The report has two primary objectives: (1) to provide information regarding portfolio holdings as to compliance with California Government Code Sections 53601 and 53635, as well as the County Treasurer's Statement of Investment Policy and (2) to detail portfolio characteristics of the portfolio's investment holdings.

### Quarterly Overview of Markets:

During the quarter, the US Treasury yield curve remained flat while yields increased across the entire maturity spectrum. At both the January and March 2006 meetings, the Federal Reserve raised short-term interest rates one-quarter of a percentage point. The Committee said further increases "may" be needed, a downshift from a December forecast that higher rates were "likely." The long-standing pledge of "measured" rate rises also vanished from the statement.

As indicated on the previous page, during the first quarter of 2006, yields increased across the maturity spectrum. The yield on one-year Treasury Bonds increased 44 basis points to 4.82%, while the yield on thirty-year Treasury Bonds increased 39 basis points to 4.90%. The spread between the one-year Treasury and the 30-year Treasury ended the quarter at 8 basis points, decreasing from 13 basis points at the end of last quarter. During the quarter, yields on 90-day Certificates of Deposits increased 47 basis points while 180-day maturity yields increased 45 basis points. Commercial Paper moved higher in the 30-day maturities by 49 basis points.



## **Portfolio Position**

The portfolio maintained a weighted maturity of less than 14 months. The County of Fresno Investment Policy (revised December 2003) Section 11.0 recommends a portfolio of securities with a weighted average maturity not to exceed 550 days. Keeping the portfolio within this maturity range minimized its exposure to potential interest rate shifts that can occur in the mid-maturity sectors of the yield curve. The portfolio was oriented towards high quality with 69.2% of the portfolio's assets invested in risk-free instruments.

### **Compliance with California Government Codes 53601 & 53635:**

The Investment Portfolio is compliant with the **California Government Codes 53601 and 53635**.

### **Compliance with Treasury Investment Pool Statement of Investment Policy:**

**The Statement of Investment Policy** is more stringent than the California Government Code. As of 3/31/06, the Treasurer's Investment Pool portfolio complied with its Statement of Investment Policy.

Please refer to the next section of the report for a more detailed evaluation of the portfolio in relationship to the California Government Code and the Treasurer's Investment Pool Statement of Investment Policy.

## **Portfolio Characteristics**

The Treasury Pool's portfolio characteristics are indicative of a plan exhibiting a high degree of quality with short-term maturities.

- As of 3/31/06, the portfolio had a market value of \$2.0 billion with an average dollar-weighted quality of "AAA."
- Approximately 69.2% of the portfolio's assets are invested in securities with virtually no credit risk (i.e., US Treasuries, US Agencies, and cash).
- The dollar weighted average life of the pool is 402 days.
- 16.0% of the portfolio at cost matures within 30 days, 29.4% matures within 90 days, and 40.6% within 180 days (see Appendix for further details).

Based on its relative high quality and near-term liquidity, and assuming no significant changes to pool funding policies, the Treasury Investment Pool is well positioned to meet its expenditure requirements over the next six months.

