Approval of Minutes

The minutes of the Board meeting of September 5, 2000, were presented for approval.

It was moved by Ms. Smith and seconded by Mr. Smith that the September 5, 2000, minutes be approved.

Delegations, Petitions, and Communications Mr. Paul Kaser spoke on behalf of the State Center Federation of Teachers and urged an end to the prolonged negotiations between the Federation and the District.

Chancellor's Report

Dr. Redwine stated it is a pleasure to have the Board meeting in the new building this evening and she congratulated each of the trustees for their decision that led to the new facility.

Campus Report, North Centers Dr. Yeager provided a brief PowerPoint presentation regarding facilities, program development, student services, and human resources at the North Centers and then introduced members of his staff.

Dr. Mark Harmon, Psychology Instructor and Advisor to the Student Government, introduced Ms. Robin McKinnon, Student Government President. She discussed the various student activities for the semester and introduced the students in the audience.

Mr. Brent Nabors, Information Systems Instructor, gave an update on technology at the North Centers and how education is enhanced through the computer resources available.

Ms. Paula Haug, Speech Instructor, shared what the faculty is doing and how they have been given the opportunity to develop a college culture through interesting and rigorous classes, clubs, activities, lectures, and conferences. Ms. Haug also expressed her appreciation of having the childcare center on site.

Mr. Smith stated that as he was touring the building prior to the meeting, he noticed there is quite a bit of glare and extra heat from the glass in some of the offices and he would like the appropriate staff and/or architect to address this issue.

Mr. Manfredi noted that he was recently interviewed by Dympna Ugwu-Oju's journalism class at the Clovis Center and one of the major concerns was security patrols at the North Centers. Mr. Manfredi requested a report on this matter in the future. Another concern was long range planning for an overall activities program for either a full-time student activities person and/or a public relations person.

Campus Report, North Centers (continued) Mr. Forhan stated the building is beautiful and asked if any tracking had been done on what areas the students live in. Dr. Yeager advised that a zip code analysis indicated that most students are from the Madera area; however, recruitment is now focusing on Kerman and Central High Schools.

Campus Report, Fresno City College From Fresno City College, Dr. Larios reported the following:

Excitement will be in the air on Saturday, October 14 as thousands of walkers will gather on the FCC West Lawn to participate in the Walk to Cure Juvenile Diabetes. Teams throughout the college have been busy recruiting walkers and raising funds. Some extra fundraising efforts include tri-tip sandwich sales, a letter writing campaign to solicit donations, a Jamba Juice sale with profits going to JDF, a silent auction, numerous raffles, and sale of the JDF sneakers. College Pharmacy has donated the funds to provide Fresno City College walkers with a special team T-shirt.

An orientation for Weekend College was held on Saturday, September 16 with over 100 prospective students attending. They are now in the process of taking assessment tests and enrolling. There will be a meeting Saturday, October 7 to update residents in the neighborhood on Weekend College plans.

Fair time is only a few days away and a number of FCC employees are gearing up to staff the FCC booth in the Industry-Commerce building. There will be information about FCC and the District will have staff to answer questions for prospective students. The vocational programs will also be highlighted in displays throughout the Career Paths building.

Students from the American Institute of Architecture Students club, AIAS, participated in this weekend's Sand Castle Competition at the Riverpark Golf Center. This year's theme was Kids, Sand and Golf. They were also mentioned in a weekend article in the Fresno Bee.

One thousand high school students from 27 schools will arrive on campus on October 17 for Career Day 2000. The event will highlight vocational programs in the Business and Applied Technology divisions. This is the 13th year the Business Division has hosted the event and the second year for the Applied Technology Division.

Rankings have come out for the athletic teams and four are in the top ten. Women's volleyball is ranked 8th in the California Community College Coaches Association poll. Women's soccer

Campus Report, Fresno City College (continued) is third in NorCal and Men's soccer is tied for 8th. In football, the team is 4-0 for the season and to date is ranked 9th in the nation and third in NorCal. The latest rankings won't be out until later this week.

The Commission on Athletics had teamed up with Hyundai Motors to sponsor Car Expo, a promotion for selected community colleges throughout California. Car Expo will be at Fresno City College on October 9th and 10th. There will be a car display and hourly drawings for dinners at Outback Steakhouse. There will also be a statewide drawing for a new car. Two years ago an FCC student won the car.

The Fall Theatre Season opens October 5 with the production *Defying Gravity*, a play by Jane Anderson and directed by theatre instructor Chuck Erven. The play, which runs through October 14, is a unique presentation of the 1986 space shuttle Challenger accident and how it affected people in different ways.

Campus Report, Reedley College Dr. Crow reported the following from Reedley College:

The Reedley College Community Concert Band and Jazz Ensemble will hold a concert on Friday, October 13 at 7:30 p.m. in the Forum Hall. The group is also gearing up for its annual Oktoberfest on Friday, October 27 at the Reedley Community Center. The event will include a social hour, dinner and dancing.

The California Community College Commission on Athletics, in conjunction with Hyundai Motors, will host *Car Expo* on Wednesday, October 11 from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on the lawn south of the cafeteria. Students, faculty, staff and the public can enter to win gift certificates and a Hyundai Tiburon, which will be awarded at the end of May.

The Reedley College Foundation Awards Ceremony will be held on Wednesday, October 4 at 6:00 p.m. in the Cafeteria. Scholarships will be disbursed to both incoming students those who will be transferring to four-year universities.

The Tiger Golf Team will host its annual Arlie Brooks Golf Tournament on Saturday, October 14 at Sherwood Forest Golf Course. The tournament kicks off at 10:30 a.m. Proceeds will benefit the Tiger Team.

Campus Report, Reedley College (continued) University, Fresno, Robert Levine has made a lifetime and global study of the nature of time.

Assemblywoman Sarah Reyes will speak on Wednesday, October 25 at 12:00 p.m. in the Cafeteria. Ms. Reyes will discuss "Student Leadership on College Campuses."

Reedley College instructor Paul Kaser has coordinated a "Women in War" speaker's forum that will be held on Thursday, November 2 at 1:00 p.m. in the Forum Hall. Women veterans from WWII, Vietnam and Desert Storm will describe their experiences and answer questions. The event is open to the public and admission is free.

