Chancellor's Report

Dr. Crow introduced the new State Center Community College Foundation Executive Director, Dr. Michele Cantwell-Copher. Dr. Cantwell-Copher has had a successful track record in education and in fundraising and will no doubt be a tremendous success in this position. She was previously employed by Central Unified School District where she served as foundation executive director and assistant superintendent. Prior to joining Central Unified, Dr. Cantwell-Copher was employed with the Clovis Unified School District. She has been meeting with SCCC Foundation board members, as well as community and business leaders.

Chancellor Crow reported the following:

Administrative Staff Development Program

Dr. Crow reported on the administrative staff development program in partnership with California State University, Fresno. The program is designed to develop leadership skills for faculty members and present entry-level administrators. There are 25 participants that will complete part one of a two-part series of the community college leadership seminar series this October. This group will begin part two of the series this February. The next group is being selected now and will begin part one of the community college leadership seminar series this January.

Chancellor's Report (continued)

Chamber Government Affairs Presentation

Dr. Crow has been invited to present to the Greater Fresno Area Chamber of Commerce Government Affairs Committee on the impact Proposition 1D will have on SCCCD. He stated that the Chamber is interested in how the facilities bond will provide growth opportunities, not only for the district, but for the valley, as well. Proposition ID will provide significant funding for Phase II of Willow/International and will also move us up in line for the north and east wings of the Old Administration Building. and Southeast site, as well as the child development centers at Fresno City College and Reedley College. We have a vested interest in making sure the voters know all of the facts and the impact this important ballot issue will have on our future. We will be presenting on September 13, and would expect to hear from the Chamber shortly thereafter on their decision to endorse Proposition ID. The Board will receive an update after that meeting.

Consideration to Approve Accreditation Progress Reports, Fresno City College, Reedley College [06-49] Action

Previous to the meeting the Trustees received draft copies of the Accreditation Progress Reports for Fresno City College and Reedley College for their review. Dr. Crow stated that any changes the Board may have will be incorporated into the final progress reports. The Board was asked to approve the progress reports with any modifications they may have. The final reports would be provided to them prior to the October Board meeting. The written reports are due in to the Accrediting Commission by October 15. A site visitation will follow by a member, or members, of the previous visitation team. They will then submit their report, and in January the Accrediting Commission will meet to act on the progress reports. The expected action from that meeting would be to accept the progress reports with the visitations from both colleges and, secondly, to remove Fresno City College from the warning status. Official notification from the Accrediting Commission is not expected until late February. We will be in attendance at their January meeting. The Commission's deliberations take place in closed session.

Using a panel discussion format, Dr. Crow, Dr. Doffoney, Dr. Hioco, and Dr. Kershaw presented the Fresno City College and Reedley College accreditation progress reports for the Board's consideration. The hard work and involvement of the colleges' faculty, staff and constituency groups were emphasized as major factors in effectively and appropriately responding to the accreditation teams' recommendations.

Following the presentations, the panel received the following comments from the Board:

Mr. Smith said that he is pleased with the progress being made because internal policies and procedures are being looked at more closely. The colleges are profiting from their reviews, and this will help assure that problems do not arise in the future.

Ms. Smith spoke to the process of shared governance, stating that it was the only way to get things settled because it allows committees and departments a voice.

In regard to the North Centers, Mr. Smith asked why we are being held by the accreditation group to a standard of number of books and number of librarians when today most research is being done electronically. He asked for an understanding of what the actual functions are for a librarian, and why a full-time librarian is needed before the center reaches campus status. He asked that, as part of the planning process, if a projection could be made about when campus status could be reached.

Ms. Smith added that librarians' duties have also changed over the years and today's librarian has to be very knowledgeable about technology. However, whether students are studying books or through technology, someone is needed to help students.

Mr. Patterson asked if the specifications for librarian have changed over the years.

