Chancellor's Report

Dr. Redwine stated that Letty Alvarez has asked that she thank the Board and all members of the District employee community for the support shown to her and her family at the time of the loss of her nine year old daughter.

Dr. Redwine advised that unfortunately there was some misinformation that went to Sacramento as part of an Academic Senate survey dealing with the distribution of Partnership for Excellence money in our district. The information has been corrected in a follow-up letter jointly signed by Dr. Abbott, Ms. Castagna, and her, but in order to make this part of the record as requested by Trustee Forhan, she reported that in 1998-99 the District received just over \$2 million and there was an agreement that the District would allocate no more than onethird of the annual Partnership for Excellence appropriation to on-going, full-time faculty and no more than fifty percent for all full-time staffing, including classified and non-academic positions. In 1998-99 the District hired twelve full-time faculty with Partnership for Excellence funds, as well as eight classified personnel to support the identified Partnership for Excellence goals and objectives. Direct academic on-going expenditures for the twelve positions totaled approximately \$750,000.00 and \$380,000.00 respectively. None of the funds were kept by the District; all monies were given to the campuses, as that is where the students are. In addition, the District expended significant Partnership funds on adjunct part-time faculty for classroom instruction. Both the full-time and part-time faculty and additional classified positions were in addition to twenty fulltime growth positions added by the District and, therefore, provided a supplement to programs existing prior to the Partnership program.

In 1999-2000 the District followed the same practice and was given approximately \$3 million, and again, all monies were allocated to campus/center programs with no monies being retained for District Office or centralized services. At this time the District has authorized the addition of two additional fulltime faculty through Partnership for Excellence funding and will

consider additional certificated and classified personnel not to exceed fifty percent in the upcoming months. Again, it should be noted that these additional faculty positions are above the addition of eighteen District-funded growth positions from non-Partnership for Excellence funding.

Lastly, it is important to understand the collaboration involved in determining the expenditure of these funds. Each college and/or center involves all constituents and employee groups in the prioritization and ultimate dissemination of the Partnership funds. In addition, the District is establishing an internal baseline for each Board approved Partnership expenditure, which will allow tracking of the effectiveness of the various expenditures and supplemental programs.

One narrative comment in the survey response indicated a "chaotic process." Unfortunately, this statement was meant to refer to the confusion that is caused by the State's late appropriation identification, as well as performance outcomes. It did not refer to any chaos that occurred within the District.

Dr. Redwine distributed copies of the joint letter to the State Chancellor's Office and stated she would appreciate everyone sharing the information broadly. She noted that she talked with Linda Collins' office, State Academic Senate President, and unfortunately at this time they do not have plans to redistribute the results of the survey.

Mr. Forhan stated the survey will be presented to the Board of Governors with significant incorrect information. The fact that information will not be corrected is a great concern and the perception will be that this District is not doing its job with Partnership monies. Our funding is based upon performance and if in fact there is a report that is submitted indicating the money is not spent properly, then we should be held accountable. This Board has gone out of its way to make sure the monies are spent in a proper way and for a report to be forwarded to Sacramento without correction very much concerns him. He advised he will do everything he can to verbalize the fact that the District is performing well above average. To forward a report containing incorrect information is not in the tradition of this District.

Dr. Redwine added that the misinformation not only jeopardizes the funds for the District, but for all community colleges.

Campus Report, Fresno City College Dr. Larios reported the following from Fresno City College:

Eight students have earned the distinction of Dupont Certified Painter and six others Duramax Certified Painter by the respective companies. This is the first time the companies have allowed students to attempt to earn the certification. It's usually reserved for the journeyman level.

The College is a major sponsor of this year's Valley Business Conference that will be held on February 24. A number of staff members are assisting in its planning on the Logistics Committee. Two business students who received scholarships will be recognized at the luncheon. A number of students will also be given the opportunity to attend the conference.

The Community College Association of Occupational Programs will be coming to Fresno on February 29 to learn more about the Manchester Educational Resource Center. The association will tour the facility and learn more about one-stop centers. They will also hear more about our Suiting Up for Success store.

Concert pianist Rosemary Caviglia will premiere her Carnegie Hall debut performance at Fresno City College on February 4 at 1:15 p.m. in the Recital Hall. Caviglia will perform on the College's new Steinway Piano. There is no charge to attend. And by the way, Ms. Caviglia just happens to be the sister of FCC head football coach Tony Caviglia.

