Mr. Manfredi stated that this is an important public relations issue that should have been resolved some time ago. He suggested that Dr. Yeager bring this forth to the county, city, and LAFCO and that the District do the necessary groundwork to ensure the expansion of the Sphere of Influence.

A motion was made by Mr. Manfredi and seconded by Mr. Smith that the Board of Trustees approve Resolution No. 02-97 recommending approval by LAFCO of expansion of the Madera City Sphere of Influence and ultimate annexation of the Madera State Center Community College Specific Plan Area.

Mr. Patterson suggested that the resolution should include wording that they complete the agreements that were made between the city, county, and District at the time we were making our determination as to where to locate the campus. Mr. Sharpe indicated the wording could be included; however, there is a short timeline as the City Council will be discussing this matter at their next meeting. The Board agreed that a cover letter addressing this issue could be included with the resolution. The motion carried unanimously.

Consideration of Quarterly Financial Status Report [02-98] Action Mr. Sharpe noted that on Page 2, Section 4 the District disclosed that long-term debt was incurred for low interest energy loans for the lighting retrofit.

A motion was made by Mr. Corona and seconded by Ms. Smith that the Board of Trustees acknowledge the Quarterly Financial Status Report (CCFS-311Q) as presented. The motion carried unanimously.

Consideration of Bids, Classroom Remodel, Clovis Center [02-99] Action A motion was made by Mr. Thonesen and seconded by Mr. Smith that the Board of Trustees award Bid #0102-19 in the amount of \$98,579.00 to Nova Abatement & Construction, Inc., the lowest responsible bidder for the Classroom Remodel at the Clovis Center, and authorize the Chancellor or Executive Vice Chancellor to sign an agreement on behalf of the District. The motion carried unanimously.

Consideration to Approve 2002-03 Decision Package Recommendations [02-100] Action Mr. Manfredi stated that he would prefer to hold off on fifty percent of the Decision Package recommendations due to the budget situation, as he fears we will have to cut back on part-time faculty. Mr. Sharpe responded that in no year has the District approached fifty percent by September.

Mr. Forhan suggested staff keep the Board updated on the use of the funds rather than prioritizing the recommendations for approval in September.

A motion was made by Mr. Corona and seconded by Mr. Thonesen that the Board of Trustees approve the 2002-03 Decision Package recommendations as presented. The motion carried unanimously.

Consideration of Resolution Ratifying Purchase Agreement, Willow/International Community College Center (Bains/ Dhillon Parcel) [02-101] Action A motion was made by Mr. Smith and seconded by Ms. Smith that the Board of Trustees:

- a) approve Resolution 02-101 Ratifying Agreement for the purchase of Real Property; and
- b) authorize the Chancellor or Executive Vice Chancellor to enter into a Purchase and Sale Agreement for approximately 17.74 acres, commonly known as 10423 North Willow Avenue, from Bains/Dhillon, et al.

Mr. Manfredi expressed his concern about the 110 acres in relationship to the discussion with the City of Fresno regarding a potential southeast Fresno site. He is supportive of the proposed location and of the dollars in the proposed bond issue. We are not abandoning Fresno City College, this is an excellent site, and we need to move forward. However, he is concerned with our

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Consideration of Resolution Ratifying Purchase Agreement, Willow/International Community College Center (Bains/ Dhillon Parcel) [02-101] (continued) relationship with the City of Fresno when we said we were cutting back the size of the campus population, but did not change the number of acres we are purchasing.

Mr. Sharpe stated that this particular purchase is the most important acreage on the campus as it represents the northeast corner of the campus where the instructional, academic, and support buildings will be located. Initial projections indicated approximately 15,000 students would attend this site with a full-time equivalency of 10,000. Based upon the City's revised general plan, the numbers were revised to a little over 10,000 enrollment with 6,500 full-time. The vast majority of a campus site is used for parking and that is dictated by zoning requirements by the City of Fresno. Mr. Sharpe added that he believes Mr. Manfredi's concerns have been expressed in the EIR and the scaling back of the campus.

Mr. Manfredi questioned if the 17 acres dictate the 100 acres. Mr. Sharpe explained the configuration of the three parcels and stated that the campus would be developed from the north to the south. The site could be reduced by doing away with the bottom quarter of the site, or selling a portion down the road if growth did not occur as anticipated; however the administration feels that the property will be needed in its entirety.

Mr. Manfredi questioned with the initial 15,000 headcount, what was the acreage. Mr. Sharpe replied that the acreage was the same, but there would have been greater use of multi-story buildings.

Mr. Manfredi asked the acreage of Fresno City College without Ratcliffe and Euless. Mr. Sharpe stated that the academic acreage at Fresno City College is 73.3 acres.

Mr. Thonesen stated that all development is not going to go to southeast Fresno. There is still a lot of land to be developed in northeast Fresno and we have to have the land on which to put our facilities. It would be shortsighted of us not to buy the entire site and then get landlocked like we are at Fresno City College.

Dr. Redwine stated that staff did present the District's plan to the City Council over two and one-half years ago, so the City was aware and did not bring up the master plan at that time.

Ms. Smith stated that we have to make decisions as they relate to our district and we need to do what is in the best interest of our students.

Another reason we do not have the existing site already expanded in Clovis is the argument that we needed the large acreage. If we only want 50-80 acres, then the existing site would be sufficient. Mr. Patterson still contends the existing site is the best site.

Mr. Manfredi requested that at a future time the Board have a presentation from the City of Fresno Planning Department on the General Plan.

Mr. Forhan stated that he was contacted by a member of the City Council regarding the site and explained that we were trying to meet the needs of our students. The fact is that Copper River has been approved, is going forward and will bring us thousands of students. Also, subdivision maps have already been filed for development between Copper River and the new site. It is going to happen and we need to serve our students.

#### Background:

Employees in the Classified Service have certain employment rights under California statutes. One provision requires a 30-day layoff notice to any permanent classified employee whose position is being eliminated or reduced. Due to State Budget reductions, District priorities, and internal reorganization, several areas are being recommended for classified employee layoffs. It should be noted that any employee in a layoff may have "bumping" rights as well as 39-month recall rights. In addition, many employees may be able to transition into open positions created as a result of the transition plan.

Funding for the District's CalWORKs program, which is a categorically funded program, is currently in question. In the January 2002 state budget CalWORKs Funding, except the childcare component, was eliminated. In the May Revise a portion of the CalWORKs funding, \$20 million, was added back in with the requirement that participating districts match the state allocation dollar-for-dollar with local funds. The dollar-for-dollar match has not been fully defined as of this time. In the absence of CalWORKs funding, the District would need to consider a layoff of employees in this program for lack of funds. The positions to be eliminated are:

- 5 Job Developer Positions
- 2 Workshop Facilitator Positions
- 1 Account Technician I Position
- 1 Program Development Assistant Position

## Fiscal Impact:

The fiscal impact is not known as of this time. The District is awaiting the requirements regarding state allocation dollar-for-dollar match.

Over the years, The Training Institute acquired administrative oversight of a number of categorical grants pertaining to the Center for Applied Competitive Technologies (CACT), Advanced Transportation Technology (ATT) and Import/Export. The structure of The Training Institute has been under review during the past year, and the following changes have been agreed upon to take place effective July 1, 2002. The CACT and ATT grants will now be the responsibility of the Associate Dean of Instruction for Applied Technology at Fresno City College. The grants related to Import/Export will be the responsibility of the District Vice Chancellor for Educational Services and Grants. The remaining portion of the Training Institute is moving to the Manchester Educational Resource Center and will focus exclusively on "not for credit" fee-based classes and contract education for business and industry. The downsizing of The Training Institute, both in terms of program and responsibilities, reduces the workload to the extent that the administration is proposing the elimination of the following three positions due to lack of work and/or funds at The Training Institute:

- 1 Account Technician II Position
- 1 Receptionist Position
- 1 50% Department Secretary Position (Vacant)

## Fiscal Impact:

The cost savings is approximately \$136,000.00.