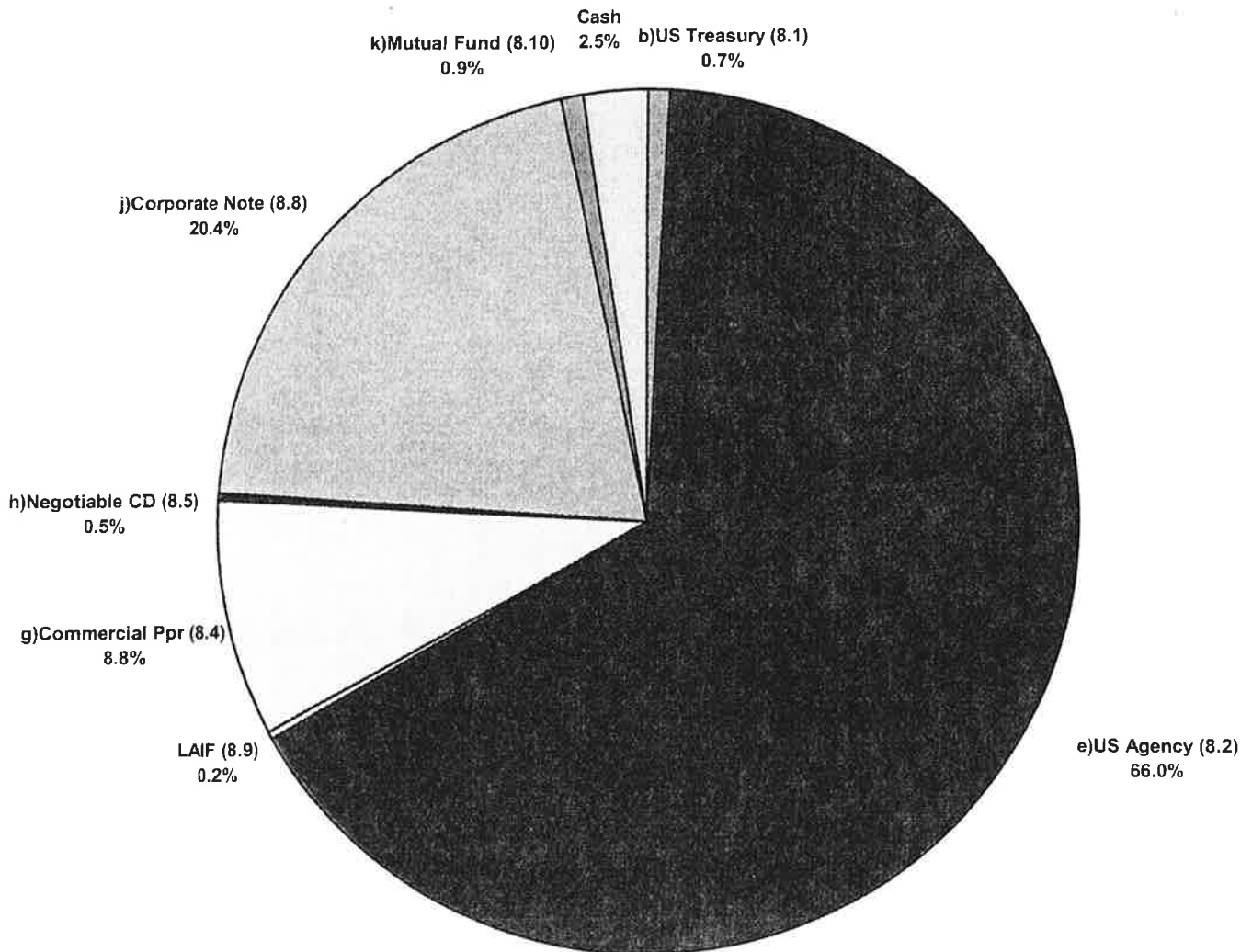

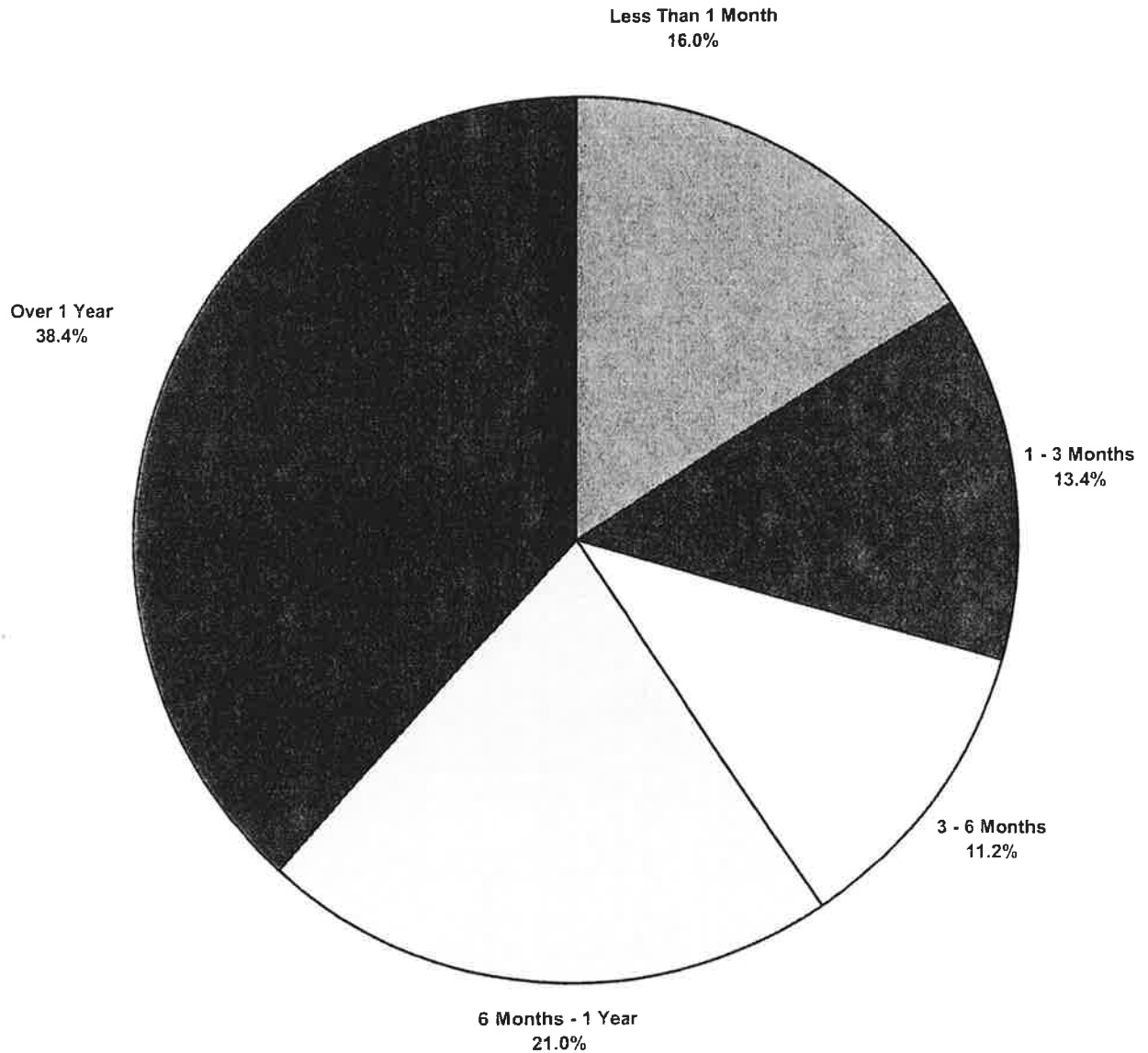
## Portfolio Breakdown by Investment Type (valued at cost)