A motion was made by Mr. Patterson and seconded by Ms. Smith that the Board of Trustees approve the Final Draft Progress Reports for Fresno City College and Reedley College, as presented. The motion carried unanimously.

Consideration to Approve Legal Services [06-50] Action Dr. Crow introduced this item stating that the District is reviewing its legal services in the four different areas of land acquisition, collective bargaining, employment law, and general business. The District put out an RFP, statewide, for interested firms to respond. Twelve firms responded and were interviewed on July 25 and 26. Three firms are being recommended to the Board for consideration as follows:

Land Acquisition - Lozano Smith Collective Bargaining - Zampi and Associates Employment Law - Liebert, Cassidy & Whitmore

In the category of General Business, reference checks are in progress, and a recommendation will be made at the October Board meeting.

A discussion followed commencing with Ms. Barreras who asked for her colleagues' thoughts about adding the firms of Best Best & Krieger, and Dowling Aaron & Keeler. She was on the interview panel and said that the rankings of these two firms were high, and unless their references did not check out, she wants to add these two firms to those being considered for approval by the Board.

Mr. Smith said he would not oppose Ms. Barreras' request to add the two additional firms because it would give the District more options, and provide a backup if there is a conflict or problem.

Dr. Crow stated that Best & Krieger were in the top three in three of the four categories, and that Dowling Aaron & Keeler qualified in the land acquisition category.

Ms. Smith left the meeting at 5:55 p.m.

Mr. Patterson asked if the firms submitted their rates with their proposals.

Mr. Forhan asked how widely the request for proposals was published. He stated that the process is very important. As a public agency, advertisement has to be handled in a way that everyone sees it and that openness and fairness applied. Those firms that surface from the committee should come to the full Board for discussion.

Mr. Brinkley explained that the RFP was handled according to the District's regular bid process, including going out twice. Locally, it was appropriately advertised in *The Business Journal*.

Mr. Thonesen asked whether the firms are based locally, or out of town.

Mr. Smith made the motion to approve the firms as recommended, and to add Best Best & Krieger and Dowling Aaron & Keeler in those categories in which they ranked. The motion was seconded by Ms. Barreras.

Background:

Over the last three years, the Board has adopted seven new chapters of Board Policies. As we informed the Board in March 2003, we are using a format recommended by the Community College League of California, which includes suggested wording to comply with all requirements of the law, as well as "best practices," as suggested by the League.

Twice a year the League issues updates to reflect recent changes in the law, etc. The attached revised Board Policies reflect such updates. These revised Board Policies have been reviewed by the Chancellor's Cabinet and by the Communication Council, including the Academic and Classified Senates. The changes are reflected in bold and strikethrough text.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve revised Board Policies 2220, 2315, 2360, 2710, 2715, 2716, 2725, 3410, 3430, 3540, 4220, 6550, 7128, 7210, 7700.

BP 2220

Committees of the Board

The Board may by action establish committees that it determines are necessary to assist the Board in its responsibilities. Any committee established by board action shall comply with the requirements of the California Public Meetings Act Brown Act and with these policies regarding open meetings.

Board committees that are composed solely of less than a quorum of members of the Board and do not have authority that may lawfully be exercised by the Board itself, are not required to comply with the California Public Meetings Act Brown Act, or with these policies regarding open meetings.

Board committees have no authority or power to act on behalf of the Board. Findings or recommendations shall be reported to the Board for consideration.

Closed Sessions

Closed sessions of the Board shall only be held as permitted by applicable legal provisions including but not limited to, the Brown Act, California Government Code and California Education Code. Matters discussed in closed session may include:

- the appointment, employment, evaluation of performance, discipline or dismissal of a public employee;
- charges or complaints brought against a public employee by another person or employee, unless the accused public employee requests that the complaints or charges be heard in an open session. The employee shall be given at least twenty-four (24) hours written notice of the closed session.
- advice of counsel on pending litigation, as defined by law;
- consideration of tort liability claims as part of the District's membership in any joint powers agency formed for purposes of insurance pooling;
- real property transactions;
- threats to public security;
- review of the District's position regarding labor negotiations and giving instructions to the District's designated negotiator;
- discussion of student disciplinary action, with final action taken in public;
- conferring of honorary degrees;
- consideration of gifts from a donor who wishes to remain anonymous; and
- to consider its response to a confidential final draft audit report from the Bureau of State Audits.

