Mr. Rowe stated there is an agreement that the flex hours would not affect any current positions and would apply only to new positions. He explained that this is a sporadic position and the hours will depend on the enrollment at the Training Institute. The Personnel Commission will set the standards, salary, etc.

Mr. Thonesen questioned if the buses would be certified and have a warranty.

The disparate impact of foreign policy decisions on different racial, ethnic and class groupings within the US and around the world. The role of the media in shaping public perception of international conflicts.

b. Effective Spring 2005

Introduction to Lesbian and Gay Studies, 3 units, 3 lecture hours. Advisory: Eligibility for English 125 and 126 or English 153 or ESL 67 and 68 recommended. The interdisciplinary field of Lesbian and Gay Studies through the disciplines of history, literature, law, science, political science, health science, media, psychology, and education. Issues to be covered will include, but not be limited to identity development and coming out, cultural ideology, sub-cultures, activism, gay marriage, gay parenting, and community. Theoretical perspectives concerning the historical development of sexual identity, the marginalization of sexual communities within social institutions and concomitant issues of class, race, and gender in contemporary U.S. Society and around the world will be explored.

Provide students with an understanding of what racial profiling is and the negative impact it can have. Students will be exposed to real-life examples designed to enhance their ability to critically analyze their own beliefs and distinguish between when race is a legitimate factor in identifying a suspect.

- 1) Automatic External Defibrillator (AED)/Ambulance Operations, 0.1 unit, 6 total lab hours, credit/no credit, 3 repeats, open entry/open exit, contract class. The training sessions will be taught by qualified instructors and the Fresno County Health Department staff.

- 4) Confined Space Rescue Operations Drill, 0.1 unit, 8 total lab hours, credit/no credit, 3 repeats, open entry/open exit, contract class. Prerequisite: FIRET 130 or employed by a public fire agency. Identify what constitutes a confined space, what hazards can be found in confined spaces, how those hazards can impact the authorized entrant and what should be done to protect entrants functioning in confined spaces. It also discusses equipment that can be used in confined space applications, ranging from environmental surveillance and monitoring equipment to respiratory protection equipment, protective clothing and lowering/retrieval systems.
- 5) Correctional Core Enhancement #2, 1.5 units, 20 lecture hours, 13.6 lab hours, 2 weeks, credit/no credit. Prerequisite: AJ 280. Optional course taken after the Basic Adult Correctional Officer Core to enhance the officer's training and to satisfy state mandated training.

- 1) Advanced Officer/Kingsburg Reserve #12, 0.5 units, 2.5 lecture hours, 2.7 lab hours, 5 weeks, credit/no credit. 3 repeats. Prerequisite: AJ 270 or reserve officer with a law enforcement agency. Provides bi-yearly 24-hour training requirements for reserve peace officers.
- 2) Automotive Paintless Dent Repair, 3 units, 2 lecture hours, 3 lab hours. This course will expose students to the technique of paintless dent repair of small dents without damaging the paint on the vehicle.
- 3) Ballistic Shield, 0.2 units, total hours: 5.2 lecture, 5.2 lab, credit/no credit, unlimited repeats, open entry/open exit, contract class. Prerequisite: AJ 270 or sworn peace officer. In-service training on the deployment considerations, limitations, and safe use of the hand-held ballistic shield.
- 4) Clovis FD EMS Continuing Education, Module B, 0.3 units, total hours: 6.3 lecture and 18.9 lab, credit/no credit, 3 repeats, open entry/open exit, contract class. Prerequisite: FIRET 130 or employed by a public fire agency. This course is designed to maintain the current level of certification and provide classes to current emergency medical technicians and first responders. This program is developed and taught by firefighters who are skilled trainers.

BP 5010 Admissions and Concurrent Enrollment

The District shall admit students who meet one of the following requirements and who are capable of profiting from the instruction offered:

- Any person over the age of 18 and possessing a high school diploma or its equivalent.
- Other persons who are over the age of 18 years and who, in the judgment of the Chancellor or his or her designee are capable of profiting from the instruction offered. Such persons shall be admitted as provisional students, and thereafter shall be required to comply with the District's rules and regulations regarding scholastic achievement and other standards to be met by provisional or probationary students as a condition to being readmitted in any succeeding semester.
- Persons who are apprentices as defined in Section 3077 of the Labor Code.

Admission

- Any student whose age, skill, or class level is equal to grades eleven or twelve is
 eligible to attend as a special full-time or part-time student for advanced
 scholastic or vocational courses.
- Any student enrolled in grades eleven or twelve may attend summer session.

Regulations shall be established regarding ability to benefit and admission of high school and younger students.

Denial of Requests for Admission

- If the Board denies a request for special full time or part time enrollment by a pupil who is identified as highly gifted, the board will record its findings and the reason for denying the request in writing within 60 days.
- The written recommendation and denial shall be issued at the next regularly scheduled board meeting that occurs at least 30 days after the pupil submits the request to the district.

BP 5010 Admissions and Concurrent Enrollment (cont'd)

Procedures shall be established regarding evaluation of requests for special full time or part time enrollment by a pupil who is identified as highly gifted.

Claims for State Apportionment for Concurrent Enrollment

Claims for state apportionment submitted by the district based on enrollment of high school pupils shall satisfy the criteria established by statute and any applicable regulations of the Board of Governors.

Regulations shall be established regarding compliance with statutory and regulatory criteria for concurrent enrollment.

BP 5015 Residence Determination

Students shall be classified at the time of each application for admission or registration as a resident or nonresident student.

A resident is any person who has been a bona fide resident of California for at least one year on the residence determination date. The residence determination date shall be the day immediately preceding the first day of a semester or summer session for which the student applies to attend.

Residence classification shall be made for each student at the time applications for admission are accepted or registration occurs and whenever a student has not been in attendance for more than one semester. A student previously classified as a nonresident may be reclassified as of the day immediately preceding the first day of a semester or summer session for which the student applies to attend.

Regulations shall be established to assure that residence determinations are made in accordance with Education Code and Title 5 Regulation.

Nonresident students shall be charged nonresident tuition for all units enrolled.

Not later than February 1 of each year, the Chancellor shall bring to the Board for approval an action to establish nonresident tuition for the following fiscal year. The fee shall be calculated in accordance with guidelines contained in applicable state regulations and/or the California Community College Attendance Accounting Manual.

Regulations shall be established regarding collection, waiver, and refunds of nonresident tuition.

The Chancellor is authorized to implement a fee to be charged only to persons who are both citizens and residents of foreign countries. The Board finds and declares that this fee does not exceed the amount expended by the district for capital outlay in the preceding year divided by the total FTES in the preceding fiscal year.

Students who would otherwise be charged this fee shall be exempt if they demonstrate that they are a victim of persecution or discrimination in the county of which they are a citizen and resident, or if they demonstrate economic hardship.

Students shall be deemed victims of persecution or discrimination if they present evidence that they are citizens and residents of a foreign country and that they have been admitted to the United States under federal regulations permitting such persons to remain in the United States. Students shall be deemed to have demonstrated economic hardship if they present evidence that they are citizens and residents of a foreign country and that they are receiving Aid to Families with Dependent Children, Supplemental Income/State Supplementary benefits, or general assistance.

BP 5030 Fees

The Board authorizes the following fees. Regulations shall be established for the collection, deposit, waiver, refund, and accounting for fees as required by law. The regulations shall also assure those who are exempt from or for whom the fee is waived are properly enrolled and accounted for. Fee amounts shall be published in the college catalogs.

Enrollment fee:

Education Code Section 76300

Each student shall be charged a fee for enrolling in credit courses as required by law.

Health fee:

Education Code Section 76355

The District shall charge each student at Fresno City College and Reedley College a fee of \$13.00 per semester for health supervision and services. The District shall charge each student at Fresno City College and Reedley College a fee of \$10.00 for the summer session for health supervision and services. The District shall charge each student at the North Centers, Career and Technology Center and other off-campus sites, a fee of \$5.00 for health supervision and services for each semester or summer session.

Parking fee:

Education Code 76360

Students and employees shall be required to pay a fee, in an amount not to exceed \$17.00 per semester and \$8.00 per intersession for parking services.

Instructional materials:

Education Code Section 76365; Title 5, Sections 59400, et seq.

Students may be required to provide required instructional and other materials for a credit or non-credit course, provided such materials are of continuing value to the student outside the classroom and provided that such materials are not solely or exclusively available from the District.

Physical education facilities:

Education Code 76395

Where the District incurs additional expenses because a physical education course is required to use non-district facilities, students enrolled in the course shall be charged a fee for participating in the course. Such fee shall not exceed the student's calculated share of the additional expenses incurred by the district.

BP 5030 Fees (cont'd)

Student Representation Fee: Education Code 76060.5

Once established pursuant to Education Code 76060.5, students will be charged a \$1.00 fee per semester to be used to provide support for student governmental affairs representation. A student may refuse to pay the fee for religious, political, financial or moral reasons and shall submit such refusal in writing. Students receiving Board of Governors fee waivers are deemed to have refused in writing to pay the fee for financial reasons.

Transcript Fees: Education Code 76223

The District shall charge a reasonable amount for furnishing copies of any student record to a student or former student. The Chancellor is authorized to establish the fee, which shall not to exceed the actual cost of furnishing copies of any student record. No charge shall be made for furnishing up to two transcripts of students' records, or for two verifications of various records. There shall be no charge for searching for or retrieving any student record.

Falsification of Residence

Non-resident students who have been admitted to a class or classes without payment of the fee because of falsification of information submitted by or for them shall be excluded from such class or classes upon notification. For the purpose of this rule only, notification consists of oral or written advice from the office of admissions of the college of enrollment to the student and such notification may be given at any time. Student excluded because of falsifications shall not be re-admitted during the semester or session from which they were excluded, nor shall they be admitted to any following semester or session until all previously incurred tuition obligations are paid.

It is the policy of this district to vigorously pursue collection of nonresident fees, payment of which was avoided by falsification. Following reports to the governing board, the district business office is authorized to initiate action or to request legal counsel to initiate action in appropriate courts of law in order to collect fees.

The Chancellor shall assure that student records are maintained in compliance with applicable federal and state laws relating to the privacy of student records.

Any currently enrolled or former student of the District has a right of access to any and all student records relating to him or her maintained by the District.

No District representative shall release the contents of a student record to any member of the public without the prior written consent of the student, other than directory information as defined in this policy and information sought pursuant to a court order or lawfully issued subpoena, or as otherwise authorized by applicable federal and state laws.

Students shall be notified of their rights with respect to student records, including the definition of directory information contained here, and that they may limit the information.

Directory information shall include:

- Student participation in officially recognized activities and sports including weight, height and high school of graduation of athletic team members.
- Degrees and awards received by students, including honors, scholarship awards, athletic awards and Dean's List recognition.

Unlawful possession, use, sale, offer to sell, or furnishing, or being under the influence of, any controlled substance listed in Chapter 2 (commencing with Section 11053) of Division 10 of the California Health and Safety Code, an alcoholic beverage, or an intoxicant of any kind; or unlawful possession of, or offering, arranging or negotiating the sale of any drug paraphernalia, as defined in California Health and Safety Code Section 11014.5.
- 4. Committing or attempting to commit robbery or extortion.
- 5. Causing or attempting to cause damage to district property or to private property on campus.

- 6. Stealing or attempting to steal district property or private property on campus, or knowingly receiving stolen district property or private property on campus.

Disruptive behavior, willful disobedience, habitual profanity or vulgarity, or the open and persistent defiance of the authority of, or persistent abuse of, college personnel, including obstruction or disruption of teaching, research, administration, disciplinary regulations, or other college activities, including, but not limited to community service functions or other authorized activities on or off campus.
- 12. Cheating, plagiarism (including plagiarism in a student publication), or engaging in other academic dishonesty.
- 13. Dishonesty; forgery; alteration or misuse of college documents, records or identification; or knowingly furnishing false information to the District.
- 14. Unauthorized entry upon or use of college facilities.
- 15. Disorderly, lewd, indecent or obscene conduct on District-owned or controlled property, or at District-sponsored or supervised functions.
- 16. Engaging in expression which is obscene; libelous or slanderous; or which so incites students as to create a clear and present danger of the commission of unlawful acts on college premises, or the violation of lawful District administrative regulations, or the substantial disruption of the orderly operation of the District.
- 17. Persistent, serious misconduct where other means of correction have failed to bring about proper conduct.

Established administrative regulations shall not prohibit the right of students to exercise free expression, including but not limited to the use of bulletin boards designated for such use, the distribution of printed materials or petitions in those parts of the college designated as areas generally available to students and the community, and the wearing of buttons, badges, or other insignia.

Students shall be free to exercise their rights of free expression, subject to the requirements of this policy.

Speech shall be prohibited that is defamatory, obscene according to current legal standards, or which so incites others as to create a clear and present danger of the commission of unlawful acts on district property or the violation of district policies or regulations, or the substantial disruption of the orderly operation of the District.

Nothing in this policy shall prohibit the regulation of hate violence, so long as the regulation conforms to the requirements of the First Amendment to the United States Constitution, and of Section 2 of Article 1 of the California Constitution. Students may be disciplined for harassment, threats, intimidation, or hate violence unless such speech is constitutionally protected.

I. Executive Summary


Introduction

This is the Compliance Review of the County of Fresno's Treasurer's Investment Pool Portfolio for the period ended September 30, 2004, pursuant to California Government Code 53646. The report has two primary objectives: (1) to provide information regarding portfolio holdings as to compliance with California Government Code Sections 53601 and 53635, as well as the County Treasurer's Statement of Investment Policy and (2) to detail portfolio characteristics of the portfolio's investment holdings.

Quarterly Overview of Markets:

During the quarter, the US Treasury yield curve flattened which primarily benefited holders of intermediate and long-term bonds. At both the August 2004 meeting and the September 2004 meeting, the Federal Reserve continued to raise interest rates one-quarter of a percentage point stating that rates remain "accommodative", possibly implying that the Committee will continue to raise rate gradually.

As indicated on the previous page, during the third quarter of 2004 yields increased primarily in the short term maturities, and decreased across intermediate and long-term maturities. The yield on one-year Treasury Bonds increased 12 basis points to 2.21% for the quarter while the yield on thirty-year Treasury Bonds decreased 44 basis points to 4.97%. The spread between the one-year Treasury and the 30-year Treasury ended the quarter at 276 basis points, decreasing from 332 basis points at the end of last quarter. During the quarter, yields on 90-day Certificates of Deposits increased 42 basis points while 180-day maturities increased in yield by 27 basis points. Commercial Paper moved higher in the 30-day maturities by 47 basis points. The 90-day yield for Commercial Paper increased 35 basis points.



Portfolio Position

The portfolio maintained a weighted maturity of less than 18 months. The County of Fresno Investment Policy (revised December 2003) Section 11.0 recommends a portfolio of securities with a weighted average maturity not to exceed 550 days. Keeping the portfolio within this maturity range minimized its exposure to potential interest rate shifts that can occur in the mid-maturity sectors of the yield curve. The portfolio was oriented towards high quality with 72.4% of the portfolio's assets invested in risk-free instruments.

Compliance with California Government Codes 53601 & 53635:

The Investment Portfolio is compliant with the California Government Codes 53601 and 53635.

Compliance with Treasury Investment Pool Statement of Investment Policy:

The Statement of Investment Policy is more stringent than the California Government Code. As of 9/30/04, the Treasurer's Investment Pool portfolio complied with its Statement of Investment Policy.

Please refer to the next section of the report for a more detailed evaluation of the portfolio in relationship to the California Government Code and the Treasurer's Investment Pool Statement of Investment Policy.

Portfolio characteristics

The Treasury Pool's portfolio characteristics are indicative of a plan exhibiting a high degree of quality with short-term maturities.

- As of 9/30/04, the portfolio had a market value of \$1.6 billion with an average dollarweighted quality between "AA+" and "AAA".
- Approximately 72.4% of the portfolio's assets are invested in securities with virtually no credit risk (i.e., US Treasuries, US Agencies, and cash).
- The dollar weighted average life of the pool is 503 days.
- 17.8% of the portfolio at cost matures within 30 days, 18.2% matures within 90 days, and 21.4% within 180 days (see Appendix for further details).

Based on its relative high quality and near-term liquidity, and assuming no significant changes to pool funding policies, the Treasury Investment Pool is well positioned to meet its expenditure requirements over the next six months.







Portfolio Breakdown by Investment Type (valued at cost)




Portfolio Breakdown by Maturity Date (valued at cost)

To determine T-Fund's net asset value per share, the daily valuation of portfolio securities is performed in accordance with BIMC's matrix pricing policy.

BIMC uses a matrix pricing methodology that is based on pricing tiers called matrix codes, and time cells that extend out the yield curve.

The matrix codes represent how a security trades relative to other securities of the same type. Security prices (yields) represent the bid side of the market and are indicative of where we would expect to be able to sell that security.

Prices of repurchase agreements come from Bloomberg. BlackRock also checks the data against Broker/Dealers who are major participants in specific money market areas. Meuller provides prices from Treasury bills, notes, and bonds.

Portfolio valuations are performed daily. Portfolio managers who are members of the matrix pricing team check data for accuracy. This data feeds the fund accounting system that determines the fund's net asset value per share. The variance to a \$1.00/share is noted and reported to the portfolio manager daily.

Depending on market conditions, the number of matrix codes and the spread between tiers may change. BlackRock reviews these factors periodically and change them as conditions warrant.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Average Maturity - The weighted average time to principal repayment. Useful as an approximation of a single maturity where the mean or average maturity is used to describe the life of the instrument.

Bankers Acceptance - Money market instrument created from transactions involving foreign trade. In its simplest form, a bankers acceptance is a check, drawn on bank by an importer or exporter of goods.

Basis Point - 1/100th of 1%.

Certificate of Deposit - A short term money market instrument representing a receipt from a bank for a deposit at a specified rate of interest for a specified period of time.

Coupon Rate - The annual interest paid of a fixed-income instrument.

Commercial Paper - Money Market instrument representing a short-term promissory note of a large corporation at a specified rate of return for a specified period of time.

Current Yield - A bond's coupon expressed as a percentage of the bond's market price.

Discount Rate - The interest rate used to translate a future value into a present value.

Duration - Often times referred to as Macaulay's duration is a fixed income measure of price sensitivity to changes in yields. It is calculated by taking a weighted average of the time periods to receipt of the present value of the cash flows from a fixed income instrument.

Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation - Also known as "FHLMC" and Freddie Mac. FHLMC is a Private Corporation authorized by Congress, which sells notes, participation certificates and other mortgage obligations backed by mortgage pools.

Federal National Mortgage Association - Also known as "FNMA" and Fannie Mae. A private corporation which buys and sells residential mortgages insured by FHA or guaranteed by VA. FNMA also issues notes, participation certificates and other mortgage obligations backed by mortgage pools.

Government National Mortgage Corporation - Also known as "GNMA" and Ginnie Mae. A wholly-owned U.S. government corporation. GNMA issues and guarantees mortgage-backed securities which are backed by the full faith and credit of the United States Government.

Repurchase Agreement - Short term collateralized loan at a specified rate for a specified period, used by large investors as an alternative for cash investments.

Yield to Maturity - The internal rate of return of a standard bond held to maturity.

Background:

Bid #0405-08 provides for the rehabilitation of selected electrical systems at the Reedley College campus. This project consists of all labor and materials necessary to separate high- and low-voltage systems in various electrical vaults and to replace cabling for two high-voltage circuits to the classroom wings. The work includes new feeder wiring, conduit, power distribution equipment, panel boards, access panels, excavation, backfill, and other related items of work. Any critical work requiring power interruption will be done during the holiday period to minimize down time to the affected areas. This project was necessitated by the need to separate high- and low-voltage underground services at the Reedley College campus.

Funding for this project will be provided by the State Scheduled Maintenance and Repair Program. The engineer's estimate for this project is \$80,000.00. Bids were received from three (3) contractors as follows:

Background:

At the onset of developing the Willow/International Center site it was determined that State Center Community College District could benefit from partnering with Clovis Unified School District in the development and construction of the necessary street and underground improvements required by the City of Fresno. This partnership has allowed the Districts to better coordinate the development of each party's infrastructure to include the full development of International Avenue, the installation of traffic signals at the intersections of International and Willow and International and Chestnut Avenues, and the burial of the Enterprise Canal in International Avenue and across District property.

The Agreement details the project expenses and the split of the expenses between the two Districts, the manner of payment, the overhead to be charged by Clovis Unified for the management of the project, and the manner of payment for the work. The major elements of the Agreement include:

1. Project Expense Split State Center Community College District

- a. 100% of the cost to install street and utility improvements on Willow Avenue from International south to Behymer
- b. 50% of the cost to install street and utility improvements on International between Chestnut and Willow Avenues, including the burial of the Enterprise Canal from the corner of Willow and International Avenues to the City of Fresno water treatment plant
- c. 100% of the cost to install a 60-inch water line for the City of Fresno from the Friant Canal to the water treatment plant on District property (Under a separate Agreement between the State Center Community College District and the City of Fresno, this cost will be reimbursed 100%.)

d. 100% of the cost to install street and utility improvements on Chestnut south of International

Clovis Unified School District

- e. 100% of the cost to install street and utility improvements on Willow Avenue from International north
- f. 50% of the cost to install street and utility improvements on International between Chestnut and Willow Avenues, including the burial of the Enterprise
- g. Canal from the corner of Willow and International Avenues to the City of Fresno water treatment plant
- h. 100% of the cost to install street and utility improvements on Chestnut north of International

2. Project Payment

At the time of the bid award, State Center Community College District agrees to make a payment to Clovis Unified School District equal to 25% of the bid award for SCCCD's portion of the total project, less an amount equal to the interest that would be earned from the date of deposit until the date of completion. After the initial payment CUSD will invoice SCCCD with progress payments throughout the rest of the project. The project payments shall include the cost of construction, construction management, and the indirect costs associated with the preparation of bids, bid documents, payment to contractors, and coordination/management of the project.
