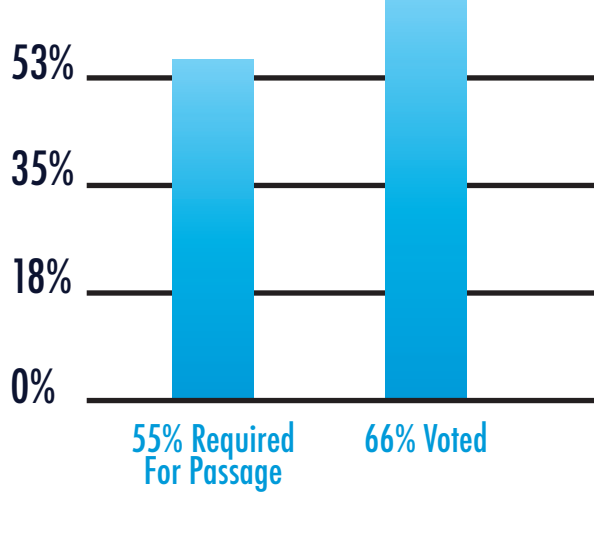

MEASURE E - STILL DELIVERING

Measure E, passed in 2002, was a bond measure that also gave the District the authority to leverage its \$161 million proceeds to acquire an additional \$51 million in state funds to finance a new Fresno City College Career & Technology campus that would include the Police Academy and Fire Academy. When the recession depleted the state funds, the Career & Technology project was delayed. The District has allocated the remaining \$30 million of Measure E so it could build the academies when additional funds became available. The \$30 million from Measure E along with proceeds from Measure C will be used to fulfill the District's original 2002 commitment to the voters to build the Police Academy and the Fire Academy without the reliance on state funding. Updates on the academies will be provided as progress is made.

WHAT'S NEXT

MEASURE C PROGRAM MANAGER SELECTION PROCESS

On December 13, 2016 the Board of Trustees will be voting on staff recommendations to hire the Measure C Program Manager.

The Program Manager, to be selected based on qualifications and experience, will be responsible for prioritizing, scheduling and managing \$485 million of Measure C and an additional \$30 million Measure E bond construction projects located throughout the District.

The request for qualifications (RFQ) was published and actively distributed. Applications have been received and reviewed. Interviews have been conducted and references have been checked.

Contract negotiations are currently taking place. When they are completed staff recommendations will be prepared for consideration by the Board of Trustees.

CAMPUS CONTROL OF PROJECT DESIGNS

The District also solicited applications for architects and has been evaluating their qualifications. A long list of architects will be given to the Board for approval at the December Board meeting.

Once the project manager and the list of architects are approved by the Board, campuses will be asked to put together a design committee for a particular project on their campus. The committee will consist of faculty, staff, students and community members who are knowledgeable about the particular project or an end user of the facility.

Three architects from the SCCC District Board of Trustees approved list of architects will be selected for each campus Measure C design committee. Each campus committee will then interview and select their architect and go through the planning and design process with their professional to ensure local design control of their particular projects. The committee will stay involved through the construction phase and will even be responsible for details like furniture selection.

LEGAL, AUDITING AND FINANCIAL

The Board of Trustees has hired Stradling, Yocca, Carlson & Rauth law offices to serve as bond counsel, the firm of Crowe Horwath as auditor, and KNN Public Finance as the financial advisor. The approved bond underwriters include Morgan Stanley & Co., Piper Jaffray & Co., Stifel Nicolaus & Co., RBC Capital Markets and Rice Financial Products Company.

ENVIRONMENTAL

RFQ's have been issued and responses have been received for the environmental consultant who will assist with land acquisitions and environmental impact reports.

CELEBRATING THE SUCCESS OF COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

During the campaign each Measure C Campus Committee reached out to its community with information on the bond and the specific improvements targeted for funding on each campus. After the vote, the campus committees have been thanking their community volunteers and celebrating their victory.

Reedley College's Madera/Oakhurst Community College Centers hosted the first celebration on October 18, 2016 and Reedley College followed with its celebration on October 19, 2016 that included a bond update presentation and the presentation of proclamations to the Associated Student Government and the community by Reedley College President, Dr. Sandra Caldwell.

CITIZEN OVERSIGHT

The Measure C Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee is made up of nine members. The criteria for selection are established by Prop 39 and includes specific representation. The role of the committee is to oversee expenditures and let the public know if Measure C money is being spent as promised in the ballot measure. Among other responsibilities, the committee will review expenditures to ensure that no bond proceeds are used for instructor or administrative salaries or other operating expenses unrelated to the bond. This newsletter will act as a continuing update tool for the committee and they will also present an annual report to the Board in public session.

The Citizens' Oversight Committee held its first meeting on Thursday, October 27, 2016 at 5:30 p.m. in the District Office Boardroom. Don Larson was named committee chair and Rene Nunez was elected vice chair. Nic Heuer of Stradling, Yocca, Carlson & Rauth law offices reviewed the Bylaws with the committee. Jeff Jensen of Crowe Horwath reviewed the financial and performance audit requirements under the law. Associate Vice Chancellor of Business and Operations, Christine Miktarian, reviewed the Measure C & E projects and Executive Director, Public and Legislative Relations, Lucy Ruiz, reviewed the communication plan.