Academic Senate Report Dr. Tony Abbott, Reedley College Academic Senate President, announced that one of the college's alumni, Jessie Garza, has been chosen as a recipient of the Gates Millennium Scholarship. Mr. Garza is currently a student at UC-Davis and he will receive \$5,000.00 a year from the Gates Foundation.

Dr. Abbott provided a PowerPoint presentation on the Hiring Policy for Full-Time Faculty. The committee has reviewed the policy, Administrative Regulation 4100, extensively for the past two years. The goal of the policy is to recruit and hire highly qualified college faculty who are expert in their subject areas and skilled at serving the needs of the culturally and ethnically diverse student population. Dr. Abbott reviewed how the makeup of the screening committee is decided, the steps taken in the application screening process, and the interview process. He noted that AR 4100 is an excellent policy and was created with good collaboration between faculty and the administration. Upcoming Senate projects include revising the adjunct faculty hiring policy and working with the administration on the Five-Year Plan for making progress on the 75/25 part-time/full-time ratio as per recent changes in Title 5 regulations.

Ms. Smith asked if the composition of the hiring committees included students. Dr. Abbott stated students are not included on the committees at this time.

Ms. Smith expressed her concern regarding the screening process and the lack of diversity of the applicant pool. She feels that some applicants that are qualified are being eliminated and that the final candidate pool is a reflection of the screening committee and not the students.

Academic Senate Report (continued) Dr. Abbott stated that diversity is also a concern of the Academic Senates; however, he has served on many screening committees and has never seen anything discriminatory.

Mr. Forhan asked if there is a problem with the Affirmative Action Officer sitting on the screening committees. Dr. Abbott explained there is an Affirmative Action representative on each committee and the Personnel Office certifies the applicant pools as to diversity.

Mr. Forhan asked if there is a way to enhance the applicant pools. Dr. Abbott stated it has been suggested by the faculty that the search process begins earlier and that is being implemented this year, as well as looking at advertising at historically minority institutions and publications. Mr. Forhan stated that while advertising is good, it has been his experience that it is the personal relationships with the people in the field that work. Dr. Abbott stated that the Senates would be happy to survey the faculty regarding other innovative ways to address this problem.

Mr. Smith stated he is also concerned about the candidate pool and suggested working with the minority faculty and staff organizations regarding recommendations for enhancing the applicant pool as well as different ways to circulate information regarding available positions. Another concern is how much consideration is given to knowledge of technology. He hasn't heard anything in the recruitment effort regarding knowledge of technology and he wants to make sure the people that are being hired are not only experts in their field, but also have a background in technology or a willingness to learn it, and an interest to keep up with new developments. Dr. Abbott stated that making technology part of the job announcement was discussed at the Department Chairs meeting today.

Mr. Beck, Fresno City College Academic Senate President, added that they do address technology when recruiting; however, the diversity issue is a problem. There is a need to look at how things have been done in the past and make "changes."

Dr. Larios noted that on July 8, 2000, the college had a districtwide career fair for adjunct faculty and over 300 people attended. The purpose was two-fold: to get more adjunct faculty in the District and an opportunity to make the schools more diverse. On October 21, 2000, there will be another districtwide job fair in the cafeteria in an effort to build the applicant pools.

Academic Senate Report (continued) Mr. Thonesen stated he would be interested in knowing of the part-time people, how many apply for full-time positions. Dr. Abbott responded he does not have that information available; however, in math or English approximately 50% of the part-time faculty apply for full-time positions.

Mr. Manfredi stated that the report the Board received last week from Dr. Padden indicated for 1998-99, 39 full-time positions were filled by 25 former adjunct faculty members. In 1999-2000 eighty-one full-time positions, including 16 temporary positions were recruited for and 44 were former adjunct faculty, including 12 temporary positions. In 2000-2001, forty-two full-time positions were recruited for, including eight temporary positions and 27 were former adjunct faculty, including 5 temporary positions.

Mr. Manfredi continued that there are some proactive things the District can do to help people with the interview process, such as counseling the part-time members when they do not get the job as to ways they can improve their interview. He also suggested that community colleges should look at hiring high school teachers and administrators.

Mr. Manfredi asked how the hiring process is structured for the North Centers. Dr. Abbott explained that the hiring policy states that the majority of the committee should be faculty from the discipline. However, if there is not a faculty majority available from the North Centers, then faculty members from Fresno City College and Reedley College are asked to join the committee.

Classified Senate Report Ms. Holly McSwain, Fresno City College Classified Senate President, gave an overview of the Senate's current activities including an orientation for new employees on October 10 and Staff Development Day on November 10. She also gave an update on the Districtwide Classified Staff Development Committee chaired by Dr. Janice Emerzian. The objectives of the committee are personal development, furthering education goals, and job skills training.

Mr. Forhan questioned why this position had not been filled earlier, and why it is being filled with an Interim Director. Dr. Padden explained that when Nancy Kast left in January 1998, the position was filled with an interim as the District was nearing the close of the faculty recruitment process. Interviews to fill the position on a permanent basis were conducted in Spring 2000; however, the candidate pool was limited as to qualifications and diversity. Once the eligibility list dies, the position will be advertised again; however, this item is to request a consultant be hired for the position through March 12, 2001, at which time a full-time Director of Human Resources will be hired. He also noted another reason for the delay was that he has been in discussion with the Personnel Commission for the past year regarding their consideration of employing a full-time Director of Classified Personnel.

Mr. Smith clarified that the Benefits Coordinator was filling in as Interim Director and has now returned to her Benefits position and this is why the consultant contract is needed. Dr. Padden concurred.

Mr. Manfredi stated he understands the District needs to recruit for the position and that the District does a vast amount of

Consideration to Approve Consultant Contract, Interim Director of Human Resources [00-242] (continued) hiring. Regarding the issue of the eligibility list, he would like to go on record as stating the whole structure of the Personnel Commission and merit system is flawed and the idea that a management position would have to wait for an eligibility list is inherently absurd. This is not an attack on Dr. Padden or the District, but it is part of the merit system that only seven or eight institutions in the state have. It is a disservice to the taxpayer and to the District to continue with the merit system and Personnel Commission.

Mr. Forhan stated that in future he would hope that when the District recruits and the candidate pool is not what it should be, and yet there is a workload and responsibilities that need to be met, that the District would take a more proactive role in adjusting the staff internally to meet our needs.

Dr. Padden commended his office staff for doing a yeoman's job in covering the extra assignments during this time period.

Action

A motion was made by Mr. Smith and seconded by Mr. Feaver that the Board of Trustees authorize the Chancellor or her designee to enter into a contract with Professional Personnel Leasing, Inc., for the services of George Shaw as Interim Director of Human Resources at a monthly stipend of \$7,117.00 plus a 20% service fee for Professional Personnel Leasing, Inc., through the amended date of March 12, 2001. The motion carried unanimously.

Consideration to Approve Title 5 Contract [00-244] Mr. Manfredi clarified that this item was a placeholder and has been amended for the Title 5 Grant. Dr. Redwine noted this contract is for the Title 5 Grant in an amount up to \$2,000,000.00 for a five-year period. Title 5 replaces the former Title III.

Action

A motion was made by Mr. Forhan and seconded by Mr. Patterson that the Board of Trustees approve the Title 5 Grant in an amount up to \$2,000,000.00 over a five-year period and authorize the Chancellor or Vice Chancellor-Business to enter into agreements on behalf of the District. The motion carried unanimously.

Consideration to Purchase Portable Science Classroom, Clovis Center [00-253] Mr. Sharpe explained this item was discussed with the Board at the budget adoption meeting in September, where an allocation was included for partial funding for the creation of a science lab in two existing classrooms at the Training Institute to be funded out of Capital Outlay funds as well as site funds from the North Centers. After receiving bids and evaluating the science lab location, it is believed a portable building is more suitable for

Consideration to Purchase Portable Science Classroom, Clovis Center [00-253] (continued) the Center. A portable gives greater flexibility to eventually move to another campus, is more cost effective, and increases the capacity to house students. In order to place the relocatable building in a timely and cost-effective manner, staff is recommending utilization of the Newhall School District bid with Aurora Modular Industries for this acquisition. Mr. Sharpe clarified that the lab is self-contained with a prep and storage area, hoods, vents, etc. The unit will be placed adjacent to the other portables, just south of the Training Institute.

Action

A motion was made by Mr. Forhan and seconded by Mr. Patterson that the Board of Trustees authorize a purchase order in the amount of \$167,357.00 to Aurora Modular Industries, utilizing the Newhall School District bid, for the acquisition of a portable science building to be placed at the Clovis Center. The motion carried unanimously.

Consideration of Bids, Relocatable Addition, Science Lab, Clovis Center [00-254] Action Mr. Sharpe stated this item is for the placement and site modifications necessary for the above-mentioned purchase, including electrical, concrete and pavement improvements, and plumbing.

A motion was made by Mr. Thonesen and seconded by Mr. Forhan that the Board of Trustees award Bid #0001-06 in the amount of \$27,240.00 to Wolf Construction, the lowest responsible bidder for the Relocatable Addition-Science Lab, at the Clovis Center, and authorize the Chancellor or Vice Chancellor-Business to sign an agreement on behalf of the District. The motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Patterson asked about additional parking at Clovis. Mr. Sharpe stated at this time the parking lot is not over capacity but this matter will be looked into for the long term.

Consideration of Posting Legal Counsel Position [00-255] Dr. Padden noted this item has been amended to reflect a different salary range.

Effective June 1, 2000, the District's legal counsel position was vacated by the resignation of Mr. Trofemuk. Since the vacancy, the District has utilized contracted attorneys to provide legal advice and services to the District. While this arrangement has provided coverage on business and personnel-related items, ongoing services to the colleges and centers have diminished.

One of the primary benefits of in-house legal services is the ability for the campuses/centers to access advice and legal consideration regarding many day-to-day activities at the sites. With the absence of in-house legal counsel, these matters are

Consideration of Posting Legal Counsel Position [00-255] (continued) oftentimes dealt with internally without the necessary consideration of the lawful impact. In addition, the District's

legal counsel was responsible for many lower-level/non-collective-bargaining personnel activities that occur in an institution the size of State Center.

In order to meet the day-to-day and ongoing legal requirements of the District, it is recommended that the position be posted for filling. It is intended that this position will not only provide the ongoing services to which we have become accustomed, but will also be responsible for overseeing the District's Affirmative Action Plan.

Lastly, the position has served as a resource and representative to the Board of Trustees for Board meetings and related Board of Trustees issues. The position, if filled internally, would once again assume this role, thereby negating the need for ongoing third-party representation at all Board meetings.

In surveying the marketplace, it is believed that there will be significant interest in the position. Because the requirements of the position are somewhat specialized with a broad spectrum of legal knowledge required, a very selective process will be established. It is recommended that the position stay at Range 62 of the Management Salary Schedule (\$74,880-\$93,420). Since this position reports not only to the Chancellor but also to the Board of Trustees, it is believed that it is important for the Board to provide direction regarding the refilling of this position.

In the interim until the position is filled, the administration recommends continued use of contracted attorneys' services to fulfill the legal needs of the District. This arrangement will not only meet our short-term needs but will also assist us in evaluating the workload of the position.

Ms. Smith stated she believes it is an asset to have in-house counsel. She opposed the request initially when Mr. Trofemuk was hired; however, there are many benefits and she supports the request.

Mr. Smith noted he talked with the Chancellor and Dr. Padden and this is the same salary that Mr. Trofemuk was making. In order to attract the right person, it is necessary to stay with the same salary range.

Mr. Manfredi stated he concurs with the amended salary range but is concerned that there is no job specification as part of the Consideration of Posting Legal Counsel Position [00-255] (continued) item. It must be articulated very clearly in the job specification that the responsibility at the Board meeting is to advise the Board regarding legal matters.

Mr. Forhan noted the Board deals with numerous real estate and construction issues and this knowledge may need to be included in the specification also. Mr. Smith stated these criteria would be a specialist and if they have both real estate and personnel experience it would be like mixing apples and oranges.

Mr. Forhan questioned having the attorney as the Affirmative Action Officer. A discussion ensued regarding this issue and it was the consensus of the Board that the Affirmative Action Officer be deleted from the job specification and be given to another appropriate person.

Action

A motion was made by Mr. Forhan and seconded by Mr. Smith that the Board of Trustees:

- a) amend the recommendation to eliminate the Action Officer Affirmative Action Officer from the job description;
- b) authorize the Chancellor or her designee to post the filling of the vacant position of legal counsel with a salary on the management salary schedule of Range 62; and
- c) authorize continued use of contracted attorneys' services, on an interim basis, to fulfill the legal needs of the District.

The motion carried unanimously.

Ms. Smith stated she would like the Board's continued involvement in developing the job description.

Consideration of Resolution Opposing Proposition 38 [00-256] Mr. Sharpe stated that recently the Board received correspondence from CSEA Field Representative, Derek Pullinger, requesting the Board to go on record opposing Proposition 38, the school voucher initiative. While Proposition 38 relates mainly to K-12, when staff began reviewing the proposition they realized the serious ramifications that its passage could have on the community college system. There are many issues and concerns that are outlined in the agenda item. The California Board of Governors, California Community College Trustees, and the Chief Executive Officers of the Community Colleges have endorsed opposition to Proposition 38.

Consideration of Resolution Opposing Proposition 38 [00-256] (continued) Action Mr. Manfredi requested that a copy of the proposition be included in the Board packet in the future.

Following a brief discussion regarding the initiative, a motion was made by Mr. Forhan and seconded by Mr. Feaver that the Board of Trustees take no position on Proposition 38, the school voucher initiative.

Ms. Smith noted there are too many hidden agendas relating to the school vouchers and some of the things they are saying about public education are not true. The community colleges are filling the gap.

The motion carried unanimously.

Consideration to Support Proposition 39 [00-257] Mr. Sharpe explained that Proposition 39 will allow for passage of local bond measures at the rate of 55% general electorate approval versus the current two-thirds. This proposition does enhance accountability with the passage of bond measures, requires a community oversight committee, and a specific listing of what the local bond measure would be used for. It also puts a cap on the amount of tax rate that can be assessed through the passage of local bonds at 25 cents per \$100.00 of assessed value for college districts. The measure has potential to have a positive impact on the community college system and the nearly \$5 billion backlog in school construction projects.

Action

A motion was made by Mr. Patterson and seconded by Mr. Forhan that the Board of Trustees go on record as supporting the passage of Proposition 39 scheduled for the November 7, 2000, general election. The motion carried unanimously.

Reports of Board Members Ms. Linda Harp, Reedley College Student Trustee, reminded everyone of the Homecoming game to be held at Reedley High School on October 7 and highlighted the week's homecoming activities. Other upcoming student events include: Hyundai Car Expo on October 11, Political Forum on October 19; Assemblymember Sarah Reyes on October 25, and a Pumpkin Carving Contest on October 30. She also noted that the Disabled Student Services is planning new classes in math, adaptive physical education, horticulture, high tech learning strategies, and learning disabilities assessments. Ms. Harp concluded by announcing she has been asked to participate in a job training and placement program in connection with the Department of Rehabilitation and Mentoring Program.

Mr. Ernie Garcia, Fresno City College Student Trustee, reported that several Senators just returned from the annual

Reports of Board Members (continued) California Community College Student Affairs Association Conference in Costa Mesa. Yesterday, the college in conjunction with Fresno State and Fresno Pacific, helped honor "Stop the Hate Week" with an informational discussion on the life of Gandhi. Other upcoming activities include: the Walk to Cure Juvenile Diabetes on October 14, Fresno Mayoral Candidates Debate on October 11, RamBurger Roundup on October 25, and the annual Safe-n-Sane Halloween Carnival on October 31 at the North Field of Ratcliffe Stadium.

Mr. Smith stated he originally sent the Chancellor a letter stating that he would like to attend the meeting with Dr. Badway regarding her visit at the Vocational Training Center; however, he rethought his decision and decided to wait until the written report was prepared. He appreciates having Dr. Badway visit the VTC and he looks forward to hearing her suggestions on what the program is doing right and what can be improved upon in the future.

Dr. Redwine noted that the full report will be available at the workshop being planned for November. Dr. Badway's exit interview remarks are currently being transcribed and will also be shared with the Board.

Mr. Manfredi congratulated Jannett Jackson on her recent promotion to Lieutenant Colonel.

Old/Future Agenda Items Mr. Manfredi reported that he received a copy of a letter written to Chancellor Nussbaum from Michael J. Parks, Field Director of the California School Employees Association. Mr. Manfredi continued that he feels there is considerable misinformation regarding the Personnel Commission and he feels the Board needs to address the issue of how the Commission and its staff operates.

Ms. Smith stated she has requested on many occasions a joint meeting with the Fresno Unified Board of Trustees to talk about partnerships. Also, she has requested a joint meeting with the City Council as it is important that the District connects with the city leaders, new mayor, etc. She noted she has been reading about creative ways other districts have dealt with the renovation of old buildings such as the Old Administration Building. One idea is for the construction classes to become involved in the project.

Regarding future items, Ms. Smith stated she would like to look into the role of the Student Trustee as a member of the Board,

not just as a representative of the Associated Student Government.

Mr. Forhan noted he would like to see a future agenda item regarding collaboration with Fresno Unified for a satellite facility in southwest and southeast Fresno. Mr. Smith commented that approximately two years ago Sherian Eckenrod attempted to set up some classes and they did not work out, but the matter does have merit.

Closed Session

Mr. Manfredi stated that the Board, in closed session, will be discussing the following: Conference with Labor Negotiator [SCFT], Hank Padden, Pursuant to Government Code Section 54957.6, and Conference with Labor Negotiator [Management/Confidential/Non-Bargaining], Pursuant to Government Code Section 54957.6. Mr. Manfredi declared a recess at 5:51 p.m.

Open Session

The Board moved into open session at 7:58 p.m. and Mr. Manfredi announced the Board, in closed session, gave direction to its chief labor negotiator with respect to negotiations with the AFT full-time bargaining unit.

Adjournment

The meeting was adjourned at 7:59 p.m. by the unanimous consent of the Board.

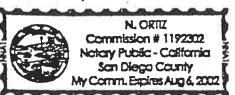

Background:

Education Code 76060 allows the governing board of a community college district to authorize the students of the college to organize a student body association. In addition, the Code says that: "The governing board may authorize the students of a college to organize more than one student body association when the governing board finds that . . . geographic circumstances make the organization of only one student body association impractical or inconvenient."

Currently, both Fresno City College and Reedley College have recognized student body associations authorized by the District's governing board. Because of the significant growth in the North Centers, the Centers have identified a need to create their own recognized student body association to provide the various student opportunities, as well as campus leadership, entrusted to student organizations. Since the statutes indicate that only colleges are authorized to have student body associations unless geographic circumstances make the organization of only one student body impractical, it is appropriate for the Board to authorize a second student body association under the affiliation of Reedley College for campuses of the North Centers. Authorization of this second Reedley College student body association will provide formal recognition, as well as compliance with the statutes.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees authorize a second student body association for the purpose of providing association activities for the State Center Community College District North Centers due to the significant geographic distance between the North Centers and the main Reedley College campus.

The California Department of Education (CDE) has contracted with the Chabot-Las Positas Community College District to implement the California Early Childhood Mentor Program in 70 community colleges through the fall semester of the 2000-01 academic year. The Early Childhood Mentor Program recruits and selects experienced child care providers and directors to be mentors to student teachers and protégé directors.

Chabot-Las Positas acts as the program oversight administrator, as well as fiscal agent, and subcontracts with local community college districts to provide the Early Childhood Mentor Program on their respective campuses. The program provides resources for implementation, including:

- implementation materials, an in-service training resource guide, and necessary forms and assistance;
- travel expenses for local Coordinators to attend statewide meetings to discuss program elements;
- various instructional and support costs, including a full stipend for 23 mentors;
- program oversight and compliance, as well as other activities.

- c) Managerial Strategies for E-Commerce; and
- d) Marketing Strategies for E-Commerce.

Black Hawk College is the lead institution, and Fresno City College has been approved as a participant for the US-European Student Mobility Grant Initiatives. This grant will provide funding for the mobility of students in US partnering institutions to selected schools in Europe through the development of the four new on-line courses of the new on-line E-Commerce Certificate.

The term of the Subcontract with Black Hawk College is for a period of three years—August 2000 through August 2003—and provides for the following:

Background:

Terms of the Agreement include:

Article I – Terms of the Agreement

The term is three years, July 1, 2000 through June 30, 2003.

Article XIII – Faculty Conditions

Under Evaluation Criteria, subsections 3. CLASSROOM TEACHER; 4.COUNSELORS; 5. LIBRARIANS; 6. NURSES; 7. COORDINATORS. No later than completion of the seventh semester in contract status or prior to receiving tenure status, whichever occurs first, contract employees hired after January 1, 2001 must be knowledgeable and, be able to demonstrate computer proficiencies, including operating a computer, using the storage devices, printer controls, essential operating system commands, browsing the internet, receiving and sending email, and the basic features of word processing and spreadsheet applications. Additionally, the contract employee will be able to demonstrate proficiency as to particular computer applications designed to meet the needs of students in the employee's teaching field or other work area, as determined by the evaluation team and department.

Article XV - Insurance Programs

Section 1. Health Insurance Contribution – 2000-01 the District contribution shall be an amount not-to-exceed a maximum monthly contribution of \$520.00 per month per

employee; 2001-02 the District contribution shall be an amount not-to-exceed a maximum monthly contribution of \$561.60 per month per employee; 2002-03 the District contribution shall be an amount not-to-exceed a maximum monthly contribution of \$606.53 per month per employee.

Section 2. Dental Insurance

- A. The District shall provide a dental care insurance program for eligible unit members and their dependents.
- B. The District shall provide a Dental program for the years 2000-2003, with benefits equal to the dental care insurance plan in effect during the fiscal year 1997-98: a PPO network with non-participating dentists compensated at 100% of usual and customary rates (UCR) as established by the 1998 National Dental Advisory Fee Survey. The Dental program shall become effective the month following ratification and approval of the collective bargaining agreement, or as soon thereafter as possible. The exclusive representative may reopen negotiations on the dental program in the second year (2001-02), following one (1) year of implemented experience with the program if there exists a number of valid complaints as determined by the Federation. In the years 2000-01, 2001-02 and 2002-03 the District will contribute a premium amount equivalent to the premium cost of the CVDP dental PPO network plan.
- C. Dental care insurance coverage shall remain in effect during approved leaves, providing unit members pay, in accordance with insurance carrier requirements, District and unit member premium contributions, except as otherwise provided.

Section 5. Life Insurance

The District shall provide a level term life insurance program for eligible unit members and their dependents: \$50,000 level term plus \$5,000 dependent coverage.

Section 6. Insurance Premiums

The District shall pay one hundred percent (100%) of the premium for coverage listed in Section 2, 3, 4 and 5, except for dental insurance and as otherwise stated herein.

Article XVII - Compensation

The salary for the year 2000-2001 is a 6% increase to each cell of the salary schedule. In the year 2001-2002 it will be the COLA +1% + an additional 1% if the growth of full-time equivalent students is at least 3.5% or greater. The salary increase for 2002-2003 will be COLA +1% + 1% to each cell of the salary schedule if the growth is at least 3.5% or greater for full-time equivalent students in the prior year.

Article XVIII - Retirement and Retirees

Early Retirement Incentive – There will be a special one-time early retirement bonus of \$14,000 to any certificated bargaining member who is 56 or older who chooses to retire at the end of Fall term 2000 (January 1, 2001) or at the end of the Spring term but no later than June 30, 2001.

There will be an additional early retirement incentive for persons retiring in the Fall 2002 and Spring 2003.

The Federation has withdrawn with prejudice Unfair Practice Charge SA-CE-1864.

Also included is the disclosure of the collective bargaining agreement. This is required by law and has been posted since October 19, 2000. Basically, the total cost for the year 2000-2001 will be \$2,027,058. The total cost for year two and year three are unknown, but the benefit cost for 2001-2002 would be \$277,958 and for 2002-2003 it would be \$296,620.

Recommendation:

At this time it is appropriate to open the meeting for input from the public relative to the settlement. Following an opportunity for public input, the Board may choose to ratify the agreement at this point in time, or prefer to defer a vote on the ratification to a closed session.

TENTATIVE AGREEMENT (subject to ratification/approval) THE STATE CENTER COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT AND THE STATE CENTER FEDERATION OF TEACHERS LOCAL 1533 2000-2003 BARGAINING

October 17, 2000

The collective bargaining provisions submitted herein between the State Center Community College District Board of Trustees and the State Center Federation of Teachers are expressly pursuant to the Educational Employment Relations Act and Article V, WAIVER OF BARGAINING, of the current Collective Bargaining Agreement between the parties.

Any article proposed for amendment by the Exclusive Representative in accordance with Article V, shall be deemed herein to remain unchanged in the Collective Bargaining Agreement unless otherwise expressly stated.

ARTICLE I TERM OF AGREEMENT

Article I, TERM OF AGREEMENT, shall remain unchanged except for the following amendments:

This Collective Bargaining Agreement (hereinafter "Agreement") between the State Center Community College District (hereinafter referred to as "District") and the State Center Federation of Teachers, Local 1533, CFT/AFT, AFL-CIO (hereinafter referred to as "Federation") is effective upon ratification, and shall remain in full force and effect through June 30, 2003. The salary provisions contained within Article XVIII and insurance provisions contained within Article XV shall be retroactive to August 10, 2000, except retroactivity shall be July for unit members whose annual work year begins in July, if the collective bargaining agreement is settled not later than October 30, 2000, except as otherwise stated regarding dental insurance.

ARTICLE XIII FACULTY CONDITIONS

Article XIII FACULTY CONDITIONS shall remain unchanged except for the following amendments:

(Include the following Section E - EVALUATION CRITERIA Subsections 3 CLASSROOM TEACHER, 4 COUNSELORS, 5 LIBRARIANS, 6 NURSES, 7 COORDINATORS) No later than completion of the seventh semester in contract status or prior to receiving tenure status, whichever occurs first, contract employees hired after January 1, 2001 must be knowledgeable and, be able to demonstrate computer proficiencies, including operating a computer, using the storage devices, printer controls, essential operating system commands, browsing the internet, receiving and sending e-mail, and the basic features of word processing and spreadsheet applications. Additionally, the contract employee will be able to demonstrate proficiency as to particular computer applications designed to meet the

needs of students in the employee's teaching field or other work area, as determined by the evaluation team and department.

ARTICLE XV INSURANCE PROGRAMS

Article XV, INSURANCE PROGRAMS, shall remain unchanged except for the following amendments:

Section 1. HEALTH INSURANCE:

C. <u>District Contribution</u>

The 2000-01 District contribution shall be an amount not-to-exceed a maximum monthly contribution of \$520.00 per month per employee.

The 2001-02 District contribution shall be an amount not-to-exceed a maximum monthly contribution of \$561.60 per month per employee.

The 2002-03 District contribution shall be an amount not-to-exceed a maximum monthly contribution of \$606.53 per month per employee.

Section 2. DENTAL INSURANCE:

- A. The District shall provide a dental care insurance program for eligible unit members and their dependents.
- B. The District shall provide a Dental program for the years 2000-2003, with benefits equal to the dental care insurance plan in effect during fiscal year 1997-98 a PPO network with non-participating dentists compensated at 100% of usual and customary rates (UCR) as established by the 1998 National Dental Advisory Fee Survey. The Dental program shall become effective the month following ratification and approval of the collective bargaining agreement, or as soon thereafter as possible. The exclusive representative may reopen negotiations on the dental program in the second year (2001-02), following one (1) year of implemented experience with the program if there exists a number of valid complaints as determined by the Federation. In the years 2000-01, 2001-02 and 2002-03 the District will contribute a premium amount equivalent to the premium cost of the CVDP dental PPO network plan.
- C. Dental care insurance coverage shall remain in effect during approved leaves, providing unit members pay, in accordance with insurance carrier requirements, District and unit member premium contributions, except as otherwise provided.

Section 5. LIFE INSURANCE

The District shall provide a level term life insurance program for eligible unit members and their dependents: \$50,000 level term plus \$5,000 dependent coverage. Provident Level term plan LTF8

Section 6. INSURANCE PREMIUMS:

The District shall pay one hundred percent (100%) of the premium for coverage listed in Section 2, 3, 4, and 5, except for dental insurance and as otherwise stated herein.

ARTICLE XVII COMPENSATION

Article XVII, COMPENSATION, shall remain unchanged except for salary schedules which shall be amended to include the following compensation offer and amendments to Section 1:

Section 1. Salary

2000-2001 Salary

The District shall provide for the 2000-2001 school year an increase of **6.0%** to each cell of the salary schedule in effect during the 1999-2000 school year for unit members, retroactive to August 10, 2000.

2001-2002 Salary

The District shall provide for the 2001-2002 school year an increase equivalent to the Statutory Cost-of-living Adjustment plus 1.0% to each cell of the salary schedule in effect during the 2000-01 school year for unit members. In addition, if the District's 2000-01 growth of full-time equivalent students (FTES) is at least 3.5% greater than the 1999-00 FTES, the District will increase each cell of the 2001-02 salary schedule by an additional one (1%) percent to the extent the FTES growth is fully funded by the state.*

The Statutory Cost-of-Living Adjustment shall be defined as that percentage amount included for California Community Colleges as contained in the 2001-02 California State Budget Act to the extent that it is actually funded.

*Example:

The Statutory Cost-of-Living Adjustment for the 1990-91 school year for California Community Colleges was 4.6%. Suppose the Statutory Cost-of-Living Adjustment for the 1998-99 school year for California Community Colleges is 5.0%, then each cell of the salary schedule in effect for 2000-01 would be increased by the sum of 5.0% plus 1.0% for a total 6.0%. However, if the cost of living adjustment for 2001-02 is 5.0% but is funded through the state budget at only 3.5% then each cell of the salary schedule in effect for 2000-01 would be increased by 3.5% plus 1.0% for a total of 4.5%. If, at any time during the term of this Agreement, the unfunded amount of 1.5% is restored or partially restored and paid to the District, it shall, to the extent paid to the District be applied retroactively to the salary schedule for bargaining unit members in paid work status on the date the District is actually paid said funds by the state. If the cost of living adjustment for 2001-02 is 5.0% but is totally unfunded by the state, each cell of the 2000-01 salary schedule shall be increased by 1.0%. Additionally, if the District's FTES for 1999-00 was 14,000 and grows to at least 14,490

FTES (3.5% growth) for 2000-01, each cell of the salary schedule shall be increased by an additional one (1%) percent effective July 1, 2002. If the state funds only 50% of a growth of at least 3.5% FTES, the cells of the salary schedule shall be increased by 0.5%.

2002-2003 Salary

The District shall provide for the 2002-2003 school year an increase equivalent to the Statutory Cost-of-living Adjustment plus 1.0% to each cell of the salary schedule in effect during the 2001-02 school year for unit members. Such District salary schedule increase shall be made only to the extent that the COLA is fully funded by the state. In addition, if the District's 2001-02 growth of full-time equivalent students (FTES) is at least 3.5% greater than the 2000-01 FTES, or if the average growth in both 2000-01 and 2001-02 school years is 3.5% or greater the District will increase each cell of the 2001-02 salary schedule by an additional one (1%) percent to the extent the FTES growth is fully funded by the state.*

The Statutory Cost-of-Living Adjustment shall be defined as that percentage amount included for California Community Colleges as contained in the 2002-03 California State Budget Act to the extent that it is actually funded.

*Example:

The Statutory Cost-of-Living Adjustment for the 1990-91 school year for California Community Colleges was 4.6%. Suppose the Statutory Cost-of-Living Adjustment for the 2002-03 school year for California Community Colleges is 5.0%, then each cell of the salary schedule in effect for 2001-02 would be increased by the sum of 5.0% plus 1.0% for a total 6.0%. However, if the cost of living adjustment for 2002-03 is 5.0% but is funded through the state budget at only 3.5% then each cell of the salary schedule in effect for 2001-02 would be increased by 3.5% plus 1.0% for a total of 4.5%. If, at any time during the term of this Agreement, the unfunded amount of 1.5% is restored or partially restored and paid to the District, it shall, to the extent paid to the District be applied retroactively to the salary schedule for bargaining unit members in paid work status on the date the District is actually paid said funds by the state. If the cost of living adjustment for 2002-03 is 5.0% but is totally unfunded by the state, each cell of the 2001-02 salary schedule shall be increased by 1.0%. Additionally, each cell of the salary schedule shall be increased by an additional 1.0% effective July 1, 2002 if the District's FTES for 2000-01 was 15,000 and grows to at least 15,525 FTES (3.5% growth) for the 2001-02 year or if the 2000-01 grow this 2% and the 2001-02 growth is 5% which calculates to an average of 3.5% FTES growth for each year. If the state funds only 50% of a growth of 3.5% or average of 3.5%, the cells of the salary schedule shall be increased by 0.5%.

SALARY DISPUTE

Any dispute pertaining to the salary provisions contained herein for the 2000-01, and 2001-02 and 2002-03 school years is subject to the Grievance Procedure of this Agreement except, however, that only the Federation may bring a grievance concerning such implementation and any such grievance must be filed within ten (10) days of notice from the District of any proposed implementation of these provisions. The District will notify the Federation concerning its calculations pursuant to the salary provisions contained herein. Such notification shall be in writing. If the Federation disagrees with the calculations, it shall notify the District within ten (10) days. Such notice of the disagreement shall include calculations prepared by the Federation, or attempt may implement its proposed calculations, the proposed calculations from the Federation, or attempt

to resolve the disagreement. If the matter cannot be satisfactorily implemented or resolved, by mutual agreement the parties shall agree to reopen negotiations regarding salaries at which time these salary formula provisions shall be of no force or effect.

ARTICLE XVIII RETIREMENT AND RETIREES

Article XVII, RETIREMENT AND RETIREES, shall remain unchanged except for the following amendments:

C. (No change in section C except for the following amendment) In lieu of the above decreasing incentive, a special one-time only incentive bonus of \$14,000.00 will be granted to <u>any</u> certificated bargaining unit member <u>age 56 or older</u> who chooses to retire at the end of Fall term 2000 but no later than January 1, 2001, or who chooses to retire at the end of Spring term 2001 but no later than June 30, 2001. Additionally this benefit will be provided to any certificated bargaining unit member age 56 or older who chooses to retire at the end of Fall term 2002 but no later than January 1, 2003 or who chooses to retire at the end of Spring term, 2003 but no later than June 30, 2003. Faculty members in addition to paragraphs A, B and C above, must also have 15 years with the District to be eligible for this incentive. Faculty members planning to retire during 2000-01 must submit their letter of intent to the District no later than November 15, 2000 for 2000-01, April 30 2002 for retirement at the end of the 1st semester 2002-03, and October 15 2002 for retirement at the end the 2nd semester, 2003.

E. This Early Retirement Incentive Program for full-time certificated bargaining unit members shall be in effect for the term of this contract only, and shall expire at the end of the academic year on June 30, 2003 and shall thereafter not be considered a status quo by the parties.

AGREEMENT

This Agreement made and entered into this day of 2000, between the State Center Community College District and the State Center Federation of Teachers, Local 1533, CFT/AFT, AFL-CIO, its successors and/or affiliates upon ratification as set forth in Article I of this Agreement and shall remain in full force and effect until the close of the workday of June 30, 2003.

This final settlement agreement concludes bargaining on all issues currently the subject of negotiations between the parties.

The Chancellor's Office allocated \$6,419,305 in 2000-01 for the continued development of SCCCD's plan to achieve the community college system-wide outcomes for Partnership for Excellence goals. These funds were distributed to Fresno City College, Reedley College, and the North Centers on a needs basis as well as FTES basis. Each site has a Partnership for Excellence committee comprised of students, faculty, staff, and administration to determine the prioritization of projects to be presented for Board approval.

Please note that tables per site have been developed reporting on the progress of meeting the individual project goals approved in 1999-2000. Some of the projects represent the first year of implementation of a multiple-year goal. Others were one-year goals and the outcomes of the project are indicated. It should also be noted that a common format throughout the District has been used to report the 1999-2000 results.

The tables representing the 2000-2001 requests are also in a common format. Each project was developed using a worksheet which itemized all the specific quantifiable outcomes for each project. The worksheet data was transferred to the tables which indicate the project name, the activities that will take place, how the project will be measured, and what PFE goals the project addresses. In addition, the Master Plan goals are identified. Partnership for Excellence positions included in the 2000-01 plan were approved in accordance with the authorization by the Board of Trustees in December 1999.

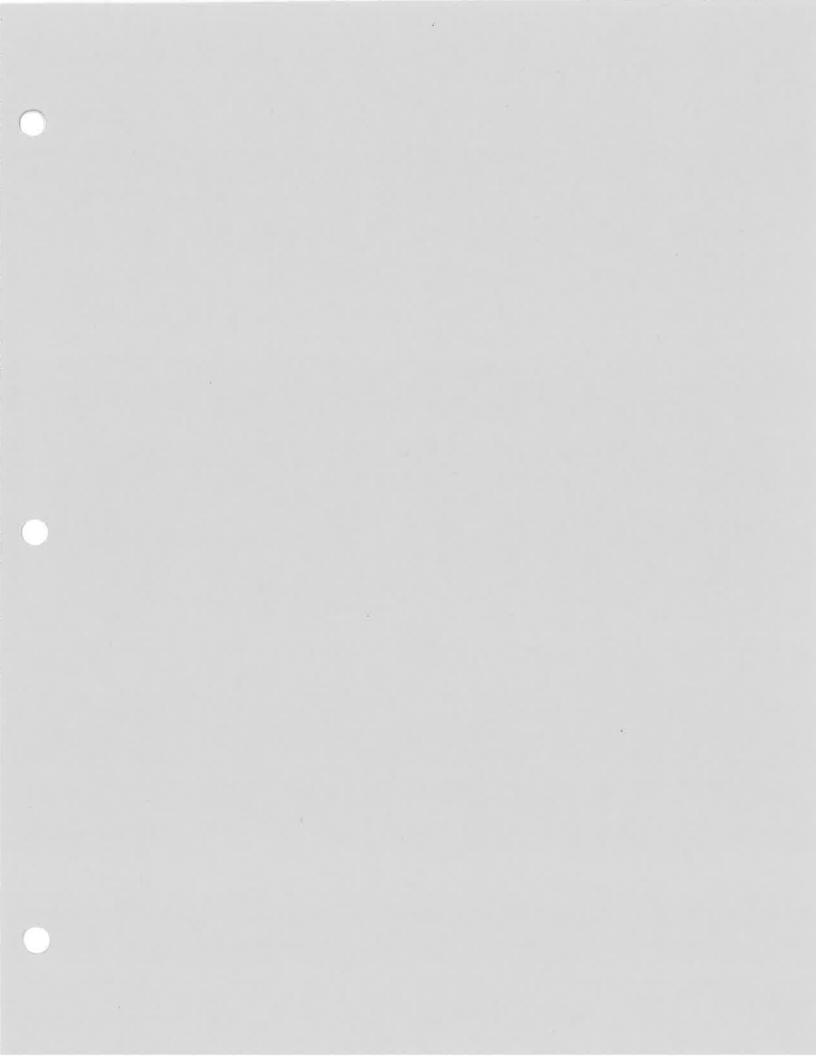

EXHIBIT: Listing of Recommendations

Background:

For the past several years, the District's enrollment has grown in a steady manner. Based upon the current year's growth and projections for 2001-2002, it is anticipated this trend will continue. Annually the District is required to report to the California Community College Chancellor's office faculty staffing levels, including full-time/part-time ratios. The District is also required to report compliance with "minimum full-time faculty obligations," which SCCCD continues to exceed.

In an effort to continue our relative position above our minimum full-time faculty obligations and to accommodate projected growth, the District will need to add thirteen (13) full-time faculty positions for 2001-2002. In addition, for the past two years the District has utilized one-third (33.3%) of our Partnership for Excellence (PFE) monies for full-time faculty positions. Because of significant increases in PFE funding for 2000-2001 and the institutionalizing of this program in the Community College system, it is recommended that the maximum percentage of PFE monies utilized for faculty hires be increased to 40%. Based upon a level of 40%, it is recommended that 24.5 full-time faculty positions be added with 2001-2002 PFE monies.

The combination of new growth positions and Partnership for Excellence positions results in 37.5 new positions. This increase will not only allow us to accommodate new growth, but will result in a significant increase in the District's full-time faculty ratio. Seventeen (17) positions are recommended for Fresno City College, eight (8) positions for Reedley College and eleven (11) positions for the North Centers. One and one-half (1-1/2) positions would be set aside to provide for a District Technology position. (These technology positions will be presented to the Board at a future date for consideration.)

Background:

Enclosed is the September 30, 2000, Quarterly Financial Status Report (CCFS-311Q) for the District General Fund, as required for community college districts (ECS 84043). In accordance with State instructions, a copy of the report will be forwarded to the State Chancellor's Office.

Since this is the first quarterly report for the 2000-01 fiscal year, few changes have occurred since the budget adoption. Additional revenue and expenditure adjustments will occur as the year progresses. Projections of revenues, expenditures, etc., are based on the adopted budget, as amended for additional grants, new programs, etc. The revenue and expenditures, when compared to budget, are normal for the first quarter at approximately 19% and 22%, respectively. Revenue received from property taxes and certain federal monies is not received until later in the year. FTES are based upon the adopted budget estimated increase of 2%.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees acknowledge the Quarterly Financial Status Report (CCFS-311Q), as presented.

Background:

Bid #0001-08 provides for the necessary renovations to upgrade existing space into a woodshop classroom for the Agriculture program at Reedley College. Included in this project is the installation of new dust collection, exhaust and cooling systems, a new fire alarm system, and electrical renovations in support of the new facility. This bid was necessitated by the need for improved and increased instructional facilities at Reedley College.

Funding for this project will be provided by 2000/01 Decision Package Funds for Reedley College. The engineer's estimate for this project is \$60,000.00. Bids were received from six (6) contractors as follows:
