Instrument sharpening, sequencing, ultrasonics, periodontal charting, and ergonomics.

  - Seminar format with discussion of various topics dealing with intermediate clinical practice of dental hygiene. Intermediate level of decision making, clinical judgment, dental hygiene diagnosis, and problem solving of clinical issues encountered in DH 5B, Clinical Dental Hygiene II. Use of diagnostic technology for caries detection, computerized delivery systems for local anesthetics, digital radiography, and subgingival irrigation therapy.
- 5. Dental Hygiene 14, Clinical Seminar Topics III, 1 unit, 2 lecture hours, 9 weeks. Prerequisite: Dental Hygiene 13. Corequisite: Dental Hygiene 5C.

Seminar format with discussion of various topics dealing with advanced clinical practice of dental hygiene. Advanced level of decision making, clinical judgment, dental hygiene diagnosis, and problem solving of clinical issues encountered in DH 5C, Clinical Dental Hygiene III. Preparation for the Dental Hygiene National Board Examination, Mock Board Clinical examination, and state licensure examinations.

6. History 20, Comparative World Civilizations to 1600, 3 units, 3 lecture hours. Advisory: Eligibility for English 125 and 126 or English 153 or ESL 67 and 68 recommended.

Fresno City College has created a faculty/staff development center named the Teaching & Learning Center (TLC). As in previous years, the funds will be used to augment and enhance the learning center so that it will continue to support the goals established in Tech II. These include but are not limited to hiring technical support staff to assist in supporting the development and implementation of new modes of instructional and service delivery such as on-line discussion groups; listservs, campus-wide distribution lists; online forums and special interest groups (SIGs), as well as, purchasing hardware, software and peripherals to allow for research and development of demonstration workstations with computers equipped to support a range of educational uses of technology; such as video capture/editing; multimedia production; web hosting and wireless networking. Hardware will also be purchased to allow for the development of on-line registration and counseling tools, to increase the number of newer technology to comply with the ratio of 1 computer for every 20 students, and to replace older computers.

The expenditures conform to the intent of TTIP/Tech II by:

- Maintaining campus-wide connectivity to the Internet a well as access to data, video and voice telecommunications;
- Upgrading legacy computers, to included software, hardware, network connectivity and printers
- Providing support staff training that allows for technical backup and direct support for students, faculty and staff
- Increasing the acquisition of online and electronic information resources
- Increasing the number of adaptive access computer stations;
- Upgrading the Technology Plan to incorporate the TCO model and guidelines for future evaluation
- Augmenting individual and group training needs of faculty, staff and administrators.

### 4CNET Data & Video

Funding in this area provides telecommunication services and connectivity to our college and the 4CNET system by integrating a combination of data, video, and voice communications to allow for teleconferencing, connecting to CSUNet and satellite downlink capabilities.

**Library Automation** 

Funding in this area will allow the college to continue to maintain its existing online database subscriptions and to augment the system with electronic resources to enhance learning. These include the purchase of Lexis-Nexis, an online encyclopedia, SIRS, Proquest, CQ Researcher, Ethnic NewsWatch, GenderWatch, Access Science, OPAC catalog system, Books in Print and other discipline specific software.

**Total Cost of Ownership** 

Last year began the transition towards the TCO Model. There is a need for additional technology system hardware to allow for segmentation of our LAN. This means we will need to purchase CISCO Layer-3 network equipment and switches to replace older systems.

### **Human Resources**

Training will focus on increasing the technological knowledge of all campus staff. These funds will enhance technology skills by implementing a formalized process of staff development in the form of a technology faire, a summer institute and individualized workshop training to replace depleted AB1725 funds.

Additionally, the above initiatives support the college and district planning initiatives through the SCCCD Master Plan goal(s) as follows: #12 Increase academic and occupational opportunities for students from diverse populations.

#15 Develop a plan to establish adequate resources to support student activities

#30 Improve district wide-area and local area network infrastructure to support instructional, administrative and student success activities.

#31 Develop a capital facilities and modernization program.

Funds will be expended to continue to train our adaptive access technician and support staff in the form of individual training workshops, training at the DeAnza HiTech Training Center, and technology conferences. Funds have also been earmarked for the distribution of adaptive technology hardware and software, upgrading of existing software such as JAWS, Naturally Speaking, etc, and modification of online resources to comply with Section 508 to allow access to the Internet.