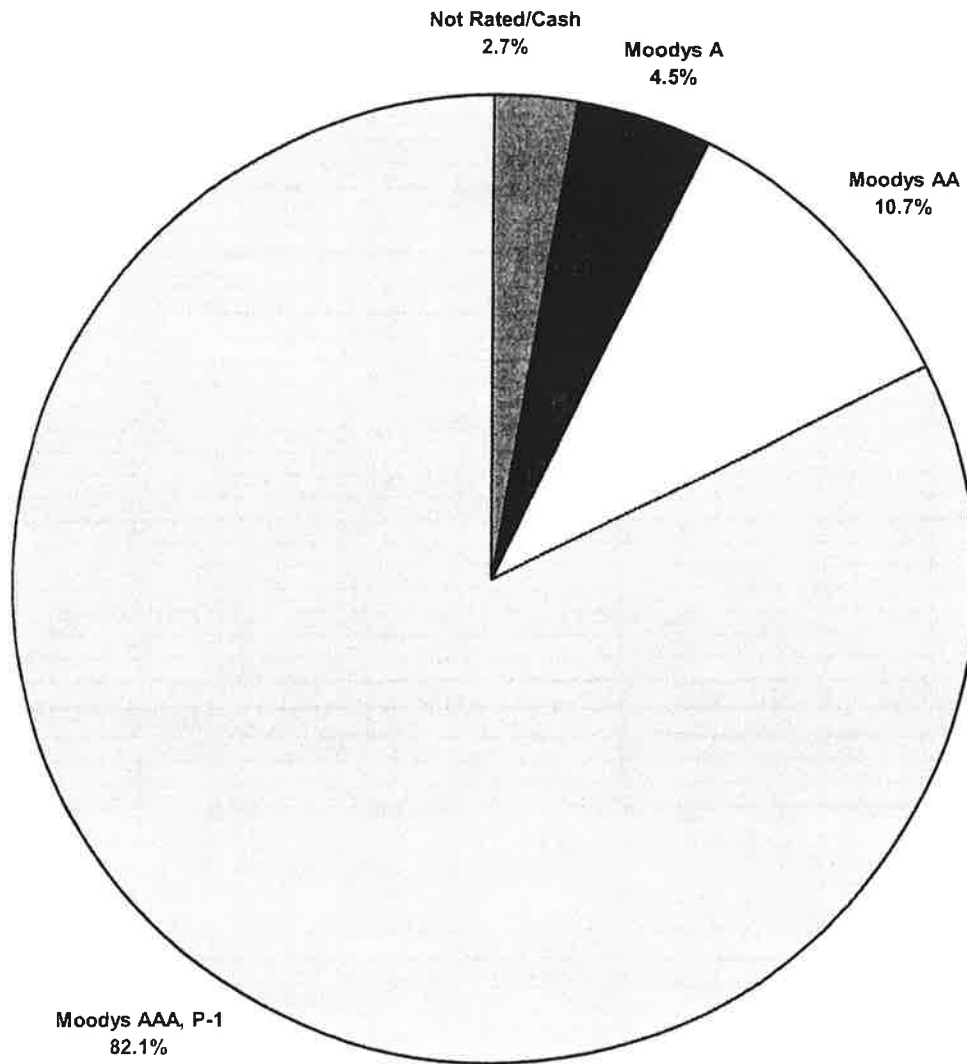
## Portfolio Breakdown by Maturity Date (valued at cost)

## GLOSSARY OF TERMS

**Average Maturity** - The weighted average time to principal repayment. Useful as an approximation of a single maturity where the mean or average maturity is used to describe the life of the instrument.

**Bankers Acceptance** - Money market instrument created from transactions involving foreign trade. In its simplest form, a bankers acceptance is a check, drawn on bank by an importer or exporter of goods.

**Basis Point** - 1/100th of 1%.

**Certificate of Deposit** - A short term money market instrument representing a receipt from a bank for a deposit at a specified rate of interest for a specified period of time.

**Coupon Rate** - The annual interest paid of a fixed-income instrument.

**Commercial Paper** - Money Market instrument representing a short-term promissory note of a large corporation at a specified rate of return for a specified period of time.

**Current Yield** - A bond's coupon expressed as a percentage of the bond's market price.

**Discount Rate** - The interest rate used to translate a future value into a present value.

**Duration** - Often times referred to as Macaulay's duration is a fixed income measure of price sensitivity to changes in yields. It is calculated by taking a weighted average of the time periods to receipt of the present value of the cash flows from a fixed income instrument.

**Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation** - Also known as "FHLMC" and Freddie Mac. FHLMC is a Private Corporation authorized by Congress, which sells notes, participation certificates and other mortgage obligations backed by mortgage pools.

**Federal National Mortgage Association** - Also known as "FNMA" and Fannie Mae. A private corporation which buys and sells residential mortgages insured by FHA or guaranteed by VA. FNMA also issues notes, participation certificates and other mortgage obligations backed by mortgage pools.

