Mr. Forhan stated that Items 03-11 and 03-12 total \$2.5 million and should have been placed on the regular agenda, and should not be approved until Item 03-22 is approved. He questioned if Darden and Associates was the sole source for these services. Mr. Brinkley explained that Darden and Associates had done the IPP's and FPP's for the project, so the District would continue with the same architect. Mr. Forhan referred to Darden's design and placement of the building at the Madera Center, and the problems with the afternoon sun. He further stated that some time ago it was the desire of the Board to go out with RFQ's, and to ensure that minority architects/contractors were included in the process. Mr. Patterson noted that the Board should accept some of the responsibility for the Madera building as they approved the plans and the building.

Mr. Forhan questioned \$482,000.00 for oversight of the project. Mr. Speece explained this expense is for oversight by architects, engineers, etc. for the entire project. It is formula based as per capital project guidelines and the State Chancellor's office. He also reminded the Board that Mr. Sharpe had previously asked for Board approval of \$2.4 million in local funds for this project in order to keep it going at the state and to keep it competitive.

Now, the District will use the bond money, but at the time, it was approved as local money. Mr. Forhan requested that in the future, reference to previous actions be made in the report.

Mr. Smith asked that given the criticism and dissatisfaction expressed so far, where does this leave the project if the Board does not approve it tonight. Mr. Brinkley stated that the project would be delayed for another one to two years.

A motion was made by Mr. Forhan and seconded by Mr. Smith that action on Items 03-11 and 03-12 be tabled until after Item 03-22 has been heard. The motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Brinkley stated that Title V requires that community college districts conduct an annual independent audit of the District's financial records and compliance issues. He introduced Mr. Ray Cowles with the audit firm of Vavrinek, Trine, Day & Co., LLP, who reviewed the audit report.

Board members questioned changes related to the new GASB requirement to include depreciation issues and the term "profit". There was a general consensus of the Board that a workshop be presented by the audit firm in an effort to answer questions regarding the GASB requirements.

Mr. Reznik asked that the unions be invited to the workshop. Ms. Barreras concurred.

The fiscal impact is an approximate savings of \$18,807.00 to the General Fund budget. This amount represents salary and benefits for the remainder of the fiscal year.

Government Code Section 3547 sets forth the "sunshine" provisions of the Rodda Act. The Board is required to hold a public hearing on the initial proposal of the employee group. The State Center Federation of Teachers, on behalf of the Full-Time Faculty, presented its initial proposals for a successor contract to the Board on January 7, 2003. The AFT Full-Time Faculty proposals are as follows:

- 1. Length of contract: three year agreement, 2003-2006
- 2. Salary: A salary formula applied annually, based on the District's ability to pay, including in-coming and on-going revenues, which will maintain/improve the faculty's state salary schedule standing.
- 3. Benefits: Fully paid health, dental, and vision benefits, including one or more additional plan options for health insurance.
- 4. Retiree Benefits: Improved retiree benefits, including 100% District paid until age 65 and increase in lifetime annual contribution.
- 5. Calendar: 16-week compressed semester schedule with winter intercession option.
- 6. Lab factor: Improvement in lab factor to .9.
- 7. On-campus requirement: Eliminate daily on-campus requirement.

- 8. Load banking: Faculty may bank overload hours for future leave time rather than receiving pay for them.
- 9. Stipends: New coaching positions not included in current contract shall include stipends commensurate with coaching positions in contract.
- 10. Distance education: Clarifying language on office hour and on-campus requirements for faculty teaching on-line courses.
- 11. Load reduction: Clarifying language on length of work year for extended contract faculty on 50% load reduction.
- 12. Class assignments: Language specifying manner in which classes are assigned per semester to faculty.
- 13. Flex days: Flex days shall be "flexible" in that faculty may select the day(s) and activities for their participation.
- 14. Senate released time: Each academic senate shall receive 2 LHE's per year released time to conduct senate business.
- 15. Evaluation of contract faculty: Language specifying if and when an evaluation committee member may be removed from a committee, and the replacement process.
- 16. Other proposals: The Federation reserves the right to add proposals on issues that may come up between January and the commencement of negotiations.

Background:

Enclosed is the December 31, 2002, Quarterly Financial Status Report (CCFS-311Q) for the District General Fund, as required for California community college districts (ECS 84043). In accordance with State instructions, a copy of the report will be forwarded to the State Chancellor's Office.

The quarterly financial report reflects projected revenues and expenditures in line with the annual budget, as amended for additional grants, programs, etc. Actual revenues and expenditures are consistent with expectations at mid-year, allowing for the fact that most of the revenue from property taxes and certain federal monies, i.e., VATEA, is not received until later in the fiscal year. The report indicates budgeted expenditures exceed budgeted revenues by \$4,945,427. This difference is expected since the various Colleges and Centers have augmented their initial budgets with carryover funds reserved in the General Fund ending balance on June 30, 2002.

The projected 25,056 FTES indicates a 5.5% increase from 2001-02, which is based upon actual first-semester growth projected for the full year. The previous quarter (September 30, 2002) projected a 5.9% increase for FTES.

The State of California has estimated a budget shortfall of \$34.8 billion for the balance of FY2002-03 and for FY2003-04. The Governor of California proposes a mid year cut to the Community College System of \$288.8 million and estimates a property tax shortfall of \$33 million. For FY2003-04, the Community College System is looking at a reduction of \$530.5 million. Both adjustments are relative to the Budget Act of 2002-03. The District anticipates reductions for FY2002-03 of approximately \$4 - \$6.3 million depending upon the proposals under consideration by the Governor, Assembly and Senate. When the Governor and Legislature agree on a Mid Year Reduction Plan the District will implement reduction plans to match the final approved plan. These reductions will significantly impact services provided to students and our community.

Energy Services Agreement with CMS Viron Energy Services

Background:

In November 2002 the Board of Trustees authorized the administration to enter into an Energy Services Agreement with CMS Viron Corporation and a Facility Financing Contract with the California Consumer Power and Conservation Financing Authority. This authorization was based upon the findings of a Comprehensive Energy Analysis performed by CMS Viron. This extensive analysis identified numerous projects to improve the energy efficiency of mechanical and electrical systems throughout the District.

The total cost for these projects was estimated and awarded at \$3,890,674, which included all costs for engineering and design, contract and construction management, and installation. To fund these projects, the District had identified \$39,165 in PG&E rebates, \$208,250 in grant funds, and \$868,000 in Scheduled Maintenance funds. The balance of the funding would be financed through a contract with the California Consumer Power and Conservation Financing Authority with repayment of these funds provided by the energy savings.

In the last several months, circumstances have changed in relation to the availability of funds to pursue completing this project in its entirety. The administration has learned that the California Consumer Power and Conservation Authority has delayed issuing bonds as originally anticipated to finance statewide Energy Services Agreements. Additionally, with the likely elimination of matching State Scheduled Maintenance funds for 2002-03, the amount of available Scheduled Maintenance funding has been reduced. Based upon these events, the remaining funding currently available for the completion of the approved energy conservation projects is estimated at \$944,000. This available funding is a combination of State Scheduled Maintenance funds from prior years (1999-00 and 2000-01), as well as locally funded Scheduled Maintenance monies and applicable grants and rebates.

If approved, the work of this smaller project will include a chiller rebuild, new boilers, evaporative coolers and rooftop HVAC units at Reedley College, a new chiller, cooling tower and fan coils units at Fresno City College, and new pneumatic controls and other related items of work at both campuses. The administration is recommending amending the original contract award to allow the completion of this smaller energy services project with the amount of funding currently available.

In accordance with Government Code Section 4217.12 and 4217.13, the Board of Trustees has already approved the award of the larger Energy Services Agreement and a Facility Financing Contract. This recommendation is not intended to change or modify previous findings relative to potential energy savings but will only allow the award of a smaller contract, in an amount estimated to be \$944,000, to be funded with funds currently available. The balance of the comprehensive Energy Services Agreement would not be pursued and completed without Board notification and only at such a time when the current financial situation is more stable and clearly defined.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees amend the previous award of an Energy Services Agreement for Energy Retrofits, Phase II, to CMS Viron Corporation, to allow for a portion of this contract to be completed with currently available funding in an amount not to exceed \$944,000, and authorize the Chancellor or Vice Chancellor, Finance and Administration, to sign an amended Agreement on behalf of the District.

Background:

The 2002-03 budget year is developing into one of the most challenging in recent history. The chronology of events affecting the 2002-03 mid-year budget cuts and the affect on the State Center Community College District are detailed below.

September 2002 - Governor signs State Budget for 2002-03.

- Allocated to community colleges:
 - 2% Cost of Living Adjustment
 - 3% FTES Growth

<u>Post-November 5, 2002, Election Budget Concerns</u> - The talk of post-election budget cuts was a continuing topic of discussion during the State Budget process. Following the election, it was still widely believed any mid-year budget cuts would be minimal and in all probability deferred until 2003-04 for education.

November 11, 2002 - District begins to plan for 2003-04 budget.

For 2003-04 budget planning purposes, all District operations were to begin preparing for an 8% budget reduction.

December 6, 2002 - Governor announces State Budget shortfall.

• State shortfall - \$21+ billion

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- Community college reduction \$216 million:
 - 3.66% across-the-board reduction = \$98 million 1.0% shortfall in anticipated statewide property tax = \$38 million Concurrent enrollment of K-12 students = \$80 million

<u>December 9, 2002</u> - Governor announces additional cuts will be required in the 2003-04 State Budget. He is scheduled to present 2003-04 State Budget Proposal on January 10, 2003.

<u>December 18, 2002</u> - Governor announces an increase in the State Budget shortfall from \$21+ billion to \$34.8 billion.

- State shortfall \$34.8 billion:
 - \$17.7 billion in revenue shortfalls (2001-02 through 2003-04)
 - \$ 4.5 billion increase in authorized expenditures for State mandates
 - \$12.6 billion in one-time funds from 2002-03 budget years into 2003-04 budget years

<u>January 10, 2003</u> - Governor presented 2003-04 Proposed State Budget to the Legislature. He included in the budget additional reductions in 2002-03.

The Assembly and Senate each have proposed 2002-03 mid-year budget reductions. The Assembly and Senate proposals are based on a proposal put forth by the California Community Colleges Board of Governors.

The summary of the effects of each proposal upon SCCCD is developed below:

<u>Proposal</u>	<u>Amount</u>
Governor/January 10, 2003	\$4,399,896
Board of Governors/January 13, 2003	\$2,942,047
Assembly Subcommittee/January 17, 2003	\$4,095,727
Senate Subcommittee/January 22, 2003	\$4,018,178

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The above estimates do not include any estimate for concurrent K-12 enrollment. The Governor has budgeted \$80 million for this reduction. The Governor most specifically is targeting students enrolled in P.E. classes held on high school campuses. In review of concurrently enrolled K-12 in P.E. programs for 2002-03, the District has no K-12 students in violation by being in P.E. classes at a high school.

The Assembly and Senate have not addressed this issue in their proposed budget cuts. The State Chancellor's Office and Department of Finance (DOF) have developed no strategy for retrieving the \$80 million from districts. The District's exposure ranges from:

- a) \$0 if audited by DOF for violations;
- b) \$65,740 if P.E. FTES statewide are disallowed (16.1 FTES/2001-02);
- c) \$1.68 million if the \$80 million is collected as a proration of total FTES statewide.

Background:

The Governor's 2003-04 Proposed Budget reduced the State's contribution to the California Community College System more than 13.76% from the September 2002-03 adopted budget. The enclosure, provided by the State Chancellor's Office, is a comparison of the adopted 2002-03 State Budget for California Community Colleges and the Governor's 2003-04 Proposed Budget to date. The focus of the entire state has been upon the tremendous mid-year cuts necessary to begin balancing the State's 2002-03 budget. Very little productive discussion has been occurring in regard to the Governor's 2003-04 budget proposal. Further, any changes implemented by the Legislature and Governor in regard to mid-year budget cuts could have significant effects on a 2003-04 State Budget. Although a 2003-04 State budget is required to be adopted by June 30, 2003, this seems virtually impossible given the enormity of the budget shortfall and complexity of the issues faced by the State.

The administration does not expect additional information on the 2003-04 budget until later in February or March after the Assembly and Senate have hearings and begin to formulate their respective 2003-04 budget strategies and proposals.

Background:

In October the Board of Trustees approved the new position of District Associate Dean of Human Resources (academic) position with the understanding that Director of Human Resources (classified) position would remain vacant. The District advertised statewide to fill the position. The screening committee consisting of administrators, faculty representatives, and classified representatives invited four people for interviews. Two of those individuals were invited for a second interview.

After extensive reference checking which included AFT and CSEA representatives, the administration is pleased to recommend Diane Clerou for the position. Mrs. Clerou has 18 years of successful human resource management experience. She is currently serving as the Interim District Associate Dean - Human Resources at State Center. She served as Interim Director of Human Resources for Victor Valley Community College District from February 2002 through July 2002, prior to that position she was the Assistant Chancellor, Human Resources at Kern Community College District for five years. In this position she was the liaison between the district office and three college campuses on personnel matters, as well as the liaison on personnel matters with federal, state and local agencies, law firms and the Board of Trustees. She administered all elements of employee recruitment, selection, evaluation, transfer, promotion, reclassification and records management for both classified and academic. She was the lead negotiator on the classified union contracts and served as a team member for faculty contracts. She administered all employee benefits and coordinated the Kern Community College District staff diversity program. Mrs. Clerou has been working in our District Human Resources office for the past several months and has done an outstanding job. Mrs. Clerou has demonstrated an excellent background and knowledge with California Community College Human Resources policies, practices and procedures. She has proven herself to be extremely

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proficient, task oriented, and enjoyable to work with. Mrs. Clerou received her Master's Degree and Bachelor's Degree in Public Administration from California State University, Bakersfield. Mrs. Clerou also possesses California Community College life credentials in Business & Industrial Management and Public Services & Administration.

Fiscal Impact:

This position has been accounted for in the Human Resources budget.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees appoint Mrs. Diane Clerou to the position of District Associate Dean – Human Resources with an effective date of February 13, 2003, with placement on the Management Salary Schedule at Range 60, Step 7 (\$102,786).