E. Please provide a short narrative on how the college/district plans on spending TCO carryover funds (Optional Ares) from prior years.

Funds from other sources have been used in the past in lieu of TTIP funds, this has allowed the campus to shelter this income in anticipation of a reduction in funds from the state. This prudent position, now allows us to maintain existing systems. The impending budget crisis and shortfall of capital will has a less egregious effect on this program. Now these funds will be used to make up for the shortfall, and will go toward the purchase netronic infrastructure equipment, continue to supplement support staff wages, replacement of older/aging workstations/equipment and provide technology training for technical support staff.

TTIP funds for 4CNET connectivity will be used for district wide access to the Internet, the SCCCD Intranet, Web based messaging access, IP based videoconferencing, remote administration to all SCCCD sites for District Office support staff, online access to Student Administrative Systems for faculty, staff, and students, enhanced Web based instruction for students, and improved network connectivity to all SCCCD remote sites.

Satellite technology will be used to provide educational opportunities for students, faculty, staff, and members of the SCCCD community. The Satellite system allows for direct viewing at the time of the broadcast and taping of broadcasts for future use. SCCCD looks forward to the staff and faculty training opportunities that the State Chancellor's Office will be offering in the future via satellite transmission.

Carry-over TCO funds will be used to attempt to keep pace with the TCO model that was adopted two years ago. We will replace our most dated central administrative servers and desktop technology with these funds.

Carry-over TTIP funds in the Human Resources area will be used to develop and implement training for District Office staff to ensure that they are kept up to date with the new technology being implemented district-wide to our students, faculty, and staff. I.S. support staff will be provided direct training as well as web and computer based training to enhance and build skills to support new technology that is planned for implementation.

TTIP funds will assist student learning and administrative services by improving our presence on the World Wide Web. We look to improve student access from the Web to both instructional and administrative systems. We are planning our next steps in the expansion of our Blackboard course management system and will add services to our web-based module of the Datatel Colleague system (WebAdvisor).

We will also use funds to improve our current video conferencing technology by implementing IP based Video Conferencing. IP based video conferencing will help in reducing our data line costs (ISDN dial-up) by leveraging utilizing our current data infrastructure. IP video conferencing will also allow us to extend our reach beyond our

district and the CCC system. It will allow for on demand conferencing and increased scheduling flexibility.

Administrative services will be enhanced by offering faculty and staff increased access to administrative systems while away from their campus or office. Support services will also be enhanced with additional web based troubleshooting tools that will allow for remote user support throughout the District.

SCCCD will use TTIP funds to ensure that current systems meet ADA regulations. We will be investigating tools that will enable us to provide web-based content that meets these regulations. All websites throughout the District will be tested to ensure compliance with Section 508. As stated before SCCCD is currently planning the next phase of our web based delivery of instruction and the upgrade of our video conferencing equipment.

The SCCCD District Office I.S. staff has identified the most dated equipment at the District Office and will attempt to replace as much desktop technology as possible. We are concentrating on updating our core administrative hardware to ensure that students, faculty, and staff will have necessary central technology available to meet their ever-growing demands.

New file servers will be purchased to run software that will deliver increased web based instruction and administrative tools. The District Office will look to replace outdated networking equipment to provide increased access to core systems, campuses within the district, and Internet based services.

This new hardware will assist our students' ability to access our core systems via the Internet. Faculty and Staff throughout the district will be able to access administrative systems away from their classrooms and offices and members of our community will have increased opportunities to access information about the District and our schools.

TTIP funds will be used to provide 4Cnet connections for email for all staff members, access to the Internet for online course management, online student services, Intranet administrative services, and cost-effective video conferencing to other SCCCD sites. Carryover funds and other non-TTIP funds are being used to improve network capability that will serve all areas of the campus – especially student services.

Satellite technology will be used to download education-oriented content for use in the classroom and for training purposes. TCO funds will be used to provide and maintain necessary hardware and software that is used in the classroom, in distance learning, and in the various departmental offices across the campus. The college has a plan for keeping software and hardware up-to-date, approaching the TCO standard for workstation replacement through the use of various funds (including IE, VTEA, and general apportionment).

Reedley College will take the necessary steps to ensure that with regard to Distance Education, communications with persons with disabilities are as effective as communications with others. Reedley College is in the process of acquiring the necessary hardware and software that is adaptable or can be made adaptable for access by persons with disabilities.

TTIP funds are being used to design and develop online courses and the Reedley College website so that students with disabilities are afforded maximum opportunity to access distance education resources "anytime, anywhere".

Our learning resources are being designed to provide accommodations such as closed captioning, descriptive narration, and content layout, which are accessible to person with disabilities using readily available assistive computer technology such as text readers.

TTIP funds are being used to provide course information in a variety of alternative formats such as sign language interpretation, closed captioning, descriptive narration, Braille, audio tapes, and large print. We are also working to provide accessible audio, video, multimedia, electronic chat rooms, and text components of our website and online courses.

Goal: Reedley College needs to (1) provide improved network access, (2) provide continued distance learning voice/audio service to all district sites, (3) bring technology-based learning resources into line with accessibility standards (Appendices F, G of CCCCO document), (4) improve speed and software capability of computer labs, (5) maintain campus network security at acceptable levels, (6) improve and increase faculty use of current instructional software, (7) improve access to up-to-date instructional software. TTIP funds will be supplemented by other funds (instructional equipment, block grant, and lottery) in order to accomplish some of these objectives.

#### I. Executive Summary


#### Introduction

This is the Compliance Review of the County of Fresno's Treasurer's Investment Pool Portfolio for the period ended September 30, 2002, pursuant to California Government Code 53646. The report has two primary objectives: (1) to provide information regarding portfolio holdings as to compliance with California Government Code Sections 53601 and 53635, as well as the County Treasurer's Statement of Investment Policy and (2) to detail portfolio characteristics of the portfolio's investment holdings.

#### **Quarterly Overview of Markets:**

During the quarter, the US Treasury yield curve flattened slightly, which primarily benefited holders of long-term bonds. At the September 24<sup>th</sup>, 2002 meeting, the Federal Reserve held short-term rates steady and conveyed a more optimistic tone than indicated earlier in the quarter when the economy was thought to be stumbling.

As indicated on the previous page, during the third quarter of 2002 yields decreased across the entire maturity spectrum. The yield on one-year Treasury Bonds decreased by 34 basis points to 1.72% for the quarter while the yield on thirty-year Treasury Bonds decreased by 85 basis points to 4.83%. The spread between the one-year Treasury and the 30-year Treasury ended the quarter at 311 basis points compared to a 362 basis point spread at the end of last quarter. During the quarter, Certificates of Deposit experienced an increase in yield for the 180-Day maturities but remained the same from last quarter in the yield for the 90-day maturities. Commercial Paper moved slightly lower in the 30-day maturities, by 2 basis points, but experienced a 2 basis point yield increase in the 90-day maturities to 1.76%.



#### **Portfolio Position**

The portfolio maintained a weighted maturity of less than one year. Keeping the portfolio within this maturity range minimized its exposure to potential interest rate shifts that can occur in the mid-maturity sectors of the yield curve. The portfolio was oriented towards high quality with 41.3% of the portfolio's assets invested in risk-free instruments.

#### Compliance with California Government Codes 53601 & 53635:

The Investment Portfolio is compliant with the California Government Codes 53601 and 53635.

#### Compliance with Treasury Investment Pool Statement of Investment Policy:

The Statement of Investment Policy is more stringent than the California Government Code. As of 9/30/02, the Treasurer's Investment Pool portfolio complied with its Statement of Investment Policy.

Please refer to the next section of the report for a more detailed evaluation of the portfolio in relationship to the California Government Code and the Treasurer's Investment Pool Statement of Investment Policy.

#### Portfolio characteristics

The Treasury Pool's portfolio characteristics are indicative of a plan exhibiting a high degree of quality with short-term maturities.

- As of 9/30/02, the portfolio had a market value of \$1.5 billion with an average dollarweighted quality between "AA+" and "AAA".
- Approximately 41.3% of the portfolio's assets are invested in securities with virtually no credit risk (i.e., US Treasuries, US Agencies, and cash).
- The dollar weighted average life of the pool is 330 days.
- 32.1% of the portfolio at cost matures within 30 days, 35.7% matures within 90 days, and 43.4% within 180 days (see Appendix for further details).

Based on its relative high quality and near-term liquidity, and assuming no significant changes to pool funding policies, the Treasury Investment Pool is well positioned to meet its expenditure requirements over the next six months.






#### Portfolio Breakdown by Investment Type (valued at cost)

In the case of T-Fund, the maturity on a repo transaction can extend from 1 to 180 days, and only Treasury issues are accepted as eligible collateral. The securities are either held at PNC Bank, which acts as custodian in the case of deliverable repo, or maintained in the fund's name at the subcustodian bank in the case of tri-party repo. In the case of deliverable repo, the market value of each security is priced in house and verified by BIMC (BlackRock Institutional Management Corporation) through the use of electronic data from sources such as Bloomberg and Telerate. For tri-party repo, the market value of each security is priced by the sub-custodian bank. Such prices are then verified by BIMC through the aforementioned electronic data sources.

The margin requirement on all repo is 102% and every trade is priced daily. Should the market value on a term repo trade fall below that level, the original dealer is required to post additional collateral to restore the needed margin. A 7-day put option exists on all term trades.

To determine the fund's net asset value per share, the daily valuation of portfolio securities is performed in accordance with BIMC's matrix pricing policy. BIMC uses a matrix pricing methodology that is based on pricing tiers called matrix codes and time cells that extend out the yield curve. The matrix codes represent how a security trades relative to other securities of the same type. Security prices (yields) represent the bid side of the market and are indicative of where that security is expected to be able to sell. The security prices come from a variety of sources. The broker/dealers used are major participants in specific money market areas (e.g. Garban Ltd. for repurchase agreements).

Portfolio valuations are performed daily. Data is checked for accuracy by portfolio managers who are members of the matrix team. This data feeds the fund accounting system that determines the fund's net asset value per share. The variance to a \$1.00/share is noted and reported to the portfolio manager daily. Depending on market conditions, the number of matrix codes and the spread between tiers may change. These factors are reviewed periodically and changed as conditions warrant.

#### **GLOSSARY OF TERMS**

Average Maturity - The weighted average time to principal repayment. Useful as an approximation of a single maturity where the mean or average maturity is used to describe the life of the instrument.

Bankers Acceptance - Money market instrument created from transactions involving foreign trade. In its simplest form, a bankers acceptance is a check, drawn on bank by an importer or exporter of goods.

Basis Point - 1/100th of 1%.

Certificate of Deposit - A short term money market instrument representing a receipt from a bank for a deposit at a specified rate of interest for a specified period of time.

Coupon Rate - The annual interest paid of a fixed-income instrument.

Commercial Paper - Money Market instrument representing a short-term promissory note of a large corporation at a specified rate of return for a specified period of time.

Current Yield - A bond's coupon expressed as a percentage of the bond's market price.

Discount Rate - The interest rate used to translate a future value into a present value.

**Duration** - Often times referred to as Macaulay's duration is a fixed income measure of price sensitivity to changes in yields. It is calculated by taking a weighted average of the time periods to receipt of the present value of the cash flows from a fixed income instrument.

Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation - Also known as "FHLMC" and Freddie Mac. FHLMC is a Private Corporation authorized by Congress, which sells notes, participation certificates and other mortgage obligations backed by mortgage pools.

Federal National Mortgage Association - Also known as "FNMA" and Fannie Mae. A private corporation which buys and sells residential mortgages insured by FHA or guaranteed by VA. FNMA also issues notes, participation certificates and other mortgage obligations backed by mortgage pools.

Government National Mortgage Corporation - Also known as "GNMA" and Ginnie Mae. A wholly-owned U.S. government corporation. GNMA issues and guarantees mortgage-backed securities which are backed by the full faith and credit of the United States Government.

Repurchase Agreement - Short term collateralized loan at a specified rate for a specified period, used by large investors as an alternative for cash investments.

Yield to Maturity - The internal rate of return of a standard bond held to maturity.

The District has recently received notice from the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office of an award of funding for the renewal of an Agriculture and Natural Resources Statewide Advisory Committee funded through the Vocational and Technical Education Act. Funding in the amount of \$28,000 has been awarded for meeting expenses, as well as support staff, to continue the Statewide Advisory Committee to act as a platform for developing policy recommendations that will aid in the formulation of the VTEA State Plan. #### Background:

The District has been notified of receipt of a grant for the Center for International Trade through the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office. The grant will provide for the development of an Industry Driven Regional Collaborative, which focuses its resources on short, intensive projects for international agricultural (ag) marketing. A mentoring Agricultural Export Coalition will be established to develop ten ag exporters from no-export to first-export orders in a two-year plan. Specialized, intensive training opportunities will be offered to 80 small agricultural companies and 500 participants. The Collaborative will organize and conduct Global E-commerce Train-the-Trainers Programs, internationalize faculty and business curricula, disseminate results of program, faculty, and course development on websites and at conferences and workshops, and establish an ag focus group to identify international trade needs and strategy, conduct symposiums regarding currency exchange policies and practical applications, and sponsor trade delegations to meet with buyers in the San Joaquin Valley. This is a two-year grant with funding as follows: 2002-03 - \$279,000; and 2003-04 - \$283,400.

#### Background:

With the passage of Measure E, the District staff has been developing strategies for the successful implementation of a Capital Facilities Plan, which now has \$161 million in local bond funds. The staff has developed a strategy that includes activities or projects for which action will be taken during the next three months. These projects have previously been identified as priority projects. The strategy also includes actions required for long-term facility planning activities with the development of a District Capital Facilities Plan, which extends through 2013. The development of the District Capital Facilities Plan will take up to 15 months.

#### Immediate Plan of Action:

The following activities or projects are scheduled for immediate action:

- a) Bid the next phase of the LAN/WAN Project for Fresno City College with the work scheduled for the summer of 2003.
- b) Develop the construction documents for Willow/International, Phase 1.
- c) Submit the Initial Project Proposal (IPP) to the State Chancellor's Office for Willow/International, Phase 2.
- d) Begin the identification and selection process for the acquisition of a site to be located in the "southeast."
- e) Solicit qualifications from architectural, engineering, program management, and other related specialty services consultants for all projects in the bond program.

- f) Select the architectural firm for the evaluation, design, and renovation of the Old Administration Building on the Fresno City College campus.
- g) Select the architectural firm for the design of new instructional classrooms at Reedley College.
- h) Contract with an engineering firm for the evaluation and development of options for additional parking to serve the Fresno City College campus.
- i) Contract with a program manager for the initial development of a planning and scheduling model. The scheduling model is designed to align the Capital Facilities Program with the funding stream that might be expected from the local bond, District revenues, state bonds, and the District's capital facilities priorities.
- j) Adopt by-laws for the Citizen's Oversight Committee.
- k) Appoint the Citizens' Oversight Committee.

#### What to Consider in Long-term Planning:

The District's Capital Facilities Master Plan needs to be developed beyond the normal five-year planning program required by the state. The District's Plan should extend through the life of the construction program funded by Measure E, which is anticipated to continue through 2013. The planning must take into account the timing of the bond issuances (\$16 million in 2003; \$50 million in 2005; \$50 million in 2008; and \$45 million in 2011). Additionally, the District wishes to take full advantage of the statewide bond money made available to community college districts. With the passage of Proposition 47, the District is anticipating the receipt of \$6.6 million over the next two years of funding. The state legislators have already approved a statewide bond measure to be placed on the March 2004 ballot from which the District would anticipate receiving some construction funding for Willow/International, Phase 1.

The Plan must also evaluate and incorporate student growth, state funding guidelines, instructional program changes, changes in technology usage, inflationary increases in construction costs, preliminary determinations of each project's scope of work, activities and time schedules for implementation, estimates of project budgets, and methods for reserving funds.

#### Long-term Planning Activities:

The planning activities required to develop a comprehensive District Capital Facilities Master Plan designed to leverage District bond funds with all other funding sources shall include the following activities:

- a) identification of a consultant to facilitate the development of a master-planning process;
- b) definition of scope for project cost projection and time schedule;
- c) determination of assumptions needed to prepare the District Capital Facilities Master Plan;
- d) projections of student growth by College or Center;
- e) Master Plan of facilities for each site or proposed site identified in the Capital Facilities Program;
- f) analysis of available funding (state and local) projected through the 2012 state bond elections; and
- g) approval and adoption of a District Capital Facilities Master Plan by the Board of Trustees.