**Government National Mortgage Corporation** - Also known as "GNMA" and Ginnie Mae. A wholly-owned U.S. government corporation. GNMA issues and guarantees mortgage-backed securities which are backed by the full faith and credit of the United States Government.

**Repurchase Agreement** - Short term collateralized loan at a specified rate for a specified period, used by large investors as an alternative for cash investments.

**Yield to Maturity** - The internal rate of return of a standard bond held to maturity.

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Background:

In November 1979 the voters passed Proposition 4 (Gann), which effectively places an appropriations limit on each public entity within the State. The appropriations limit base was derived from the amount an entity had appropriated in its budget during the 1978-79 fiscal year. The base is annually adjusted upward in accordance with the inflationary allowance relating to the Consumer Price Index, as well as by population increase. Under Senate Bill 1352, enacted by the Legislature to implement Proposition 4, it is necessary that each public entity establish its appropriations limit for a given year prior to the last day of the previous fiscal year. It is further necessary that the governing body provide fifteen (15) days in which the public may examine the documentation used in arriving at the appropriations limit. Further legislation modified the method for computing the limit but the notification provisions remain the same.

The enclosed Resolution is intended to notify the public that the appropriations limit for this District for 2006-07 has been established and will be officially approved at a regular meeting of the Board to be held on June 27, 2006.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt Resolution No. 06-72G, Notice of Intent to Establish an Appropriations Limit for the 2006-07 Fiscal Year.

With the current Lease set to expire on July 31, 2006, the administration is currently evaluating the existing program location. The District currently leases space in the Student Center/Bookstore building at Fresno City College to the Educational Employees Credit Union (EECU) for operation of an automatic teller machine (ATM). This ATM was placed in 1995 and has provided the opportunity for convenient banking for our students and staff. Because of our successful relationship with the EECU, it was determined to be in the best interest of the District to continue this partnership. The District has recently completed negotiations to extend this ATM Lease for an additional five years. EECU will continue to pay \$100 per month for the term of the new Lease and also pay the District a commission of \$.035 per transaction. Also included in the new Agreement is a monthly payment to cover the cost of electricity for the ATM and surrounding area.

Additionally, the District has added by Lease Addendum, the use of automatic teller cash machines at the Clovis and Madera Centers. These are both stand-alone, cash-only machines located inside the main entrance at the Clovis Center and inside the student lounge at the Madera Center. EECU will continue to pay \$50 per month for each cash-only machine, as well as a commission of \$.035 per transaction.

Upon approval, the new Agreement will be for the three machines, as noted, for a term of five years, beginning July 1, 2006, and ending June 30, 2011. Currently, the combined total of the three machines is averaging 6,500 transactions per month.

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Background:

The Personnel Commission held a public hearing regarding their proposed budget for 2006-07 at its meeting on May 16, 2006. Following the Public Hearing, the Personnel Commission approved a budget of \$343,946 plus any increases for mandated personnel costs. The 2006-07 budget includes a revised staffing structure. It allows for the addition of a Personnel Analyst and an Administrative Secretary I for the Personnel Commission. However, the current vacant Personnel Assistant position will not be filled at this time. Additional funds have also been budgeted in advertising. This represents an increased budget from 2005-06 of \$29,045.

According to Education Code the Personnel Commission will forward their adopted budget (\$343,946) to the County Superintendent of Schools for action. The District may object or challenge the Personnel Commission budget by submitting its objection to the County Superintendent of Schools. If the County Superintendent of Schools proposes to reject the budget as submitted by the Commission, he shall, within 30 days after the Commission's submission of the budget, hold a Public Hearing on the proposed rejection within the affected District. He shall have informed both the Commission and the Governing Board of the date, time and place of the hearing. He may after such Public Hearing either reject, or, with the concurrence of the Commission, amend the proposed budget. In the absence of agreement between the Personnel Commission and the County Superintendent, the budget of the preceding year shall determine the amount of the new budget, and the items of expenditure shall be determined by the Commission.