College Business Manager Michael Guerra has been elected as Director of the northern region of the California Association of College Stores. He is also the newly elected president-elect of the Fresno Friends for the Hispanic Scholarship Fund.

The Counseling and Job Placement offices are sponsoring a series of three career planning workshops in February. Students can choose day or evening workshops. The workshops will allow the students to explore career interests, assess skills and explore options.

The Human Resources Association of Central California has started a new mentoring program called Partnering for Success. Members of the association have become mentors to seven students who have completed our program. FCC hosted a luncheon to introduce the students and association members to each other and conduct an orientation.

The advisory committee members will provide valuable input on curriculum development, facilities, laboratory activities, employability skills and current and future employment needs.

Clovis Center

Tina Masterson and Julie Whiting participated in the Clovis Area Gifted and Talented Program Career day, emphasizing to the 4th through 6th grade students the need to attend college in order to reach their career goals. It is my prediction that many of these students will be attending the new Clovis campus in the year 2010.

The District and North Centers will be represented at the February 5th San Joaquin Valley Chicano and Latino Educational Leadership Conference College Fair at CSU Fresno. Over 100 students from throughout the valley will be present.

Madera Center

An Arts and Lectures group comprised of faculty and students has been very busy coordinating a speaker's forum for the spring semester. The series was inaugurated by James Glynn, Madera Center sociology instructor and columnist speaking on Moral and Spiritual Values. The next lecture in the series will be held on February 29th featuring Pastor Maurice Phillips, chair of the Madera Ministerial Association. Mr. Phillips will be speaking on the topic of "Children and Spirituality."

The Arts and Lectures group is also sponsoring a student photo and art exhibit in the Student Activities Office.

Dr. Kershaw continued that one of his major goals during his interim assignment was to fast track the licensure and opening of the Child Development Center. Three Madera Center students were invited to present at the 12th annual CSU Biotechnology Symposium held at the Cal Poly Pomona campus on January 13-15.

Bid specifications are being written which will result in the parking lot, landscaping and new science/chemistry laboratory installation to be completed by the beginning of the fall semester.

Dr. Kershaw concluded his report by stating as this is his last board meeting as the Interim Vice-Chancellor, he would like to thank the Board, Dr. Redwine and the Cabinet for their tremendous support and encouragement. As a result of his sevenmonth tenure, he has greatly increased his knowledge level, and has had the opportunity to work with a variety of talented and dedicated individuals at both the site and district levels. The positive momentum of the North Centers is increasing at a steady pace and he looks forward to working with Dr. Don Yeager as he transitions into the Vice-Chancellor/President Designate position.

Dr. Redwine and the Board expressed their appreciation to Dr. Kershaw for doing an excellent job during his interim assignment.

Academic Senate Paula Castagna, Fresno City College Academic Senate President, stated that the Academic Senate, the body that gave Report the incorrect information to the State regarding Partnership for Excellence funds, is chagrined that the State Academic Senate has said the information will not be corrected. She advised she will be in contact with Linda Collins tomorrow. There is also a plenary session in April and that information is usually published for these sessions. She advised she will do everything she can to see that the information is corrected from this district and any other district that has taken the opportunity to make corrections. Ms. Castagna continued that a lot of the Academic Senate Presidents are in the position for one year only and are subject to more mistakes. The State Senate office needs to be more flexible and let the report reflect the correct information.

Ms. Castagna stated this is the first year she has had the opportunity to watch a board at work and she appreciates the Board's commitment to excellence and accountability.

She reported that this year's Hayward Award nominees were Jerry Bill, Sociology; Marilyn Moore, Child Development; and Summary of Minutes, Board of Trustees, February 1, 2000 - Page 9

Academic Senate Report (continued) Ann Walzberg, Nursing. Ms. Walzberg was voted as the Fresno City College nominee and her name will be forwarded to the State for the final selection process.

Regarding academic and professional matters, she noted there are two items that will be discussed in the future: sixteen-week semester and office hours for adjunct faculty. These topics will bridge over and touch on some union issues, but they need to be able to address the academic and professional vantage points of these items.

Current involvements include follow-ups on the Shared Governance Workshop (videos and handouts were given to the Board, and copies will also be available to all staff and students); Master Plan and Strategic Plan implementation and evaluation committees at the campus and District level; Faculty Hiring Committees, and the hiring process for the Vice Chancellor of Educational Services and Planning.

Lastly, she discussed Learning Styles and a web site put together by a group of instructors at Diablo Valley College. The styles are categorized as visual/non-verbal, visual/verbal, auditory, tactile/kinesthetic, and balanced (overlap). The web site address is http://silcon.com/~scmiller/lsweb/dvclearn.htm. She asked that everyone access the site, take the learning styles survey, and email the results to the Academic Senate as she would like to do a profile on a cross section of people in the District and their learning styles.

Mr. Woody Smothers, Classified Senate President at Reedley College, stated the Senate appreciated the opportunity to attend the Shared Governance Workshop. They are preparing for the yearly 4CS Conference in Granlibakken, near Lake Tahoe, and publishing the first newsletter of Classified Senate activities.

Mr. Roger Lenz, business consultant to the Greater Fresno Consortium, gave a presentation on bringing Wilberforce University to the Valley. The consortium is in the process of buying land to build the university on Avenue 12 and Road 30 ¹/₂. He requested access to the Madera Center's sewer capacity, the District's cooperation in dealing with the City of Madera and County, and cooperation with future project development.

The Board discussed several issues relating to the requests to include: any agreement regarding the sewer lines should be with the University, not the Consortium; the relationship of the housing element with the university; the amount of money on

The Board asked staff to provide more information on the Consortium's request for the March Board meeting. Dr. Redwine committed to having the information to the Board in advance of the meeting to allow time for review of the material.

Mr. Pat Wright, Executive Director of CART, and Mr. Dick Center for Johanson, Chairman of the Board, gave an overview of CART, Advanced Research a national model for high school reform with an emphasis on and Technology science, technology, and project-based curriculum where (CART) students are involved in their education and curriculum is closely correlated to real world activities. Following a brief discussion by the Board regarding the need for CART to recruit all achievement levels of students, programs for adult learners, collaborative programs regarding workforce and economic development, and possible use of the facility on a rental basis for evening programs, the administration was instructed to develop a comprehensive plan to use the facilities at CART and the types of programs to be provided.

Mr. Patterson thanked Mr. Johanson for his support of the CART program as well as his support of the SCCC Foundation.

Public Hearing on Initial Bargaining Proposals Presented by State Center Federation of Teachers Local #1533, CFT/AFT, CIO/AFL [00-47] Dr. Padden stated that Government Code Section 3540 et seq. sets forth the "sunshine" provisions of the Rodda Act. The Board is required to hold public hearings on the initial proposals of the employee group and those of the Board. The State Center Federation of Teachers presented its initial proposals for a successor contract to the Board on January 11, 2000. The AFT proposals are as follows:

Article I - Term of Agreement

• AFT proposes a three (3) year term

Article XII - Hours, Workload, Class Size

- Section 3 Lecture Hour Equivalents
 - AFT proposes an additional load factor for teachers required to teach a split assignment (between sites) (fiscal impact – unknown, total increase dependent on additional information)
- Section 7 Lecture Hour Equivalents
 - AFT proposes raising the current lecture/lab ratio from 1 : .75 to 1 : 1 (this would result in a 33 1/3% increase in the cost of laboratory instruction districtwide)
- Section 6 <u>Calendar</u> (paragraph 2)
 - AFT proposes to increase the number of flex days from two (2) each semester to four (4) flex days per semester (fiscal implication – unknown: possible additional staff development monies needed)
- New Section: Length of Semester
 - AFT proposes that the current 18 week semester be reduced to 15-16 weeks (fiscal impact unknown – District by law must offer classes for a minimum of 175 days per year and faculty work year is still 177 duty days)

Mr. Manfredi opened the public hearing at 6:02 p.m. There being no comments, the hearing was closed at 6:03 p.m.

Dr. Padden reviewed that over the past several years there has been exceptional growth in both our student population and the number of faculty positions added to staff. There has been little growth in support staff. The administration has done an analysis of what we need to support growth as we have seen it over the last five to six years. We are recommending that fourteen (14) new positions be considered for approval. Of the fourteen (14), four (4) would be supported through Partnership for Excellence monies, and ten (10) from the general fund. Under the Partnership programs, we are recommending the following:

Quarterly Financial Status Report [00-49]	Mr. Sharpe stated the quarterly financial report reflects projected revenues and expenditures in line with the annual budget, as amended for additional grants, programs, etc. Actual revenues and expenditures are consistent with expectations at mid-year, allowing for the fact that most of the revenue from property taxes and certain federal monies is not received until later in the fiscal year. The projected 22,039 FTES indicates a 5.7% increase from 1998-99, which is based upon actual first semester growth projected for the full year.
<u>Action</u>	A motion was made by Mr. Thonesen and seconded by Mr. Patterson that the Board of Trustees acknowledge the Quarterly Financial Status Report (CCFS-311Q) as presented. The motion carried unanimously.
Consideration to Approve Use of Existing Furniture Contracts, Madera Center [00-50]	Mr. Sharpe reviewed that with the Madera Phase 1A Administration Building scheduled to open in August 2000, it is necessary to begin contracting for the purchase of classroom and office furniture as well as other necessary equipment items. The original furniture and equipment requirements listing prepared by the District and approved by the State was based upon contract pricing utilizing existing contracts that can be piggybacked through various government and local agencies.

The products available through these contracts have been selected with input from site staff and administration and are based upon prior District purchases for the Madera Center and other District locations. Utilization of these contracts does not preclude the use of other furniture vendors yet to be determined by the purchasing department and Madera site administration.

The utilization of these existing contracts will allow acquisition from competitive, cost effective contracts of substantial volume, while matching existing standards and design already selected and approved for use at the Madera Campus. It is also the desire of the administration to utilize these contracts when necessary for the purchase of furniture for other District locations. The combined cost for the purchase of furniture against these contracts for the Madera Center is approximately \$210,000.00. Funding for these Madera Center purchases will be from 1998 State Bond Measure funds while other furniture purchases will be from various budgets as previously approved by the Board of Trustees.

A motion was made by Ms. Smith and seconded by Mr. Feaver that the Board of Trustees approve participation in the California Communities Purchasing Program (Agreement #P922088) and the County of Tulare Contract (#2602) for the purchase of furniture for the Madera Center and other District locations as needed, and authorize purchase orders to be issued against these contracts. The motion carried unanimously.

> Mr. Sharpe advised that the Budget Development Calendar has been established with a sequence of events consistent with that of previous years. The process will conclude with a recommendation for Board approval at its regular meeting on September 5, 2000.

Mr. Manfredi led a discussion on the Board's input regarding the budget, especially in the decision package area, and the possibility of having a special meeting or having an earlier retreat.

A motion was made by Mr. Forhan and seconded by Ms. Smith that the Board of Trustees approve the 2000-01 Budget Development Calendar with the Board Retreat to be scheduled in early to mid March. The motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Smith noted he will be out of the state March 20 through April 1.

Clovis Center Board Subcommittee Apppointments [00-52]

Sphere of Influence Impact - Madera Center [00-53] The Board of Trustees appointed Mr. Patterson and Mr. Forhan to serve on a District subcommittee to provide a comprehensive study and to recommend a long-term course of action to meet current and future student population growth in the Clovis/Northeast areas of the District, with a report/recommendation due back to the full Board of Trustees in March or April 2000.

Mr. Patterson stated that in light of the article that appeared in *The Fresno Bee* on January 24, 2000, addressing the Local Agency Formation Commission's (LAFCO) denial of the City of Madera's request for an expanded sphere of influence to include the State Center Community College District Park Plan, he is concerned what the future holds for the Madera Center. He would like to know if there is going to be any termination of agreements with the City and County of Madera, and if the decision impacts the Center's ability to offer services.

In response to Mr. Patterson's concerns, Mr. Sharpe explained the following:

- The sewer lines are installed from the City of Madera to the campus, and on Avenue 13, the District will be reimbursed for the sewer lines as development occurs. The District will not be reimbursed on Road 30 ½ unless the lines are leased to another organization, such as being requested by Wilberforce.
- Supervisor Silva did question the improvements at Highway 99 and Avenue 12. In the original EIR and then the Mitigated Negative Declaration for the Phase 1A development, CalTrans did raise the issue of traffic and congestion at the intersection; however, after meeting with them they signed off on the plan based upon their studies. It was indicated that before the next phase of construction they may require a traffic study to be done.
- Regarding controlled intersections, Road 30 ½ has a stubout for a stop light, but it is not the District's obligation to install the light because the stub-out has been provided as part of the Avenue 12 improvements. The light will not be a factor until the parking lot is being used on Road 30 ½.
- Concerning funding issues and changing priorities, the District is beyond that point. The District has invested significant dollars to start the campus and to get state

Sphere of Influence Impact - Madera Center [00-53] (continued) recognition. The money being put into the project now is really state dollars. Phase 1B will be funded entirely by the State of California unless the rules are changed by the passage of Proposition 26. As it stands now, one hundred percent of the preliminary plan funding is by the State of California. The only obligation the District would have relative to facilities for Phase 1B is the parking lot.

Mr. Sharpe continued that the County sees the denial as a shortterm setback. In talking with the landowners, they have assured us they will be back with LAFCO in one year to submit their request again.

Mr. Manfredi added that while it is disappointing, we have to look at it as short-term poor planning. The issue is that the City of Madera has been on line with every issue. The Center is attached to their sources and we are using their sewer system. The County staff, Planning Department, etc., made the recommendations, and the County Board, County Planning Commission, City of Madera, property owners, and the District signed off. However, LAFCO is made up of different people; there are two representatives from the County, two from the City, and one at large. Another factor is the landowners have never come up with a concrete plan of development.

Mr. Patterson stated he has some concerns when a member of LAFCO, who is also a member of the Board of Supervisors, is saying that the District has gotten away with something and we should have been paying our fair share of the development of Highway 99 and Avenue 12. Another impact is possible roadblocks with future development and access of the area. On a districtwide level, in the Clovis area there is a need and these types of problems do not exist there. He added that he would like to be reassured before more money is spent in Madera, and there should be a consideration to divert some of the funding to Clovis.

Mr. Sharpe advised that the funding is site specific; however, the District is pursuing the Clovis issues through the IPP.

Mr. Manfredi stated with the Board's concurrence, he would like for Dr. Redwine to personally contact LAFCO to see what their concerns are, give them correct information on some items, and then consistently reevaluate our allocations.

Mr. Patterson concurred and added that Dr. Redwine should contact all parties involved with the project in Madera to advise them of the Board's concerns.

Sphere of Influence Impact - Madera Center [00-53] (continued)

Reports of Board Members Mr. Smith stated the District can develop at Madera and address the needs at Clovis at the same time. There is not a sufficient basis to stop in Madera. The Chancellor will contact the Madera officials and report back to the Board. Tonight a subcommittee was formed to study the needs of the Clovis Center.

Mr. Manfredi stated that Reedley College Student Trustee Andy Gonzales was unable to attend the meeting but asked that his report be included in the minutes. Mr. Gonzales reported that February is Black History Month and the students will celebrate by sampling food, having live musical entertainment, and distributing informational brochures. Current fundraising activities include selling balloon bouquets for Valentine's Day and the Big Brother/Big Sister Bowl-a-Thon on March 19. At the end of the month, students will be able to participate in an activity similar to "Who Wants To Be A Millionaire," but with much less prize money -- nothing with a zero.

Marylee McGough, Fresno City College Student Trustee reported that today marks the beginning of a month long celebration of African American History, with opening ceremonies at 10:00 a.m. tomorrow in the theatre. One of the traditional highlights, Spiritual and Gospel Night, will be held on February 4 at 7:00 p.m. in the theatre. There will be a number of educational forums including one on Law Enforcement, with several African American police officers serving on a panel to discuss their experiences and offer advice to students. Dr. Christine Johnson-McPhail will make a special presentation on February 23 in the theatre. She will be sharing her new book entitled A Pocket Book of Mother Wit. The month's entertainment piece will be a tribute to Bob Marley, as his birthday will be celebrated with a reggae dance at the African American Museum on February 25. The College Activities office will be hosting a Census Forum titled "Make Sure You Count" on February 28 in the gym. It will focus on the purpose and procedures for the Census and inform students about job opportunities.

Mr. Smith stated he was not able to attend the last Board meeting and would like to meet with Mr. Sharpe about what occurred. He sent a letter to all Board members and the Chancellor regarding the VTC and possibly upgrading the VTC facilities at some point. He asked this item be placed on a future Board agenda or discussed at the Board Retreat.

Ms. Smith invited everyone to attend the annual Wall of Honor at the African American Museum on February 29 from Summary of Minutes, Board of Trustees, February 1, 2000 - Page 21

Reports of Board Members (continued) 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. It is the tradition of the Wall of Honor to recognize those who have made a contribution not only to the District or have a connection to the District, but are doing some great things. The committee is looking for employees or alumni who have not just done their job, but have gone above and beyond and have made a difference in the community.

Mr. Manfredi reminded everyone of the forums for the Vice Chancellor-Educational Services and Planning to be held on Thursday, and the Board interviews scheduled for Friday.

Future AgendaMr. Manfredi stated he is looking forward to a presentation on
the technology consortium and on-line curriculum.

Closed Session Mr. Manfredi stated that the Board, in closed session, will be discussing the following: Conference with Labor Negotiator [SCFT and CSEA], Hank Padden, Pursuant to Government Code Section 54957.6; and Conference with Legal Counsel – Anticipated Litigation, Pursuant to Subdivision (c) of Section 54956.9 (one potential case). Mr. Manfredi declared a recess at 6:55 p.m.

Open Session The Board moved into open session at 7:33 p.m., and Mr. Manfredi announced the Board had nothing to report from closed session.

Adjournment The meeting was adjourned at 7:35 p.m. by the unanimous consent of the Board.


I. Executive Summary

Introduction

This is the Compliance Review of the County of Fresno's Treasurer's Investment Pool Portfolio for the period ended December 31, 1999, pursuant to California Government Code 53646. The report has two primary objectives: (1) to provide information regarding portfolio holdings as to compliance with California Government Code Sections 53601 and 53635, as well as the County Treasurer's Statement of Investment Policy and (2) to detail portfolio characteristics of the portfolio's investment holdings.

Quarterly Overview of Markets:

During the quarter, the fixed income pool produced slightly negative rates of return as Treasury yields rose across the maturity spectrum resulting in price declines. Shifts in money-market yields were mixed. (see figures below).

As the data above indicate, during the fourth quarter of 1999 yields increased across the maturity spectrum. The yield on one-year Treasury Bonds increased by 82 basis points to 5.98% for the quarter, while the yield on thirty-year Treasury Bonds increased 44 basis points to 6.48%. As a result, the spread between one-year and thirty-year Treasuries decreased to 50 basis points from 88 basis points at the end of the third quarter as the yield curve flattened slightly. During the quarter, Bankers Acceptances experienced a yield increase for the 180-day maturities and a yield decrease for the 90-day maturities. High-quality Commercial Paper demonstrated a similar pattern, experiencing a yield increase for 90-day maturities and a yield decline for the shorter 30-day maturities.



Portfolio Position

The portfolio maintained a weighted maturity of less than one year. Keeping the portfolio within this maturity range minimized its exposure to potential interest rate shifts that can occur in the mid-maturity sectors of the yield curve. The quality of the portfolio was also high with 57.8% of the portfolio's assets invested in risk-free instruments.

Compliance with California Government Codes 53601 & 53635:

The Investment Portfolio is compliant with the California Government Codes 53601 and 53635.

Compliance with Treasury Investment Pool Statement of Investment Policy:

The Statement of Investment Policy is more stringent than the California Government Code. As of 12/31/99, the Treasurer's Investment Pool portfolio complied with its Statement of Investment Policy.

Please refer to the next section of the report for a more detailed evaluation of the portfolio in relationship to the California Government Code and the Treasurer's Investment Pool Statement of Investment Policy.

Portfolio characteristics

The Treasury Pool's investment holdings represent a portfolio of assets having a high degree of quality. As of 12/31/99, the portfolio had a market value of \$1.3 billion with an average dollar-weighted quality between "AA+" and "AAA". Approximately 58% of the portfolio's assets are invested in securities with virtually no credit risk (i.e., US Treasuries, US Agencies, and cash). The dollar weighted average life of the pool is 293 days. 18.3% of the portfolio matures within 30 days, 28.3% matures within 90 days, and 39.5% within 180 days (see Appendix for further details). Based on its relative high quality and near-term liquidity, and assuming no significant changes to pool funding policies, the Treasury Investment Pool is well positioned to meet its expenditure requirements over the next six months.







In the case of deliverable repo, the market value of each security is priced in house and verified by BIMC (BlackRock Institutional Management Corporation) through the use of electronic data from sources such as Bloomberg and Telerate. For tri-party repo, the market value of each security is priced by the sub-custodian bank. Such prices are then verified by BIMC through the aforementioned electronic data sources.

The margin requirement on all repo is 102% and every trade is priced daily. Should the market value on a term repo trade fall below that level, the original dealer is required to post additional collateral to restore the needed margin. A 7-day put option exists on all term trades.

To determine the fund's net asset value per share, the daily valuation of portfolio securities is performed in accordance with BIMC's matrix pricing policy. BIMC uses a matrix pricing methodology that is based on pricing tiers called matrix codes and time cells that extend out the yield curve. The matrix codes represent how a security trades relative to other securities of the same type. Security prices (yields) represent the bid side of the market and are indicative of where that security is expected to be able to sell. The security prices come from a variety of sources; broker/dealers who are major participants in specific money market areas (e.g. Goldman Sachs and Merrill Lynch for repurchase agreements) are used.

Portfolio valuations are performed daily. Data is:input by a BIMC trader or portfolio manager and checked by a Group Manager. This data feeds the fund accounting system that determines the fund's net asset value per share. The variance to a \$1.00/share is noted and reported to the portfolio manager daily. Depending on market conditions, the number of matrix codes and the spread between tiers may change. These factors are reviewed periodically and changed as conditions warrant.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Average Maturity - The weighted average time to principal repayment. Useful as an approximation of a single maturity where the mean or average maturity is used to describe the life of the instrument.

Bankers Acceptance - Money market instrument created from transactions involving foreign trade. In its simplest form, a bankers acceptance is a check, drawn on bank by an importer or exporter of goods.

Basis Point - 1/100th of 1%.

Certificate of Deposit - A short term money market instrument representing a receipt from a bank for a deposit at a specified rate of interest for a specified period of time.

Coupon Rate - The annual interest paid of a fixed-income instrument.

Commercial Paper - Money Market instrument representing a short-term promissory note of a large corporation at a specified rate of return for a specified period of time.

Current Yield - A bond's coupon expressed as a percentage of the bond's market price.

Discount Rate - The interest rate used to translate a future value into a present value.

Duration - Often times referred to as Macaulay's duration is a fixed income measure of price sensitivity to changes in yields. It is calculated by taking a weighted average of the time periods to receipt of the present value of the cash flows from a fixed income instrument.

Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation - Also known as "FHLMC" and Freddie Mac. FHLMC is a Private Corporation authorized by Congress. which sells notes, participation certificates and other mortgage obligations backed by mortgage pools.

Federal National Mortgage Association - Also known as "FNMA" and Fannie Mae. A private corporation which buys and sells residential mortgages insured by FHA or guaranteed by VA. FNMA also issues notes, participation certificates and other mortgage obligations backed by mortgage pools.

Government National Mortgage Corporation - Also known as "GNMA" and Ginnie Mae. A wholly-owned U.S. government corporation. GNMA issues and guarantees mortgage-backed securities which are backed by the full faith and credit of the United States Government.

Repurchase Agreement - Short term collateralized loan at a specified rate for a specified period, used by large investors as an alternative for cash investments.

Yield to Maturity - The internal rate of return of a standard bond held to maturity.



Background:

In December 1999 the Board of Trustees approved funding to provide e-mail and internet access for students and faculty throughout the District. The District has negotiated an agreement with California State University Fresno and it's Central Valley Internet Project (CVIP) to provide this internet and e-mail service. The CVIP currently provides e-mail and internet access to its own students, faculty and staff as well as to several other educational institutions in the Fresno area.

These contracted services will benefit the District's educational system by allowing enhanced communication between instructors and students, the ability to require student utilization of the internet, and the ability for instructors to disseminate information such as syllabus, assignments, etc., via the internet. In addition to providing e-mail addresses and student internet access, all District affiliated individuals, including students, faculty and other employees will be allowed unlimited remote internet access at a rate of \$9.95 per month. This monthly rate is guaranteed by CVIP to remain at the same price charged to it's own students and employees and represents a significant savings compared to other available internet service providers. This agreement will effectively allow a continued transition to enhance use of technology by the students, faculty and other employees of the District.

Funding for year one of this project will be provided by additional 1999-00 General Fund monies previously allocated and approved by the Board of Trustees in December 1999. This agreement will be for a three-year period with a yearly cost of \$68,214.00 and a total three-year cost of \$204,642.00.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve an agreement with the Central Valley Internet Project for Student and Faculty Internet and E-mail Access, and authorize the Chancellor or Vice Chancellor-Business to sign the Agreement on behalf of the District.

INITIAL PROPOSAL FROM THE STATE CENTER COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT TO THE STATE CENTER FEDERATION OF TEACHERS LOCAL 1533 2000-2003 BARGAINING

The collective bargaining proposals submitted herein by the State Center Community College District Board of Trustees are expressly pursuant to the Educational Employment Relations Act and Article V, WAIVER OF BARGAINING, of the current Collective Bargaining Agreement between the parties.

It is the intention of the State Center Community College District Board of Trustees to bargain in good faith over the proposals submitted by the respective parties to the Collective Bargaining Agreement.

Any article proposed for amendment by the Exclusive Representative in accordance with Article V, shall be deemed herein to remain unchanged in the Collective Bargaining Agreement unless otherwise expressly stated.

ARTICLE I TERM OF AGREEMENT

ARTICLE 1, TERM OF AGREEMENT, shall remain unchanged except for the following amendments.

The term of agreement shall include the full statutory allowance of three years from **July 1, 2000** July 1, 1997, or the date the Agreement is ratified and/or approved, whichever is later, to **June 30, 2003** June 30, 2000.

ARTICLE IX FEDERATION RIGHTS

Article IX, FEDERATION RIGHTS, shall remain unchanged except for the following amendments:

References to public information, employee lists, Federation officials, mailbox usage, bulletin board usage, facility usage, telephone usage, and release time will provide for a greater detailed understanding of the parties of the rights and obligations in each of these areas. Additionally, an indemnification provision will be added to save harmless the College District in such matters which confer benefits on the Federation.

ARTICLE XII HOURS, WORKLOAD, CLASS SIZE

Article XII, HOURS, WORKLOAD, CLASS SIZE, shall remain unchanged except for the following amendments:

By mutual agreement between the instructor and the dean of instruction, adjustments in teacher workload based on the application of the above formula which would normally dictate the changing of an instructor of a class shall not be made until the following semester. By mutual agreement between the instructor and the dean of instruction, factors for lecture hour equivalents for lecture classes may be established by using the number which is the arithmetic mean of the number of students in all classes of the contract load for the instructor, computed on the first (1^{et}) census week day enrollment. The first (1^{et}) census day week enrollment reflects all new registrations, additions, and drops that are returned to the admissions and records offices by the end of the Friday that precedes Monday of the first (1^{et}) census day week; this Friday could be the thirteenth (13th), fourteenth (14th) or fifteenth (15th) day of the semester.

2) The provisions regarding workload, work week, office hours, calendar, department head, reassigned time and distance education will be further clarified to ensure the highest quality of education provided to the College District students in relation to the efficiency, costs, and educational program design. Additionally, development of educationally related programs and their ownership shall further be clarified and defined in order to provide clear understanding as to the rights and obligations of faculty members.

ARTICLE XIII FACULTY CONDITIONS

Article XIII, FACULTY CONDITIONS, shall remain unchanged except for the following amendments:

Faculty shall be required to comply with technology proficiency requirements as well as existing standards of performance required for continued employment.

ARTICLE XV INSURANCE PROGRAMS

Article XV, INSURANCE PROGRAMS, shall remain unchanged except for the following amendments:

The District will continue to offer the current benefits of Article XV, Insurance Programs, at the stated current monthly contribution. The benefits program, including medical insurance, dental insurance, vision insurance, salary protection insurance, life insurance and retiree health insurance shall continue within the limitations prescribed by the parties for the 2000-2003 school year. Increased cost of these programs for the period 2000-2003 and subsequent years will not be the obligation of the College District beyond the levels provided for in Compensation and the provisions of Article XVII, Compensation. Compensation as provided for in Article XVII, is designed to allow use for insurance programs. Should there be an increase in the premium costs of the current benefits program, the College District agrees to explore the options available for covering such increases from compensation.

The District has the sole discretion to change benefit plans administrators and providers so long as the actual benefits received by enrollees are substantially comparable to those under the former benefit plan.

ARTICLE XVII COMPENSATION

Article XVII, COMPENSATION, shall remain unchanged except for the following amendments.

Section 1. Salaries

Compensation for members of the faculty bargaining unit shall include, but not be limited to:

Salary Class and Step Salary – Fringe Impact Health and Welfare Benefits Additional Costs as related to the implementation of the Agreement.

The provisions of Article XVII, Compensation, will provide a basis for compensation covering the three year maximum statutory period pursuant to Government Code section 3547 et seq., the Educational Employment Relations Act, and will take into consideration application state and federal laws, the interests and welfare of the public and the financial ability of the College District, the Consumer Price Index for goods and services where applicable, the overall compensation presently received by employees in the bargaining unit, including direct wage compensation, calendar of services, insurance and retirement benefits, the continuity and stability of employment, and all other benefits received which may bear upon compensation prospective Additionally, such compensation. as determinations may differ from the prior experiences of the parties, a method for resolving any disputed claims will be included.

The District is currently unaware of the income it will receive for the forthcoming school year, as the COLA from the state budget has not be clarified. It is the intention of the District to propound a compensation offer as soon as reasonably practicable once it receives sufficient information from the state regarding budgetary allocations.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees convene a public hearing for the purpose of receiving public comment. Following the open comment period, no Board action is necessary.
