








Districtwide Trends: Student Headcount







Service Area Population (2024) vs. SCCCD Employees (2024) & SCCCD Students (2023FA)



Service Area Population (2024) vs. SCCCD Employees (2024) & SCCCD Students (2023FA)








SCCCD Employee Trend – Full-Time Faculty







New Science Building | Fresno City College



Academic Center 3 | Clovis Community College





Authorizes \$14 billion in general obligation bonds for new construction and modernization of K-12 public school facilities; charter schools and career technical education facilities; and California Community Colleges facilities. Fiscal Impact: Increased state costs to repay bonds estimated at about \$934 million per year over the next roughly 30 years.






Awareness of State Center CCD has increased to more than eight in ten...

As you may know, you live in the State Center Community College District. How much do you know about your local community college?






...and nearly seven in ten now believe their local community college needs additional funds.


What we CANNOT do while "at work"

Use district copiers, meeting rooms, or suppliers to advocate for or against the measure, or discuss bond campaign matters – this includes computers, district cell phones or direct lines and district e-mail addresses



What we CANNOT do and say while "at work"

O Urge voters to favor or oppose a bond measure that is before the voters; nor can we discuss "voting yes" in the classroom as a way to influence voters

Educate, Don't Advocate What we CAN do

- ✓ Undertake studies and gather data in connection with the condition and needs of the campuses
- ✓ Inform the citizens of the College's programs and activities, including the need for improved facilities
- ✓ Provide factual, unbiased information about the needs facing the district and what the bond measure will accomplish



Educate, Don't Advocate What we CAN do

- ✓ Distribute factual, unbiased flyers informing voters about the measure
- ✓ Distribute information that constitutes a fair and impartial presentation of fact to aid voters in reaching an informed judgement regarding a bond issue
- ✓ Give a fair presentation of the facts in response to a citizen's request for information



Educate, Don't Advocate What we CAN do

- ✓ Provide factual, unbiased information about the needs facing the district and what the bond measure will accomplish
- ✓ Provide factual, unbiased information about what will happen if the measure does not pass
- ✓ Any officer or trustee may appear at any time before an organization, when requested by the organization, to present the district's view of a bond measure, to discuss the reasons why the Board has called a bond election, and to answer taxpayer questions




Educate, Don't Advocate What we CAN SAY

- ✓ If voters approve, bond funds will be used for...
- ✓ The bond will only be used on facility needs, not salaries
- ✓ Oversight for this bond measure will come from the Citizen's Bond Oversight Committee, which is a non-paid position