The Personnel Commission will be forwarding a budget of \$343,946 to the Fresno County Superintendent of Schools and this amount will be included in the District's budget.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees direct the Chancellor to notify the Fresno County Superintendent of Schools that there will be no objection to the State Center Community College District Personnel Commission budget of \$343,946 for the 2006-07 fiscal year.

RE: Budget Message

Dear Board Members:

During the past several years the Personnel Commission has gone through a number of changes with both Commissioners and staff changing. In mid-April I was hired as the new Director of Classified Personnel and have been working through the backlog of recruitment and examination processes, classification study requests, out-of-date job descriptions and a multitude of other day to day needs of the district in the area of classified employees.

During this short time, I have reviewed the discussions of the Personnel Commission last November, 2005, when they adopted a staffing pattern. This included the three positions currently allocated (Director, Personnel Assistant, and Personnel Technician) and added two additional positions (Administrative Aide and Personnel Analyst). After careful consideration, I recommended that for the 2006-07 year, the positions of Personnel Technician, Personnel Analyst and a lower level of Administrative Secretary I be filled, leaving the Personnel Assistant vacant for now. This recommendation was approved at the May 16 meeting of the Personnel Commission.

In reviewing the non-personnel line items, a lack of dollars for advertising positions was readily apparent. The average cost of a single advertisement in the Fresno Bee alone is about \$450. Additionally, there were dollars allocated, but unspent in other line items. The advertising line item has been more than doubled to allow for adequate funding to recruit for all classified management, confidential and bargaining unit positions.

Thus, the approved overall budget of \$343,946 represents an increase of less than 9% even with adding a full-time staff member and more than doubling the advertising dollars. During the 2005-06 fiscal year, the Personnel Commission budget represented approximately 2.5% of the total district budget. For 2006-07, the budget as approved by the Commission would constitute about 2.4%.

I respectfully ask for your consideration of this budget request.

Upon certification and notice from the Fresno County Superintendent of Schools of such tie vote, the governing board of this school district shall order an election by requesting the Fresno County Superintendent of Schools to call a special runoff election to be held in the school district on the sixth (6th) Tuesday following the election resulting in the tie votes. Only the candidates receiving the tie votes shall appear on the ballots. Any member of the governing board who will be succeeded by a winner of the runoff election and whose term would expire before the winner of the runoff election would be determined shall continue to



discharge the duties of his office until his successor has qualified. The runoff election shall be called and conducted substantially in the manner provided in Chapter 3 (commencing with Section 5300) of the Education Code, provided, that the governing board shall determine the adjustments of the time requirements prescribed therein which would be necessary in order to conduct the runoff election.

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Background:

Request for Qualifications #0506-18, Advertising, Marketing and Communication Services, was advertised and distributed to interested firms to provide comprehensive advertising, marketing and communication services to the District and its campuses for the development and implementation of various projects and campaigns, including, but not limited to, enrollment, fundraising, branding, and public information campaigns. The administration recently completed evaluation of the RFQ submittals. Six firms responded as follows: Creative Solutions; Charles Looney Advertising; Panagraph, Inc.; The Rios Company; Thielen & Associates; and Neu Design. These responses were evaluated by a screening committee comprised of the Executive Director, Public and Legislative Relations, and representatives from the Public Information Offices at the various campuses. Based upon the qualifications of the firms and their relevant experience related to the identified District requirements, all of the firms responding were judged qualified to perform work for the District in their specific areas of expertise.

The screening committee was then expanded to include additional administrators and staff from Fresno City College, Reedley College, the North Centers, and the District Office. This committee met on April 12, 2006, to perform additional vendor interviews. The committee members considered the qualifications, experience and expertise of each firm in making recommendations as to the strengths and characteristics of particular firms and the appropriate types of projects to best utilize those strengths. Based upon these unanimous recommendations, further discussions and negotiations were held with the firms to develop a scope of work, deliverables and budget for the various campaigns. Current projects and recommendations are listed below; however, further recommendations may come before the Board as additional needs arise for marketing, enrollment, advertising and communication agreements.

Hispanic Enrollment Outreach (The Rios Company) - Provide marketing consultant services to assist the District in the development and implementation of a public relations and outreach campaign, targeting Hispanic students and their parents within the North and South Valley regions of the District's service area.

District Website Redesign (Creative Designs) - “ Create a fresh look and feel” for the District website utilizing interactive solutions, flash animation, scalable design, new template designs, interactive photos, restructured site navigation, online forms, newsletters and special downloads.

Measure E Public Information Campaign (Panagraph, Inc.) - Design and produce the annual report and produce radio and other public information campaign materials.

Internal Capital Campaign, Old Administration Building (Panagraph, Inc.) - Develop the Old Administration Building fundraising campaign, including logo and theme, marketing information, brochures, video, website and project support.

Enrollment Campaign (Panagraph, Inc.) - General recruitment campaign via various media outlets, including print, radio and television.

The District, under the terms of the Agreement, will operate and maintain the facility as an Early Childhood Education Center. The Agreement additionally provides for CUSD to access the facility in coordination with the District. The District will provide opportunities for CUSD students to attend Early Childhood Education classes. This partnership between the District and CUSD is representative of the cooperation and commitment of the two Districts to work together to provide the best possible instructional programs to the respective student populations at the least cost to our constituents.

The District has worked with CUSD to develop plans and specifications for the Child Development Center to be located on the District's Willow/International campus. This facility will have offices, two classrooms, four childcare rooms, appropriate storage, and food and restroom facilities to service the programs.

Bids for this project were received under the multiple prime bids format by CUSD on May 23, 2006. Additional bids for the Earthwork, Concrete, Masonry and Fencing *were opened on June 1, 2006, and are included as part of this award. After consulting with CUSD, it was determined that bids for the Storefronts and Glass should be rejected and re-bid.* The multiple prime bid format allows for a single construction manager to oversee multiple prime bids and to coordinate the work for both Districts. The funding from State Proposition 47 K-12 funds for this Child Development Center construction phase is \$1,868,674.00. The low bids to date for the District and CUSD work total \$5,229,791.00. Bids for Earthwork, Concrete, Masonry and Fencing were opened on June 1, and are included in the recommended award amount. The bid for Storefronts and Glass was rejected with a bid amount of \$285,000.00 and will be re-bid. Both CUSD and the District are confident that the re-bid amount will be at or less than the original bid amount. Since the District does not have a

*meeting in July, the administration is recommending that the re-bid for Storefronts and Glass, at an amount not to exceed \$285,000.00, also be included in the award. This action will give CUSD the authorization necessary to award the entire project without any delays.*

Additionally, as per our Agreement with CUSD, a fee of 5% of the total bid amount, plus approved reimbursable expenses, is payable to Harris Construction, Inc., for construction management services for this project. Any remaining amount over the State budget allocation and the initial Measure E funding estimate will be funded at 50% of cost through Measure E General Obligation Bond Funds. *However, due to the inflationary bidding climate, the District has agreed to fund the amount over budget for the recently opened Earthwork bid. Only the budget amount of \$768,967.00 for this contract will be funded by CUSD at 50%. The impact of this decision results in a payment by the District, for the Earthwork contract, of \$662,057.50 instead of the anticipated 50% split of \$523,270.50, resulting in an additional cost to the District of \$138,789.00.*

It should be noted that both the State Center Community College District and the Clovis Unified School District will ultimately receive the use of the new \$6 million Child Development Center facility at an anticipated total cost to the District of \$2 million.

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Background:

The State Capital Outlay Program includes various steps to ultimately receive State approval and funding for capital projects as outlined below:

- District prepares and submits an Initial Project Proposal (IPP) to State Chancellor's Office (by July 1).
- State Chancellor's Office reviews IPP and approves or rejects the proposal.
- If IPP is approved, the District is authorized to proceed with the preparation of a Final Project Proposal (FPP) for submission to the State the following year (by July 1).
- State Chancellor's Office reviews FPP and approves or rejects the proposal.
- If FPP is approved, the project will compete with other approved community college FPP's for funding from future statewide education construction bonds on even-numbered years.

At the May 3, 2005, meeting the Board authorized the submittal of an IPP to complete the tenant improvements to the north and east wings of the Old Administration Building. The District has received approval to submit an FPP for this project. This project would renovate approximately 36,500 gross square feet and 23,100 assignable square feet of interior space (north and east wings of the building). The total estimated cost of \$7,206,000 includes matching funds of \$496,000 from Measure E for the preliminary plans and working drawings. The first opportunity for funding would be from the 2008 statewide education construction bond.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt Resolution No. 06-34 authorizing submittal of the Final Project Proposal for the OAB – North and East Wings, Phase III, Fresno City College.

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Background:

The State Capital Outlay Program includes various steps to ultimately receive State approval and funding for capital projects as outlined below:

- District prepares and submits an Initial Project Proposal (IPP) to State Chancellor's Office (by July 1).
- State Chancellor's Office reviews IPP and approves or rejects the proposal.
- If IPP is approved, the District is authorized to proceed with the preparation of a Final Project Proposal (FPP) for submission to the State the following year (by July 1).
- State Chancellor's Office reviews FPP and approves or rejects the proposal.
- If FPP is approved, the project will compete with other approved community college FPP's for funding from future statewide education construction bonds on even-numbered years.

At the May 3, 2005, meeting the Board authorized submittal of an IPP for the first phase of site development for the Southeast Center and the construction of the initial facilities to house the following:

- Career & Technology programs currently located at the Annadale facility
- Fire Academy program currently located at the Annadale Facility
- Police Academy program currently located at Fresno City College
- Initial phase of academic programs and student support services

The FPP submittal is for the development of approximately 32 acres and the construction of 80,000 gross square feet and 56,508 assignable square feet of facilities. In addition, the off-site construction, including street improvements and water and sewer connections, would be constructed. The project is estimated to cost \$54 million in 2006 dollars. The recommendation

is to fund a match of \$21.6 million from the \$30 million in Measure E funds allocated for this project. This provides a 40% match with the State and maintains a reserve of \$8.4 million to cover the yearly inflation increases at 6.5% per year and to construct parking lots, which are not State supportable. If the 6.5% inflation is a true rate, then the project match would be \$27.8 million in 2010 for a total project cost of \$69.5 million. The first opportunity for funding will be from the 2008 statewide education construction bond.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt Resolution No. 06-35 authorizing submittal of the Final Project Proposal for CTC Site Development & Phase I Facilities, Southeast Center.

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Background:

The position of Associate Dean of Instruction, Reedley College, was posted February 15, 2006. During the recruitment period, the District received 24 completed applications from throughout the United States. The Search Advisory Committee was composed of two administrators, one compliance representative, four faculty members (three were department chairs) one counselor, and one classified professional. The committee paper screened the applications and invited six candidates to interview on May 17 and May 18, 2006. The Search Advisory Committee recommended three candidates to the President for interviews. The President recommended Dr. Roberto Urtecho to the Chancellor for an interview.

Dr. Roberto Urtecho is the recommended candidate for Associate Dean of Instruction, Reedley College. Dr. Urtecho has 19 years of educational experience with 18 of those years in community colleges as an instructor, program director and interim dean at the College of the Sequoias. Dr. Urtecho earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in Biology from St. Mary's College, his Master of Arts degree in Biology from St. Bonaventure University, New York, and his Ph.D. from the University of California, Davis.

Recommendation:

It is recommended the Board of Trustees appoint Roberto Urtecho as Associate Dean of Instruction, Reedley College, with placement on the management salary schedule at Range 62, Step 5 (\$9,102) effective July 1, 2006.