The agenda for each regular or special meeting shall contain information regarding whether a closed session will be held and shall identify the topics to be discussed in any closed session in the manner required by law.

After any closed session, the Board shall reconvene in open session before adjourning and shall announce any actions taken in closed session and the vote of every member present. All matters discussed or disclosed during a lawfully held closed session and all notes, minutes, records or recordings made of such a closed session are confidential and shall remain confidential unless and until required to be disclosed by action of the Board or by law.

Closed Session (continued)

If any person requests an opportunity to present complaints to the Board about a specific employee, such complaints shall first be presented to the Chancellor. Notice shall be given to the employee against whom the charges or complaints are directed. If the complaint is not resolved at the administrative level, the matter shall be scheduled for a closed session of the Board. The employee shall be given at least twenty-four (24) hours written notice of the closed session, and shall be given the opportunity to request that the complaints be heard in an open meeting of the Board.

Minutes

The Chancellor shall cause minutes to be taken of all meetings of the Board. The minutes shall record all actions taken by the Board. The minutes shall be public records and shall be available to the public. If requested, the minutes shall be made available in appropriate alternative formats so as to be accessible to persons with a disability.

The minutes shall also record the names of those present, all motions, names of those making and seconding motions, votes, major discussion points, etc.

Conflict of Interest

Board members shall not be financially interested in any contract made by the Board or in any contract they make in their capacity as board members

A board member shall not be considered to be financially interested in a contract if his or her interest is limited to those interests defined as remote under Government Code section 1091 or is limited to interests defined by Government Code section 1091.5.

A board member who has a remote interest in any contract considered by the Board shall disclose his or her interest during a board meeting and have the disclosure noted in the official board minutes. The board member shall not vote or debate on the matter or attempt to influence any other board member to enter into the contract.

A board member shall not engage in any employment or activity that is inconsistent with, incompatible with, in conflict with or inimical to his or her duties as an officer of the District. A board member shall not simultaneously hold two public offices that are incompatible.

In compliance with law and regulation, the Chancellor shall establish administrative regulations to provide for disclosure of assets of income of board members who may be affected by their official actions, and prevent members from making or participating in the making of board decisions which may foreseeably have a material effect on their financial interest.

Board members shall file statements of economic interest with the filing officer identified by the administrative regulations.

Board members are encouraged to seek counsel from the District's General Counsel or outside counsel, as appropriate, in every case where any question arises.

Code of Ethics/Standards of Practice

The Board maintains high standards of ethical conduct for its members. As members of the State Center Community College District Board of Trustees, working as a collective unit in conjunction with administration, staff, students, and the communities we the Board serves, will execute to the best of our its abilities the duties and responsibilities vested in us it by the California Education Code and entrusted to us the Board by its constituency.

We Board members recognize that as elected public servants our their actions, behaviors, and verbal statements will be under the watchful eye of the citizenry at all times. Therefore, the decisions we make made as a Board must reflect our dedication to promote higher education along with opportunities for professional, vocational, and technical growth and enhancement. As officials of public education, we Board members must be a positive reflection of those for whom we speak.

- 1. Board members will devote time, thought and study to the duties and responsibilities of a community college Trustee in order to be effective.
- 2. We Board members recognize the fact that the strength and effectiveness of the Board is as a total Board, not as a group of individuals.
- 3. We Board members agree to work with fellow Board members in a spirit of cooperation and compromise despite differences of opinion that may arise during debates on issues.
- 4. We Board members agree to respect the office that we hold. Remembering that as an individual we have no legal authority outside the meetings of the State Center Community College District. Board members should never misuse the power inherent in their office. Board members will abide by state and federal anti-discrimination and harassment laws.
- 5. We Board members pledge to avoid any situation that constitutes a conflict of interest. When a matter arises that could be a question of conflict of interest, we Board members will remember to notify the Chancellor and/or Board President before any official action is taken.
- 6. We Board members will resist influencing votes or actions of other Board members or of any employee, through threat, promise of award, deception, exchange of vote, or by any other means than legitimate open discussion.
- 7. All official business by the Board will be conducted in open public hearings except for those issues which are by law more appropriately dealt with in closed session.

Code of Ethics/Standards of Practice (continued)

8. We Board members recognize that all discussion in closed session should not be released or discussed by individual board members, outside the confines of the closed session. We agree that Any information disclosed from closed session will only be released with the approval of the Board by majority vote.

9. The Board's function is to establish the policies of the District. The Board shall hold the Chancellor and his/her staff accountable for the administration of the educational program and the conduct of college District business. Any complaints, criticisms, and comments received by individual Board members regarding the District should be directed through appropriate channels as previously agreed upon by the Chancellor and Board.

Violations of this policy may subject the member violating it to censure by the Board.

Censure Policy

- 1. <u>Statement of Purpose</u>. Censure is an official expression of disapproval passed by the Board. A Board Member may be subject to a resolution of censure by the Board should it be determined that any form of Trustee misconduct has occurred.
 - All Board Members are expected to maintain the highest standards of conduct and ethical behavior. In order to maintain public confidence in the Board, and the governance, the Board will be prepared to investigate the factual basis behind any charge or complaint of Trustee misconduct.
- 2. Censure Procedure. A complaint of Trustee misconduct is submitted by another member, or by a member of the public. The Board will first consider the complaint to determine whether further investigation is warranted. If the Board does determine such further investigation or consideration is warranted, the complaint will be referred by the Board President for investigation and review to an ad hoc committee composed of three Trustees not subject to the complaint. In a manner deemed appropriate by the committee, a thorough fact-finding process shall be initiated and completed within a reasonable period of time to determine the validity of the complaint. This process may include an external investigator, as appropriate.

The Trustee subject to the charge of misconduct shall be permitted to present information to the committee.

Code of Ethics/Standards of Practice (continued)

The committee shall, within a reasonable period of time, make a report of its findings to the Board for action.

3. The committee, if it determines censure may be appropriate, will direct the Chancellor to draft a Resolution of Censure and place the matter on the agenda of the next regular or special Board meeting for consideration by the Board as a whole.

Political Activity

Members of the Board shall not use District funds, services, supplies or equipment to urge the passage or defeat of any ballot measure or candidate, including, but not limited to, any candidate for election to the governing board.

Initiative or referendum measures may be drafted on an area of legitimate interest to the District. The Board may by resolution express the Board's position on ballot measures. Public resources may be used only for informational efforts regarding ballot measures.

Board Member Compensation

Members of the Board who attend all board meetings shall receive \$400.00 \$750.00 per month. A member of the Board who does not attend all meetings held by the Board in any month shall receive, as compensation, an amount not greater than the pro rata share of the number of meetings actually attended.

A member of the Board may be paid for a meeting when absent if the Board, by resolution, finds that at the time of the meeting the member is performing services outside the meeting for the community college District, is ill, on jury duty, or the absence is due to a hardship deemed acceptable by the Board.

Nondiscrimination

The District is committed to equal opportunity in educational programs, employment, and all access to institutional programs and activities.

Administrative regulations shall be established that ensure all members of the college community can present complaints regarding alleged violations of this policy and have their complaints heard in accordance with the Title 5 regulations and those of other agencies that administer state and federal laws regarding nondiscrimination. The regulations shall provide for Academic Senate involvement.

No District funds shall ever be used for membership, or for any participation involving financial payment or contribution on behalf of the District or any individual employed by or associated with it, to any private organization whose membership practices are discriminatory on the basis of national origin, religion, age, sex (gender), race, color, medical condition, ancestry, sexual orientation, marital status, physical or mental disability, or because someone is perceived to have one or more of the foregoing characteristics.

Prohibition of Harassment

All forms of harassment are contrary to basic standards of conduct between individuals and are prohibited by state and federal law, as well as this policy, and will not be tolerated. The District is committed to providing an academic and work environment that respects the dignity of individuals and groups. The District shall be free of sexual harassment and all forms of sexual intimidation and exploitation. It shall also be free of other unlawful harassment, including that which is based on any of the following statuses: national origin, religion, age, sex (gender), race, color, medical condition, ancestry, sexual orientation, marital status, physical or mental disability, or because he or she is perceived to have one or more of the foregoing characteristics.

The District seeks to foster an environment in which all employees and students members of the college and District communities feel free to report incidents of harassment without fear of retaliation or reprisal. Therefore, the District also strictly prohibits retaliation against any individual for filing a complaint of harassment or for participating in a harassment investigation. Such conduct is illegal and constitutes a violation of this policy. All allegations of retaliation will be swiftly and thoroughly investigated. If the District determines that retaliation has occurred, it will take all reasonable steps within its power to stop such conduct. Individuals who engage in retaliatory conduct are subject to disciplinary action, up to and including termination or expulsion.

Any student or employee person who believes that he or she has been harassed or retaliated against in violation of this policy should immediately report such incidents by following the procedures described in AR 3435. Supervisors are mandated to report all incidents of harassment and retaliation that come to their attention.

This policy applies to all aspects of the academic environment, including but not limited to classroom conditions, grades, academic standing, employment opportunities, scholarships, recommendations, disciplinary actions, and participation in any community college activity. In addition, this policy applies to all terms and conditions of employment, including but not limited to hiring, placement, promotion, disciplinary action, layoff, recall, transfer, leave of absence, training opportunities and compensation.

To this end the Chancellor shall ensure that the institution undertakes educational activities to counter discrimination and to prevent, minimize and/or eliminate any hostile environment that impairs access to equal education opportunity or impacts the terms and conditions of employment.

Administrative regulations shall be established that define harassment on campus. The Chancellor shall further establish regulations for employees, students, and other members of the

campus community that provide for the investigation and resolution of complaints regarding harassment and discrimination, and regulations for students to resolve complaints of harassment and discrimination. All participants are protected from retaliatory acts by the District, its employees, students, and agents. The regulations shall provide for Academic Senate involvement.

This policy and related written regulations shall be widely published and publicized to administrators, faculty, staff, and students, particularly when they are new to the institution. They shall be available for students and employees in all administrative offices.

Employees who violate the policy and regulations may be subject to disciplinary action up to and including termination. Students who violate this policy and related regulations may be subject to disciplinary measures up to and including expulsion.

Sexual and Other Assaults on Campus

Any sexual assault or physical abuse, including, but not limited to, rape, as defined by California law, whether committed by an employee, student, or member of the public that occurs on District property is a violation of District policies and regulations, and is subject to all applicable punishment, including criminal **procedures** regulations and employee or student discipline regulations. Students, faculty, and staff who may be victims of sexual and other assaults shall be treated with dignity and provided comprehensive assistance. Administrative regulations shall be established to ensure that students, faculty, and staff who are victims of sexual and other assaults receive appropriate information and treatment and that educational information about **preventing sexual violence is provided and publicized as required by law**. The regulations for sexual assaults shall meet the criteria contained in Education Code section 67385, 67385.7 and 34 C.F.R.§ 668.46.

Standards of Scholarship

Administrative regulations shall establish standards of scholarship consistent with the provisions of Title 5, Sections 55750, et seq. and Board Policy.

These regulations shall address: grading practices, academic record symbols, grade point average, credit by examination, academic and progress probation, academic and progress dismissal, academic renewal, course repetition, limits on remedial coursework, and grade changes. The regulations shall provide for Academic Senate involvement.

Disposal of Property

The Chancellor is delegated authority by the Board to declare as surplus such personal property of the District as is no longer useful for District purposes, and regulations shall be established to dispose of such property in accordance with applicable law. Employment of Convicted Felons

The Board believes that student and employee safety is essential to a successful learning and working environment. The Board recognizes that students and employees must feel safe in order to learn and to work. In order to ensure that students and employees are in a safe environment, individuals who have been convicted of certain felonies will not be permitted to serve as employees of the District.

For the purposes of this Policy, "convicted" will be construed as meaning a plea or verdict of guilty or no contest, a jury verdict of guilty, or a finding of guilt by a court in a trial without a jury.

For purposes of this policy, "felony" is a crime which is punishable with death or by imprisonment in the state prison. This policy applies to any offense which, if committed in this state, would have been punishable as a felony. When a crime is punishable, in the discretion of the court, by imprisonment in the state prison, or by fine or imprisonment in the county jail, it shall be deemed a felony for purposes of this policy.

For purposes of this policy, a violent felony is any felony listed in subdivision (c) of Section 667.5 of the Penal Code and a serious felony is any felony listed in subdivision (c) of Section 1192.7 of the Penal Code.

For purposes of this Policy, "sexual psychopath" will be construed as meaning any person who, by reason of mental defect, disease, or disorder, is predisposed to the commission of sexual offenses to such a degree that he/she is dangerous to the health and safety of others. Applicants determined a sexual psychopath will not be employed.

Applicants convicted of any sex offense, as defined in Education Code Section 87010, will not be employed.

Applicants convicted of any controlled substance offense, as defined in Education Section 87011, will not be employed.

This policy shall not operate to deny a person employment solely on the basis that the person has been convicted of a felony if the person has obtained a certificate of rehabilitation and pardon under Penal Code Section 4852.01 and if probation has been terminated and the

Employment of Convicted Felons (continued)

information or accusation has been dismissed pursuant to Penal Code Section 1203.4. If any conviction is reversed and the formerly convicted person is acquitted of the offense in a new trial, or the charges are dismissed, this section does not prohibit his or her employment thereafter.

State Center Community College District complies with all Education Code provisions regarding employment of convicted felons. In addition, the specific nature of the crime involved may disqualify an applicant from a specific position. These would include, without limitation:

- Applicants convicted of a crime involving theft or fraud may not be employed in a
 position regularly responsible for fiscal matters, including as a cashier, or in a
 position regularly responsible for filing reports of any nature regarding fiscal
 matters.
- Applicants convicted of driving under the influence may not be employed in a
 position regularly required to drive or operate heavy machinery in the course and
 scope of his or her duties.
- Applicants convicted of any crime involving a minor, including a crime involving a
 minor as the victim of the crime, may not be employed in a position regularly
 responsible for supervision of minors or with regular unsupervised contact with
 minors.

Applicants convicted of a serious or violent crime may only be employed by the District if the Governing Board determines from the evidence presented at a hearing that the person has been rehabilitated for at least five years or has received a certificate of pardon under Penal Code 4852.01, or if probation has been terminated and the information or accusation has been dismissed pursuant to Penal Code Section 1203.4.

Academic Employees

Academic employees are all persons employed by the District in academic positions. Academic positions include every type of service, other than paraprofessional service, for which minimum qualifications have been established by the Board of Governors for the California Community Colleges.

Faculty members are those employees who are employed by the District in academic positions that are not designated as supervisory or management. Faculty employees include, but are not limited to, instructors, librarians, counselors, and professionals in health services, DSPS, and EOPS.

Decisions regarding tenure of faculty shall be made in accordance with the evaluation procedures established for the evaluation of probationary faculty and in accordance with the requirements of the Education Code. The Board reserves the right to determine whether a faculty member shall be granted tenure.

The District may employ temporary faculty from time to time as required by the interests of the District. Temporary faculty may be employed full time or part time. The Board delegates authority to the Chancellor to determine the extent of the District's needs for temporary faculty.

Notwithstanding this policy, the District shall comply with its goals under the Education Code regarding the ratio of full-time to part-time faculty to be employed by it and for making progress toward the standard of 75% of total faculty work load hours taught by full-time faculty.

Whistleblower Protection

The Chancellor shall establish procedures regarding the reporting and investigation of suspected unlawful activities by District employees, and the protection from retaliation of those who make such reports in good faith and/or assist in the investigation of such reports. For the purposes of this policy and any implementing procedures, "unlawful activity" refers to any activity, intentional or negligent, that violates state or federal law, local ordinances, or District policy.

The procedures shall provide that individuals are encouraged to report suspected incidents of unlawful activities without fear of retaliation, that such reports are investigated thoroughly and promptly, remedies are applied for any unlawful practices and protections are provided to those employees who, in good faith, report these activities and/or assist the District in its investigation.

Furthermore, District employees shall not: (1) retaliate against an employee or applicant for employment who has made a protected disclosure, assisted in an investigation, or refused to obey an illegal order; or (2) directly or indirectly use or attempt to use the official authority or influence of his or her position for the purpose of interfering with the right of an applicant or an employee to make a protected disclosure to the District. The District will not tolerate retaliation, and will take whatever action may be needed to prevent and correct activities that violate this policy, including discipline of those who violate it up to and including termination.

The State Center Community College District will enter into an Agreement with the Foundation for California Community Colleges to fund the Early Learning and School Readiness AmeriCorps Program at the North Centers. This grant will allow 50 North Center students to provide early learning and school readiness services to 120 preschool-age children while meeting the practicum required for all child development majors. The students selected to become AmeriCorps members will be eligible to earn an educational award of \$1,250 for their services from the AmeriCorp educational trust fund. The Agreement, which includes funding in the amount of \$100,075, is for the period July 1, 2006, through June 30, 2007.

Recommendation:

- a) authorize the District, on behalf of the North Centers, to enter into an Agreement with the Foundation for California Community Colleges to provide early learning and school readiness services, with funding in the amount of \$100,075 for the period July 1, 2006, through June 30, 2007;

Background:

The District has reviewed its contractual legal services in four areas: land acquisition, collective bargaining, employment law and general business issues that, due to workload and case content, cannot be handled by the in-house counsel. Following the advertisement for Request for Proposal, the District received proposals from twelve legal firms from throughout the state of California. On July 25 and 26, 2006 interviews were conducted with all twelve firms. Members of the interview panel were Trustee Isabel Barreras; Doug Brinkley, Vice Chancellor Finance and Administration; Randy Rowe, Associate Vice Chancellor Human Resources; and Eileen O'Hare, General Counsel. Background:

In September 1998 the Board authorized a three-year agreement with one-year extensions for Fresno City College to lease space for purposes of an educational resource center at the Manchester Center. The Manchester Educational Resource Center (MERC) originally housed a variety of services supporting the CalWORKs programs, Workforce Development Board programs and the Fresno WORKS collaborative. These services included assessment, counseling, workshops, and placement activities for CalWORKs students. While the CalWORKs program continues to offer these services at the MERC, a variety of other programs are also now located within the leased space. These programs and services include The Training Institute, the TRIO Educational Talent Search program, Fresno County Health and Human Services employees co-located in the MERC in support of CalWORKs students, short-term training programs, a Tutorial Center, financial aid representation for District students, and general education courses and a work-experience program offered through the Business Education Division.

The Manchester Center itself has proven to be a viable site for a one-stop employment/career center, as well as meeting the needs of these various programs. As a total facility, the Manchester Center has been redeveloped into a mixed-use facility that provides a venue for education, shopping, working and recreation. The Manchester Center enjoys the advantage of being in the geographic and population center of Fresno, provides convenient local arterial access, has easy freeway access, and is a major switching station for public transportation. The Manchester Center also provides 24-hour security, food services, adequate parking and good proximity to Fresno City College.

The current MERC lease agreement cost includes 13,652 square feet of space. This includes 11,367 square feet of contiguous space, a 675 square-foot clothes closet offering business attire for disadvantaged students, and a 1,610 square-foot computer lab located on the same floor east of the MERC. In total, the facility houses seven computer labs and two general-purpose classrooms, as well as office space, a network room and restroom facilities. The recommended lease extension

includes the current base rate of \$1.31 per square foot, plus the District is responsible for HVAC, janitorial, taxes and insurance at a rate of approximately \$.35 per square foot for a total of \$1.66 per square foot. Since the District does not pay a load factor or include any common areas in the cost of the lease, this rate is for actual square footage occupied at the MERC.

This lease rate is adjusted annually by the Cost-of-Living Adjustment for California Community Colleges. The \$1.31 rate per square foot is a competitive rate that compares favorably with other educational and community programs currently housed in the Manchester Center. The administration has been unable to locate a comparable site that offers the geographic advantage of Manchester Center or the available amenities, including parking, food service, public transportation and compatible tenant programs.

An additional advantage of this proposed five-year lease extension is the inclusion of significant improvements to the current facilities. These tenant improvements, funded entirely by Manchester Center, include the addition of a two-ton cooling unit for the network room, carpet replacement and painting throughout the entire facility, and additional requested maintenance items. The cost of this lease will be paid from General Fund monies for Fresno City College and The Training Institute, as well as from grant funding for the TRIO program.

Fiscal Impact:

\$21,658.16/month – General Fund monies for Fresno City College and The Training Institute \$1,000.00/month – Grant Funding for the TRIO program

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve a five (5) year lease extension with Manchester Center, for 13,652 square feet of space to house the Manchester Educational Resource Center, at a cost of \$1.31 per square foot, plus costs for HVAC, janitorial, taxes and insurance, and authorize the Chancellor or Vice Chancellor, Finance and Administration, to sign the extension agreement on behalf of the District.

Background:

With the passage of Measure E in November 2002, the State Center Community College District established a Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee, as required under law (Local School Construction Bond Act of 2000) and the Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee Bylaws adopted by the Board in 2003. The membership of the Committee is to include a student member who is active in student affairs. Jessica Fern, who attended Reedley College, was the student representative to the Committee. She graduated in the spring of 2006 and lost eligibility to serve on the Committee during the summer of 2006. Her term would have ended June 30, 2007. It is, therefore, the recommendation of the administration to appoint Scott Hacker, who also attends Reedley College, to complete the term through June 30, 2007.

The Committee membership is also to include a member of the Foundation Board where the District maintains a Foundation. Don Larson has been the Foundation representative for two terms. Statute restricts a person from serving more than two consecutive terms. Tom Burk with Phoenix Coatings, Inc., of Madera has agreed to serve as the representative from the Foundation Board for a two-year term ending June 30, 2008.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees appoint the following members to the Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee:

- a) Scott Hacker as the student representative to complete the term vacated by Jessica Fern ending June 30, 2007; and

Background:

Proposition 1D will be on the November 2006 statewide general election ballot and will have a direct impact on State Center Community College District. The proposition would provide \$3.1 billion for public higher education facilities, including \$1.5 billion over the next two years for the California Community Colleges for building projects to serve the educational needs of the System's 1.6 million students.

The amount of \$19,247,000 from Proposition 1D has been allocated for the Willow/International Educational Center, Phase II. The District will match this amount with Measure E funding, which will complete Phase II of the project for a total estimated cost of \$38,494,000.

Recommendation:
