Chancellor's Report

Dr. Crow reported the following:

- The districtwide enrollment management audit is being conducted November 7-10 by Noel-Levitz, a well-known and highly regarded consulting firm. Representatives will be visiting each site and reviewing current enrollment practices. In addition to making suggestions on how outreach efforts can be enhanced, Noel-Levitz will also help identify new markets. The Board will receive a summary report.
- On Friday, October 27, Fresno City College hosted a "Jazz Night at the OAB" fundraiser. The event was a huge success. A number of community members attended the event and the response was overwhelmingly positive for the campaign. Trustees Pat Patterson and Dottie Smith represented the Board at the event. The internal campaign continues to progress toward its goal. The "silent" phase of the external campaign will begin after the first of the year.

Chancellor's Report (continued)

- Last Tuesday all employees of SCCCD were invited to a
 forum on shared and participatory governance sponsored by
 the State Academic Senate and the Community College
 League of California. Ian Walton, California Academic
 Senate President, and Scott Lay, CEO of the Community
 College League of California, were presenters. Mr. Forhan
 attended, as well as employees from throughout the District.
- The inaugural State Center Bowl is November 18. The bowl selections will be announced on November 13.

Campus Reports

Tony Cantu, on behalf of President Ned Doffoney, reported the following from Fresno City College:

- Fresno City College faculty and staff are saddened by the passing of Dr. Doffoney's wife, Arletha, on November 2.
- The accreditation team of Dr. Michael Viera and Dr. Thomas Oliver were at FCC on October 31 to validate the progress the college has made in addressing the recommendations made by the Accrediting Commission. Mr. Cantu stated that Dr. Viera and Dr. Oliver were pleased with the significant progress the college has made in responding to the recommendations
- The Fresno City College *Rampage* won several awards at the Northern California conference of the Journalism Association of Community Colleges in San Jose on October 14, 2006.
- The Title VI-A Latin American Studies Grant Committee is sponsoring Latin American expert Dr. Michael Doyle, professor of Spanish and adjunct professor of international business at the University of North Carolina, Charlotte, for workshops on November 16-17.
- Classified Staff Development Day is Friday, November 10. The theme is "Putting the Pieces Together."
- "Clay Bones & Clay Flesh, A Play in Clay" is the new exhibit in the Art Space Gallery. Art Instructor Bob Kizziar is the featured artist. The exhibit runs through December 7.
- At the November 1 Speakers Forum, syndicated columnist Ruben Navarette spoke on immigration issues.

- Reedley College employees participated in the 5th Annual Spelling Bee Challenge on October 20. This Fresno Bee and Central California Branch of the International Dyslexia Association joint fundraiser event was co-chaired by Linda Reither. Kim Perry served as pronouncer. The RC team included Letty Alvarez, Sarina Torres, Anne Adams, and Linda Dover.

- Students from Madera Center Speech Instructor Brad Millar's classes volunteered as judges for the Madera County Academic Pentathlon Speech Competition on October 17.
- A team of faculty, staff, and students from the Clovis Center participated in the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation "Race for the Cure" on October 28.
- On October 21 three student clubs from the North Centers (Aztlan, Phi Beta Lambda, and TV-Movies) participated in the Muscular Dystrophy Association's "Walk for Five."
- The Oakhurst Center sponsored a "Trunk and Treat" event with the local Chamber of Commerce.
- The North Centers, along with Reedley College and Fresno City College faculty and staff look forward to the Noel-Levitz enrollment audit visit, November 7-10.

Academic Senate Report Mr. Rick Santos, Fresno City College Academic Senate President, reported the following:

- Paula Demanett, Thom Gaxiola and Rick Santos attended the State Academic Senate Fall Plenary. Sessions included the basic skills initiative and redefining the associate degree.
- The following resolutions were passed: 1) Eliminate the term "transfer" in program titles for the associate degree;
 2) Recommend to the Board of Governors a change in Title 5 to add language defining both associate degrees;
 3) Oppose the use of IGETC and/or CSU GE breadth as the sole basis of a degree; and
 4) Support interpretation of Title 5 that prohibits the use of IGETC and/or CSU GE breadth as the sole basis for the associate degree.

Academic Senate Report (continued)

- Major debate occurred at the Fall Plenary about the direction that colleges could take regarding the Fall 2009 implementation of new math and English lA standards for graduation.
- The Senate sponsored a well-attended session explaining how shared governance and participatory governance works.
 Presenters were Ian Walton, President of the State Academic Senate, and Scott Lay of the Community College League.
- The Fresno City College Academic Senate approved the college mission statement and program review flow chart.
- The Strategic Planning Council is now ready to begin reviewing action plans. The Academic Senate believes that the Strategic Plan is a solid, progressive plan, and they are looking forward to its implementation.

Classified Senate Report

Ms. Linda Nies, Reedley College Classified Senate Past President, reported the following:

- Reedley College and North Centers' Classified Senate representatives are working on a variety of subcommittees for staff development and other projects.
- Held the third annual Halloween office decorating contest.
- The November 10 Classified Professionals Staff Development Day theme is titled "All Aboard," featuring sessions on campus emergency procedures, health and fitness, identity theft, and team building.
- Advanced PowerPoint is the topic for the technology training series on November 30.
- Fiscal responsibility is the topic for the November 17 Leadership State Center Class VI. The program's graduation ceremony is December 8.

Workforce Development Summit

Dr. Tom Crow and Dr. Teresa Patterson provided the Board of Trustees with a report of the Workforce Development Summit held on October 26, 2006, at Tornino's. They reported that the attendance was exceptionally good with approximately 225 business and industry leaders participating. Participants were assigned to discussion groups such as health care and construction. The dialogue at all of the tables was positive and very productive. Faculty and staff served as facilitators and recorders. Board members attending the Summit were Isabel Barreras, Pat Patterson, Dottie Smith, and Willie Smith. The speakers for the Summit were Dan Walters, political columnist for the Sacramento Bee; and Phyllis Eisen, Vice President of the Manufacturing Institute of the National Association of Manufacturers and the Executive Director for the Center for Workforce Success. The speakers provided their observations at the conclusion of the Summit.

Workforce Development Summit (continued) The Summit did several things for the District:

- Provided an internal audit of the occupational programs.
- Provided a review of the programs, future plans, awards, major employers, and membership of advisory committees.
- Provided an opportunity to receive input from business and industry leaders about the future of their industries and how SCCCD can help them meet their needs in the next five years.

The information from the Summit will be summarized and provided to all participants. All of the occupational programs will be reviewed to determine how programs can best be offered. Some of the areas of review will include duration, time of day, summer sessions, method of instruction, and location. This review will include credit, non-credit, and contract training. The process will begin with a districtwide meeting in early December of pertinent management employees and leaders of constituent groups. A major emphasis will be to become more involved in direct service with businesses.

Mr. Thonesen opened the public hearing at 5:15 p.m. There being no comment from the public, the hearing was closed at 5:16 p.m.

Mr. Smith had a question about redacting Board members' home addresses and names from the Form 700 Statement of Economic Interest in the event that the form is produced in response to a California Public Records Act request.

Acknowledgement of Quarterly Financial Status Report, General Fund [06-62] Action The Board of Trustees acknowledged the Quarterly Financial Status Report (CCFS-311Q), as presented.

Consideration to Authorize Agreement for Pouring Rights, Districtwide [06-63] Action FCC Students Rosanna Spicer and Dina Haigounian, and FCC Instructor Gerry Bill, addressed the Board regarding the recommendation before the Board to grant exclusive pouring rights to Coca-Cola. They spoke about environmental and human rights abuses by Coca-Cola in foreign countries, and about offering students freedom of choice on campus by not granting monopoly status. Bernard Navarro, FCC American Indian studies instructor, spoke about the idea of multiculturalism and the responsibility to other cultures.

Mr. Brinkley spoke regarding the benefits of granting exclusive pouring rights on a contractual basis. In exchange for the pouring rights, the District is compensated with supplemental funding and products for student programs and services. Coca-Cola and Pepsi are the two major companies that can provide a wide range of beverages. Of the two proposals provided to the Board, Coca-Cola gives the highest level of support.

Ms. Smith asked if there is a policy for doing business with companies in regard to human rights. She said that it is a crucial issue and that, as an educational institution, we need to think about how it relates to the community we serve. She asked what the pros and cons of the policy would be, and what is the next step.

Mr. Patterson said he agrees with Ms. Smith's perception and he supports that. He said that the District should not be doing business with companies that violate human rights. He asked about the decision to prefer one company over the other. He expressed that the issue was important and that we need to look at the source to see which are civil rights abusers.

Ms. Barreras reminded the Board that she had brought up the issue with Coca-Cola several months ago and agreed with the concerns the students expressed.

Ms. Barreras made a motion to table the item, but was not seconded.

Mr. Smith asked if the decision had to be made at the meeting because he felt it was important that more research be done on this issue so the Board can make an informed decision.

Mr. Brinkley said that based on the Board's concern the issue will be researched, additional information provided, and brought back to the Board at another meeting.

Background:

The funding of Other Post Employment Benefits (OPEB) has received much press lately due to Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement Numbers 43 and 45. At the 2006 Board retreat the administration provided the Board with the most current actuarial information based upon the need to begin funding this negotiated commitment for SCCCD employees and current retirees. The District's report was prepared by Milliman, an actuarial firm, to determine the liabilities for District employees as of July 1, 2005. Based on this actuarial report the District's Present Value of Benefits is \$48,755,922, the Unfunded Actuarial Accrued Liability is \$31,578,274, and the Annual Required Contribution (ARC) is \$2,803,677 based upon a calculation of a 30-year amortization at a 4% discount rate.

Actuarial studies are required to be completed on a regular basis, as required by GASB 43/45, so the District can evaluate how it is addressing its Other Post Employment Benefits (OPEB). Although there is currently no mandate to begin funding this negotiated obligation, it is prudent business practice to begin funding the ARC. Current actuarials place this contribution at approximately \$2.8 million, as previously stated. The actuarial report is required to be updated at least every two years at which time the ARC will be recalculated along with the other details of the study. The Board has adopted a budget which provides for the ARC to be funded beginning with 2006-07. The administration is recommending that the initial contribution for this obligation be made to a District internal revocable trust fund set up to specifically account for Retiree Health Benefits. In order to properly account for the inter-fund transfer of monies between funds, the California Education Code requires a Resolution authorizing said transfer. The Resolution provides direction for the Fresno County Office of Education to complete an inter-fund transfer as follows:

I. Executive Summary


Introduction

This is the Compliance Review of the County of Fresno's Treasurer's Investment Pool Portfolio for the period ended September 30, 2006, pursuant to California Government Code 53646. The report has two primary objectives: (1) to provide information regarding portfolio holdings as to compliance with California Government Code Sections 53601 and 53635, as well as the County Treasurer's Statement of Investment Policy and (2) to detail portfolio characteristics of the portfolio's investment holdings.

Quarterly Overview of Markets:

During the quarter, the U.S. Treasury yield curve remained flat while yields decreased across the entire maturity spectrum. At both the August and September 2006 meetings, the Federal Reserve kept its target for the federal funds rate at 5-1/4 percent. The Committee indicated that economic growth had moderated from its strong pace earlier in the year, partly reflecting a gradual cooling of the housing market and the lagged effects of increases in interest rates and energy prices.

As indicated on the previous page, during the third quarter of 2006, yields decreased across the entire maturity spectrum. The yield on one-year Treasury Bonds decreased 30 basis points to 4.91%, while the yield on thirty-year Treasury Bonds decreased 42 basis points to 4.77%. The spread between the one-year Treasury and the 30-year Treasury ended the quarter at 14 basis points, increasing from 3 basis points at the end of last quarter. During the quarter, yields on 90-day Certificates of Deposits decreased 11 basis points while 180-day maturity yields decreased 19 basis points. Commercial Paper moved higher in the 30-day maturities by 8 basis points.



Portfolio Position

The portfolio maintained a weighted maturity of less than 16 months. The County of Fresno Investment Policy (revised December 2004) Section 11.0 recommends a portfolio of securities with a weighted average maturity not to exceed 550 days. Keeping the portfolio within this maturity range minimized its exposure to potential interest rate shifts that can occur in the mid-maturity sectors of the yield curve. The portfolio was oriented towards high quality with 66.9% of the portfolio's assets invested in risk-free instruments.

Compliance with California Government Codes 53601 & 53635:

The Investment Portfolio is compliant with the California Government Codes 53601 and 53635.

Compliance with Treasury Investment Pool Statement of Investment Policy:

The Statement of Investment Policy is more stringent than the California Government Code. As of 9/30/06, the Treasurer's Investment Pool portfolio complied with its Statement of Investment Policy.

Please refer to the next section of the report for a more detailed evaluation of the portfolio in relationship to the California Government Code and the Treasurer's Investment Pool Statement of Investment Policy.

Portfolio Characteristics

The Treasury Pool's portfolio characteristics are indicative of a plan exhibiting a high degree of quality with short-term maturities.

- As of 9/30/06, the portfolio had a market value of \$1.8 billion with an average dollar-weighted quality of "AAA."
- Approximately 66.9% of the portfolio's assets are invested in securities with virtually no credit risk (i.e., US Treasuries, US Agencies, and cash).
- The dollar weighted average life of the pool is 474 days.
- 14.8% of the portfolio at cost matures within 30 days, 22.6% matures within 90 days, and 38.1% within 180 days (see Appendix for further details).

Based on its relative high quality and near-term liquidity, and assuming no significant changes to pool funding policies, the Treasury Investment Pool is well positioned to meet its expenditure requirements over the next six months.






Portfolio Breakdown by Investment Type (valued at cost)

The matrix codes represent how a security trades relative to other securities of the same type. Security prices (yields) represent the bid side of the market and are indicative of where Blackrock would expect to be able to sell that security.

Prices of repurchase agreements come from Bloomberg. BlackRock also checks the data against Broker/Dealers who are major participants in specific money market areas. IDC provides prices from Treasury bills, notes, and bonds.

Portfolio valuations are performed daily. Portfolio managers who are members of the matrix pricing team check data for accuracy. This data feeds the fund accounting system that determines the fund's net asset value per share. The variance to a \$1.00/share is noted and reported to the portfolio manager daily.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Average Maturity - The weighted average time to principal repayment. Useful as an approximation of a single maturity where the mean or average maturity is used to describe the life of the instrument.

Bankers Acceptance - Money market instrument created from transactions involving foreign trade. In its simplest form, a bankers acceptance is a check, drawn on bank by an importer or exporter of goods.

Basis Point - 1/100th of 1%.

Certificate of Deposit - A short term money market instrument representing a receipt from a bank for a deposit at a specified rate of interest for a specified period of time.

Coupon Rate - The annual interest paid of a fixed-income instrument.

Commercial Paper - Money Market instrument representing a short-term promissory note of a large corporation at a specified rate of return for a specified period of time.

Current Yield - A bond's coupon expressed as a percentage of the bond's market price.

Discount Rate - The interest rate used to translate a future value into a present value.

Duration - Often times referred to as Macaulay's duration is a fixed income measure of price sensitivity to hanges in yields. It is calculated by taking a weighted average of the time periods to receipt of the present value of the cash flows from a fixed income instrument.

Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation - Also known as "FHLMC" and Freddie Mac. FHLMC is a Private Corporation authorized by Congress, which sells notes, participation certificates and other mortgage obligations backed by mortgage pools.

Federal National Mortgage Association - Also known as "FNMA" and Fannie Mae. A private corporation which buys and sells residential mortgages insured by FHA or guaranteed by VA. FNMA also issues notes, participation certificates and other mortgage obligations backed by mortgage pools.

Government National Mortgage Corporation - Also known as "GNMA" and Ginnie Mae. A wholly-owned U.S. government corporation. GNMA issues and guarantees mortgage-backed securities which are backed by the full faith and credit of the United States Government.

Repurchase Agreement - Short term collateralized loan at a specified rate for a specified period, used by large investors as an alternative for cash investments.

Yield to Maturity - The internal rate of return of a standard bond held to maturity.

Background:

It is necessary that the residence hall rental rate at Reedley College be established early in order that the information may be included in the college publications so that incoming students for 2007-08 can be properly informed. Because of an increase in the cost of operations, it is appropriate to raise the fees for the 2007-08 academic year. The current rental rate is \$2,342 (\$1,171 per semester), plus a nonrefundable contract fee of \$130. It is proposed that the 2007-08 residence hall rental rate be established at \$2,480 (\$1,240 per semester), plus a nonrefundable cleaning and damage fee of \$100 and a non-refundable activity fee of \$35.

Dormitory Fund Revenue Increase: \$23,460.

Background:

Title V of the California Code of Regulations allows districts to charge instructional materials fees for materials which are of continuing value to the students outside of the classroom setting, including, but not limited to, textbooks, tools, equipment, clothing, and those materials which are necessary for a student's vocational training and employment.

Many of the non-credit courses and various credit courses provide programs that are appropriate for assessment of an instructional materials fee. These programs include such items as woodworking projects, flower arranging, ceramics projects, and welding projects. Because these materials are of continuing value to the students and in most cases are retained by the students, it is appropriate to charge a materials fee. It should be noted that the fee cannot exceed the actual cost of the materials provided and cannot be a prerequisite to taking the available class. In order to provide courses of this nature, the District must rely upon the students paying the expenses for the value of the personal items; therefore, it is necessary for the Board of Trustees to adopt an instructional materials fee schedule for assessment of the appropriate fee.

Background:

The Center for International Trade Development (CITD) has recently been awarded an Economic and Workforce Development Industry Driven Regional Collaborative grant administered through the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office. The purpose of the grant is to develop and implement the California Food and Agricultural Trade Assistance Program (CFATAP). The CFATAP will provide export training for agriculture business enterprises, especially to those that are women and minority owned.

This is a two-year grant with funding in the following amounts: September 12, 2006, through August 30, 2007 - \$213,025; and August 31, 2007, through August 30, 2008 - \$254,118.

Background:

As part of the on-site development of the Willow/International Center, a storm water inlet and piping system was constructed on the site and connected to the Fresno Metropolitan Flood Control District (FMFCD) system. The main storm water pipeline, which runs from just south of International Avenue across the site to Behymer Avenue, will carry the storm water generated on the site and a portion of the storm water from International Avenue. The Flood Control District has agreed to operate, maintain, repair, remove and replace the storm water pipeline. In return the District must grant a 20-foot-wide pipeline easement to the FMFCD.

State statutes require the District to take action at two separate Board meetings. The first action, which the Board is being asked to take at the December 5, 2006, meeting, is to adopt a Resolution of Intention to Dedicate Easement. The Resolution provides public notice that the District will be considering the dedication of an easement to the FMFCD on January 9, 2007, and that public comment will be solicited prior to the Board considering and taking action on the dedication. The second action occurs on January 9, 2007, when the Board holds a public hearing regarding the dedication and considers adopting a Resolution Authorizing Dedication of Easement. Enclosed is Resolution No. 06-67 stating the District's intention to dedicate an easement to the FMFCD. This Resolution requires a roll call vote and approval of at least two-thirds majority.








EXHIBIT "A" STORM DRAIN PIPELINE EASEMENT






EXHIBIT "A" STORM DRAIN PIPELINE EASEMENT







Background:

As a result of the resignation of the Vice Chancellor Educational Services and Planning/Grants, the District conducted an "in-house" search to fill the position of Interim Vice Chancellor Educational Services and Planning/Grants. A total of four (4) people applied for the position of Interim Vice Chancellor Educational Services and Planning/Grants. All four of the candidates were interviewed for the position on Wednesday, November 22, 2006.

The recommendation is that Michael Quinn, Dean of Instruction, Humanities, Reedley College, be appointed Interim Vice Chancellor Educational Services and Planning/Grants, effective January 2, 2007.

Michael Quinn was first employed with State Center Community College District in 1986 as a part-time English instructor. In 1988 he was hired by Fresno City College as a full-time English instructor. Mr. Quinn taught English until 1996 when he was promoted to Acting Dean of Humanities/Social Science at Reedley College. In July 1997, Mr. Quinn was appointed as the Dean of Humanities/Social Science Reedley College and holds that position to date. Mr. Quinn received his B.A. in Philosophy from Mt. Angel Seminary, St. Benedict, Oregon. He received his M.A. in Education from Fresno Pacific College.