The job duties of the Research Assistant at the State Center Community College Foundation office no longer meet the needs of the Foundation office. Due to lack of work for the Research Assistant position and the need for the duties that are included in the Administrative Assistant job description, the administration is recommending the position of Research Assistant in the State Center Community College Foundation office be eliminated and the position of Administrative Assistant be created in the Foundation office. This change will better assist the Foundation in meeting its goals as well as the needs of our District.

## Fiscal Impact:

The cost savings is approximately \$5,000.00.

Fresno City College is proposing the elimination of a vacant Account Technician I position and upgrading this position to an Account Technician II. There is a need to upgrade the duties and responsibilities of this position and the Account Technician II job description aligns very well with the identified needs. The Account Technician II position will further assist the Accountant Auditor position in categorical areas.

The current collective bargaining agreement covering classified employees contains provisions for implementing layoff in the event the Board determines it is a necessity.

## Fiscal Impact:

The fiscal impact is approximately \$4,500.00 increase included in Fresno City College budget.

The utilization of proper English principles in the proper and effective writing of reports utilized in the criminal justice system.
- 2) Culture, Film, and Media, 3 units. Advisory: Eligibility for English 125 and 126 or English 153 or ESL 67 and 68 recommended. Introduction to the discipline of visual anthropology. Class will explore and critique historical and contemporary cross-cultural images (moving and still) as well as cultural exhibits. Includes an introduction to different anthropological methods and perspectives and how they influence ethnographic filmmaking as well as interpretations of images with reference to ethnicity and gender in the contemporary and mainstream media.
- 3) Introduction to Archeology: Methods and Theory, 3 units. Advisory: Eligibility for English 125 and 126 or English 153 or ESL 67 and 68 and Math 101 recommended. Introduction to the discipline of archaeology. How modern archaeology uncovers the past from the material remains left behind by past human cultures. Includes an introduction to contemporary methods

of data collection, analysis, and interpretation with case studies and examples from archaeological research around the world.

## 2. Special Studies 77

#### a. Applied Technology Division

#### 1) Offered Fall 2001

- a) Background Investigation, 1 unit, credit/no credit only. Prerequisite: Open to all law enforcement agencies including police, sheriff, corrections, probation and AJ 70. Basic techniques and procedures for background investigators.
- b) Call Diversion Training, 3 units, credit/no credit only. Prerequisite: community service officer. Train community service officers to become complaint/dispatchers for non-emergency calls.
- c) Drug Influence in a Custodial Setting, 0.5 units, credit/no credit only. Prerequisite: Currently employed in a public safety agency. Train students to recognize persons under the influence of alcohol, cocaine, depressants, hallucinogens, marijuana, opiates, phencyclidine and stimulants. Students are instructed in substance identification, physiological symptoms, objective signs and basic report writing elements for strip search authorization forms.
- d) Force Option Simulator, 0.1 unit, credit/no credit only. Prerequisite: Sworn peace officer. Course is designed to place officers into situations that require them to make use of force decisions. Officers must utilize communication skills and possibly a variety of force options, depending on the video scenario.
- e) Officer Update #6, 0.2 units, credit/no credit only. Prerequisite: Sworn peace officer or AJ 70. This is an 8.4 course designed to update officers in CPR/first aid, officer safety, clets & firearms.

#### 2) Offered Spring 2002

- a) Advanced Officer/Kingsburg Reserve #7, 0.5 units, credit/no credit only. Prerequisite: Reserve officer with law enforcement. Class is designed to meet the bi-yearly 25-hour training requirements for reserve officers.
- b) Carbine & Lateral Vascular Neck Restraint, 0.2-1.0 units, credit/no credit only. Prerequisite: Sworn Peace Officer. Provide students with the information and hands-on experience needed to effectively use the carbine rifle. The lateral vascular neck restraint portion of the class will deal with the proper application of the LVNR.
- c) EMT-Paramedic Training Program, 30 units. Prerequisite: Valid emergency medical technician basic certificate. Advisory: Eligibility for English 125 and 126 or English 153 or ESL 67 and 68 and Math 101 recommended. Course is designed to produce qualified and competent EMT-Paramedics who are educated and trained in all elements of prehospital advanced life support to the acutely ill or injured patients and whose scope of practice is in accordance with Title 22 of the California Code of Regulations.
- d) Field Tactics II for Probation Officers, 0.5 units, credit/no credit only. Prerequisite: Employed by a public safety agency or completion of AJ 285, 286, 280, or 270. Course focuses on field tactics for the field probation officer. Areas covered include radio procedures, use of force and legal aspects, explosive recognition, and low speed driving.
- e) First Aid and CPR Update/Interpersonal Communications, 0.2 units, credit/no credit only. Prerequisite: Sworn Peace Officer. Course is designed to update the student's first aid/CPR certification and to improve the student's communication skills. The focus of the communications skills portion will be on interpersonal communications.
- f) Patrol Rifle, 0.3 units, credit/no credit only. Prerequisite: Sworn peace officer. Course is designed to give officers a total of 20.8 hours of intensive training with the M-16 carbine rifle. The training will focus on the component parts of the rifle, tactical considerations for

- deployment, field of fire, ballistic considerations and weapons proficiency as demonstrated through qualifications and live-fire scenarios.
- g) Police Driving Simulator, 0.1 unit, credit/no credit only. Prerequisite: Sworn peace officer. Course is designed to review defensive driving and emergency vehicle operation principles. Through the use of the simulators, students are placed into dangerous driving scenarios in a controlled training environment. Students will experience the results of their vehicle operations decisions without risk of injury.

- 5) Madera County EMS Continuing Education, 0.5 units, credit/no credit only. Prerequisite: Permission of the instructor. Course will provide all Madera County firefighters with refresher and re-certification on a wide variety of relevant subjects. Training sessions will be taught by qualified instructors, professional firefighters and emergency medical technicians.
- 6) Madera County Firefighter Continuing Education, Module B, 0.3 units, credit/no credit only. Prerequisite: Permission of the instructor. Course will provide all Madera County firefighters with refresher and re-certification on a wide variety of relevant topics. Training sessions are developed and taught by paid professional firefighters.
- 7) North Central FPD Firefighter Continuing Education, Module A, 0.5 units, credit/no credit only. Prerequisite: Permission of the instructor. Course is designed to maintain a high level of basic skills for firefighting operations. The training will be provided by in-house specialists in specific areas.
- 8) Troubleshooting HVAC Electrical Diagrams, 1 unit. Advisory: Understanding of electrical fundamentals is required. Field experience troubleshooting heating, ventilating, and air conditioning (HVAC) equipment is recommended. Course provides a brief review of basic electrical principles, a thorough description of the electrical components typically used in HVAC systems and the use of wiring diagrams as a diagnostic tool.

#### c. Effective Summer 2002

Seasonal Firefighter Returnee Academy, Module B, 1 unit, credit/no credit only. Prerequisite: Permission of the instructor. Course provides instruction in wildland fire ground safety and skills for returning firefighters. Course will also cover refresher training for hazardous materials first responder, emergency medical technician, and defensive driving techniques.

Designed for students with barriers to employment who have successfully completed the DIVE and SWIM components of the WAVE program. Emphasis is on active job search, which includes completion of resume portfolio, submittal of job applications, seeking and pursuing job leads, interviews, follow-up on interviews, securing and retaining employment.

## b. Effective Summer 2002

Summer Placement Labor and Site Hours (SPLASH), 3 units, credit/no credit only. Designed for students with barriers to employment including but not limited to disabilities, CalWorks, lack of employment history, and lack of job seeking skills. #### Background:

The focus of this project is to address three components which (1) develop articulated curriculum models, (2) create multi-measure assessments, and (3) provide staff development programs for each of three industry sector subgroups—heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC), cabinetry and carpentry.

The program begins with research and compilation of resources and materials covering industry sector standards, emerging technology standards, academic content standards, labor market information, generic workplace and employability skills standards, and work-based learning components and standards. These resources and materials are used to train leadership teams which then develop action plans for their schools to embed articulated, work-based learning programs in grades 7-14+ curriculum.

This year's activities include staff development for the middle school, high school and college segments of the project on the processes used to build effective articulation programs. Assessment, evaluation and dissemination of the articulation processes developed and program results, based on data from practitioner and student surveys, will be the focus of year III activities.

#### Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve entering into year two renewal for the Innovative Practices Work-Based Learning Grant in the amount of \$123,892 for the period June 1, 2002 – May 31, 2003, and authorize the Vice Chancellor of Educational Services and Planning to sign the agreement to enter into the contract with the California Department of Education on behalf of the District.

#### I. Executive Summary


#### Introduction

This is the Compliance Review of the County of Fresno's Treasurer's Investment Pool Portfolio for the period ended March 31, 2002, pursuant to California Government Code 53646. The report has two primary objectives: (1) to provide information regarding portfolio holdings as to compliance with California Government Code Sections 53601 and 53635, as well as the County Treasurer's Statement of Investment Policy and (2) to detail portfolio characteristics of the portfolio's investment holdings.

#### **Quarterly Overview of Markets:**

During the quarter, US Treasury yields increased across the entire yield curve. For the quarter, coupon income accrued on bonds was offset by the decline in bond prices resulting in little or no return in the broad US bond market. At the February 2, 2002 meeting, citing improved market conditions, the Federal Reserve kept rates unchanged for the first time in a year, perhaps a prelude to tighter monetary policy. Shorter-term Treasuries generated the strongest results among Treasuries over the latest quarter.

As indicated on the previous page, during the first quarter of 2002 yields increased across the entire maturity spectrum. The yield on one-year Treasury Bonds increased by 53 basis points to 2.70% for the quarter while the yield on thirty-year Treasury Bonds remained nearly unchanged at 5.45%. The spread between the one-year Treasury and the 30-year Treasury ended the quarter at 275 basis points compared to a 313 basis point spread at the end of last quarter. During the quarter, Certificates of Deposit experienced an increase in yield for both the 90-Day and 180-day maturities. Commercial Paper moved slightly lower in the 30-day maturities, by 1 basis point, but experienced a 10 basis point yield increase in the 90-day maturities by 10 basis points to 1.90%.



#### Portfolio Position

The portfolio maintained a weighted maturity of less than one year. Keeping the portfolio within this maturity range minimized its exposure to potential interest rate shifts that can occur in the mid-maturity sectors of the yield curve. The portfolio was oriented towards high quality with 35.6% of the portfolio's assets invested in risk-free instruments.

#### Compliance with California Government Codes 53601 & 53635:

The Investment Portfolio is compliant with the California Government Codes 53601 and 53635.

#### Compliance with Treasury Investment Pool Statement of Investment Policy:

The Statement of Investment Policy is more stringent than the California Government Code. As of 3/31/02, the Treasurer's Investment Pool portfolio complied with its Statement of Investment Policy.

Please refer to the next section of the report for a more detailed evaluation of the portfolio in relationship to the California Government Code and the Treasurer's Investment Pool Statement of Investment Policy.

#### Portfolio characteristics

The Treasury Pool's portfolio characteristics are indicative of a plan exhibiting a high degree of quality with short-term maturities.

- As of 3/31/01, the portfolio had a market value of \$1.5 billion with an average dollarweighted quality between "AA+" and "AAA".
- Approximately 35.6% of the portfolio's assets are invested in securities with virtually no credit risk (i.e., US Treasuries, US Agencies, and cash).
- The dollar weighted average life of the pool is 332 days.
- 36.6% of the portfolio at cost matures within 30 days, 39.7% matures within 90 days, and 42.6% within 180 days (see Appendix for further details).

Based on its relative high quality and near-term liquidity, and assuming no significant changes to pool funding policies, the Treasury Investment Pool is well positioned to meet its expenditure requirements over the next six months.








#### Portfolio Breakdown by Maturity Date (valued at cost)

#### **GLOSSARY OF TERMS**

Average Maturity - The weighted average time to principal repayment. Useful as an approximation of a single maturity where the mean or average maturity is used to describe the life of the instrument.

Bankers Acceptance - Money market instrument created from transactions involving foreign trade. In its simplest form, a bankers acceptance is a check, drawn on bank by an importer or exporter of goods.

Basis Point - 1/100th of 1%.

Certificate of Deposit - A short term money market instrument representing a receipt from a bank for a deposit at a specified rate of interest for a specified period of time.

Coupon Rate - The annual interest paid of a fixed-income instrument.

Commercial Paper - Money Market instrument representing a short-term promissory note of a large corporation at a specified rate of return for a specified period of time.

Current Yield - A bond's coupon expressed as a percentage of the bond's market price.

Discount Rate - The interest rate used to translate a future value into a present value.

**Duration** - Often times referred to as Macaulay's duration is a fixed income measure of price sensitivity to changes in yields. It is calculated by taking a weighted average of the time periods to receipt of the present value of the cash flows from a fixed income instrument.

Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation - Also known as "FHLMC" and Freddie Mac. FHLMC is a Private Corporation authorized by Congress, which sells notes, participation certificates and other mortgage obligations backed by mortgage pools.

Federal National Mortgage Association - Also known as "FNMA" and Fannie Mae. A private corporation which buys and sells residential mortgages insured by FHA or guaranteed by VA. FNMA also issues notes, participation certificates and other mortgage obligations backed by mortgage pools.

Government National Mortgage Corporation - Also known as "GNMA" and Ginnie Mae. A wholly-owned U.S. government corporation. GNMA issues and guarantees mortgage-backed securities which are backed by the full faith and credit of the United States Government.

#### Background:

In November 1979 the voters passed Proposition 4 (Gann), which effectively places an appropriations limit on each public entity within the State. The appropriations limit base was derived from the amount an entity had appropriated in its budget during the 1978-79 fiscal year. The base is annually adjusted upward in accordance with the inflationary allowance relating to the Consumer Price Index, as well as by population increase. Under Senate Bill 1352, enacted by the Legislature to implement Proposition 4, it is necessary that each public entity establish its appropriations limit for a given year prior to the last day of the previous fiscal year. It is further necessary that the governing body provide fifteen (15) days in which the public may examine the documentation used in arriving at the appropriations limit. Further legislation modified the method for computing the limit but the notification provisions remain the same.

The enclosed Resolution is intended to notify the public that the appropriations limit for this district for 2002-03 has been established and will be officially approved at a regular meeting of the Board to be held on June 25, 2002.

The 2002-03 project house is to be located at 1589 Bullard Avenue, Clovis, and shall consist of a single-family residence with construction costs not to exceed \$70,000. The project would commence in the Fall Term and be completed by the end of the 2002-03 school year.

#### Background:

In August 1999 the Board of Trustees awarded a contract bid jointly with the Clovis Unified School District for the lease of copiers on a cost-per-copy basis. The current contract, which has been successful in reducing our copier costs, expires on June 30. Based upon the differing needs of the two organizations, the administration has gone out to bid based solely upon the requirements of our District. All local copier vendors were invited to participate in the bid process for Bid #0102-22, Cost Per Copy Copiers, Districtwide. This new contract will provide for the placement of digital copy machines that will have the ability to be networked for increased productivity. Additionally, the recommended vendor has proposed a single per copy cost regardless of the size of the copier. Combined with the advantage of no minimum per month charges, this proposed contract will have the ability to reduce costs further during summer and holiday periods as well as simplify the accounts payable process. This proposed contract will have a duration of three years and will allow for the use of copiers for all departments on a straight cost-per-copy basis. The per copy charge covers all maintenance and supply costs for the machines with the exception of paper. Funding for this contract will be provided by General Fund monies and various Categorical Programs as identified for copier needs.

Bids were received from ten (10) vendors. Careful analysis has determined the proposal from Stanton Office Machines for \$0.0149 per copy for all ranges of Minolta digital equipment to be the lowest responsive bid. Demonstrations and reference checks have shown this equipment to be reliable, easy to use and well placed.

#### Background:

The Personnel Commission at its meeting May 13, 2002, held a public hearing regarding the proposed budget for 2002-03. Jon Sharpe and Randy Rowe represented the State Center Community College District. The Director of Classified Personnel presented a budget of \$425,000.00 which represented an increase of 60% for 2002-03.

During the May 13<sup>th</sup> public hearing the administration stated the District's opposition to the proposed budget. The administration's position is to maintain a status quo budget with provisions for salary and benefit increases due to contractual agreements. A member of the Personnel Commission proposed a budget of \$350,000.00. This is an increase of \$85,000.00 from the 2001-02 budget and a decrease of \$75,000.00 from the Director's proposal for 2002-03. The administration stated its opposition to this budget increase and restated the administration's position for a status quo budget for 2002-03. Following the public hearing the Personnel Commission voted to approve the \$350,000.00 budget for 2002-03 (increase of \$85,000.00).

The Director's recommended budget included the addition of three positions: 1) a new Personnel Assistant, 2) a new Administrative Assistant and 3) a new Personnel Technician. The budget adopted by the Personnel Commission for 2002-03 includes two permanent full-time positions: 1) a new Personnel Assistant and 2) a new Personnel Technician. The administration does not concur with the budgetary increase and the addition of two new positions for several reasons. Due to budgetary restraints, the District is trying to maintain budgets at present levels. The District currently has a vacant position (retirement) which when filled can assist the Commission on an as needed basis. Also the Director of Human Resources position has included in its job description the ability to assist the Director of Classified Personnel with his duties. Lastly, the transition plan of the Personnel Commission will be completed within two years, and therefore, the workload will actually decrease in time.

The process for including the Personnel Commission budget in the 2002-03 District budget is as follows:

The Personnel Commission will forward their adopted budget (\$350,000.00) to the County Superintendent of Schools for action according to Education Code 88073. The District may object or challenge the Personnel Commission budget by submitting its objection to the County Superintendent of Schools. If the County Superintendent of Schools proposes to reject the budget as submitted by the Commission, he/she shall, within 30 days after the Commission's submission of the budget, hold a public hearing on the proposed rejection within the affected District. He shall have informed both the Commission and the Governing Board of the date, time and place of the hearing. He may after such public hearing either reject, or, with the concurrence of the Commission, amend the proposed budget. In the absence of agreement between the Personnel Commission and the County Superintendent, the budget of the preceding year shall determine the amount of the new budget, and the items of expenditure shall be determined by the Commission.

#### Fiscal Impact:

Dependent upon final budget outcome (approximately \$85,000 increase).

It is recommended the Board of Trustees direct the Chancellor or her designee to present to County Superintendent of Schools the District's written objection to the Personnel Commission's proposed budget.

The governing board member election is to be held and conducted within the territorial jurisdiction of the above-named college district pursuant to the authority of Section 5340 of the Education Code to be consolidated with other elections, including school board member elections to be held that same day and within the same territory, for the purpose of electing THREE qualified persons to fill the offices of board members whose terms expire on the first Friday in December of this year. The above-named college district shall be established as a Special Election District and the basic unit for conducting the election shall be the elementary school district in the territory, and the precincts, polling places, voting booths, and polling hours thereof shall be the same within the Special Election District as the precincts, polling places, voting booths, and polling hours of any other election consolidated therewith.

The governing board hereof hereby orders and consents to a consolidated election pursuant to and in accordance with Elections Code Section 10400, et seq., and Education Code §§ 5323, 5340, and 5342.

The current policies of the above-named college district regarding board member selection in case of tie vote and charges to candidates of board member elections are on file with the Fresno County Elections Department, 2221 Kern Street, Fresno, CA 93721.

WHEREAS, the governing board may estimate as a cost to the candidate the total cost of printing, handling, translating and mailing the candidate's statement, including costs incurred as a result of complying with the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the governing board hereof determines as follows:

- 1. The cost of printing, handling and mailing candidate statements, including cost incurred as a result of complying with the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended, shall be charged to and borne by the candidate.
- 2. The candidate's statement shall not exceed 200 words and additional materials may not be sent to the voters.

Each candidate shall pay at the time the statement is filed an amount determined by the Registrar of Voters to be the share of the increased cost of the election due to the candidate's option to file a candidate's statement pursuant to Section 10012 of the Elections Code.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the district administration cause a copy of this RESOLUTION to be filed with the Fresno County Superintendent of Schools and a copy with the Fresno County Elections Department.

Any member of the governing board who will be succeeded by a winner of the runoff election and whose term would expire before the winner of the runoff election would be determined shall continue to

discharge the duties of his office until his successor has qualified. The runoff election shall be called and conducted substantially in the manner provided in Chapter 3 (commencing with Section 5300) of the Education Code, provided, that the governing board shall determine the adjustments of the time requirements prescribed therein which would be necessary in order to conduct the runoff election.

## Reedley College Draft Strategic Plan June, 2002

This strategic plan is the result of one and one-half years of work by the Reedley College staff and representatives of the Reedley College service area. Immediately following is a brief summary of the strategic direction of the college, broken down into seven major areas of focus. Part II sets forth "Goals and Objectives" for each of the seven areas. These are further explained in later sections, which provide background on the planning (III) and a narrative expansion of the goals and objectives (IV).

These goals and objectives are intended to guide the strategic direction of the college year by year for the next three years. Each year the college will review the goals and the key performance indicators associated with each goal. The college will revise the goals to reflect accomplishments and changes in direction. ### I: Seven Strategic Directions, In Brief

- 1. Public and Private Partnerships—Reedley College recognizes the importance of partnerships with individual students of all ages as well as with businesses, government agencies, community organizations, and minority communities. The college strives to strengthen current partnerships and develop new ones.
- 2. College Climate and Integrating with the Community—Reedley College strives to increase success within its organization by maintaining an enhanced working environment, a high degree of esprit de corps, and pride of association within its faculty and staff, and to actively share this sense of the college with the surrounding community. Reedley College values its diversity and the diversity of the community it serves, and seeks to promote a spirit of welcome and inclusion both on and off campus.
- 3. Teaching and Learning—Reedley College is committed to serving all students through student-centered teaching and learning, from students who are under-prepared for college work to those who are able to compete at the top academic levels. The college seeks to provide every student the opportunity to succeed.
- **4. Student Services**—Reedley College is committed to effective enrollment management and providing support services to ensure that students are successful in achieving their educational goals.
- **5. Planning and Assessment**—Reedley College plans to develop a coordinated, systematic approach to gathering and refining data for decision making. It seeks to become a data-informed and data-managed organization.

- **6. Technology**—Reedley College will advance its computing and teaching infrastructure in a way that recognizes the critical role of technology to the success of the college, its students, faculty and staff.
- 7. Infrastructure—Reedley College is committed to managing its physical facilities to get maximum efficient utilization from existing facilities, as well as to developing facilities needed to sustain the college in the future.

### II: Goals and Objectives

### 1. Public and Private Partnerships

Reedley College has working relationships with individuals and organizations. Some are formal, some are informal, but all are important. These relationships help the college succeed in its work. Partnerships with students are fundamental. Partnerships with businesses increase the college's resources and credibility. Partnerships with community organizations and minority groups benefit the college in many valuable ways. Reedley College knows that strengthening partnerships of all kinds translates to more student success.

Reedley College aims to be the life-long learning and cultural center for the entire service area by building partnerships with individuals and organizations.

Strategic Objectives

- 1.1. Reedley College strives to be a valued and thoroughly utilized resource to all members of its service area—from very young school children to elderly adults.
- 1.2. Reedley College's programs will further develop productive, interactive working relationships with business, community, and government organizations in the community, the state and the nation.
- 1.3. Reedley College will develop new partnerships with minority community organizations; these partnerships will enrich Reedley College and improve the college's success with special population students.
- 1.4. As a result of these partnerships, Reedley College students will in turn benefit from new internships, service-learning placements, and work experiences within organizations in the communities of the college's service area.

## 2. Enhancing the College Climate and Integrating with the Community

Reedley College seeks to be a model community characterized by a high sense of esprit de corps and pride of association with all who comprise the college and its communities.

Reedley College seeks to enhance collegiality among staff, and to promote acceptance of diversity in all of its campus endeavors and its off-campus outreach.

#### Strategic Objectives

- 2.1. Reedley College will educate its students and staff in the challenges faced by individuals with disabilities, and how best to accommodate disabilities.
- 2.2. Reedley College's relationship to its communities is vital, so the college seeks to communicate with its public by means of the most effective public media for each situation.
- 2.3. Reedley College strives to promote the value of diversity both in and outside the classroom and within the larger community.
- 2.4. Reedley College seeks to extend its values into the community by extending itself through communication networks and through active participation with the diverse cultures that live and work in its service area.
- 2.5. Reedley College will continue to present itself to the public through a public access web site that promotes community participation in the college life.
- 2.6. Reedley College will continue to celebrate diversity and its diverse communities through the arts—theatre, music, and graphic arts—and through public events and festivals.
- 2.7. Reedley College will encourage decision making through shared governance and administration.
- 2.8. Reedley College will support professional development activities that foster team building and unity among employees.

## 3. Teaching and Learning

Reedley College's students of all ages come through the college's open door with a wide range of preparedness—from those not yet ready for college work to those who could be admitted into the university system. The college's goal and commitment is to assist and to challenge all these students to achieve their academic goals.

## Reedley College sets as a goal to be recognized as a progressive student-centered teaching and learning institution.

### Strategic Objectives

- 3.1. Reedley College will identify ways to improve student retention, student persistence and improved performance in basic skills.
- 3.2. The college will systematically develop and implement new or improved teaching methodologies.
- 3.3. The college seeks continually to increase the number and variety of enrollment opportunities.
- 3.4. The college will upgrade, revise and expand its instructional offerings as necessary to respond to new or changed community needs.
- 3.5. The college will develop and implement a uniform set of institutional expectations of students and academic guarantees for students.

- 3.6. The college will develop and implement a procedure for tracking the success of students after graduation, transfer, or program completion.
- 3.7. The college will revise the freshman year experience to encourage greater rates of success for first-year students.
- 3.8. Reedley College will support the academic needs of students with disabilities through in-service training for teaching staff on proven and effective teaching strategies for those students.
- 3.9. The college will develop and implement a plan for the improvement and expansion of library and learning resources services, including online services.

#### 4. Student Services

Reedley College's various student services provide support for students beyond the classroom that is vital to student success; tutoring services, financial aid, and counseling are examples of these services.

Reedley College strives to provide all the services its students need to succeed at the college.

Strategic Objectives

- 4.1. Reedley College aims to recognize the unique characteristics of its students and to respond to their special needs.
- 4.2. Reedley College aims to actively listen to the needs of students and to use student input—satisfaction surveys and other formal listening approaches—to improve its services to students.
- 4.3. Reedley College will develop programs to ensure that entering students understand both what a student and what the college each must commit to the educational experience for a student to succeed.
- 4.4. Reedley College seeks to support each student in achieving his/her goal—whether it is to transfer, to earn a certificate, license or credential, to graduate, or simply to seek enrichment.
- 4.5. Reedley College will develop a comprehensive outreach and recruitment plan that responds to demographic trends and increases public awareness of the college in underserved segments of the community.

## 5. Planning and Assessment

Reedley College recognizes that systematically gathered and analyzed information is an important tool for improvement of the college over time, and commits to collecting and managing data in a way that will support the goals and objectives of this plan.

Reedley College seeks to increasingly base strategic decisions on the analysis of systematically collected data, and to integrate resource allocation with planning.

#### Strategic Objectives

- 5.1. Reedley College will utilize data available within the management information system and other available resources and records to support and guide its strategic direction.
- 5.2. Reedley College will efficiently coordinate the collection and interpretation of key data to ensure that the entire college and community benefit from the insights gained.
- 5.3. Reedley College will present college-wide statistics in ways that inform the district governing board, its faculty and staff, and its communities about conditions at the college, and will benchmark institutional data in the context of relevant local, state and national data.
- 5.4. The college will tie its strategic planning efforts to its budgeting process and to other institutional resource-allocation processes.
- 5.5. The college will establish and develop a systematic method of benchmarking the relative progress and success of programs and procedures.
- 5.6. The college will improve its monitoring of faculty and staff evaluations and its mentoring activities to ensure that the efforts of individual staff fulfill the objectives of the college's mission and strategic plan.

## 6. Information Technology

Information technology has become the most essential and widely applied tool of the contemporary world. At Reedley College it includes both computing and networking as well as computer-driven teaching tools and applications. The college recognizes the critical role technology plays in the strategic direction of the college.

Reedley College will use and support its computing and technology infrastructure in a way that recognizes the critical role of information technology in the success of the college and its students, faculty and staff.

## Strategic Objectives

- 6.1. Reedley College will use its technology through administration, computer and media services staff, and the technology advisory committee to ensure a stable teaching and work environment that recognizes the critical role computing plays in all aspects of the college enterprise—management, teaching, learning, and communication.
- 6.2. Reedley College will provide sufficient technology staff to manage the campus-wide computing infrastructure, to provide adequate training to students and staff, to support the network, and to maintain secure access to the Internet.

- 6.3. Reedley College will provide regular scheduled replacement of equipment and software, and get maximum use from older equipment through redeployment.
- 6.4. Reedley College will provide training for all users—basic training for all users, intermediate training for selected groups in new and limited applications, and advanced or specialized training when needed.
- 6.5. Reedley College will provide sufficient technology resources to enable all faculty and staff to become proficient in using information systems in management, teaching, learning, and communication.
- 6.6. Reedley College will continue to upgrade its website to provide links to the District Office, the North Centers, Fresno City College, the Internet and Intranet, and a common link to all online courses.
- 6.7. Reedley College seeks to make computing accessible to all students including students with disabilities over the next three years.

#### 7. Infrastructure

The physical plant and facilities of Reedley College are a major public investment for the college, the community and the state. Reedley College recognizes the importance of effective management of this significant asset.

Reedley College will provide adequate space and modern, well-maintained, state-of-the art facilities.

### Strategic Objectives

- 7.1. The District and Reedley College will seek increased sources of funding to fully implement the Five-Year Construction and Scheduled Maintenance Plan.
- 7.2. Reedley College understands the importance of coordinating physical plant expansion with the college district and will work with the district in an atmosphere of collaboration to take full advantage of the district's planning activities and resources.
- 7.3. District Operations and Reedley College will maintain an inventory and condition of buildings, property, grounds, and fixed equipment as a tool for benchmarking the physical plant status.
- 7.4. In anticipation of the retirement of the special revenue bond in 2004, the college will conduct a comprehensive feasibility study for the residence hall program.
- 7.5. The college will make the campus accessible to persons with disabilities in all future construction.

## III. Background and Planning Framework

Reedley College opened its doors as Reedley Junior College in September 1926. In 1946, it recognized its role as a comprehensive community college. The mission of Reedley College is to offer an accessible, student-centered educational environment which provides high-quality learning opportunities essential in meeting the challenges of a diverse, global community.

At Reedley College, we believe that people's lives are enriched in an atmosphere of intellectual curiosity, personal integrity and individual accomplishment. The college furnishes experiences designed to promote critical thinking, enhance cultural literacy, and foster awareness of the interdependence of all persons and their environment. Reedley College is committed to maintaining a highly qualified staff of educators and support personnel who reflect the diversity of our unique community. We embrace a flexible attitude toward change and encourage the spirit of innovation. The goal of the college is to develop each student's full potential as well as respect for self and others. To this end, the college provides comprehensive curriculum offerings, lifelong learning opportunities, counseling, and educational services.

Reedley College is one of two colleges in the State Center Community College District. The District encompasses a 5,500 square mile area and 17 unified and high school districts. The campus encompasses 420 acres which includes the school's 300-acre farm adjacent to the main campus, and the college manages an 800-acre demonstration forest in the nearby Sierra Nevada mountains. As of 2000-2001 Reedley College registers more than 10,000 students annually. The college offers associate degree programs, the first two years of a college transfer program, and a variety of occupational certificates and short-term training programs.

In this planning cycle, Reedley College is concentrating efforts in seven broad areas of concern. In a college- and community-wide planning process, these seven areas emerged as critical for the immediate and long-term future of the college:

- Develop public and private partnerships,
- Enhance the college climate and integration with the community,
- Improve teaching and learning,
- Improve student services,
- Improve planning and assessment,
- Improve the use of technology, and
- Improve the infrastructure.

Additionally, the college must allow for the eventual independence of the North Centers—Madera, Clovis and Oakhurst—and must acknowledge the need for the

development of a separate but related planning process that addresses their distinct needs. While most of the current plan addresses the needs of the southern portion of State Center Community College District, provision is also made for a planning process that will address the North Centers.

The resultant plan sets forth goals and strategic objectives as a foundation for development during this planning period. Working with strategic planning consultant Burt Peachy, the college formed a planning team and seven committees to identify approaches to improvement in these seven areas. A strategic plan is a statement of intent and goals. It sets a target toward which the institution aims. This plan sets an agenda for change over a period of at least three years, and continuously marks progress, while it evolves with change. At the end of each year in the cycle, goals are revisited and evaluated. At the end of each assessment, the goals and objectives are adjusted to reflect the new realities and new aspirations.

As part of the initial planning process Reedley College shared this plan with the community for review and comment, and revised the plan based on that review. The College is part of the community in a way that makes feedback and review essential to the success of the strategic plan. The college values the participation of the community in developing and affirming its planning direction.

## North Centers-Madera, Clovis, Oakhurst

In the area of planning, North Centers staff and administration implemented the first phase of a planning process in January, 2002. During the spring semester, a mission statement, core values statement, and three-year goals will have been developed. The goals will be utilized during the fall semester of 2002 to develop a three-year plan for the North Centers. This plan will then be matched with the resources available from the District during the spring of 2003. The first year of actual implementation of the three-year plan will be the 2003-2004 academic year. This will set up a cycle for updating the plan each fall semester and matching it to resources during the spring semester for the following academic year.

## IV. Narrative Expansion of The Goals and Objectives

Reedley College seeks to develop new *public and private partnerships*. The college serves the communities of south Fresno County and northern Tulare County. It regularly provides teaching and learning opportunities for community members—families, school children, college-age students, working adults, members of the retirement community, businesses, government agencies and community organizations. The college seeks to strengthen existing partnerships and to develop new partnerships with community groups.

Academic and vocational programs develop relationships with businesses and government agencies. The college's vocational programs provide businesses, government, and community agencies with easy access to new employees, and these relationships enhance program resources and effectiveness by means of equipment donations and other gifts from community partners. Moreover, the college's academic programs prepare students very well for successful transfer into upper-division majors at universities, thus providing them with dependable career pathways. In the coming years, however, the college must focus on forging firmer links between the business community and the various business-oriented academic programs, thus enhancing the college's ability to provide students with hands-on, real-world learning opportunities in the form of internships and service learning placements.

The goal of establishing internships and service-learning placements takes the college to the community in the workplace. This practice further enables the community to participate in the important role of educating Reedley College students at the same time that workplace experience provides students with valuable hands-on learning.

Reedley College seeks to *enhance the college climate and integrate with the community* first by maintaining within its organization an enhanced work environment and a high degree of esprit de corps and pride of association within its faculty and staff, and secondly by modeling the diverse community that it values. The college educates the college faculty, staff and students by formal training opportunities that increase awareness of diversity and the staff's capacity to value and appreciate the benefits of a diverse society. Students with disabilities are one minority that the college especially seeks to understand and value. Academic departments are encouraged to enhance their curricula by recognizing contributions to their respective disciplines of minority thinkers and writers. In this way the values of racial and cultural diversity are integrated across the curriculum and across the campus, and the institution promotes behaviors that build appreciation for the contributions racial and cultural diversity make to our society.

In addition to promoting curricular change on campus, the college seeks to participate in the diverse cultural life of the communities that comprise its service area. Diversity is more than an abstraction in the communities of south Fresno County and northern Tulare County; minority communities are active in this region and have long-tenured traditions. Reedley College benefits from and celebrates this diversity by including opportunities to share arts and culture with the wider community through formal events and festivals. The college makes available its facilities for performing and graphic arts and for public gatherings that are designed to share diversity. The college makes these opportunities known to the surrounding community not only by traditional means (printed materials, news releases to local papers, and a prominent marquee), but also via an open-access website that may increasingly serve as an effective means to integrate the college and the community. By making itself more accessible in this way, the college invites the community to become more active in the life of the college.

Families enjoy access to Reedley College concerts, athletic events, performing arts events, film series, a speakers series, and special community festivals on and off campus. Reedley College believes that encouraging all community members, young and old, to identify themselves with the college is an effective and powerful way to recruit students for all programs. School children enjoy intellectual stimulation and discovery in events intended to teach and recruit, such as the spring "Kaleidoscope," the FFA Field Day and the Latino film series. These events ensure that students learn early they are valued and welcome at Reedley College.

Cultural minority partnerships are a tool for effectively serving minority students. Reedley College seeks to enhance success by taking Reedley College to the minority community. This can happen at many levels. For example, the college needs to work with students' families to actively encourage minority families to support students who are sometimes caught in conflicts between the demands of family and the demands of education. The college's Gear Up Program takes the college to the public schools, and Upward Bound prepares pre-college students for college work. Active involvement with local service groups that link to minority students' families will further strengthen the college's ability to serve these students.

Reedley College sets as a goal to be recognized as a progressive student-centered teaching and learning institution. Reedley College is an open access institution that welcomes all students. Students frequently arrive with academic limitations in their readiness for college English and mathematics. To enable students to succeed, the college will work to address these readiness issues and to lay groundwork that will encourage more students to persist. The on-campus information systems and test scores provide useful information to allow faculty, staff and administrators to understand the ability of students and to chart student progress. Academic departments are dedicated to working together to uniformly challenge students to achieve at their highest level. Reedley College seeks to elicit excellent performance from students in all programs. In order to succeed at this, the college must broaden the range of information it collects concerning student success after students leave courses and programs. The forestry and aeronautics programs continue to stay in touch with graduates over time, providing models of the value of knowing and staying in touch with students as they exit these programs and enter careers. Reedley College would like to maintain this kind of student information on all students when they leave, wherever they go. The data will enable the college to track its

performance by benchmarking the performance of its students in all endeavors. This ongoing contact with students in the work place is also a valuable source of information on what programs need to be updated and what new programs should be developed.

Reedley College is committed to superior student services. The college's student services staff includes managers and staff responsible for working with students in a variety of ways, from enrolling them in the college to providing formal advice in program requirements and in behaviors and skills required for success. These student services personnel also work with the faculty and administration to ensure that all members of the college faculty and staff understand the unique needs of Reedley College students. When the entire faculty and staff work together on behalf of student success, the college embodies the small-college values it affirms. Student services staff members recognize the importance of close collaboration with other college staff in order to achieve the most effective student services possible. In a recent strategic planning focus group, students expressed how they value hands-on and practical learning. The student services personnel encourage faculty of all disciplines to develop hands-on, experience-based learning as one important manifestation of the college's small-college values. Reedley College anticipates that it will continue to grow but at a reasonable rate that will allow it to continue to offer its students the small-college experience it values. The college has received federal Title V money to address retention, the freshman year experience, and related success issues. These federal resources will support and augment the college's strategic efforts in assisting special populations, student athletes, and students with disabilities, and will contribute to an assessment center, a transfer center, a tutorial center, and an Early Alert program.

Reedley College recognizes the value of objective data in the process of dynamic planning and assessment. In recognition of the importance of data collection and analysis in guiding the institution, the college has recently hired an institutional researcher. Various departments have traditionally gathered data to provide feedback on program outcomes. The college intends to build on these efforts but to improve the value of the data by greater coordination to ensure that key data are part of a college-wide process. This will ensure that the data are given maximum visibility and that they are used efficiently. Institutional data are valuable to all members of the college—the governing board, administration, faculty and staff, and the public. Data collection efforts become increasingly valuable as they are sustained over time. Reedley College statistics are useful if they are viewed in comparison to similar colleges and in the context of relevant local, state and national data that create a frame to view Reedley College. How does the college compare to similar colleges and to the standard of the state and nation? How does Reedley College compare to itself last year, or five years ago? The college seeks to understand the current snapshot in order to evaluate progress toward its strategic goals. The Datatel management information system and various unit satisfaction surveys are already available. These existing sources will be evaluated and incorporated into a college-wide data gathering plan. Where there are pieces missing to complete the picture, the college will develop appropriate data gathering approaches, to include sources beyond educational institutions (labor market information, etc.). This is a process that takes time. Until adequate benchmarks are established it is difficult to recognize problems or

progress. A three- to five-year systematic effort is essential to develop a method that works. Each strategic goal will be analyzed to determine key performance indicators—that is, the strategic planning group will ask and answer the question, "What yardsticks will inform us that we have succeeded (or failed) to make progress toward this goal?" The data gathering efforts will be guided by these important yardsticks.

Reedley College recognizes the critical role *technology*—computing and educational technology—plays in institutional effectiveness and in the success of individual students and staff. Like many institutions, the college embraced computing gradually over time. However, by 2002 computing has become an essential tool for all aspects of the college operation. The college uses Datatel management information software as a principal operational tool; all faculty use computing for production and communication, and most faculty will use the networking capacity of computers to locate and present instructional materials. Because computing and technology have become basic to the institution's operation, the college is determined to sustain the resources committed to installing, maintaining and operating the computing and technology infrastructure. Upgrading the computing infrastructure must become systematic and regular in order to sustain the college's operations; budgeting and planning will provide for regular upgrading of the existing infrastructure in order to support the strategic mission of the college. Planning for proper deployment of technology infrastructure will include creative redeployment of aging equipment. Training students and staff in the use of existing software also increases the value of the technology investment. It is only when faculty and staff understand and fully utilize the Datatel system and the Microsoft suite of programs that the investment is fully realized. The college works in conjunction with the district office to maintain standardized computing platforms, but goes beyond the standards when it needs applications not included in the district standard. Regulations require that the computing infrastructure be accessible to students with disabilities. For this reason and to fulfill its goal of serving the needs of students with disabilities, the college will make the computing infrastructure accessible over time.

Reedley College has a large and complex infrastructure essential to its operation. The college's maintenance and facilities team have the experience to operate this large and complex campus facility. The maintenance staff has developed a systems approach to maintenance which involves inventory of all buildings, property, grounds and fixed equipment. This inventory is the basic tool for establishing priorities and exercising management control over how to best utilize limited resources. The maintenance staff also relies on regular staff input to help in establishing maintenance priorities, and continually seeks ways to develop a more efficient and systematic maintenance operation. Through connection with the network and use of electronic databases, they will efficiently maintain a functional record of equipment maintenance over time. The infrastructure needs of the college do face significant challenges, however. The budget climate in California for the past several years has encouraged Reedley College and many colleges to defer maintenance on buildings and facilities in order to commit much needed resources to programs and growth. While perhaps necessary, this practice cannot be continued indefinitely without having serious negative impacts on instruction and student services. Therefore the college must do what it can to encourage the development of

external support. The maintenance staff encourages the district and the college to seek increased sources of funding in order to implement the plan for ongoing maintenance of the physical plant, as well as for expansion to meet needs generated by increasing enrollment and program innovation.

#### Background:

Over the years the District has accumulated credit balances in student accounts from a variety of sources. The major source of this balance is from students who have registered for classes and either dropped or not attended the class sessions, as well as other payments for items such as health fees. This amount has now accumulated to a significant balance, totaling approximately \$300,000, with \$45,000 being three years or older. It should be noted that the majority of these balances are rather insignificant with the vast majority being less than \$50.

Because there is a significant cost in administering and maintaining the credit balances in every student's or former student's account, the law provides a vehicle whereby the balance may be moved to the General Fund after a process is followed. Following is a summary of the process allowed under Government Code Section 50050 to transfer outdated credit balances:

- If the account balance is \$15 or greater and the depositor is known to the District, then the account balance may be moved to the General Fund after three years and after the District gives public notice.
- The District must provide public notice by publishing a Notice once a week for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation within the jurisdiction of the District.
- The Notice must state the amount of money, the fund in which it is held, and that it is proposed that the money will become the property of the local agency (District) on a date not less than 45 days nor more than 60 days from the first publication.
- In order to comply with the two-week advertisement requirement and 45-day period, the Board would take action to transfer the funds at a regularly scheduled meeting approximately seven weeks after the first notification.

• Students with account balances who claim their money prior to the date that it becomes the property of the District may do so by filing a claim, and the District will release the money to the student prior to the date that it becomes the property of the District.

This process will not affect student credit balances which are less than three years old and, therefore, it provides a vehicle for cleaning up outdated balances of primarily former students.

Enclosed is a sample of the Public Notice which, if approved by the Board of Trustees, would be placed in <u>The Fresno Bee</u> in the near future with action for the transfer of funds to be scheduled at the September Board meeting.

#### Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees authorize the Chancellor or her designee to initiate the process for the transfer of long-standing credit balances by placing a Public Notice in <u>The Fresno Bee</u> with Board action to approve the transfer scheduled for the September Board meeting.

#### Background:

In order to implement the District's Facilities Master Plan, including the Willow/International Community College Center Project, it may be necessary for the District to acquire real property that is presently occupied by residents, farms, or businesses. The occupants of those residences, farms, or businesses will necessarily be displaced by the new campus facilities for which the properties are being acquired. California Government Code section 7267.8 and California Code of Regulations, Title 25, section 6006 require that, prior to displacing persons from property, a public agency must adopt rules and regulations to implement the requirements of the Relocation Assistance Act (Gov. Code, § 7260 et seq.) and that are in compliance with the California Department of Housing and Community Development's relocation assistance regulations (Cal. Code Regs., tit. 25, § 6000 et seq.).

In addition, the California Code of Regulations requires the District to develop a Relocation Assistance Advisory Program which complies with the provisions of the State's Relocation Assistance Act. The purpose of those advisory services is to attempt to minimize the hardships that displacement may bring and to attempt to ensure that all persons displaced from their dwellings are relocated and all persons displaced from their places of business are assisted in reestablishing their business operations.

Under the attached Resolution, the District would be adopting by reference the rules and regulations set forth in the State's Relocation Assistance Act and the State Department of Housing and Community Development's regulations as the District's relocation assistance rules and regulations. This is required in order to implement relocation payments and to administer relocation assistance to persons displaced by the District's real estate acquisitions.

The state regulations require that the District adopt local "Grievance Procedures" so that any person or business dissatisfied with the payments or relocation services offered by the District would have the opportunity to have their concerns reviewed administratively without the necessity of legal action. Exhibit A to the Resolution sets forth the staff's recommended Grievance Procedures for the District.

Under the proposed procedures, the District's Office of Finance and Administration would be designated as the District Department responsible for implementing the relocation assistance guidelines and conducting any required grievance procedures. The Grievance Procedures themselves consist of a two-step process. The first step is that anyone dissatisfied would be entitled to make an informal oral presentation to the District's Vice Chancellor, Finance and Administration in an attempt to resolve the matter or clear up any misunderstandings at that level. If the grievant is still dissatisfied after that step, then the next step would be the convening of a Relocation Assistance Grievance Review Committee. Under the proposed procedures, that Committee would be composed of three persons appointed by the Board of Trustees who are not officers or employees of the District. At least one of the committee members must be knowledgeable in the field of relocation assistance; at least one must be versed in the conducting of administrative hearings; and at least one must be a member of the community representing the District residents at large. The Committee's task would be to conduct formal hearings into grievances concerning relocation payments and/or relocation advisory services provided to displaced persons or businesses. The District's Vice Chancellor, Administration and Finance would provide clerical and other support services needed by the Committee.

Following the formal hearings, the decisions of the Relocation Assistance Grievance Review Committee would be administratively final and conclusive and not subject to further administrative appeal. Anyone dissatisfied with the Committee's decisions could request judicial review by means of filing a writ of mandate in the Superior Court within ninety (90) days of the Committee's final decision.

(the "Relocation Guidelines"); and

WHEREAS, section 6010 of the Relocation Guidelines requires that, prior to displacing persons from property, each public entity must make certain prior determinations that it will comply with the provisions of the Act and the Relocation Guidelines; and

WHEREAS, section 6032 of the Relocation Guidelines requires that each public entity must develop a relocation assistance advisory program which will comply with the provisions of the Act and of the Relocation Guidelines; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the District to provide advisory services which offer assistance to minimize the hardship of displacement and to ensure that all persons displaced from their dwellings are relocated and all persons displaced from their places of business or farm operations are assisted in reestablishing the business or farm operations.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE STATE CENTER

The relocation assistance rules and regulations of the State Center Community College District as adopted in paragraph two above shall be deemed to be automatically revised to conform to any subsequent amendment of the Act and any subsequent amendment of the Relocation Guidelines beginning at section 6000 and up to and including section 6176.
- 4. The attached Exhibit "A" is hereby adopted as the District's procedures to implement the "Grievance Procedures" required by Article 5, commencing with section 6150, of the Relocation Guidelines.

Pursuant to Article 5, commencing with section 6150, of Title 25 of the California Code of Regulations, the following procedures are adopted to implement the "Grievance Procedures" required by said Article 5. (All references to section numbers are to Title 25 of the California Code of Regulations unless otherwise specified.)

- 1. The District's Office of Finance and Administration is hereby designated as the District Department which will be responsible for implementing the Relocation Assistance Guidelines and conducting any required "Grievance Procedures."
- 2. The District's Vice Chancellor, Finance and Administration will conduct any "informal oral presentation" grievance review requested by a complainant pursuant to section 6156(b).
- Any "Formal Review and Reconsideration" grievance review requested by a complainant pursuant to section 6158 will be conducted by a Relocation Assistance Grievance Review Committee convened by the District for that purpose. The Relocation Assistance Grievance Review Committee will be composed of three (3) members appointed by the District's Board of Trustees who are not officers or employees of the District. At least one (1) of the Committee members must be knowledgeable in the field of relocation assistance; at least one (1) must be versed in the conducting of administrative hearings; and at least one (1) must be a member of the community representing the District residents at large. The District's Office of Administration and Finance will provide such clerical and other support services as the Committee may need or reasonably request.
- 4. Decisions rendered by a Relocation Assistance Grievance Review Committee will be administratively final and conclusive and not subject to further administrative appeal. Any petition for judicial review of a decision rendered by a Relocation Assistance Grievance Review Committee must be pursuant to California Code of Civil Procedure section 1094.5 and must be brought within the time allowed by California Code of Civil Procedure section 1094.

#### Background:

RFP #0102-31 is for the procurement of an upgrade to our current mainframe production and test servers necessary to run the Datatel Colleague system across all District locations. Also part of this RFP is the purchase of a storage area network solution (SANS) which will integrate with the new servers and the District's existing Intel based file servers. When the Datatel Colleague system first went live in the fall of 1997, installation of the Student System, Financial Aid and Accounting modules had been accomplished. Since this initial implementation, the Human Resources and Payroll modules have been added to Datatel. Additionally, the District has committed computing resources to WebAdvisor (web based access to register, view grades, class rosters and leave balances), and a telephone registration system. These additional services, combined with a 5% yearly student enrollment increase, have created demands on system resources that the current system is unable to manage. In fact, over the last year the District has been forced to shut down all but mission critical processes on the current system in order to meet the demands required during the registration process. While this growth is positive, it has had a negative effect on our ability to deliver computing resources across the District. It is the goal of RFP #0102-31 to provide an integrated system that will meet current demands and also provide for growth and expansion by 30% over the next five years.

The purchase of this proposed new Hewlett Packard mainframe and storage area network solution will provide the advantage of a proven Datatel first development platform. The low bidder for this solution also has an extensive relationship with Datatel and has provided many colleges and universities with computing infrastructure and services designed to specifically enhance the Datatel application.

Included in this purchase is three years of full system maintenance and all hardware, software, installation and training. Also included is a trade in allowance of our existing equipment. The recommended vendor, Sysix Technologies, has submitted the lowest priced proposal as well as a proposal that complies with the detailed project requirements.

As noted above, this RFP had two opportunities for response: (1) mainframe production and test systems, and (2) storage area network solution. Respondents were invited to respond to one or both portions although our stated preference was to award to a single vendor. You will notice that several vendors submitted proposals for the storage area network solution only. In both cases the cost of the solution was greater than the storage network solution contained in the recommended award. If awarded, installation will begin in July 2002, with testing performed throughout August 2002, and full system production by mid September 2002.

Funding for this project will be provided by previously approved 2002/03 Decision Package Funds. Proposal responses were received from five (5) vendors as follows:
